#### **Best Advice**

Our exam candidates in G10 & 12 are moving closer to their finish line when their mock exams commence on Monday. These exams will conclude on 15 March. These exams allow students the opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of course requirements.

Poor traditions include cramming until the last minute and trying to survive with as little sleep as possible. The end result is predictable, disappointing and/or surprising.

My best advice includes:

- Go to bed 15 minutes earlier than usual with the goal of a good night's sleep by not rising in the darkness of early morning.
- Eat a good breakfast.
- Shun all social media and visual media (movies, series, etc.)
- Walk six times around the sports field each day.
- Arrive early at the designated exam venue.
- Read questions closely and carefully.
- Manage and maximise the exam session to complete all exam requirements.
- When exam papers are returned, remember the feedback is more important than the grade.
- Refine your final study plan based on what the mocks reveal for you.
- No excuses: just better.... discipline....or focus.....or commitment.....or effort....or less distractions.

### **Balance, Down Time and Siestas**

There is a misguided belief that everything stops in exam years and you just focus on academics. So, it is disappointing that some of our G12 athletes have opted out of the ISSAG athletics this year, as well as other activities and events over the course of 2018/2019. Has this singular focus worked? To date, no. Hopefully, yes by the end of May. The missing ingredient has been balance. Most students do not engage in sufficient physical exercise during the week. This is a global issue and not just a TIS problem.

But there is too much to do and not enough time to do it! It all comes down to time management, priorities and discipline. Perhaps, removing distractions, such as social media and apps like Telegram will save individuals a lot of time. Deciding if watching a movie, or a series, may be best in June, when you will have all the free time you like, will remove a lazy

















distraction and save heaps of time.

The most overlooked issue that most students are ignoring is adequate sleep. Short-changing sleep is the same as short-changing your success, as no one can perform at their best if they are sleep-deprived. Kidding oneself, or making excuses, are the two common outcomes from sleep-deprived performance. Having a 60 minute siesta in the afternoon will only throw out sleeping patterns so that the cycle of sleep deprivation is enhanced instead of removing it altogether.

I hope all exam students will dock voluntarily during the entire mock exam session.

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








### **SCIENCE CORNER**

MYP 4 chemistry students this week were introduced to the Mole concept and the Avogadro's constant. To do this, students were tasked to calculate the amount of chalk particles they use to write their names on walk ways in the school community.

The practical experiment that we had on Tuesday was a very fun experience for me. In class, we just started stoichiometry and we learned how to use moles to find the number of particles and the mass of a substance using the Avogadro's constant and vice versa. For our experiment, we had to work in pairs, to find out how many particles of clacium carbonate (chalk) we used to write our names on the pavement. I think that this experiment has really helped me put my knowledge of stoichiometry into practice and in a suitable context. -



It was fun! Once I saw the questions, my partner and I were a bit confused, but after we read through we started to actually look forward to it. The experiment involved using chalk to write our names on the pavement, then calculating the amount of chalk that had depleted. We did this to better understand what we were learning about Avogadro's Constant (6.02214086 × 1023 mol-1). - Nana Ama Boakye



#### Educators' Conference 2019 - Connect. Learn. Innovate.

At Lancaster, the counselors' and heads of schools' educational forum was indeed a career life enrichment programme. The Keynote Speaker, Mrs. Betty Djokoto, former Headmistress of Wesley Girls' High School spoke on the theme: **Educational Leadership in a Global Context**. In today's competitive world, it is not enough to earn a degree, but the applicability of the knowledge gained, the person's personal energy that he/she brings on board, the character traits that are relevant to the job at hand based on the job description; all these factors are a reflection of the quality of education received by an individual in all facets of his/her life. Globally, there are certain key performance indicators that are the catalysts for individual success which should not be compromised on. These are:

- School's Values and Ethics must be ingrained in the life of the students. To strive for excellence, respect, godliness, and integrity, these traits must be ingrained in the minds and hearts of the students and exemplified by staff members as well. The vision and core mandate for operating as a school must be positively reflected in the lives of the students. As educators, the future of the next generational leaders lies in our hands. What are we doing differently?
- **Brainstorming with Others for Best Practices.** To achieve success it is essential as heads of schools, to seek the opinions of those they supervise. Unanswered questions and best ideas can be solicited through brainstorming sessions, especially when there is a crisis or challenging circumstance.
- Making a Positive Mark. Formulated policies and strategies can be rigid and unadaptable but in the process, as educators, we can make amendments, inject creativity and innovation in our work to achieve the best of results.
- Handling Failures. What structures and measures are put in place for students dealing with failures? There has to be an immediate emergency measure to make students to firstly understand that failures are part of life's journey. In the face of failure, we must learn to identify our mistakes, learn the lessons and become better and wiser! Counselors can step in to counsel students and parents to fully understand the student and the best way to go.
- **Set Performance Targets.** Students can perform better when reasonable targets are set for them in terms of academic performance. Extra tuition can be organized for such underperforming students and personal issues that affect students academically can also be addressed.

















The second session for Counsellors present, was led by Ms Coomerene Rodrigo, a Teaching and Learning Developer at Lancaster University Ghana. She led a discussion on Educational Leadership in a Global Context: The Counselors' Perspective. Under this topic, Career Counselling Theories applicable to the field were explored. They are:

- Trait and Factor Theory (Frank Parsons): The basic premise here is we are attracted to a given career by our particular personality and numerous variables that constitute our background. It is a rational and objective judgment about the relationship between an individual's traits, and the labour market.
- **Development Self-Concept Theory (Donald Super):** Developmental theories recognize the changes that people go through as they mature, and they emphasize a life-span approach to career choice and adaptation. These theories usually partition working life into stages, and they try to specify the typical vocational behaviours at each stage.
- Social Cognitive Theory (Albert Bandura): It is a learning theory based on the idea that people learn by observing others with the environment, behaviour, and cognition acting as primary factors that influence development in a reciprocal triadic relationship. Similarly, the environment one is raised in may influence later behaviors such as career choice. A child's environment and upbringing inform their career choice.
- Vocational Choice Theory (John Holland): This is based on the premise that personality factors underline career choices. This theory postulates that people project self-and world-of-work views onto occupational titles and make career decisions that satisfy their preferred personal orientations.
- Happenstance Theory (John Krumboltz): This theory states that indecision is desirable and sensible, as it allows the opportunity for clients/students to benefit from unplanned events. Thus it creates the flexibility that student needs to adapt to a different career opportunity that they might get. Career choice isn't fixed or a straight road, students can adjust and adapt to suit whatever options they have.

The conclusion was that an eclectic approach which involves the fusion of any of the above theories will aid in a better understanding of the career needs of our unique and diverse students. Also, theory and practice of counselling should be both applied in the counselling process.

#### Grade 8 Lesson: Life Values: Integrity and Respect

Life's essential values of integrity and respect can never be compromised. These distinctive values set an individual apart, travels with them into their future career paths, marital homes, families and the community at large. The gravity of our actions in applying these life principles creates a lasting impression about us to others. We had an engaging lesson meant to conscientize students to have a personal conviction and apply these values in their everyday interaction. Self-explanatory images that explain the key concepts were adopted in the teaching process.























### **Student Self Reflection – Grade 8**



"I had a fun time during today's lesson. I was able to absorb and build upon my knowledge especially in the real-life aspect. In today's lesson, we learned about Respect and Integrity. The key things I took out of this lesson is that, if you want to be a respectful individual, you are supposed to put a smile on a person's face always, treat people right and see things with an open mind. We also learned about respect. I learned a few types/forms of respect and they are, respect for difference, respect of rules, self-respect and more. Being an individual of integrity also requires the

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following types/forms of respect above. This lesson was very interactive, it's wasn't as boring as I thought it would be and wish for another lesson similar to this. Before I sign out I would love to share something. Integrity is one of the most basic values employers seek in employees that they are going to hire and if you are very respectful (at work) you can reduce stress, conflict and other forms of problems. "In today's class we studied the importance of Integrity and Respect. I learnt that integrity is the ability to do the right thing whether or not somebody is watching you. Integrity is also the act of being principled and honest to yourself as a personal conviction. Under Integrity we spoke on the 7 Sins of speaking, these are the actions that people take preventing integrity in their life. The 7 sins of speaking are: Judging, Complaining, Excuse, Negativity, Dogmatism, Exaggeration and Gossip; each of these points can cause someone to feel bad and look down on themselves. The last topic we looked on was respect,

I learnt that respect is treating and regarding someone right, regardless of their position in life. Respect is not only from older people to younger people, but respect is also demonstrated both ways whereby elderly people can strengthen their respect from others, as a result of respecting others too". - Nhyira Owusu (Grade 8)

Mummy bought the CD so I have watched it already but I watched it again last Saturday's entertainment and it brought back many memories. While watching it, I had many flashbacks

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


