Experiences and Opportunities

The opportunities and experiences available to TIS students ensure they are ready to be successful at university on completion of their IB Diploma Programme. This assumes that students are consistent and committed to their involvement in their personal selection of experiences.















There are four areas in which TIS expects consistent involvement: academics; sport; culture; and service. So, I am disappointed when students are 'told' by teachers and/or parents that they must only focus on the academics. This doesn't provide a balanced lifestyle which is to the detriment of the student. It also backfires when it comes to university applications when students must articulate their points of difference to admission officers.

An additional opportunity at TIS that provides a great balance in experiences is the Duke of Edinburgh International Award (DoEIA) that was introduced at the being of this semester. Involvement is a great and well-respected bonus for students when it comes to university offers. The adventurous journey is an exciting component at each level of the DoEIA. TIS is facilitating this compulsory component by establishing the CAS and Dukies Adventure Camp in mid-June. (Please see the CAS section).

From G7-12, all students are expected to be committed to academics, sport, culture and service. It is only in the second semester for G10 and 12 students that they have no obligations so that they can focus on their studies.

Medical Exeats

Parents who request a medical exeat for their son/daughter must collect a medical form from the Infirmary and have their physician complete it and then return to the Infirmary so that our nursing staff are fully informed to provide the appropriate medical attention for each student. Parents' cooperation is important in this matter.

Entrance Examinations

Online aptitude testing has replaced the traditional entrance exam at TIS. This change has two benefits for students:

- it eliminates any bias for students studying under different school curriculum programs; and
- the test can be completed at TIS at any time convenient to the student (and parents) and TIS.

What sort of questions are asked in aptitude tests? The questions look at patterns, relationships, vocabulary and meaning. For example:

- Underline the word that has been misspelt in each sentence.
- Choose the missing word in this sentence from the list.
- What is the next number in this sequence?
- Comprehension questions for a reading passage.

You can't study for an aptitude test. However, you will enjoy it if you are a reader, and you enjoy maths and writing. Reports from the test will be available (at cost: GHC80) and identify particular strengths and areas for attention, as well as predicting the likely result for the student in MYP, IG and DP final exams.















Consequently, there are no fixed testing dates. Families should advise Bijoux of suitable dates and times so that the testing can be completed, and you can save some money. The next discount deadline is 31 May.



IB Middle Years Programme e-assessment wins international award

The online magazine Education Today published an article about the MYP e-assessment (http://www.education-today.co.uk/ib-middle-years-programme-eassessment-wins-international-award/)

The IB e-assessments have been awarded as Best Use of Summative Assessment, beating international competition like the French Ministry of Education. A quote from the judges, "the


















MYP e-assessment was impressive in how the examinations are designed to assess students higher order thinking skills which previously had been harder to do using paper testing" and "that it clearly demonstrates that it is possible to successfully deliver online summative assessments in schools anywhere in the world".

The e-assessments that were first implemented in 2016, were approved as international exams, similar to the IGCSE, by Ofqual in the UK. As they state, the e-assessments, which take place during two weeks in May of the final year of the MYP (Grade 10) go beyond rote memorisation where 75% focuses on inquiry, communication and critical thinking skills. Dr Sue Wilkinson, IB's Head of e-Assessment says, "students are challenged to connect to what they have learned with what they might learn next, collect data, analyse results and apply big ideas solving real-world problems. As such, a single examination provides an effective assessment of the broad range of knowledge, skills and concepts needed to thrive and succeed in the 21st century".

With the further implementation of the MYP in Grade 9 next year and Grade 10 the following year, teachers will now focus on this "new" way of questioning.

What Is the MYP Personal Project?

As the Grade 8 students will continue their journey into Grade 9 MYP next academic year, they will start to work on their Personal Project at the end of Grade 9.

The question that students, teachers and parents begin to ask is, what is the Personal Project? The Personal Project is a key and compulsory component of the MYP Grade 10, which needs to be original and solely an individual project. This project could be inspired by the student's hobbies or interests, skills or abilities, or some events or places the student has been to. The project allows students to set up a goal, which is guided through inquiry with a chosen global context throughout the investigation process, and ATL skills they want to develop. The projects are assessed based on the assessment criteria; Investigation, Planning, Taking Action and Reflecting.

The inquiry process in the MYP Personal Project involves students in a wide range of activities to extend their knowledge and understanding and to develop their skills and attitudes. These student-planned learning activities include: deciding what they want to learn about, identifying what they already know, and discovering what they will need to know to complete the project, creating proposals or criteria for their project, planning their time and materials, and recording developments of the project. They also make decisions, developing understandings and solving problems, communicating with their supervisor and others, and creating a product after which they evaluate the product/outcome and reflect on their project and their learning.

As students become involved in the self-initiated and self-directed learning process, they will find it easier to construct in-depth knowledge on their topic as well as to develop an understanding of themselves as learners. The Personal Project enables students to pursue their personal interests further in the MYP. Though the Personal Project is not necessarily a research essay, personal projects always involve research, including the use and collection of information and sources.

The Personal Project encourages students to practise and strengthen their approaches to learning (ATL) skills, and to develop an area of personal interest, which also provides an excellent opportunity for students to produce a truly personal and often creative product or outcome and to demonstrate a fusion of their learning in the MYP.

The project offers many opportunities for differentiation of learning and expression according to students' individual needs. The personal nature of the project is important; the project should mostly revolve around a challenge that motivates and interests the individual student.















The MYP Personal Projects is student-centered and age-appropriate, and it enables students to engage in practical explorations through a cycle of inquiry, action and reflection. The MYP Personal Projects helps students to develop the attributes of the IB Learner Profile; provides students with an essential opportunity to demonstrate ATL skills developed through the MYP, and fosters the development of independent lifelong learners.

PSAT Sign Up (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test), for current Grade 9 students

Grade 9 students who are considering the U.S. as a future university destination, are strongly encouraged to sign up for the PSAT exam. Please sign up right away with the College Guides. Parents of current Grade 9 students who want their children to take the test should please confirm their interest by emailing Ms. Constance Quaye: constance.quaye@tis.edu.gh Please sign up by next **Monday**, **May 14**, **2018**.

Those who sign up will be emailed more details about the registration fee for the PSAT exam, & payment deadline. The PSAT exam will take place next semester, in October 2018.

Why should students take the PSAT test?

1. High scores can lead to National Merit Scholarships (applicable for U.S. citizens only): The National Merit Scholarship Corporation uses these scores to qualify semifinalists who are then considered for National Merit Scholarship competition.















Recipients and finalists can become eligible for corporate scholarships and many colleges and universities offer National Merit Scholarship participants institutional grants and merit scholarships as well. In some cases, these grants cover full tuition.

2. Good scores can indicate projected performance on the actual SAT test required by many U.S. universities: The PSAT is a terrific way to familiarize yourself with the structure, content and process of taking the SAT and get a sense of how you'll perform on the actual exam. Your score can show you which subjects you may not be particularly strong in, regardless of your grades in related classes.

Your performance will empower you with the information you need to design a suitable SAT study plan that will help you earn your best possible score.

Community Project & Service in Action


