Many are feeling anxious as they are feeling the weight of expectations on them. I hope this anxiety does not diminish their performance as I know everyone is capable of doing their best.

My advice to exam candidates as they prepare to commence this examination phase is:

- Focus with no distractions:
- Get adequate sleep (minimum of 7 hours each night) so you can feel fresh for the day's exams:
- Similarly, don't rise early and then take a short nap;
- Eat properly (don't snack); and
- Be disciplined in what you do.

# **Special Assembly**

TIS will host a Special Assembly next Tuesday at 2.45pm when two leading academics from the University of Leicester will address the audience on:

- The strengths and weaknesses of a family business (Professor Hugo Letiche); and
- Social media: strengthening or disrupting democracy? (Dr Athina Karatzogianni).

As always, interested parents are also invited to attend this special assembly.

#### **Social Media**

On the subject of social media, there have been limitations placed on the use of social media, including chat sites. Access is available from 3.30-5.30pm daily. Any use outside these hours means students are circumventing the system and demonstrating a lack of integrity.

Why the limitations? Social media has many benefits, but many students are more focused on 'chatting' with friends, especially during lessons, instead of focusing on their learning. Put simply,













it's a distraction to their learning and the use of laptops at TIS is for the sole purpose of assisting learning, not distracting learning.

I hope parents will question their son or daughter if they receive a message during school hours as to how they are accessing a message service?

On a similar note, I urged G12 students yesterday to apply a self-imposed ban on social media until after their exams end, so they do not lose their focus at this critical time. I encourage G10 students to adopt this same action. The important question is: how many students will be disciplined to adopt this action?

# **Achievers' Day and Graduation Ceremony**

Our Annual TIS Achievers' Day and Graduation Ceremony will be held on Saturday, 1 June, commencing at 10.00am. Students may commence their summer vacation at the conclusion of this event (and not before.)

The awards this year will be adjusted to align with our commitment: academics, culture, sport and service. All students are expected to demonstrate commitment to each aspect and Achievers' Day will recognize student achievement and performance in each area. Consistency and commitment will be key criteria. For example, in academics, tardiness to class or the non-submission of assessment tasks do not reflect commitment. Being the only student in a class does not merit an award if consistency and commitment are lacking.

# **TIS Re-registration**

In order to ensure the accuracy of our student numbers for 2019/2020, parents should have received an email two weeks ago to complete the re-registration of their child/children by 30 April. To confirm enrolment for next year, parents will be required to complete basic contact data to ensure current data on MB is accurate. Please use the specific link provided in the email. [I have sent reminders again today.]

You will enter this data on OpenApply (OA) which is MB's younger sibling. It is user-friendly, however, if you have any issues, please contact Rita, or myself.

Current Grade 10 students: I expect all G10 students to continue into the IB Diploma Program in Grade 11. What about the results from the IGCSE? They are an indicator for best choice of subjects and the appropriate level – Standard or Higher. However, both programs (IG and DP) are complete opposites, so students who may not have enjoyed IG will often thrive in DP. Nothing beats the DP experience and all G10 students will have the opportunity to commence the full Diploma Programme from the start of G11. I am happy to discuss options and choices with any parent who may have any questions.



#### **Science Corner**

#### An Acid and Base Lab

We were tasked with finding the pH of some everyday substances and we had to do this in pairs. We used an electric pH finding machine (pH meter) to determine the pH of each of the substances. From this lesson I was able to learn the differences in pH and how they affect the use of the substance. I was also able to build my collaborative skills. Overall, it was a very fun and exciting experience. - Nana Ama Boakye

In chem class, we used a pH meter to test for the pH of multiple solutions, such as sobolo, orange juice and bleach. Bleach had the highest pH



(12.63) and this means it is an alkaline/base and Coke had the lowest pH (2.41). This helped me understand the higher the pH the lower the acidity. Just like bleach, bases are slippery, smooth substances. - **Hedia Dickson**

#### IBDP1 Extended Essay Café- 23 - 24 April 2019



Students presented their research questions, chapter headings and snippets of interesting findings they may have come across in their reading.

The audience, made up of students and supervisors, had the opportunity to offer comments and suggestions for improvement.

The two day program also offered an opportunity for students to learn about the different topics that are being researched and subsequently broaden their knowledge on different contexts and issues of global importance.

Each student was given 10 minutes to present their most up-to-date EE research findings.

Students were required to inform the panel of the following:

- a. Subject, research topic and question.
- b. Background. What is their EE about? Key issues to be addressed etc.
- c. Research conducted thus far and planned research for the summer.













- d. Methodology for data collection & analysis.
- e. Possible chapter headings (a workable outline of possible sections and or chapters).
- f. Problems encountered and solutions found where applicable.



#### Dear DP2 Parents,

We trust all is well with you and that you had a wonderful Easter break.

Hopefully, you have had a discussion with your ward regarding their final university (destinations/acceptances/choices).

Kindly remember to pay the enrollment deposit directly to the universities your child gained admission into and intends to enroll at, to secure their spot before the 1 May reply deadline or the specific deadline stated in the university's acceptance package. Students could lose admission offers if they do not pay the required deposit on time. We encourage wait-listed applicants to inform the university of their continued interest if still interested.

Also for UK universities, students must choose a suitable firm and insurance school (first and second choice) on UCAS track after your approval, being cognizant of factors of importance to you such as affordability, location, preferred programme/course, IB DP final results conditions tied to the admission offer in relation to the student's current performance among others.

We also emailed you requesting for your confirmation of the top 6 universities to receive your child's final IB DP Results in July via IBIS website for free. Any additions after 1 May would incur payment via credit card to IB. Please send an approval email to us latest Monday 28 April.



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

#### Fingerspelling in Ghanaian Sign language



Fingerspelling is the manual alphabet used in Ghanaian Sign Language and is performed using a variety of hand shapes. It is mainly used for spelling out names, people, places and things that don't have their own unique sign. Additionally, it is commonly used for spelling out titles of books and movies, as well as signing the brand name of various items

#### How to do it

Letters are signed with the dominant hand and generally with the palm facing the viewer. When fingerspelling, the hand should be at shoulder height. Letters are signed at a constant speed with a pause functioning as a divider.

#### **Fun Facts**

- There are many different manual alphabets throughout the world. Ghanaian Sign Language uses the GSL Manual Alphabet.
- American fingerspelling is composed of 22 one hand gestures to represent 26 letters.
- British fingerspelling uses **both hands** to form each letter.
- Japan has the **most** extensive fingerspelling with different gestures to cover the 46 hiragana characters.
















All hail the Prom King and Queen!







