Crunch Time

The mighty month of May is upon us which means exam time for our Grade 10 and 12 students. The DP exams commence on Monday. Yes, although it is a public holiday in Ghana, it's not the case everywhere else. Although there was an ICT exam on last Tuesday, the main IGCSE exams begin on Tuesday.

We wish all of our exam students well and we pray that they can achieve the best result that reflects their consistent efforts over the past two years. Unfortunately, each student, especially our Grade 12, carries a lot of expectations from family, peers, school and friends, as well as their own. These expectations can be a bigger burden than the actual exams. However, I am confident that the overwhelming support they will receive during this exam period will ensure their focus is on achieving their goals.

Visiting Saturday

As stated in the special email to parents last Tuesday, a 'Visiting Sunday' is listed on the calendar for this Sunday. Unfortunately, I had overlooked this event, as the previous

Visiting Sunday was only two weeks ago and many parents joined us for the Exam Students' Service on Sunday. Thus, it had not been mentioned in last week's bulletin.

However, as it is scheduled the day before IB exams commence for our G12 students, it has been changed to Saturday, 30 April from 12.30pm-3.30pm. The reason for this change is that there is a high occurrence of students with upset stomachs on the evening or next day following these visits, with the main priority for students being the food brought in. To minimise the risk for our exam students being unwell for the start of their final journey, this event has been moved to Saturday.

I am aware of one international parent who has already arranged to visit on Sunday. As previously stated, international parents may visit when they are in Ghana.

International students have been provided with an option to visit a mall on Saturday during the visiting period on Saturday.

As much as possible, the visit should be kept short to allow students to continue with preparations for exams, Food, if brought in, should be as simple as possible.

MYP: Global Contexts

Teaching and learning in the MYP involves understanding of both key and related concepts within a global context. Learning that occurs outside of a context is often shallow and short term in character. The six learning contexts, used

by all IB world schools, are designed to foster an awareness of the individual's role in, and engagement within, an increasingly interconnected and complex global society.

Identities and Relationships

Students will explore identity; beliefs and values; personal, physical, mental, social and spiritual health; human relationships including families, friends, communities and cultures; what it means to be human.

Orientation in Space and Time

Students will explore personal histories; homes and journeys; turning points in humankind; discoveries; explorations and migrations of humankind; the relationships between, and the interconnectedness of, individuals and civilizations, from personal, local and global perspectives.

Personal and Cultural Expression

Students will explore the ways in which we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs and values; the ways in which we reflect on, extend and enjoy our creativity; our appreciation of the aesthetic.

Scientific and Technical Innovation

Students will explore the natural world and its laws; the interaction between people and the natural world; how humans use their understanding of scientific principles; the impact of scientific and technological advances on communities and environments; the impact of environments on human activity; how humans adapt environments to their needs.

Globalization and Sustainability

Students will explore the interconnectedness of humanmade systems and communities; the relationship between local and global processes; how local experiences mediate the global; the opportunities and tensions provided by world-interconnectedness; the impact of decision-making on humankind and the environment.

Fairness and Development

Students will explore rights and responsibilities; the relationship between communities; sharing finite resources


with other people and with other living things; access to equal opportunities; peace and conflict resolution.

When teachers select a global context for learning, they are answering the following questions:

- Why are we engaged in this inquiry?
- Why are these concepts important?
- Why is it important for me to understand?
- Why do people care about this area of learning?

The six MYP global contexts (below) inspire explorations of our common humanity and shared guardianship of the planet. They invite students to reflect on local, national and global communities in addition to the real-life issues and concerns of 11 to 16 year old students. For each MYP unit of inquiry, teachers should identify one global context that establishes a focus for meaningful teaching and learning in a programme of international education. Over the course of their study, students will encounter all six global contexts. These contexts provide the common point of entry for inquiries into what it means to be internationally minded, framing a curriculum that promotes multilingualism, intercultural understanding and global engagement.

In the final year of the programme, the global contexts are assessed through the Personal Project which is completed by students in Grade 10

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THE MAKING OF ALWAYS AND FOREVER



In the making of *Always and Forever*, a story by Fafa Apreku and Jacqueline Buba, the two have emerged with such vitality to tell a story; one that is insightful, reflective, and evocative. Taking inspiration from Robert Frost's 'The Road Not Taken' in which the persona draws our attention to an important aspect of life, making (right) choices, the two remind us of another human experience – friendship and love, which is portrayed through the characters, Fafa and Kekeli.

Through an epistolary form, one reminiscent of Mariama Ba's *So Long a Letter*, Fafa writes to her friend, Kekeli and narrates the experiences and moments they have shared. In perfect sync with Helen Keller's concept of friendship, "I would rather walk with a friend in the dark, than alone in the light," we are given a realistic overview of what friendship entails: good times and bad times, presence and absence; and hope and despair.

Through a flashback, we see the resplendent moments in friendship symbolized by Fafa and Kekeli enthusiastically searching for shells and chasing tiny crabs. Nonetheless, they instill the idea that life is not perpetually rosy. The metaphor of murder highlights

the despondency of friendship as Fafa tells Kekeli, "But you swore never to kill, did you not? You did not kill physically, yet you killed us. You killed our resiliency ... you killed several times over."

This is suggestive of the changing scenes of life: the disintegration of the bond that friends and lovers share, and sometimes (or most of the time) the irreparable consequences of disappointment. This is real and the two achieve their purpose of not just writing and recollecting a utopian world of tranquility, but indeed demonstrating realism and dualism — phenomena we can relate with.

Regardless of such pessimistic tendencies of friendship and love, Fafa suggests to Kekeli that their fluctuating experience is synonymous to her growth and maturity. She says, "It's made me realize the truth of life, the truth of love." They suggest that love is "inexplicable and irrevocable." If this is true and we agree with Shakespeare that "Love alters not with his brief hours and weeks/ But bears it out even to the edge of doom," then *Always and Forever*.

Creative Arts Updates

WHY STUDY CREATIVE ARTS

The Creative Arts is second nature to the life of any individual as everything we do goes through a process of finding, engagement and expression. A child is borne into a world (stage) and engages with the world in finding the self (identity) in becoming an individual.

During this process of finding and discovering, one engages with a number of encounters that happen in society and with people. These encounters are creative encounters and its expression is the art.

Why study a

Mind Under Serenity, to Impact our students Creatively

Every student is musically inclined which is tracked back to the very first note sung by most children when they transition from one world to the other. Imagine being in a room and experiencing the birth of 10 children at the same time. It is this orchestration that is developed in children when they study music; how to further explore through voice and instruments, what has naturally been given at birth.

According to Caroline Phillips, early musical training helps develop brain areas involved in language and reasoning. It is thought that brain development continues for many years after birth. Recent studies have clearly indicated that musical training physically develops the part of the left side of the brain known to be involved with processing language, and can actually wire the brain's circuits in specific ways. Linking familiar songs to new information can also help imprint information on young minds.

There is also a causal link between <u>music and spatial</u> <u>intelligence</u> (the ability to perceive the world

accurately and to form mental pictures of things). This kind of intelligence, by which one can visualize various elements that should go together, is critical to the sort of thinking necessary for everything from solving advanced mathematics problems to being able to pack a book-bag with everything that will be needed for the day.

Students of the arts (music) learn to think creatively and to solve problems by imagining various solutions, rejecting outdated rules and assumptions. Questions about the arts (music) do not have only one right answer.

Recent studies show that students who study the arts (music) are more successful on <u>standardized tests</u> such as the SAT. They also achieve higher grades in high school.

A study of the arts (music) provides children with an internal glimpse of other cultures and teaches them to be empathetic towards the people of these cultures. This development of compassion and empathy, as opposed to development of greed and a "me first" attitude, provides a bridge across cultural chasms that leads to respect of other races at an early age.

Students of music learn craftsmanship as they study how details are put together painstakingly and what constitutes good, as opposed to mediocre, work.

In music, a mistake is a mistake; the instrument is in tune or not, the notes are well played or not, the entrance is made or not. It is only by much hard work that a successful performance is possible. Through music study, students learn the value of sustained effort to achieve excellence and the concrete rewards of hard work.

Music study enhances teamwork skills and discipline.

Music provides children with a means of self-expression.

Music study develops skills that are necessary in the workplace. It focuses on "doing," as opposed to observing, and teaches students how to perform, literally, anywhere in the world. Employers are

looking for multi-dimensional workers with the sort of flexible and supple intellects that music education helps to create.

Musical performance teaches young people to conquer fear and to take risks. A little anxiety is a good thing, and something that will occur often in life. Dealing with it early and often makes it less of a problem later.


