These include students applying to OxBridge (Oxford or Cambridge) and students looking forward to studying medicine in the U.K. The next batch of submissions will be for the early applicants (early decision and action). Theirs will be submitted before the 1 November deadline. They have been guided to complete it and are expected to submit their applications ahead of the deadline. The final set which will be for all other students applying to other countries, will be submitted before close of November.

With this in mind, all DP2 students are reminded to complete all outstanding essays, personal statements and online applicatons over the break. Let's keep our fingers crossed as we pray for record-breaking offers.

Other supporting documents may include, but are not limited to, bank statements, letter from employers and university specific forms.

Without mincing words, the whole process is a very tedious one. We therefore encourage both parents and students to start the process early enough having in mind the deadlines and required forms for each school they are applying to. They should also be diligent in filling out the form with a modest but honest information in order to attract a favourable offer from various schools. A reminder that higher academic grades and test scores (SAT/ACT) often attract more generous scholarships at highly selective universities. Also some schools consider leadership initiative, community service and special talents among others.

Highlight of Grade 8 Class Session

Research- the systematic investigation into and study of materials and sources in order to establish facts and reach new conclusions- is an essential skill students' need. Our Grade 8s had an interesting lesson as they were guided through the necessary steps for conducting a valid research by the ATL Teacher.

Article on the Application Process.

One of the biggest mistakes students make in preparing their applications for admission is the tendency to treat the information they submit as random data points. Scores, essays, courses, grades and letters of recommendation are often regarded as items to be completed on a checklist for each college. When this happens, students miss important opportunities to make a difference in their applications. Rather than being purposeful in presenting their credentials, they fail to "connect the dots" to create a coherent picture of who they are.

As you prepare your applications for admission, then, consider how the different elements of your application can be woven together to tell your story. Remember that admission committees are most interested in learning about you and what you have to offer the community of scholars they are assembling through the admission process. Use your essays, letters of recommendation and extra-curricular to create a picture of who you are and what you have to offer.



Science Corner

The IGCSE Biology students of Grade 10 took part in a practical where they prepared slides of human spermatozoa and observed them under the microscope to identify both its motility and structure. Afterwards, they were tasked to make a large labelled drawing of the cells they are observing.


CASSA Updates
