Self-Management and Self-Discipline

All students are assigned a locker in the class block. This is to ensure they have all their class requirements in a central location during the school week, instead of carrying a heavy load in their backpack each day.

An important aspect of boarding school life is developing your self-management skills, as well as your self-discipline. Self-management means students need to be organised and disciplined to fulfill their obligations and responsibilities to TIS expectations. The TIS expectations are: right place, right time and with the right equipment. No excuses. The appropriate learner profile is being principled.

The self-discipline aspect is consistency in fulfilling obligations and meeting expectations.

Students are responsible for their belongings and this is why all student items should be labeled clearly, including clothing. Yet, quite a few students are careless when it comes to personal belongings, including their devices and their cables.

Lost and found items, or more aptly named by Surama as *Left and Careless*, are kept for 10 days before being stored and to be given away to an orphanage at the end of each midsemester. Personal ID helps locate the owner, however, unlabeled items are likely to be left unclaimed. There will be a big emphasis placed on self-responsibility over the next month to highlight its importance for each student.

Grade 9 Mathematics

Grade 9 students have settled into their International Mathematics program. They are required to use a Graphic Design Calculator (GDC) TI-84 Plus CE-T for their examinations. This is an excellent opportunity for students to become conversant with the GDC before starting their IBDP course.

Currently, the Mathematics Department has provided an emulator for Grades 8 and 9 on their personal devices. In addition to this, the school will be providing Grade 9 with the above mentioned hand held (GDC) which is the version in use by Tema International School, at a cost of \$150 to each student. The use of the hand held GDC will start in Grade 9 classes at the beginning of the second half of this semester, Monday 30 October 2017. Every student will be required to own a hand held GDC by this date.

There is the opportunity for Grade 9 parents and guardians to make their own arrangements to provide their wards with this GDC. All parents and guardians are therefore being invited to notify the school via email to Mr. E Torkornoo <u>etorkornoo@tis.edu.gh</u> by the 29 September 2017 of their intention to make their own arrangements to provide the GDC for their wards. After this date, the school will automatically provide the GDC to any students whose parents or guardians have not contacted the school. The cost will be reflected in their next invoice.













MYP Corner

Central Agreements.

You must have come across meetings where there seems to be total chaos of people talking at the same time, raising their voice or behave disrespectfully in other ways. There are codes of how one should behave in a meeting to be able to discuss matters in a civilised way. We can call these central agreements that all should stick to.

This week I called for a meeting with Grade 8 students and teachers. Reason was that there had been quite a lot of complaints about the behaviour of the students in class and the fact that not meeting deadlines seem to be normal.

I do realise that we are dealing with young people at an age where it is normal to stretch boundaries. It's part of puberty. And then you have 25 of them in a classroom, which might cause even more friction. But all of this cannot be an excuse for uncivilised behaviour, hence the meeting. When addressing the students and asking why they were there most of them perfectly knew the reason. Bit by bit issues of misbehaviour were shared both by students and teachers. More important is then what to do about it. Corporal punishment we have left behind us (hopefully) a long time ago and also other means of punishment I don't really believe in. It is the same as with awarding, it works handing out stickers when kids are small but it loses its value when they get older.

It is the intrinsic motivation that drives people that will last longer. In the Netherlands they have to close prisons because the system is such that it is not so much about the punishment but more about awareness and prevention. Now I don't want to label our students as criminals but I do think that awareness is more important. There are no bad students, period! We just need to put them back on track occasionally.

As they knew exactly what were the underlying problems, I asked them all to write 10 central agreements and send them to me. I am sharing one, by Maame Benewaa Kyei, as an example.

Ten (10) Agreements

- Work should be submitted on time or after the first reminder when the deadline.
- We should be obedient towards are teachers.
- We should respect our teachers when they give us a set of instructions to follow
- We shouldn't talk unless we've been told to and when other people or the teachers are talking.
- If we want to answer questions, answers shouldn't be shouted out, but, we should raise our hands and patiently wait till our turn.















- We shouldn't walk out of the class without permission from the teacher or any other authority (if the teacher is absent).
- We should ask the teacher when there is something that we don't understand so we don't fail in our class exercises, quizzes, assessments, practical tests, etc.
- We should listen and pay attention to the teachers and any other helpful opinions from our grade mates under every topic during the lessons in every class so we don't hold the class back by saying we don't understand anything that was said in that lesson.
- We shouldn't talk back to the teacher when we are being corrected.
- We shouldn't distract the class by making noise and wasting time by making irrelevant comments.

Maame added to it in her email : 'Here are my agreements and with every agreement I think that there should be three chances given to us students so after three chances wasted then you are free to give a suitable sanction of your choice. Again, on behalf of my grade mates I'm very sorry for our behavior during classes. Thank you.'

Not too sure about the three chances, but nice try.

I will ask the students to sign their central agreements and put it in a public place to remind them all. I hope that by bringing this in the open and discussing it with the students in a civilised manner it will trigger the intrinsic motivation to work on it. What we don't want for sure is where those who are willing, suffer from the behaviour of others. They will have to show now that as a class they can work that well together that they get to be known as one of the best classes of TIS.

Effective Citing and Referencing When to Cite

When we acknowledge the use of materials or ideas that are not ours, the reader must be able to clearly distinguish between our own words, illustrations, findings and ideas and the words and work of other creators.

Style guides give us advice for documenting our sources in written work, but they are less helpful with other formats and mediums. Nevertheless, we can be honest and we can be helpful to our audience(s)—for assessment purposes, this is an expectation.

In written work, we should cite in the text where we have used an external source. The inclusion of a reference in a bibliography (works cited/list of references) at the end of the paper is not enough. However, for pieces of "creative" written work such as writing in the style of an author or genre, for which in-text citation is not usually expected, creative ways of acknowledging the use of other people's work may be permissible. A bibliography or list of references is also expected.

In other forms of work (music, video, artistic pieces), we are expected to acknowledge use of external sources appropriately.

In presentations we can provide our audience with a handout of our references, or list our sources on the final slide(s).

During an oral presentation, we can acknowledge the sources we are using by the use of phrases, for example, "As Gandhi put it ..." or "According to ...". We can show a direct quotation by saying "Quote ... Unquote" or by signalling with "rabbit's ears" or "air quotes". In a presentation supported by posters or slides, we can include short or full references on the slides; if short references are made on the slides, then we should again provide a full list of references on a handout or on the final slide(s).

We can include references or acknowledgments of other people's work in the final credits of a film. A piece of music can be accompanied by programme notes indicating influences and direct sources. Art on display can be labelled or captioned.

Naviance is an excellent college planning and career assessment software program / tool, designed to help students align their interests with suitable careers and university choices. It has helpful resources such as SAT/ACT Test Prep materials for students as well as a wealth of information on universities across the globe.

Grade 9- Time Management

What do you do with the 24 hours you have in a day? How can you effectively manage your time? Are you able to complete all your tasks on time? How relevant is multitasking in the use of time? Time Management was the central theme of discussion during our class this week. 


