Parent Reminders

Report on Slapton Ley Field Centre Trip

30th October-5th November 2016

The field study team of 20 students and three teachers arrived at the Slapton Ley Field Study Centre UK at about 10:30pm on Monday, 31 October 2016.

The program is outlined below

Monday 31	
October	Arrival at FSC
Day Two	Breakfast was served at 8:00am and was followed by an introductory workshop
Tuesday	from 9:00-10:30am with our instructor be Nick Paskin.
1 November	We were then given equipment such as a tape measure, a meter rule, quadrant and
	a clipboard, and later we split into groups of three and one group of two.
	At 11:00am the field team began a recognisance walk to explore the local
	coastline, Slapton Sands. We observed the types of plants, the human population,
	and the salinity of the soil, seed dispersion, moisture content and many other
	issues for an environmental survey. Students took the opportunity to investigate
	the social, economic and environmental impacts of tourism, using Tocross Bay as
	a case study area.
	The team then gathered for an investigation of the flora and fauna of at the Slapton shingle beach.
	We strolled back to the Slapton Ley Field Centre, to rest for about 40 minutes and
	soon made our way to the soil lab where we planned to calculate for soil moisture.
	The group gathered again after dinner for a seminar on data analysis.
Day Three	Biology and ESS students visited the Slapton Ley National Nature Reserve to
Wednesday	explore the local nature reserve which is managed by the field centre. This
2 nd November	provided the students with an exciting opportunity to learn a variety of ecological
	sampling techniques in a range of habitats. Specimen collected from the
	woodlands and the lake were sent to the FSC lab for discussion and analysis before
	dinner.
	Later in the evening the course instructors, Nick and Chloe with the assistance of
	the accompanying teachers (Richmond, Michael and Yvonne) guided the students
	to prepare a proposal and practical scheme of work for their own IA.















	Geography students took a trip to Dartmouth, a coastal town, and honeypot centre for tourism. Students worked in groups of three to collect a variety of data from five survey zones for their Geography IA. The group arrived at FSC by 4:30pm where the data was collated and pooled together for analysis. There was a seminar after dinner which gave the students an opportunity to learn variety of skills for the treatment and analysis of the data collected.
Day Four: Thursday, 3 November	There was a seminar for Biology and ESS students to present and explain their practical scheme of work. Each student was given the set of equipment needed for the collection of both quantitative and qualitative data on the nature reserve in a habitat of their choice. Data was collected from <i>Slapton Ley National Nature Reserve and Slapton Sands Shingle beach</i> .
	The data collected were sent to the FSC lab for further analysis. Later in the evening, series of seminars on statistical techniques for data analysis were organised for the students.
	The Geography students stayed at the FSC seminar room under the supervision of Miss Tagoe and started the write-up their IA.
Day Five Friday, 4 November	Write-up, shopping at Plymouth and departure The day was mostly dedicated to the write-up of IAs. Workshops were organised through-out the sessions to explain how to appropriately present, analyse and evaluate data. The accompanying teachers and the course instructor provided the technical assistance for the write-up.
	At 12:30pm, the group then proceeded to Plymouth, an urban centre which is about an hour drive away from The Field Centre for shopping. The team arrived at 6:15pm at the Field Centre, had dinner at 7:00pm, cleared and cleaned the labs, packed luggage and departed out of the centre at 11pm.
Day Six Saturday, 5 November	Arrival at Heathrow airport 5:00am, departure at 8:40am. Arrived in transit at Schiphol airport (Amsterdam) at 11:05am. Lunch at 11:30am and thereafter departure from Schiphol airport at 2:25pm. Arrival at Kotoka International Airport, Accra at 8:10pm.















In all the field trip was an insightful experience for all the Biology, Geography and ESS students. All students were exposed to a variety of simple but modern apparatus for gathering data from the field.

Apart from the field work experience where students were exposed to different habitats (river, stream, forest reserves, ponds, sea shore) to enrich their data collected, the lab work was another interesting moment where students were introduced to various techniques of data analysis and presentation. This facilitated the write-up of the students' Internal Assessment Reports.

We are glad to say that all students who went on this trip appreciated the relevance of this trip as each of them was able to complete their IA in either one of these subjects: Biology, Geography or ESS.

The team wishes to express their profound gratitude to the Principal and the senior management of Tema International School for the opportunity to undertake this trip.

Based on the timelines we provided earlier, November is the recommended month for submission of applications to US., Canadian and UK universities.

Tit-Bits on Counseling in TIS

Some refer to it as deliverance, healing and giving advice. Others term it as finding out who is right, who is wrong and telling people what to do. However, the right descriptors are: therapeutic, active listening, helping others solve their problems by viewing various options and dealing with feelings. This is the perception and reality of counseling.

Counseling is a profession that has been around for years and is aimed at assisting individuals and groups to make adjustments, informed choices and decisions and also resolve challenges (psychological, emotional and social) associated with life. Counseling involves two people (counselor and counselee(s)). The counselor is usually a psychologist or any other professional with the requisite knowledge and training in counseling. On the other hand, the counselee(s) is an individual(s) or a group with problems that require the assistance of a counselor.

At TIS, counseling services are available and easily accessible to students, staff, parents / guardians and in general the wider school community. These individuals either voluntarily seek help, are referred or are approached by the counselor. The session is held in private (counselor and counselee) and confidentiality is highly guaranteed and positive outcome assured. The counselor works with the counselee to understand the issue at hand and suggests alternative way of resolving the issue - the counselor does not impose his or her will on counselee. Students, staff and parents are always welcome to share their concerns on any issue that they have. Below are my details.

Journalist for Arts and Culture Awards - who also doubled as the Keynote Speaker for the event, among a host of others.

TIS Creative Writers and Photographers Workshop through the Camera's Lens.

On Friday, 11 November, 2016, at the rise of the morning sun, the organizers of the TIS Creative Writers and Photographers Workshop garnered at the base of the Handel-Picasso Block. The Organizers had to be there promptly to organize the remainder of yesterday's preparation. The student organizers were more than animated for the day. The feeling was awesome; meeting students from other schools and also putting their skills and expertise to service was the prize. While the staff organizers were finalizing logistics, the student organizers eagerly awaited amidst playing music to contribute to the serene atmosphere, for the arrival of the first batch of participants. The organizers were designated to various sessions and ensured that participants were giving appropriate amenities. The registration process was marked with a loving euphoria and an expectant mood.

At the opening plenary session, participants were given a gist of the agenda for this year's conference by looking at her predecessor. Members from various schools accounted for the reading of poems from last year's conference to show the beauty and diversity of the students. The keynote speaker was introduced and with an eye catching biography, Mr.Kofi Akpabli took the stage. He focused on the goal of the youth to capture the moments and retell the stories to our future generation. Mr. Akpabli left some remarks and quotes with the students to take on through the course of the conference. At the Multi-Purpose Hall, after the opening conference the participants socialized over the day's snacks.

The first parallel sessions – Photography, Screenplay, Poetry, Short Story, Music, and Spoken Word - began on high notes. The Photography session for instance, started with a blast. Participants were given the open space to interact and introduce themselves. The facilitators suggested each of their previous experience and current experience in the fields they were working with. Participants were introduced to the basics of the camera and had to learn to use the medium before they could see the product. They were introduced to the functions and the bodies of various examples of DSLRS. Three components were essential to learning the basics as the facilitator suggested, ''Photography is the control of light'': Aperture, ISO and Shutter speed were quintessential to the functioning of the camera. The participants experimented with the different conditions and the roles of the ISO, Aperture, and Shutter Speed, got a fair and personal experience with the facilitators and learnt how to adjust the various settings on the camera.

On Saturday, 12 of November, 2016, the day after, participants arrived early. The organizers ushered them to their designated areas. "Bringing words to life" with Mr. Akoi-Jackson was active, during the plenary session. Sample presentations and videos were given to elaborate the idea of performance of written works. Participants were given tasks to make a choral reading using intonation. A general topic was not given, rather keywords to be embedded in the works. After our enrichment session which lasted for an hour, we broke off into the parallel sessions.















The photography class started with a recap of the day before. Participants were introduced to how photography is able to transform various lives and is a means for expression. The participants were engaged in a one-to-one to session to experience the varied components of photography.

The participants then began their performance of the works they had composed. This involved various genres including spoken word, music lyrics, poetry, short stories and many more. This was an interesting and entertaining platform for the students. At the closing ceremony, all participants expressed feelings of fulfillment and expressed gratitude for being part of the workshop. By its nature, departure always comes with feelings of melancholy, especially when the people are one. It was with a tremendous heartache, as participants bid their farewells and traded their contacts. 






Sounds of Triumph Concert









MYP Corner
