Balance, Commitment and Effort

TIS is a very busy school and, being residential, there are many opportunities and activities to identify, develop, improve and enhance their knowledge, skills, understanding and talent/s.

There is a tendency to leave things to the last minute, whether it is an assessment task, activity, training or revision. Usually, the result is not optimal performance, students are tired and prone to illness. Some/many students wear 'study cramming' as a badge of honour, yet do not appreciate the full ramifications.

Students have been encouraged to ensure they exercise daily to provide some balance, especially during exam season. I have noticed the regular gym users are students who are focused on their studies.

It is a balance and consistency of effort that will maximize student achievement. Students are aware of activities in advance and should plan ahead to avoid conflicts and barriers to















achieving their goals for this semester. Changing to a strategic, rather than a last-minute approach, will bring its rewards.

Unfortunately, many students are missing opportunities to develop new or enhance existing skills by participating in ASA (after school activities). This unbalanced approach does not assist students when they apply for university and college admission in Grade 12. It is the non-academic evidence and experiences that make the critical difference in offers and scholarships. Building a personal portfolio during the junior secondary years demonstrates commitment and achievement.

Admissions for 2018/2019

Admissions for 2018/2019 opened on 1 December. It benefits TIS if our admissions process is completed early, by the end of May. The benefit to parents for completing the admission process early is discounted fees at the application and admission stages of the process.

Online aptitude testing will replace the traditional entrance exam. This change has two benefits for students:

- it eliminates any bias for students studying under different school curriculum programs; and
- the test can be completed at TIS at any time convenient to the student (and parents) and TIS.

What sort of questions are asked in aptitude tests? The questions look at patterns, relationships, vocabulary and meaning. For example:

- Underline the word that has been misspelt in each sentence.
- Choose the missing word in this sentence from the list.
- What is the next number in this sequence?
- Comprehension questions for a reading passage.

You can't study for an aptitude test. However, you will enjoy it if you are a reader, and you enjoy maths and writing. Reports from the test will be available (at cost:GHC80) and identify particular strengths and areas for attention, as well as predicting the likely result for the student in MYP, IG and DP final exams.

Consequently, there will be no fixed testing dates. Families should advise Bijoux of suitable dates and times so that the testing can be completed, and you can save some money. The next discount deadline is 28 February.


Once they have signed in, they can click to add a new applicant, and can start the application for their other child.


IBDP Update










TIS Amnesty Club – Anti-Corporal Punishment Advocacy Campaign.





The TIS Amnesty Club is committed to promoting the ideals of responsible behaviour in schools. To ensure a healthy and friendly school learning environment for all stakeholders, it is necessary for teachers, students and school administrators to practise and promote responsible behaviour at all levels in the school. This starts with knowing, practising and upholding to the fundamental human rights of everyone in the school. Such rights have been outlined in the United Nations Universal Declarations of Human Rights.

As ignorance of the law is not considered an excuse to defaulting. It is binding on schools to inculcate in their teaching syllabus these fundamental human rights, as outlined in the Universal Declarations of Human Rights. School Administrators, Teachers, Students, Non-Teaching Staff, Parents, and all other stakeholders must be introduced to Universal Declarations of Human Rights. This document must be very visible in schools — in the classrooms, hostels/dormitories, offices, and even hallways. Every school's mission statement and core values must emphasize the need to uphold the rights of its members. In addition, teaching of the Universal Declarations of Human Rights must be part of every school's orientation for new students.

In brief, school communities must make a conscious effort to respect, practise and uphold to the rights of everyone; and this starts with

education.
