ISSAG

This is the second time I have seriously questioned TIS involvement in ISSAG. There is no respect for time, and event organization and management practices are frustrating. Our boys performed well last Saturday. The team was a development squad who did themselves proud and learnt a lot from the experience. Our girls did not play a match, but did themselves proud by their demeanour. This can't happen ever again.

Focus and Technique

Our G12 students to a large extent and our G10 students to a lesser extent are starting to feel the pressure of upcoming mock exams at the beginning of March. Now is the time for students to have a clear focus on their goals and to avoid distractions. It is not just content that needs revision, but constant practice in good exam techniques: reading and interpreting questions correctly; knowing key terms; practise answering different types of questions within set times; continuing to seek feedback of how to improve writing skills and analysis. Remember, lack of good sleep affects performance and health.

Device Paradox

(Some) Students claim they can't learn without their devices, but many do not look after them. When they want to use them, they require charging. When provided with instructions online, these are not read, or actioned. Yet, they know the latest football results. Once students value a device as a learning tool and not a toy, or a TV, their learning will be

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enhanced. However, students must do the thinking and not assume the device will.

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Science Corner

PRACTICAL VOLLEYBALL (UNDERARM PASS)

Volleyball, originally called Mintonette, is a sport that was invented in 1895 by William G. Morgan. He invented the sport 4 years after basketball was made. The sport is normally played by two teams of usually six players divided by a net. The main goal is to hit a ball with your hand over the net that divides you and your opponents so the ball will touch the ground or floor of the opposing team in order to score a point. This must be done in a way that the ball will be grounded in the dedicated or demarcated area on the floor.

The purpose of the unit is to provide students with learning experiences that will lead to the development of basic skills in team sports (volleyball). Emphasis is placed on the underarm pass and overhead pass. Students are also given opportunities to demonstrate skills learnt in game situations.

Ready position for the underarm pass

The feet are comfortably spread shoulder width, with one foot slightly behind the other. The feet are pointed towards the impending action, with the weight mostly on the balls of the feet.

The knees are flexed comfortably, slightly inside and in front of the big toes. The body is flexed comfortably at the waist, with the back straight and leaning forward. The head is up, with the eyes looking toward the source of the incoming ball. The arms and hands are held relaxed, either inside and slightly in front of the knees, or placed lightly on top of the corresponding thighs near the waist.

Theatre for Young Audience: MYP Grade 7 Drama Unit

'We stop being creative the moment we stop playing'

APPROACHES TO LEARNING SKILL FOR THE WEEK

SKILL CATEGORY: Thinking Skills SKILL CLUSTER: Critical Thinking STRAND: Inquire in different contexts to gain a different perspective

Why is it important to consider multiple perspectives?

Perspective is the way individuals see the world. It comes from their personal point of view and is shaped by life experiences, values, their current state of mind, the assumptions they bring into a situation, the context of the situation, and a whole lot of other things.

Everyone has different perspectives on things. A short person will see a tall person as tall but an even taller person will see that tall person as short. People might say Messi is the best soccer player in the world, or maybe Ronaldo, while others say Tottenham is the best soccer club in the English Premier League.





















It all boils down to the angle from which they are making their observations. Be an IB-learner and be open-minded about situations you find yourself in.

One key thing we have realized is that once we have adopted a perspective, it is difficult to suspend, or change it. It is even harder to take another's perspective if it is different from ours.

However, the key to successful relationships lies solely in our ability to consider the perspective of another. Take an immigrant, for example; someone who is coming from a different country, leaving everything behind and coming to a new country and just trying to make a living. Yet society feels as if that they don't belong there; that they are just additional mouths to feed and thus a nuisance. Put yourself in their shoes, they probably never wanted to leave their country, they never wanted war to happen, but it did and it's not their fault. It is necessary to look at both sides of the story before you draw your conclusion because not everything that you see is what it is.

Considering multiple perspectives help you learn and understand different cultures, morals and beliefs of different people. It helps you develop better communication skills with people from every part of the world without being judgmental. Eventually, you become open-minded. Everything we hear is an opinion, not a fact, and everything we see is just our point of view and not the truth.



Let us, therefore, desist from being too hasty in drawing conclusions, and be mindful that perhaps the way we saw something isn't the only way of seeing; that perhaps if we went an inch higher or lower, we would see things a little differently. Let us make it a habit of considering multiple perspectives as that is likely to give as a bigger picture based on which we can draw more objective conclusions.



- Transportation to and from Dulles International Airport/Union Station in Washington,
 D.C. will be provided by the program.
- Hood College maintains **24/7 security service, a 24/7 health centre**, and free Wi-Fi, which will be accessible to all.
- For necessities, Hood College has a campus store available.
- Students will be accommodated on campus in the residence halls at Hood College separated by gender.

- Three meals per day will be provided by the Hood College dining hall which is served buffet style.




















- For each meal, the dining hall offers three main courses (with vegetarian options) to choose from, a salad and soup bar, fresh fruit, and a vast selection of beverages.





TRAVEL TO FRANCE/SPAIN WITH US





















- This is a three-week language and culture immersion programme, which is designed to motivate students, keep them interested and is based on modern, communicationoriented methods.
- Participants live in pairs with the host families chosen by the organizers Horizons du Monde.
- Participants spend the first two weeks in a chosen region and the last week in Paris/Madrid.
- Participants have lessons for three hours in the morning session of each day and go out in the afternoon to discover the culture and civilization of the French/Spanish people. They visit tourist attractions, markets and supermarkets, museums, they play games and they watch films among others.
- > Participants are chaperoned by teachers of TIS at the ratio of one teacher to 10 students.
- > Lessons are delivered by professional French/Spanish teachers.
- Teachers from TIS live in the coordinator's house and communicate with students in the host families. Together with the coordinator, they get solutions to any problems that may arise from any of the host families.
- TIS teachers, the coordinator and the group's guide wait at a meeting point each morning. The host parents bring the participants in their private cars awaiting to be transported in a coach to school.
- At 5.00pm- 6.00pm each day, host parents wait at the same rendez-vous to take the kids back home.
- > Participants spend weekends at home or go out with their host parents.
- > Participants are not allowed to go out unaccompanied by host parents or TIS teachers.
- Participants have the telephone numbers of their TIS teachers and that of their host parents. Teachers also have that of all their students.
- > Participants have travel and health insurance.

















- On arrival in France/Spain, the TIS leaders collect all passports from participants and give them back to them on the day of departure.
- Parents of our students have access to the addresses of the host families of their children and therefore, can communicate with them and may even visit them should they be in France/Spain whilst the group is there.
- > Parents have the addresses of the TIS leader so they can communicate with him/her.
- > Participants are advised to keep their pocket monies with TIS teachers.

privileged children in our community. *Portia (leader, Pen in a Box)*







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












Preparations and Expectations toward Inter-Colour Singing Competition **Red Kigelia African Flower – Greetings from your patron,**




"Essentially, I would like to appreciate school management for the opportunity to experience a face to face IB workshop for the first time.

My colleague, Sylvester, and I attended an IB Workshop in Dubai, specifically on MYP Projects. Indeed it was remarkable to meet IB educators all over the world sharing best practices and challenges. It was quite interesting to notice that we all had common stories to share, school or country
