

ManageBac for Parents

ManageBac (MB) is our learning management portal that is used by teachers for planning assessment, reporting and attendance. Students use it to access assignment tasks, resources, and assessment results, including semester reports. Parents access MB for reports, announcements and can track their child's academic performance. Almost all messages, including the weekly bulletin and monthly newsletter will be sent through MB to parents.

Welcome emails from ManageBac (MB) were sent out last night to new parents and continuing parents who have not accessed it yet. Please check your junk/spam folder if the email is not obvious in your inbox. Click on the second link – Set My Password. Some advice...

So you're setting up your ManageBac password and you may be asking, "What's with the mission-impossible password requirements?"

We take data protection and security pretty seriously, which is why we recently updated our password strength requirements. This is especially important as we introduce Single-Sign-On, which is the ability to sign into multiple platforms with the same username and password.

The password will not save until you see a green box.

You could use a password like **S8raH18!**, but that's not very fun to remember, nor is it nearly as secure as a longer password with random words put together. It's better to use a phrase. We've found that the combination of three or four random common words is easier to remember *and* harder to crack!

An example of a super strong password that's not too hard to remember would be **Teacher Matt Bobo Yellow** or **Horse Battery Staple Yea**

PREPARING FOR MYP5





At the end of this week, we welcome our returning students to school. Although we say students are returning to school, they do not really return to what they left behind last academic year. Something always looks different. Sometimes friends look different, sometimes we look different, but always our studies will be different because we have moved on by one academic year. For our MYP teachers (returning and new) every new academic year brings change in a familiar setting. This year the change is the new MYP5. This is a new era for everyone involved in MYP5 and it cannot be compared to any other experience TIS has ever had.

In the two weeks before the beginning of the new semester, teachers went through sessions and training to help them be well prepared for MYP5. Dianne Blackburn a well-established MYP facilitator and a good friend of TIS, joined teachers in their preparations for delivering the MYP framework from grade 7 through to 10 for the first time.

Teachers went through group discussions on Interdisciplinary unit planning, ATLs evaluations, Service as Action delivery, Personal project management and working with a prescribed global context, just as students would. During this staff development week, teachers also discussed the best ways to link and incorporate one discipline into another and to make this an integral part of their MYP lessons. All can attest to the valuable experiences they had.





Our Grade 10 students will become the first TIS students to complete the MYP with IB assessments next semester. Along with their teachers and parents, MYP5 students must decide on what subjects they will take to MYP certification by October 2019. Again, by the end of October MYP5 students are expected to start on the e-portfolios whose framework will be set by the IB. Parents (of MYP5 students) are invited to attend the parent information session on the 20 September 2019. It will be a session to inform parents and answer questions regarding MYP assessments. There will be an opportunity for parents to try for themselves some such assessments for themselves.

Teachers and students can expect another fast and furious year; in order for everything to run smoothly, students must respect all deadlines for submitting completed work for school assessments or for the IB. Students must work closely with their teachers and personal project supervisors to ensure that no opportunity to succeed is lost. Once again, I welcome everyone back to the start of the academic year 2019-2020.

From the Diploma Coordinator

Akwaaba, and welcome everybody to a new school year!

My name is David Spooner, and I am proud to have been invited by the Founding family, and by Dr. Ken, to join TIS as its new Diploma Coordinator. It is not my first visit to TIS, however; four years ago I and another colleague were invited to give a Theory of Knowledge Workshop, and when, earlier this year, I saw that the position of Diploma Coordinator was to become vacant, I had no hesitation: I remember what it felt like being here, and how welcoming and hospitable everyone was, and decided that here was where I wanted to be. Luckily, Dr. Ken and the Founding family agreed...and here I am, a nervous, excited raring-to-go newbie!

This year the school is to undergo its third International Baccalaureate Diploma 5-Year Review. This is important because it gives us the opportunity to showcase our talents and to demonstrate to the IB that we deserve our World School status! Thus, this year, we will all be looking at every aspect of the school, including the teaching and learning, school policies, the steps we take ensure that we live and breathe our Mission Statement, and that of the IB, as well as embody the principles of the learner profile. No stone will be left unturned...and when we put those stones back, the school will be better as a result...which means that the education your sons and daughters will receive will be better. I will be supported in that by my colleagues, of course, but also by the students, and by yourselves, so at various stages in the year I will be contacting you and asking for your thoughts and feedback on a number of aspects of the school, and I thank you in advance for your wonderful support.

Before coming to Ghana, I have taught in a number of IB World schools in a number of countries. I am from the UK, and since leaving have taught in Spain, Finland, Lebanon, Greece, Jordan, Italy and France. For many years I have been an IB workshop leader, helping teachers to become better teachers, a curriculum writer (I am partly responsible for writing the current Philosophy Guide) and am also an examiner, school authorization visitor, and...a 5-Year Evaluation visitor! So, I would like to think I know how the IB Diploma works, inside and out, and I am proud to be able to bring whatever expertise I have to help make TIS even better than it is.

With that in mind, I am very happy that the Diploma Programme is expanding this year to offer two new courses, Philosophy and French ab initio.

Having received many requests from students for the introduction of French Ab initio, the Department of Language Acquisition is proud to be able to add French Ab Initio as one of the languages that IB Diploma and course students may study. This will serve as a great opportunity for students who have not yet had the opportunity to learn French, but who wish to. We cannot forget that Ghana is surrounded by Francophone countries, and thus the increased opportunities that being able to begin to study French at TIS in Ghana bring are suddenly multiplied.

We are also offering the study of Philosophy as an option in the Diploma Programme, as a supplement to the other courses available in the Department of Individuals and Societies. Philosophy sometimes gets a bad press: it is often seen as a pointless subject, where there are never any clear answers; sometimes it is seen as a dangerous subject, because dictators and charlatans do not like people who can think critically; it is often seen as impractical because there is no clear career-progression attached to it. However, as Kwame Anthony Appiah has said,

"I started philosophy looking for answers. But along the way I came to prize exploring the questions. Progress consists, I think, in a clearer delineation of the conceptual options, not in reaching determinate conclusions."

Not many of my previous students went on to study Philosophy at university (one of them did, and she now begins her tenure as a Professor of Philosophy at Pennsylvania State in the U.S.A. Not bad at all!). The rest went on to study a variety of subjects at a variety of universities, and studying Philosophy gave them the 'edge' over other students, and the fact that they studies Philosophy gave the student who is now beginning a specialization in thorassic surgery a greater understanding of medical ethics; gave the lawyer a greater understanding of rhetoric, and gave the aid worker for Medecins sans frontiers a greater intercultural understanding. Philosophy also got me here, to TIS. And, in a world where it is becoming increasingly difficult to know how to spot the difference between truth and falsehood, the real and the fake, Philosophy provides a toolkit of transferable skills for doing just that, and more.

I look forward to meeting as many of you as I can in the future.

Save Our Shores Project initiated by Edward Quansah & Eyako Eli Dzantor



Save Our Shores hopes to inspire more citizens to join us in taking responsibility and reversing the damage caused to our beaches. We will also like to raise awareness about the devastating effects of plastics such as, but not limited to:

- 1. Plastics use up land and clutter landfills.
- 2. Plastics take thousands of years to properly decompose.
- 3. They are carcinogenic (cancer causing) agents.
- 4. When burnt, plastics release dangerous chemicals that contribute to climate change.
- 5. Plastics threaten the lives of aquatic animals who ingest them and others predators (including us) who feed on these fish.

After a long day of cleaning, we were able to accumulate 6 bags (45kg) worth of litter and dropped this off at the *Zoomlion Recycling Plant, Accra,* where they will be recycled and used as compost. Although we were not able to massively reduce the overabundance of plastic litter in the depths of the ocean, we are more than glad to have contributed to making the Krokrobite beach a cleaner place! We will continue to take actions to promote a clean environment and fight against plastic pollution until it no longer exists in our community.



More beaches clean/awareness ups will be organised. We hope to mobilise the entire TIS community.

most of the time we don't even make use of it all. It was great to share some of my own clothes and that of my family and friends.


One thing I learnt is the fact that even though those children are orphans, or their parents cannot look after them, and they have less than myself, they are not deprived of joy. From the time I

USING SIGN LANGUAGE IN THE CLASSROOM

Using Ghanaian sign language (GSL) in preschool or elementary school classroom keeps students' hands moving, their minds engaged and their brains learning! Signing involves physical movement, which adds a kinesthetic element to learning. This physical movement engages students' bodies as well as their brains, giving them a more intensive and multi-sensory learning experience. In addition, some signs are iconic (they look like what they represent. For example, the sign for BIRD looks like a bird's beak opening and closing), which means that the form or action of the sign supports and

strengthens understanding of the corresponding word. All of this physical involvement pays off.

Moreover, signing boost academic achievement. Multiple studies have been conducted with hearing children who use sign language in their educational settings. Dr. Marilyn Daniels an expert in this area of study summarizes these research findings in her book "*Dancing with Words*". Daniels reports that signing in the classroom generates enthusiasm for learning and increase self-confidence and self-esteem. These important social benefits contribute significantly to optimizing academic achievement.

Furthermore, using GSL in the classroom gives students a natural opportunity to learn about deaf culture, and gives them the opportunity to communicate with the deaf people they may encounter in life.


We are committed to challenging our students to make the best of their CAS journey at TIS so that they become active, compassionate and lifelong learners while contributing to make the world a better place for everyone.





INDIVIDUALS AND SOCIETIES DEPARTMENT



We welcome you to the 2019/2020 academic year. The department is fully prepared to support students in their life-long learning through the various disciplines and learning experiences planned for this academic year.

In this department, students collect, describe and analyze data used in studies of societies, test hypotheses, and learn how to interpret complex information, including original source material which focus on real-world examples as essential aspect of the subject group¹.

At TIS, we offer the following subjects which fall under IB Group 3:

Integrated Humanities: An interdisciplinary subject under which students study various types of human interactions, using methods that are largely analytical, critical or exploratory.

Business Management: Students learn to analyze, discuss and evaluate business activities at local, national and international levels.

Economics: Students essentially learn about scarcity, resource allocation, and the methods and processes by which choices are made in the satisfaction of human wants.

Geography: Students develop an understanding of the interrelationships between people, places, spaces and the environment.

History: Studying history helps students develop an understanding of the past, which leads to a deeper understanding of the nature of humans and of the world today.

Information Technology in a Global Society (ITGS): The subject encourages students to make informed judgments and decisions about the role of information and communication technologies in contemporary society.

Psychology: Study of this subject equips students with greater understanding of themselves and appreciate the diversity of human behavior.

<u>WHY STUDY PHILOSOPHY?</u> Well, why bother? Philosophy is just blablaba, right? It's not useful, it's not practical, so what's the point?

It turns out that not only is it useful and practical, but if you want to succeed in a whole range of fields – business, economics, marketing, science and medicine – it is not only useful and practical, but will also help you to earn more money than if you didn't study it.

"Once hired, philosophy majors advance more rapidly than their colleagues who possess only business degrees'" writes Thomas Hurka, Professor of Economics and Business at the University of Calgary. He strongly advises the younger generation to consider studying philosophy, if they want to be successful in business. This is supported by a recent study by Payscale, which shows that while starting salaries of philosophy graduates might be less than those with business degrees, by mid-career, the salaries of philosophy graduates surpasses those of marketing, communications, accounting and business management. Taking this into consideration, it appears that having the right business degree from a prestigious business school does not guarantee a successful career in business. Following this line of thought, Matthew Stewart, former management consultant of the Mitchell Madison Group tells, "If you want to succeed in business, don't get a Business degree. Study philosophy instead.'"²

It is also, of course, interesting in its own right. It is challenging, and difficult, and yet fascinating and, no matter what other subjects you combine it with, useful.

We are often told that, in twenty years or so, 80% of the careers and professions that you will be in do not even exist yet. The world of work is changing rapidly, the world in which we live is changing rapidly, and it is becoming increasingly difficult to spot the difference between fact, opinion and belief, between genuine news and 'fake news.' It is hard to know what is true or what is false any longer. The only subject that can really provide you with a 'toolkit' for the future – the future of work, the future of your life, and the future of the planet - is Philosophy.

PHYSICS IA TRIP TO THE KWAME NKRUMAH UNIVERSITY OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY (KNUST), KUMASI

On 28 May 2019, some IBDP 1 (Grade 11) Physics students went to the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology to carry out some scientific (physics-related) investigations as in fulfillment of an IB requirement for each subject.

The team arrived at the university premises at about 11:30 am and some orientation was done by a member of faculty of the Department of Physics. After the orientation, the team moved to the Engineering Guest House to have lunch and rested in the various allocated rooms. At about 5:00 pm the students converged to be briefed about the whole physics IA process and they chose their individual topics of interest according to available facilities/equipment.

The students then began and concluded their various investigations on 29 May, while the others completed the following day.

After obtaining their data, write-ups were done up to evaluation and their supervisors read through for possible corrections.

On 31 May, 2019, the team returned safely to the TIS premises at about 2:30pm.



Below is a student's reflection of the whole trip.

"The IB Physics IA trip to Kumasi was a very nice experience all roun. When I first heard we were going to Kumasi, I did not know what to expect but I was looking forward to it. The five-hour road journey to Kumasi and back was not as boring as I expected because myself, and my other fellow physics students were able to make the most of it. When we got to the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST), we were taken round by one of the professors to the various different stations where one could conduct their experiment. I decided on the wind turbine experiment in which specifically, investigated the power output of a wind turbine depending on the different surface areas and designs of the wind turbine blades. This experiment was very enjoyable as I was able to collect my data in the two days we were experimenting. The person who was supervising me from the university was very helpful and supportive and I encourage the next set of G11 physics students to build a small relationship with whoever their supervisor is, as it makes your investigation smoother. Staying at the engineering guest house was a fun experience because we were able to watch TV and talk with our peers during our free time and also finish our IA write up. Overall, I learnt a lot at KNUST and I really appreciate my time over there because as I look back I see it as a privilege of which I took full advantage."


