3Ps

Planning. Punctuality. Performance. It is not only an important semester for our exam candidates (G10 & 12), but also all students. To enjoy a successful semester, students will need to focus on the 3Ps.

Follow us

Planning. Students have a lot to do during the semester and it is very easy to become distracted by being involved in the many activities



















available at TIS. First, students need to articulate their goals for this semester. If students allow others to plan their time, then it is unlikely that personal goals will be achieved, or at least to the expected standard. All planning takes time to develop, yet many people do not set aside this time, instead preferring to 'wing it' or 'fly by the seat of their pants'. Without planning, success will rely on luck and good fortune, and disappointment is a frequent outcome.

Punctuality. It is critical that individuals respect time. A lack of respect will result in chaos, missed deadlines and opportunities. Planning and punctuality fit like gloves. Prioritising and allowing adequate time to complete tasks are essential skills for any successful person. Leaving things until the last minute will result in disappointment and the failure to achieve the best possible outcome, due to the last-minute rush to complete a task.

Performance. Students must be very clear about what they want to achieve by the end of this semester. In the planning stage, they will have articulated their goals to achieve. Students must ensure they reflect on their goals regularly to remind themselves so that focus can be maintained. They must remove distractions. They must ensure they use their time wisely, but ensure a balance. They must have a clear understanding of the task components, practise the requisite skills regularly, ensure adequate sleep, submit all tasks before due dates and reflect on all feedback. They must remain focused, balanced and committed to achieving their goals.

Getting the 3Ps right will ensure success this semester.

Online aptitude testing replaced the traditional entrance exam last year and was appreciated by applicants. This change has two benefits for students:

it eliminates any bias for students studying under different school curriculum programs; and
the test can be completed at TIS at any time convenient to the student (and parents) and TIS.

You can't study for an aptitude test. However, you will enjoy it if you are a reader, and you enjoy maths and writing. Reports from the test will be available and identify particular strengths and areas for attention, as well as predicting the likely result for the student in MYP and DP final exams.

Consequently, there will be no fixed testing dates. Families should advise TIS of suitable dates and times so that the testing can be completed.



- Transportation to and from Dulles International Airport/Union Station in Washington,
 D.C. will be provided by the program.
- Hood College maintains **24/7 security service, a 24/7 health centre**, and free Wi-Fi, which will be accessible to all.
- For necessities, Hood College has a campus store available.
- Students will be accommodated on campus in the residence halls at Hood College separated by gender.
- Two students will share a room, which contains two beds, two desks, two closets, and an air conditioning unit. Room selection will be randomly assigned for cultural exchange in order to encourage diversity and inter-cultural growth.
- Each floor of the residence hall has a water fountain and two community bathrooms for the students on that hall (four showers, five toilets, and two sinks in each.)
- Bedding and linens will be provided for each student attending the program.
- Fully-equipped kitchens are available for student access.
- Washing machines and dryers are located in each residence hall and available to students; detergent will be provided.
- Hood College maintenance staff cleans community spaces on a daily basis, however they will not be cleaning individual rooms.
- Three meals per day will be provided by the Hood College dining hall which is served buffet style.



Alumni spent quality time with Grade 10s, DP1s and DP2s and we are full of gratitude to have had them visit us this week! They shared the following important nuggets of wisdom.

Some Highlights and Captions from the various Alumni Week sessions so far:

4 Time Management

A lifetime plan is how to manage the limited time available. For academic purposes Shadrack, a TIS alum studying Chemical Engineering and Business at University of Birmingham, UK explained that making the most out of the time to study, practice and seek help where necessary is a safety net in making the best of grades. Students should greatly consider looking at the syllabus and examiners expectations and remarks as a guide to their studies. Prior to that there is the need for engagement, leadership, extracurricular activities in order to develop socially and fit into any environment. It's great to have fun, enjoy each moment but most importantly know what is urgent, important and needful. According to Shadrack, being a student leader at TIS prepared him for greater responsibility and sharpened his interpersonal skills in working with others in the university.

4 Self-Identity

Self-identity and realization of one's talents and abilities are fundamental stepping stones for self-development. Thus, at Tema International School, students are given the best opportunity to discover, explore and engage in real life situations as they find out what they love and can do best. However, Nana Yaw, an alum and music teacher here at TIS, emphasized strongly that in knowing one's self it is very important to realize and appreciate the fact that there are others that may be better and smarter so there is the need to be humble, respect, learn and pick up the good things from others, without feeling inferior. To excel, it is also crucial to apply yourself to the rules. Chander Dev IB Coordinator, knitted it beautifully by saying "persistence will get you to the top but being consistent will keep you at the top". In addition, TIS alum Ekow Ewusi-Mensah, also added his voice that it is imperative to have staunch values, believe in yourself and not to be swayed off purpose.

Life Time Connections

As a unique family school, the best connections, networks and partnerships are formed here at TIS. Students were encouraged to be each other's keeper, helpful and supportive of others. Together they can achieve greater success.

4 Scale of Preference-Why Am I Here at TIS? Academics Comes First

Christopher Gordon, a TIS alum who is a graduate of Princeton University- USA (undergraduate), Imperial College London- UK (Masters) and currently pursuing his PhD at Texas A & M University- USA, made a profound contribution. For him and his

















cohort of friends they allocated most of the time to study, engaging in healthy academic competitions. Knowing your learning style, either visual or audio learner, also helps greatly and puts you in a better advantage. For him consistency, practice and practice were the foundations for making the best of grades with distinction. Practically with his friends, they solved past questions meant for an hour within twenty minutes just to prepare themselves for the actual exam. As a result they had enough time to go over past questions, notes and get the right answers as well as make necessary corrections. It all begins with commitment, discipline and consistency. Christopher Gordon noted that, failure should not hold you back from persevering. He shared his personal story with failure and how he made it eventually to Princeton University. Even if you don't get admitted into your dream school, make the most out of the opportunities around you.

4 Other inspiring words & contributions this week, from TIS alumni:

Alumna Edinam Mac Deh, a young lawyer, inspired the ladies to avoid putting limits on themselves, and to go for anything they want in terms of their career aspirations among others. She also urged students to get to know themselves, their passions and interests and start developing them now.

Alumnus Kobby Anderson said experiencing racism as international students can be expected, but they should not let it get to them and should keep a level head in responding should that come up. He also encouraged students to consider STEM courses and work hard when they get to university, in order not to fail. Alumni, Nadean Sam, Zoe Sawyerr, Aaron Osebre met with DP1s and DP2s and urged them to take their IB Diploma programme seriously, noting that it made university work much more easier. They said the IA, EEs, TOK essay and other written assignments, learning to reference put them a step ahead of their peers when it came to university assignments and that students should be grateful to their parents for investing in them at TIS. Also they emphasized the need to be organized, meet deadlines and be wise when it comes to managing their finances.

A big thank you to David King, who taught DP1 Economics and English Literature classes this Thursday! Both teachers (Mr. Awakey & Mr. Sutinga) and students were amazed at how interesting and effective the lesson was. This was the first of its kind and we are so grateful! We would like to urge more alumni to consider joining in next time around.

Have you heard about the TIS language immersion programme? Find out more.























- This is a three-week language and culture immersion programme, which is designed to motivate students, keep them interested and is based on modern, communicationoriented methods.
- Participants live in pairs with the host families chosen by the organizers Horizons du Monde.
- Participants spend the first two weeks in a chosen region and the last week in Paris/Madrid.
- Participants have lessons for three hours in the morning session of each day and go out in the afternoon to discover the culture and civilization of the French/Spanish people. They visit tourist attractions, markets and supermarkets, museums, they play games and they watch films among others.
- > Participants are chaperoned by teachers of TIS at the ratio of one teacher to 10 students.

















- Lessons are delivered by professional French/Spanish teachers.
- Teachers from TIS live in the coordinator's house and communicate with students in the host families. Together with the coordinator, they get solutions to any problems that may arise from any of the host families.
- TIS teachers, the coordinator and the group's guide wait at a meeting point each morning. The host parents bring the participants in their private cars awaiting to be transported in a coach to school.
- At 5.00pm- 6.00pm each day, host parents wait at the same rendez-vous to take the kids back home.
- > Participants spend weekends at home or go out with their host parents.
- > Participants are not allowed to go out unaccompanied by host parents or TIS teachers.
- Participants have the telephone numbers of their TIS teachers and that of their host parents. Teachers also have that of all their students.
- > Participants have travel and health insurance.
- On arrival in France/Spain, the TIS leaders collect all passports from participants and give them back to them on the day of departure.
- Parents of our students have access to the addresses of the host families of their children and therefore, can communicate with them and may even visit them should they be in France/Spain whilst the group is there.
- > Parents have the addresses of the TIS leader so they can communicate with him/her.
- > Participants are advised to keep their pocket monies with TIS teachers.




