Devices

Please note: students do not need the most expensive laptop on the market. Students must have their laptop in a protective case when moving between classrooms, and also when moving to and from hostels.

International students who arrive with a mobile phone must hand it to Alex Tay on arrival and collect it at the start of a school break.

An Exciting Year Ahead

Thanksgiving Service

At the start of each semester, a Thanksgiving Service is conducted. On Sunday, 2 September, the first semester Thanksgiving Service will be conducted from 11.00am-12.30pm in the MPH. Like all school events, parents are invited and welcome to attend.

Visiting Sunday

Following the Thanksgiving Service will be Visiting Sunday until 4.30pm. Visiting Sunday is an opportunity for family and food, and at first, not in that order. Visiting Sundays are scheduled throughout the year, usually once each month. If a month contains events that parents may attend at TIS, a Visiting Sunday may not be listed. Exeats

ManageBac for Parents

ManageBac (MB) is our learning management portal that is used by teachers for planning assessment, reporting and attendance. Students use it to access assignment tasks, resources, and assessment results, including semester reports. Parents access MB for reports, announcements and can track their child's academic performance. Almost all messages, including the weekly bulletin and monthly newsletter will be sent through MB to parents.

Welcome emails from ManageBac (MB) were sent out last night to new parents and continuing parents who have not accessed it yet. Please check your junk/spam folder if the email is not obvious in your inbox. Click on the second link – Set My Password. Some advice...

















So you're setting up your ManageBac password and you may be asking, "What's with the mission-impossible password requirements?"

We take data protection and security pretty seriously, which is why we recently updated our password strength requirements. This is especially important as we introduce Single-Sign-On, which is the ability to sign into multiple platforms with the same username and password.

The password will not save until you see a green box.

You could use a password like **S8raH18!**, but that's not very fun to remember, nor is it nearly as secure as a longer password with random words put together. It's better to use a phrase. We've found that the combination of three or four random common words is easier to remember *and* harder to crack!

An example of a super strong password that's not too hard to remember would be **Teacher Matt Bobo Yellow** or **Horse Battery Staple Yea**



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

YYAS Educators' Conference, 2018

Accra stood still as counselors from all over the globe headed towards Tema International School as the conference host for this year's program. The 3-day program ran the 16-18 August. The Yale Young African Scholars Program (YYAS) is an intensive academic and enrichment program designed for African secondary school students planning to pursue tertiary education and who wish to make meaningful impact as young leaders on the continent. The Yale Young African Scholars Program is in proud partnership with the Highlife Foundation and a member of the HALI Access Network, in collaboration with Ahaspora Young Professionals (Ghanaian Student returnees from abroad, giving back by mentoring high school students and networking). With additional support from The Whitney and Betty MacMillan Center for International and Area Studies at Yale, 150 students participated in the YYAS student conference also held concurrently at T.I.S.

Some Highlights on College Application Process, gleaned from the Educators' Event:

- Students must demonstrate a strong sense of commitment to their environment through community-based learning, as well as a cumulative record of good academic standing.
- For students focusing on pursuing a degree in the USA, a strong demonstration of grit
 must be reflected in essays, as well as ability to adapt to new environments,
 teamwork, critical thinking, writing, public speaking, digital literacy and global
 awareness.
- Financial Aid. Students must have a balanced list of schools. Different universities have different financial aid policies, so students are urged to do a thorough research on their universities of choice. Need-Blind Schools: these are schools that give financial aid to students irrespective of their family financial track record. Need Aware Schools. These schools give aid to students based on the university's financial capabilities. However, receiving aid is highly competitive and students who have demonstrated outstanding academic work in addition to leadership, service and other contributions to their communities stand a greater chance of being selected. USA universities tend to be the most generous when it comes to undergraduate financial aid packages awarded to international students.
- Writing ACT/SAT tests. Practise, practise, practise in order to improve your score!

The CAS orientation camp is an opportunity for students to understand: their responsibilities as CAS students; CAS project requirements; how to


















balance CAS throughout their two years of the programme and make connections with TOK, EE, their subjects, ASA and DoEIA.

Service in Action - Connect, Action, Impact




