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TIS Re-registration

To confirm enrolment for next year, parents are required to complete student and family data to ensure current data on MB is accurate. Please use the specific link provided in the email sent at the end of March. If unable to find it, please email Ken.

This accuracy is crucial. For the past two years, incorrect spelling of names and dates of birth have only been noticed once students have been registered for IGCSE or DP exams.















For the health records section, if you have new records that should be on file, please attach them to OA, or email them to me. Documentation we have for health records will be uploaded by Bijoux over the coming months, so you can overlook this question in re-registration.

Re-registration should be completed by 30 April to avoid a late fee*.

You will enter this data on OpenApply (OA) which is MB's younger sibling. It is user-friendly, however, if you have any issues, please contact Bijoux or myself.

To date, only 24% of parents have completed the task. Your cooperation and timeliness will always be appreciated.

* A late fee of GHC250 will be imposed for re-registration from 1 May - 3 June. From 4 June -31 July, re-registration will require the payment of the admission fee. From 1 August, re-enrolment will be required for those students who did not re-register.

MYP Corner

Exams!!

While thinking about my weekly article for the newsletter I came across one I wrote last year in the first week of May at my school in London regarding the e-assessments.

"It's an exciting two weeks ahead for our Grade 10 students with the e-assessments starting on Tuesday. To allow our students to do some extra revision and get emotionally prepared, there will be no lessons for Grade 10 on Monday. Where students need to see a teacher, they can of course come to school for that, otherwise they can stay at home. During the rest of the two weeks of exams lessons will continue as normal as possible under the circumstances. The subject teachers are not allowed to be at their exams and therefore will be available for the lessons, especially for those not taking the exams."

As you can see teaching and learning is indeed ongoing, even during exams. When creating the MYP exams the aim was to create them in such a way that one cannot really study for them but actually has to apply the knowledge and skills that have been obtained over the years. For this the exams are context based and often in a way that students have not really seen before. It is a challenging way of doing exams and they can be tough, but at the same time are a good preparation for the DP. Now we all know that not all is purely contextualized and that there is still knowledge and skills one can revise. Having said that, how much of knowledge that you cramp into your brain during a revision actually remains long term?

Of course the MYP students at the International School of London were not as focused in class as they normally would be but in general it was business as usual and students knew that there was still the end of school report as well. By no means I want to say that students were not prepared. They had been going through all the topics over a longer period of time in many ways, and also the e-assessments themselves had been practised beforehand to get the students acquainted with the software.

Here at TIS life will be different for many students when exams start. They will go into revision mode, build up the, hopefully positive stress to get ready for their exams. I wish them all the best and hope for the best outcomes to their potential.

For Grades 7 & 8, however, it will be business as usual with normal lessons and assessments till the last week of school. No exams or test weeks for them!

Counsellor's Corner



One-on-one meetings with our DP1 students and their parents are ongoing. With dedication and relentless support, we continue to guide our students through the college application process in a timely and efficient manner. Not only does our department provide this opportunity; here are some of the other ways that we encourage our students:

- We have a comprehensive college guidance curriculum which we take all students through, right from grades 7 12.
- There are weekly college guidance classes for every grade, as well as one-on-one meetings and walk-ins.
- We host universities from Ghana, UK, US, Australia, Canada, and other countries that personally inform students about study opportunities.
- Counsellors meet individually with all students and their parents to outline each student's personal university interests and preferences.
- The department provides career testing and coaching to assist students in identifying appropriate career choices, and connects students to internship opportunities and provides letters of support for students applying for internships.
- We facilitate all applications to summer program opportunities, such as Yale YGS.
- We help identify appropriate scholarships and assist students with scholarship and financial aid applications and nominations (our students have won full scholarships to universities every year as a result).
- We facilitate all aspects of the college application process, including assistance with college essays and personal statements, reviewing and submitting recommendation letters, and applying for financial aid and scholarships.

CONFLICT RESOLUTION

Last week, Grade 7 students identified conflicts that they sometimes experience in their class. After identifying several different tensions, including social conflict, and physical or verbal conflicts, the students collected ideas about key areas of conflict within their peer group. Once these were identified, students collaborated to suggest solutions to solving conflicts. The Emotional Counsellor emphasized the need to learn to listen to others and to respect each other, among other guidelines given. Some of the problems and solutions the students raised are as follows:

People Become Angry: Creating a reading corner or calm down space in the school where students can go when they are feeling frustrated or angry

People Not Keeping Good Hygiene: Students should talk to their peers in private to encourage better hygiene practices.

People Being Rude or Disrespectful: Teachers and class representatives should work together to encourage better behaviour.


