I have had the privilege to attend the Re-Imagine Education Conference and the Gala Opening of the African Leadership University (ALU) in Mauritius this week. Both TIS and ALU share and pursue a similar goal: to produce future leaders. ALU is a young, focused and innovative tertiary institution that will make a strong and positive impact across Africa with its outstanding graduates. Its focus is on real learning and as TIS Alumni, Selasi Torkornoo, said in her welcoming speech to guests on Tuesday night, 'I wake up each day ready to enjoy another day of learning at ALU.' Each student I have met at ALU this week is enthused and excited about their learning, their coursework and the innovative approach to learning that makes ALU stand out as a unique university. These student progress reports will be available online by noon on Thursday, 24 March. Parents will receive an email when these reports are available and how to access them.


CAS Updates

SEX EDUCATION WORKSHOP:

TIS hosted *Nana Akosua Hanson* - from the Mbaasem Foundation- and her team in a 3-day Sex Education Workshop.

Recognising that young adults and teenagers in today's world of social media need to be well informed and educated on sex-related issues, and thus be prepared adequately and cleared of all myths and misconceptions about sex, there was the need for this workshop which dealt extensively with issues such as consent, boundaries, sexual assault (rape), safe sex, STIs &

HIV/AIDS, especially for our Grade 12 students who will be leaving for university in less than a year. It was a very interactive exercise in which students gained a deeper understanding of issues. Below are a few remarks.

"It was an interesting talk. It made me conscious of some things I was totally oblivious of. For example, the different ways that people can lure you into having sex. It also cleared some misconceptions I had about the characteristics of a potential rapist."

NB: These schools should be the student's preferred choices. However, IB only allows one Canadian and one U.S. school. The other four schools can be in Ghana, UK, Hungary, Mauritius, or anywhere else that your ward has applied.

Please include <u>all</u> Ghanaian Universities to which your ward is applying.

Kindly keep the following factors in mind as you choose your top 6 schools:

- Location
- Affordability
- Programme of study

NHSMUN Report

The National High School Model United Nations (NHSMUN) Conference trip to New York City was a wonderful experience. Twenty-eight delegates comprising seventeen males and eleven females represented two countries (Djibouti and the Federated States of Micronesia) in 15 committees including ECOFIN, AU, World Bank, SOCHUM, SPECPOL, FAO, WTO, UNESCAP, DISEC, LEGAL and UNESCO. Our cherished delegates and four teachers left the shores of Ghana on Sunday, 28 February and reached their destination on Monday, 29 February, 2016.

Visit by TIS Alumni

Three of our Alumni, Elom Tettey Tamaklo, Nyahan Tachie-Menson (IB Class of 2015) and Kwaku Dapaah Opoku (IB class of 2014) paid us a visit at the hotel. The leader of the group, Elom Tettey Tamaklo, being a seasoned MUN student director, shared his experiences with our delegates and encouraged them to be on point during committee sessions.

Opening Ceremony

The opening ceremony was held at Hilton Grand ballroom (3rd Floor) on Wednesday,2 March, from 5.15pm-6.15pm. It was a colourful event with over three thousand and eight hundred (3,800) delegates from one hundred and fifty-seven (157) schools. The Secretary-General, Costanza Cicero, finally declared the conference open at 6.15pm.

Committee Sessions

The delegates had their Committee Session I on 2 March from 8.45pm -11.15pm. In total, there were five Committee Sessions with thirty-one (31) committees. Some of these committees were overcrowded, especially, LEGAL, ECOFIN, UNESCO and AU which impeded fruitful discussions and debates. However, some of our delegates managed to get their resolutions passed.

Mission Briefings

Thirteen delegates accompanied by two teachers had their Mission Briefing at the Permanent Mission of Djibouti, 866 United Nations Plaza, Suite 4011, New York, NY 10017 at 10.00am on Thursday, 3 March, 2016. The rest of the delegates of the Federated States of Micronesia with two teachers also had their Mission Briefing at the Hilton Hotel Midtown at the same time. These mission briefings served as an eye-opener for our delegates and increased their confidence levels during their committee sessions.

Position Papers

As part of the pre- conference requirements, our delegates submitted their position papers on two topics in each committee. The feedback from NHSMUN staff was excellent and we are very proud of our delegates. Our delegates would have won so many awards had it not been NHSMUN's policy of



de-emphazing awards during conferences and **recognizing entire delegations** rather than individuals in each committee.

Meals

A daily breakfast buffet was served at the Hilton Hotel Midtown and our delegates really enjoyed themselves. They had their lunch and dinner from eatery spots around the hotel being accompanied by the teachers.

Closing Ceremony

The conference finally came to an end with the closing ceremony at the United Nations General Assembly Hall at the UN Headquarters at 1.45pm on Friday, 4 March, 2016. Only three schools were given awards for continuously attending the conference for the past ten years and over.


