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### **Health Walk**

It's an early start for our S2 Health Walk in the morning, especially for our parents who join us so enthusiastically. But, 6.00am is the best time for this exercise. I hope you can join us.

### **Obligations**

Students in G7-9 and 11 will select their 3 ASAs (After School Activities) for this semester over the next few days. This process will be completed online.

Our exam candidates (G10 and 12 students) are not required to participate as their focus is on their studies for this semester. While this obligation has been removed, our exam candidates must ensure they are maximizing their time, and not wasting it. Nevertheless, these students must still ensure balance in their daily routines, keeping in mind that adolescents should be involved in 60 minutes of physical activity each day. As some candidates prepare for ISSAG basketball and athletics, which ensures balance, they need to plan their daily schedule to ensure all targets are met.

I am emphasizing two priorities for the semester: respect time and no spectators.

#### Respect Time

Time is something we can't get back. Once it is lost, it can be hard to complete priorities or actions. Being late is disrespecting others, whether it is late to class or late submitting assessments. The end result is usually self-imposed stress that then provides another distraction from achieving goals. As Robin Sharma reminds us, if you're not early, you're late!

#### No Spectators

Students are expected to be participants and not spectators. It is very easy to watch others do things, but how does this improve the spectator? TIS expects students to ensure balance across their academics, sport, cultural and service activities. Unfortunately, there is a minority of students who remain spectators who therefore do not challenge themselves. Without challenges, students will never be able to perform at their best!

### **Yale Young African Scholars Program**

This outstanding residential program will be one of three held across Africa in 2019. The Ghana session will again be hosted by TIS from 24 July - 1 August. It is strongly recommended for G11 and 12 students for 2019/2020 academic year.

### **Identification Labelling**

Students are required to have their belongings appropriately labelled for identification purposes. Too many students are careless about leaving their belongings in the wrong place (not their lockers) and then not remembering where they left them. Often, items left around the school, especially devices, power cables and chargers, are claimed by students who think an item belongs to them. All items are clearly labelled when school resumes for second semester.

### **Student Medication**

Any student medication must be sent to the Infirmary, along with medication instructions. Please note that any time a student is kept at the infirmary for observation, a record is maintained on MB and parents will receive an email alerting them about this record.

### New Admissions for 2019/2020

Admissions for 2019/2020 are now open. It benefits TIS if our admissions process is completed early for planning purposes.

Online aptitude testing replaced the traditional entrance exam last year and was appreciated by applicants. This change has two benefits for students:

- it eliminates any bias for students studying under different school curriculum programs; and
- the test can be completed at TIS at any time convenient to the student (and parents) and TIS.

You can't study for an aptitude test. However, you will enjoy it if you are a reader, and you enjoy maths and writing. Reports from the test will be available and identify particular strengths and areas for attention, as well as predicting the likely result for the student in MYP and DP final exams.

Consequently, there will be no fixed testing dates. Families should advise TIS of suitable dates and times so that the testing can be completed.

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### **Be Relentless for Your Success**

Good Morning TIS, I am Derek Bonsu from the IB class of 2016. Today I am here to talk to you about "How to Stay Motivated and Defeat Laziness"

I believe that the biggest obstacle in succeeding in a given task is the lack or decline of motivation. The main problem you face is that your conscious awareness does not last very long. You work hard for a few days and then roll back into the old patterns. This happens because our everyday working schedule is usually very repetitive and can get quite boring overtime. However, the temptations of our subconscious desires such as checking our Social Media, Postponing work for some relaxation time etc. are very pleasurable, they act as your safe space and comfort zone which we usually find difficult to escape from.

So, how do we a stay motivated even when we don't feel like it? Note that:

#### 1. Your Environment Matters

Your Environment shapes your ability to work. Your mind subconsciously associates your room with a mental image of leisure or chilling because that's the most performed activity in this space. This is why most successful people usually have a separate room for working. It is all psychological. In your room everything is jumbled up in to one. Sometimes you work most times you chill.

#### 2. Goals > Current Pleasure

The fight is not against relaxing and chilling because these acts are necessary for balance and mental stability. The real fight is to find as strong reasons to work as you have for chilling and relaxing. Think of the reasons that compel you to relax then think of reasons that compel you to work (success, good grades, your future), these would come in the future as fruit of intense hard work now. Also, the triggers to seek pleasure exist all around you (devices, applications, people etc.) Sadly, the triggers to chase you goals mostly exist in your memory.

Now do you see the problem?

It is important to note that we are in the era of short attention spans, where you get bored of the same things very quickly, *do you really think that doesn't apply to your goals and dreams as well?* These apps selling fun and pleasure keep updating and adding new features based on what you like to get you more addicted.

How many times has the goal in your mind updated or added new features? Hardly

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It has remained the same, your mind gets bored of the repetition, it is called "Over-Exposure", and this is why these apps change continually update to prevent you from getting bored of them. The problem is that you are not working as hard because your goal isn't producing that much incentive or excitement in you anymore, as opposed to pleasures which you experience immediately. You need to update the reasons to work, in order for your goals to dominate pleasure.

### 3. Own your Mood & Mind

Remember that, feeling motivated is a mood and your mood is built in your mind as a response to an external stimulus. <u>For Example</u>, you watch a comedy and your mood is full of happiness, you listen to contemplative music that reminds you of life and you get into a philosophical mood. These are some examples of how easily and temporarily your mood can be affected. But then again these are temporary.

### So, what are the long-term mood influencers that enforce motivation?

They are **Experience** and **Thought**. Experience is a visual stimulus that is recorded in your memory as images or film, the best thing about it is when you recall it. A strong experience has the fine quality of reminding you how of you felt at a particular moment and that feeling can be effective in overcoming pleasures which influence your productivity.

#### Let's take an Example, how many times has this happened to you?

You are in a place surrounded by people with the same dream and goals as you. It can be an exam, conference or competition and by looking around you feel one of two things. Either you felt <u>overwhelmed with confidence</u> that you will champion the event, or you were filled with <u>doubt and worry</u> regarding why you haven't been working enough.

OR

In another example, you are listening to someone who has achieved the goals you are working towards and as they are giving you advice, telling you about their success story and work ethic, you feel driven and motivated, and begin to think about how you're head off to achieve your similar goal.

It is important to note that your mood is also shaped by the content you feed the mind. If you watch thoughtful content, you'd find yourself in deep thought afterwards. The mind is the one

















thing we all have but it is the one thing we don't have a manual for. Nobody really teaches you how to use your mind. Your mind is like a delicate, impressionable child, feed it knowledge and it would become smarter, feed it pleasure and it would become lazy, feed it brutal honesty it would become strong. However, our modern would is filled with distractions causing your mind to randomly move from one thing to another all-day, through this you become good at being distracted. The same works for the opposite, if you practice concentration all day long. You would end up becoming an expert at focusing on one task after the other.

Concentration is simply the ability to keep your awareness on one thing for a prolonged period of time. You should integrate concentrating into your everyday life. With prolonged concertation comes the wonderful power of observation. Becoming more observant allows you to understand concepts and solve problems faster and more efficiently.

I also suggest that your viewing habits should be centered around content related to positively developing your character and academic priorities. When you read and watch thoughtful content your mind automatically notices all the meaningless and harmful things around you. This is because you have started valuing knowledge and thoughtfulness. Great thought has a brilliant quality of keeping you focused. Harnessing knowledge is also a great factor in boosting low confidence and a distracted mind. So, I suggest that in your spare time, instead of pleasurable activities that obstruct your productivity, watch at least 10 minutes of any lecture, motivational documentary or interviews of people you admire such as billionaires and individuals with brilliant minds.

You would find great pieces of advice that will support your focus and protect your motivation.

I hope I have been able to help you start off your semester with some motivation and if this speech has not been enough then I would like you to all note that at the end of this academic year I would be giving an award to some individuals based on their academic growth, achievements and contribution to our school. This award is one worth working hard for because I doubt there has ever been any of its kind. Lastly, I would also like to inform our student athletes that we would be kickstarting a sporting league this semester which is aimed at bringing the best out of you on and off the pitch. On this note I would like to conclude my presentation and remember:

"You have to be relentless in your quest for success"

### **MYP** Corner

#### Technology, E-assessments and MYP



Technology is now an integral part of our modern lives; most work places are using online devices connected to some <u>network</u>. They are engaged in a wide range of activities ranging from the use of a <u>word processors</u> to creating and using their own databases and diagnostic assessments. More obvious examples of these are in <u>health</u> <u>assessment</u>, <u>psychiatric assessment</u>, and <u>psychological assessment</u> and of course

educational assessment.

Adolescents in Ghana who attend school are increasingly coming into contact with a growing range of digital technologies at home, so it would be questionable if this did not continue when they come to school; the one place where they should be learning and using technology even more. When our students leave us to join the workplace, they must be adequately equipped to be part of the technological revolution and even become leaders in this respect. As educators and as educational institutions we can no longer shy away from this reality (technology and digital revolution). It is a very big elephant in an ever shrinking (non-technological) room. More and more educational organizations are reflecting this shift to provide for technological and digital world savvy students, yet when it comes to evaluating their abilities here, they revert to pen, paper and knowledge recall. Within the IB, MYP teaching obliges teachers to use varied forms of technological media to reach the varied forms of learning styles adolescents have. It also obliges learners to be well versed in the use of these media for problem-solving. MYP ensures that this type of teaching and learning is validated by offering the MYP eAssessement, a media rich and dynamic facility which assesses students using the tools that are such a natural part of their existence today. It provides authentic assessment by placing students in unfamiliar situations to solve unstructured real-world issues. This has only been possible with current advances in technology in schools.

In 2018. the **MYP** eAssessment was awarded the **'best** of Summative Assessment'. It was commended for the 'best transformational project'. The MYP eAssessment is not only based on knowledge recall. The examination is majorly based on inquiry, communication and the use of higher order thinking skills and concepts needed to succeed in this century. Technology has the greatest impact on assessment in the MYP in that it has allowed students to be placed in the middle of problem solving scenarios, engaging them through images, videos, animations and complex models for which they (the students) must use their higher order critical thinking skills to make decisions and arrive at a conclusion. Students have grown up on video games and all manner of interactive social media, this is what they already know and that knowledge should not be diminished by current educational practices.

















The idea of e-assessments is not new; although the IB world joined the world of e-assessments very recently. The first MYP e-assessments took place in May 2016. The Diploma program of the IB is already looking towards e-assessments. Imagine students who are able to use critical thinking and higher order skills from MYP in these new DP e-assessments. It is only matter of time before e-assessments in education becomes the global norm. TIS will be looking forward to its first batch of eAssessment candidates in 2020.



# **Tema International School**





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- ➤ This is a three-week language and culture immersion programme, which is designed to motivate students, keep them interested and is based on modern, communication-oriented methods.
- Participants live in pairs with the host families chosen by the organizers Horizons du Monde.
- Participants spend the first two weeks in a chosen region and the last week in Paris/Madrid.
- ➤ Participants have lessons for three hours in the morning session of each day and go out in the afternoon to discover the culture and civilization of the French/Spanish people. They visit tourist attractions, markets and supermarkets, museums, they play games and they watch films among others.
- Participants are chaperoned by teachers of TIS at the ratio of one teacher to 10 students.
- Lessons are delivered by professional French/Spanish teachers.
- ➤ Teachers from TIS live in the coordinator's house and communicate with students in the host families. Together with the coordinator, they get solutions to any problems that may arise from any of the host families.
- > TIS teachers, the coordinator and the group's guide wait at a meeting point each morning. The host parents bring the participants in their private cars awaiting to be transported in a coach to school.
- At 5.00pm- 6.00pm each day, host parents wait at the same rendez-vous to take the kids back home.
- Participants spend weekends at home or go out with their host parents.
- Participants are not allowed to go out unaccompanied by host parents or TIS teachers.
- Participants have the telephone numbers of their TIS teachers and that of their host parents. Teachers also have that of all their students.
- > Participants have travel and health insurance.
- ➤ On arrival in France/Spain, the TIS leaders collect all passports from participants and give them back to them on the day of departure.

















- ➤ Parents of our students have access to the addresses of the host families of their children and therefore, can communicate with them and may even visit them should they be in France/Spain whilst the group is there.
- ➤ Parents have the addresses of the TIS leader so they can communicate with him/her.
- Participants are advised to keep their pocket monies with TIS teachers.




how bakers are able to ice cakes for it to look extremely smooth. While waiting for the cupcakes to bake, she shared some of her experiences about life in


