Balance (and Consistency)

As we come close to the end of the first semester, it is important for students to reflect on their achievements and plan goals for next semester. TIS is a very busy school and, being residential, there are many opportunities and activities to identify, develop, improve and enhance their knowledge, skills and understanding.

There is a tendency to leave things to the last minute, whether it is an assessment task, activity, training or revision. Usually, the result is not optimal performance, students are tired and prone to illness. Some/many students wear 'study cramming' as a badge of honour, yet do not appreciate the full ramifications.

Students have been encouraged to ensure they exercise daily to provide some balance, especially during exam season. I have noticed the regular gym users are students who are focused on their studies.

It is a balance and consistency of effort that will maximize student achievement. Students are aware of activities in advance and should plan ahead to avoid conflicts and barriers to achieving their goals for second semester. Changing to a strategic, rather than a last-minute approach, will bring its rewards.

MYP Corner

Inquiry Based Learning

In my workshops for teachers new to the MYP, I often ask them to visualize Inquiry Based Learning. This results in creative combinations of text and images describing the buzz, the researching, energy, questioning and the collaboration of students. It is definitely not the picture of a classroom with tables in rows with students facing and listening to the teacher lecturing. I am not going to state that lecturing should be completely banned from the classroom, but it shouldn't take the whole lesson.

More important is to create a learning environment where questioning, trial and error are used to enhance the learning. We ask our teachers to create or have engaging lessons, but how do you achieve this? Above all it needs the experienced, skillful, passionate teacher who wants to share the passion of the subject with the students.

















Further more it needs lessons that require students to inquire in their own way. The more we allow for individual inquiry, the more the students will be engaged in their own learning based on their curiosity. Collaboration is another way to work with inquiry. As they say "two know more than one" and together students will be able to come up with more inquiry, as well as shared solutions.



The above is what I witnessed this week when walking into a grade 7 Math lesson with Ms. Yvonne Tagoe. The classroom has quarter circle tables that can be put together in different ways to create bigger and smaller working groups. The students were working in these groups on different sub tasks as part of their unit inquiry.

In some of the reflections students have been writing about the MYP they mention how much fun the lessons can be. If we have been able to achieve this in the first semester than I am a happy MYP Coordinator. It means that we indeed have the experienced and engaging teachers that can make inquiry based learning happening.

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Mathematics Corner

End of Unit Mini Project- Grade 7 Mathematics class

Unit 3: Decision-Making helps us to specify one or more conditions to be evaluated by formulae.

Task: Plan a trip to Mole National Park for a family of 3 adults and 3 children. Criteria: B, C & D

Content: Constructing, simplifying and evaluating expressions, solving equations

ATL: communication and self management

Differentiation: Scaffolding – the use of a template to provide structure to the task. As part of project based learning, Grade 7 is under taking a short project which has been broken into several manageable tasks which together will create a write up. They have been given a template to guide them in their task from. Some will stick closely to this and others will use it as a check list once they have completed their work.

They were allowed to choose their own mode of transport. So far these have ranged from a Mini Cooper to very large Lamborghini V12 engine car to a commercial air flight. They have to choose their own accommodation and food and calculate the costs.

They have to work out how much it costs to get there are back. For those going by car they have to calculate the fuel consumption of their respective cars for the distance they will cover and fine the cost of their fuel.

They will have to construct their own expressions and equations to complete their calculations based on knowledge gained during the unit. They then have to reflect on what they have done and how to improve their decision making for any further projects.

Before this project the majority of the class did not know where Mole National Park was, now they want to plan a school trip there!

ACT December Reminder

A unexpired passport is the only form of acceptable ID for admission for the test. Anyone without a passport will not be allowed to write the test. Those writing ACT December should be sure to bring their passports to school and leave them with the college guidance department if they have not already.

January SAT Registration:

If your student has registered for January SAT all payments should be made in U.S. dollars only. The SAT is \$110.

IB2 College Applications:

All IB2 students are reminded to complete all application requests such as transcripts and recommendation letters to their universities with December and January deadlines, before we close for the Christmas break. Based on the timelines we provided earlier, November is the month recommended for all U.S., Canadian and UK university applications.

IB1 College Applications:

All IB1 students are reminded to discuss their country of choice with their parents during this vacation. Each student should have a list of at least 5 schools for every country that they are applying to upon their return to school, and this list will be reviewed by their college guidance counselors.

ATL (Approaches to Learning) Skills:

Grade 7 & 8 students are learning about the importance of ATL skills for their academic success. These skills fall into five categories, being communication, social, self-management, research, and thinking. The students have made goals for their ATL development for next term. Some of their goals include the following:

• I will try to not be scared to ask questions, even in subjects that I find difficult, like French.







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








- I will stop using vulgar words when I feel very angry.







