• Challenge Week:

While G10 students were finishing their final IGCSE exams and G11 students were completing their Group 4 project, G7-9 students were either involved in the Creative Week Challenge, or NXplorers. For Challenge Week, students in their House Colour teams had two challenges.







Challenge 1: Short Film. The short film challenge was to create a 6-minutes short film about the Essence of TIS. This film had to tell the story from the perspective of the filmmakers, according to the nominated/chosen required element. Films were judged on: story, writing, treatment, cinematography, directing, sound; location, editing, costume, and innovation.

• Mawuena and Emmanuel

We were provided with a dilemma this week. Mawuena, for whom we raised the required amount to pay for his hole-in-the-heart operation, has shown some natural healing and the Children's Heart Foundation Ghana has advised that Mawuena requires a further 6-12 months monitoring to determine if an operation is required.







Meanwhile, the foundation has recommended that Emmanuel Selassie would be a suitable recipient for the heart surgery funding that G11 students organised as part of their major project.

It is a dilemma as the whole TIS community rallied behind Mawuena and we were all thrilled to reach a big target. However, the foundation ensures a due diligence process and, at this stage, Mawuena's operation will not proceed. As the ultimate purpose of the fundraising was assist a young child who required open-heart surgery, it is important that we provide the funds to the next child on the waiting list.

We pray that Mawuena's heart continues to heal naturally so that surgery is not required in the future. However, if assistance is required in the future, TIS will attempt to support him in the most appropriate way.

Again, thank you, G11, for their successful project to save a life. Special thanks to everyone who contributed to this worthwhile cause.

• Merit List, ISSAG and G7/8 Subject Awards

Tonight, after dinner, students will be presented with their merit list awards for the current academic year, ISSAG certificates, and G7/8 students who gained first place in their individual subjects will receive certificates.

Devices for Students in G7-9

From the start of the 2016/2017 academic year, students in Grades 7-10 will be able to bring one device to school for use in the classroom, under teacher guidance. Devices exclude mobile phones and the preferred device for students is a laptop computer. Students in G11-12 may bring two devices.

Parents should note that a device is not mandatory and the choice is the parents' decision. However, a device will provide convenience to students, as all students will be accessing ManageBac (MB) from August, as well as Naviance, a guidance program to support students right through to the submission of their university applications.

Parents are reminded that students with devices may only log onto the TIS network and not bring their own internet modems to school. For those students using a tablet, parents must ensure the sim card is removed or disabled if the device is cellular.

Reminder – IB1 Parents

Thank you for supporting our students through the initial stages of the application process.

The summer break is the ideal time to discuss final choices for the colleges/universities that our students will be attending. Expect an email from your ward's counselor on some important information relating to their applications and progress.

Test Reminders

The Preliminary SAT / National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT / NMSQT), 2016:

We will be registering students for the upcoming PSAT exam, scheduled to take place in October 2016.

The PSAT exam is a simpler version of the New SAT Aptitude test required by most U.S. universities as part of the admission requirements. It is **open to Grade 10 students**. Interested students will have to sign up as soon as school resumes and parents will be informed of the registration fee and registration deadline early next semester.

Advantages of taking the PSAT exam:

- \checkmark The PSAT exam offers an opportunity for students to become conversant with the format of the New SAT.
- ✓ It serves as a practice exam for students to get better acquainted with the various sections of the New SAT exam; Evidence Based Reading & Writing, Mathematics (with and without the calculator).
- ✓ Students receive feedback on the areas they scored poorly on and are able to identify their errors and strengths and improve their test taking skills.
- \checkmark It is shorter and easier than the NEW SAT exam
- ✓ Eligible Grade 10 students (U.S. citizens) who score highly on the PSAT stand the chance of winning scholarships for university through the NMSQT.

All test takers have been reminded of their **valid unexpired passports,** as the <u>only</u> acceptable form of ID based on strict ACT Inc. directives (USA).







Photocopies or printed scanned copies are unacceptable.

Scores are usually available online, 6-8 weeks after the test date, by logging into your child's account using his/her username and password.

Reporting time for test takers is 7:15am and the exam is scheduled to end at about 12:45pm.

Test takers are reminded to have their passports for the test.


We made a significant amount of money, though we are yet to finalize the account, all thanks to the support from our parents


