Sex Education Workshops

The Mbaasem Foundation, as part of their ongoing effort to prevent sexual abuse, will be conducting sex education workshops over three evenings for our students from 14-16 March

The workshops will cater for three different age groups: G7-8; G9-10; and G11-12. The 7-10 workshop is basic sex education for pre-adolescent and teenage years that will focus on educating on the misconceptions on sex and sexuality, given lessons on teenage pregnancy and its consequences, HIV/AIDS, as well as what a healthy and respectful dating life looks like.

The 11-12 workshop will focus on the rudiments of sexual consent and also recognize situations of sexual assault and rape in order to help prevent it and raise the necessary alarms.


