Mocks are Over: What's Next?

There are plenty of bleary-eyed students who will quickly recover from examitis afternoon with the end of the G10 and G12 mock exams.

These students must now reflect on their approach and planning up to these mock exams, as well as their exam techniques and performance, as results are released.

The mock results will provide students (and their parents and teachers) a reasonable indication as to where they are at with their final exams about six weeks away. Importantly, all planning should be gearing up to maximum performance from six weeks until the end of the exam sessions.

I see three common challenges ahead for our exam candidates:

• Final study plan: the mocks should have identified each student's strengths and areas to work on more closely. Finalising a balanced study plan must be the first priority for all students who should work closely with their teachers to maximise the required support to achieve maximum performance. Ensure your planning is realistic and specific.

• Exam techniques: students need to reflect on feedback and seek clarity if required to address specific exam techniques that prevented best results in the mocks. Was critical analysis an issue? Was poor time management in responding to some questions a problem? Was clear planning to answer any task something that requires practice? Was writing and holding a pen for a length of time something to overcome within six weeks? These aspects are just as important as study plans. If you misinterpret questions, your knowledge and understanding will not assist you. Do you need to see Aunty Sandra about exam stress and how to handle it better so that you can still produce your best performance?

• Balance: cramming your studies, lack of sleep and poor eating habits over the coming six weeks do not work. Going into an exam tired, or unwell, will impact in a negative way. If

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students have remained consistent with their studies and use their time well, then the expected results will follow. Panicking and trying to revise entire courses over the next six weeks will be counter-productive. Manage your time. Prioritise. Use all assistance available. Be in the moment and not be distracted about your university offers. Get a minimum six hours of sleep each night, and not over 24 hours.

Individuals & Societies Corner

GRADE 9 GEOGRAPHY TRIP REFLECTIONS

The Grade 9 Geography students embarked on a fieldtrip to the Ghana Meteorological Authority at East Legon on 8 March, 2019. The students were accompanied by their teacher, Mr. Michael Odame and assistant librarian, Ms. Setor Addih. The trip was to enable the students to describe and appreciate the methods of collecting and measuring meteorological data. Feedback from the students indicate that the trip was very interesting and educative. They were given the opportunity to experience the recording, processing and forecasting of weather elements. We wish to express our gratitude to the management of Tema International School for giving us the opportunity to undertake this trip. We also appreciate the kind support of Mr. Richmond Obeng, a Meteorologist at the station, for educating us on the use of weather instruments. Please find below some reflections from the students. (*Michael Odame- Geography Teacher*)

On Friday, March 2019, we visited the Ghana Meteorological Authority. We learnt the different elements of weather and their measuring instruments. We were given the opportunity to observe the use of instruments such as, hygrometer, sunshine recorder, rain gauge and many others. The hygrometer, for instance, measures the humidity of the air and uses the principle of human hair to work. When the air is moist, the hair contracts and when the air is dry, the hair expands again. All-in-all, the trip was very enlightening, and interesting. I look forward to going for a trip like that in the future. – **Joshua Mefful**

On Friday, 8 March, my classmates and our teacher went to the meteorology agency to study about climate and the weather and how it is broadcasted to the world. When we got there, we had an hour lecture on the agency, its branches and its stations. They also briefed us on the instruments used to measure weather elements such as, rain gauge for rainfall, thermometers for temperature of the day and know the amount of rainfall. We were later on sent to the field where all the measurements for the wind speed, temperature, rain, sunshine and every other variables are measured. After the field we went to the forecast studio room where the current weather and upcoming weather reports are recorded and sent to news stations for broadcasting and inform the community. Two of our colleagues were given the opportunity to forecast the weather for the next 24 hours. The Geography trip was very educative as I learnt a lot. **Mafina Amoako**









SCIENCE CORNER

Factors affecting enzyme activity Introduction

The DP Biology students of Grade 11 took part in a practical where they investigated the effects of temperature on enzyme activity. Students identified and observed the optimum temperature for a reaction involving starch and the enzyme amylase at varying temperatures.

Below are some reflections of two students.

In today's biology class, we participated in an experiment to investigate factors affecting enzyme activity. As we suited up with our lab coats and became familiar with the tools and chemicals we would be using, excitement filled the air. It was a very interesting experience

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with many steps to follow in order to receive the expected result. Unfortunately, it was a failure at the first attempt, but with some perseverance, we were finally able to get some positive results. It was really fun to make mistakes but keep trying as we all enjoyed some relaxing music and the company of our classmates. This was one of my first experiments here and I look forward to many more moments like this as I continue my journey here at TIS. - **Abèle. T**

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


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

"Participating in the University of Guelph's admitted students dinner was a very insightful experience. I met potential Gryphons and I had the opportunity to interact with a parent of a current Gryphon, Ms. Victoria. From her, I received advice on how to manage finances and the best residency to apply for as a first-year student. It was really nice to have a parent's perspective. Both Mr. Damalie and Ms. Victoria revealed the pros and cons of university life as a first-year student and an international one for that matter. I learnt so much more about the school through this meeting such as the work experiences I can undertake in and out of school and the numerous facilities available to students. I discovered that for a school like Guelph, you may still be accepted into your faculty if you are one or two points off your predicted grades,

however he added that most admitted students excel and meet their conditional offer requirements so there should be no room for complacency in the final exams".

Accommodation

- \$750 residence deposit must be submitted by the deadline posted in the Offer of Admission in order to be guaranteed a space in residence. Priority is given to first years and it is advisable they stay on campus and can move out in the second year. Deadline for first years to make a deposit is June 3, 2019.

Scholarship Information

We look forward to seeing you soon (a few meetings will take place next week, however, most parents will meet us after the mid-semester break). Thank you!









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Ghanaian Sign Language



A sign language is a language which allows the users to communicate using the hands instead of sound- simultaneously combining hand shapes, orientation and movement of the hands, arms or body, and facial expression to fluidly express a speaker's thought. The sign language remains nevertheless a fully- fledged language, with its own constructional method of sentences.
