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## CAS Updates

### Red Cross Volunteering - Reflections from Student Participants



On 6 March 2017, a team consisting of 5 members of the TIS Red Cross Society attended an Independence Day celebration at Kpone, Tema, to act as first aiders in case of any emergencies. This was a very interesting experience for me. Before setting off to Kpone, I did not want to go because I felt like I would just spend all my time walking around in

the sun, doing nothing because I felt like no Red Cross treatment would be needed. But not more than 10 minutes after our arrival, we were called to action. Children who had not eaten since morning were made to stand in the scorching sun from 7am to 12pm. Many children collapsed even before 9am and being a small number, this was an arduous task for us. Being the only boy amongst the Red Cross members present, I had to put up a show of strength, carrying several casualties. I, for one, do not understand why the children could not have been given canopies and chairs to sit on and relax until their turn to march. I believe this would have been a better idea instead of putting the lives of the little children at risk. All in all, it was a really eye opening experience and I wish to do more and put the skills I have learnt as a Red Cross member into action when needed. **(Kevin Selorm Mensah \_ Grade 11)**

On the 6 March, five members of the TIS Red Cross visited Kpone to assist the students participating by acting as first aiders in case of an emergency. Only 5 out of more than 20 members were present so at first I felt rather discouraged but through the course of the day I became rather excited to be part of the event. The event itself was not very pleasant as it could have been especially regarding the welfare of the children. The children had been standing at attention for over 4 hours in the heat of the sun while adults and officials lounged under canopies. These conditions therefore heightened the chances of children collapsing. We, the Red Cross, had our hands full attending to the constant influx of dizzy, nauseated and unconscious children. The TIS Amnesty Study Group had an orientation with the mother body, Amnesty International, Ghana. Two national executives, the Acting Country Director, Mr. Frank Doyi and Mr. Isaac Nyanteh, the Human Rights Education Coordinator, visited the students and shared the goals and projects of Amnesty International. As people who are concerned about the promotion, protection and respect of human rights, the students present appreciated the orientation session and look forward to joining in the positive and responsible activism of Amnesty International. The club wishes to extend its appreciation to Mr. Frank Doyi and Mr. Isaac Nyanteh for gracing the orientation session. Below is a review of the orientation **Chloe Asiedu, the initiator of the club in TIS.**

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## Review of Amnesty International Orientation in TIS

A close knit family dreams of their warm afternoons gliding through the water in the new home they had just acquired. Just moments ago, the couple's two children passed the gate. A batch of security personnel quickly divided these families leaving them estranged. Their freedom is suppressed under political pretenses. Redefine their personality and ascribe terrorists to their ceremonial name. The American dream you propagated to them has finally been reached. Yet, you seize them. Seize them from the opportunity to be educated, restrict their liberty to protect your national security.

Mr. Frank Doyi gave us a brief overview on the aims of Amnesty International and the evolution of the organization. Amnesty's aim is ensuring the freedom of individuals. We should reach through the walls of policy makers, activists to exercise the change we need. However, this all stems from our participation and our dedication to ensuring humanity is preserved. There should be mutual respect bearing in my mind our principles and this will annihilate conflict. The students of Tema International School were encouraged to channel their energies into courses of responsible actions including processions, public forums and lobbying the parliament. Amnesty's position and partnership with United Nations and its subsidiaries would be a pedestal in our representation.

Mr. Isaac Nyanteh said we must be accountable for our views. To put our human rights, lens into perspective, our demands must be met with supply. This supply comes from students promoting human rights in all forms starting from participation in student governance. We must establish a collaborative relationship between students to staff and staff to students to project our issues. Human rights issues don't start from a foreign planet. They start right from our domestic activities and our contribution towards mankind's decline. We must find a way to conserve our dignity and allow freedom to be disseminated across the globe. Considering Ghana's valuable contribution towards the success of Amnesty, we must practise what we preach. This accounted for the perseverance towards abolishing the death penalty. Often clouded by human errors or further evidence people were later vindicated. The death penalty might be a punishment yet it does not serve as reformation for the character and cannot inspire people to do so. Furthermore, we must also shape our culture to defend our human rights issues. Our culture can be a benefit but can also slow the progress of amendments. Our session ended with an open ended, interactive question time.

The students of Tema International School had not exhausted their questions during the session and pounced for more. This led to a series of student initiatives and a reformation in the way students can bring about an impact in the school. The meeting was adjourned but with our scope expanded, we started to think of ways to start our first project. To influence our society and ensure everyone's individuality is expressed. 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On 7 Mach 2017, representatives from the Amnesty International group in Ghana honoured the school with their presence to brief us on the tasks and objectives of this prestigious non-government organization. We were told about the role Amnesty takes in protecting the rights and freedoms of people. We were told about the numerous measures Amnesty has taken to ensure that the rights of people are respected. These included organizing public awareness programs, writing letters to government officials and organizing demonstrations. The team encouraged us to provide our aid in which ever means possible to support the cause of Amnesty International. Do you as an educational institute spend time on practising parading in military style or is time better spent on learning? We should not confuse discipline with learning to respect each other, as well as rules and regulations to a certain extent. It is in the first section of the IB Mission Statement: “The international Baccalaureate aims to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and *respect*”.

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## Counselor's Corner



### College Application Process- IB1 Parents

The one-on-one meeting with IB1 parents and students to discuss the College Application Process, preferences and progress with the Counselors comes off soon. Expect an email from your child's Counselor and please remember to sign up. Thank you.

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**SAT May** – SAT May registration is now available- the last opportunity to take the SAT in IB1. Students should register by **Friday, 10 March**. Registration payment of \$US110 should be paid to the college guidance counseling department by **Tuesday, 14 March**.

### An important note on SAT & ACT

We encourage *all* IB1s considering university/college education in the United States to register for May SAT due this week. College Board, the official SAT Test Agency has formally notified us of some changes in the dates available for taking future SAT Tests. We have therefore modified our test dates to reflect some of these changes for the next academic year.

Returning 1B1 & IB2 students should note that they must register for September ACT before the close of this academic year. **SAT and ACT tests should be taken during IB1**, as this is the time when students are expected to write the exams and this eases the burden of having to take it in IB2 when universities and scholarship application deadlines come up as early as November. In IB2 students can take it in October and the subject test only in November, if there is the need to. Vacations are a great time to prepare amply for these tests.

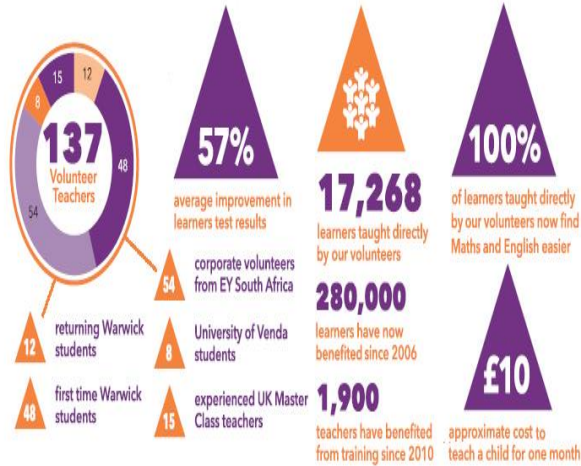
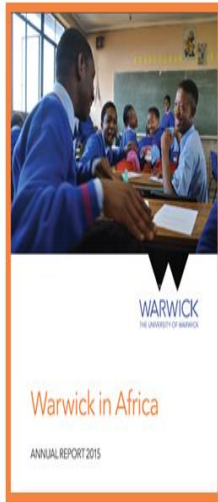

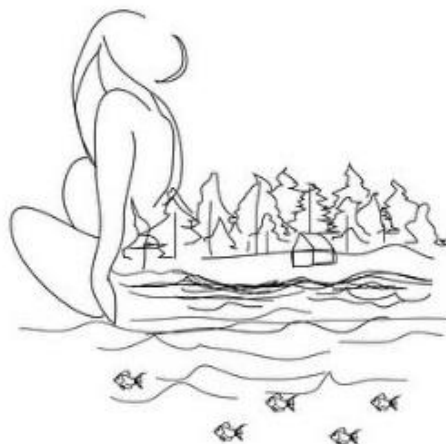

## Ear-Phones

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## Academic Honesty – Citiation – How to cite?

When we cite, we should make clear what it is that we are citing. It must be clear to the reader just what it is that we owe to someone else, and whether we have quoted exactly, or have used our own words and understanding of the original material.

The reader must be able to distinguish clearly between our words/work and the words/work of others. Quotations—the exact words used by others—are indicated either by quotation marks or by displaying (indenting) the quotation.

Paraphrase and summary of others' work should similarly be distinguishable from our own words and ideas.

Use of a style guide ensures that our citations and references are recorded consistently.

Choice of introductory or parenthetical citation is often a matter of readability, emphasis and authority.

As noted in the definitions below, the citation in the text links to a full reference that will enable the reader to trace the exact material used.

The three main types of in-text citation are as follows.

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## 1. Author

In-text citation is done by an introductory and/or parenthetical citation providing:

- the last name of the author, and
- page number(s) from which the quotation or paraphrase is taken, if applicable.

## 2. Author–date

In-text citation is done by an introductory and/or parenthetical citation providing:

- the last name of the author, and
- the year of publication from which the quotation or paraphrase is taken, and the page number, if applicable.

## 3. Numbered footnote

In-text citation is done by:

- superscript note numbers that come after the referenced passage, and after the final punctuation mark, if used, and
- corresponding footnotes placed at the bottom of their page of reference containing all reference details from which the quotation or paraphrase is taken; when using a source for a second or subsequent time, a shorter footnote reference is sufficient.

Detailed examples of citation will be shared in the future updates.

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## Interesting Read

### Better learning not better grades

Matt Glanville is the IB's Head of Assessment Principles and Practice. Here he shares his thoughts on what good quality education really means.

As well as having an ambitious mission to create peace in the world, the IB also wants to improve educational standards and share best practice around the globe, but what does this actually mean? It may seem strange coming from someone who works in assessment, but good examination results are not actually the same as a good quality education. I would (and regularly do!) argue that they represent the fairest way of choosing between students for higher or further education, or for employment, when society says it is acceptable to want the 'best' people, but being the 'best' is very different from being the 'best you can be'.

Recent research in the UK has looked at the long term impact that different styles of school management has on the long term 'success' of a school. Although the methods used in this research have been challenged by some, the report's findings will not surprise anyone in education. They suggest that short term measures to boost examination results have little long

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term benefit, except to the careers of those who implement them. Even the more inspiring report on learning analytics still talks about “maximizing academic performance” and “improvements in grade point averages” as a result of interventions, although they do also take a broader view of the benefits from learning analytics.

So if we reflect on our own approach to improving teaching are we also guilty of focusing on grades rather than education? The IB offers a range of professional development workshops, teacher support material, feedback from the examinations sessions (subject reports), and is planning to provide even more data through the Results Extra service. This service allows teachers to see which individual questions and topics their students answered well and those that they were less able to answer relative to students worldwide. All of these services can support the provision of excellent teaching and learning, but can also be employed to support ‘teaching to the test’.

In the IB Assessment Division our aim is to create relevant and meaningful assessments that support good teaching and learning rather than ‘teaching to the test’ but there are limitations to what can be achieved while ensuring that candidates and teachers feel the examination fairly reflects what students have learnt and teachers have taught.

Ultimately it is the school leadership team who can support a focus on each student being the best learner they can be and not to only focus on chasing better examination grades. I understand the reality of the pressures put on schools worldwide by government accountability metrics, and parental expectations. With a background in the UK, I have experienced the impact this has and recognize that the IB can only provide the opportunity for education to value the IB Learner Profile and the goal of students developing synergies between their subjects.

As our mission states, we want our students to ‘help create a better and more peace world through intercultural understanding and respect’. A Diploma Programme candidate with 24 points, or indeed a young person who excelled themselves to achieve 19 points, can do that just as successfully as someone who has achieved 45 points.

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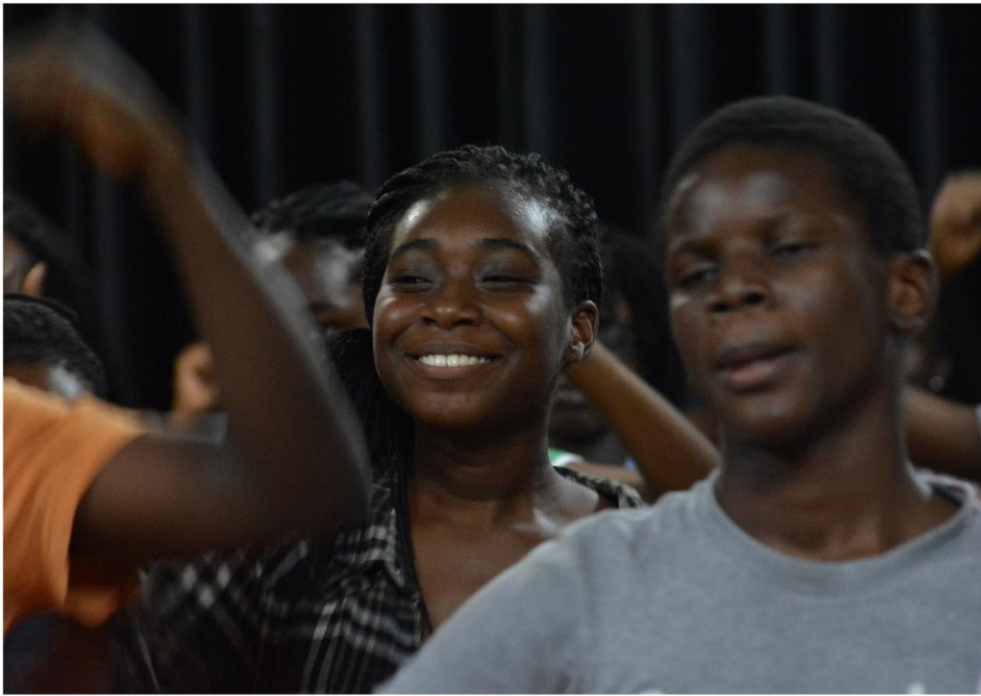


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
