

PYP CORNER

Early Years

For the past five weeks, we have been focusing all our inquiry on the transdisciplinary theme: 'Who We Are.' Particularly, we have been exploring the central idea:

'Every day, I learn more about who I am, my friends, my senses and how I am changing!'

We have been learning about our family compositions, our favourite things, letters that compose our names, etc. Through engaging activities, we have extended our knowledge of who we are, and at the same time, developed our thinking and researching skills.

Our inquiry into friendship started with learning each other's names. By now, the TIS family knows our favourite song, 'Bee bee, Bumble bee, can you say your name for me...?' The first most important key to building friendships is learning each other's names. In addition to knowing our friends' names, we have learnt how to spell them. We have engaged in learning experiences that have allowed us to practice being Caring and Principled friends. This means welcoming each other to school with broad smiles, sharing our resources, taking turns, being gentle with each other and speaking kind and truthful words.

Through these learning experiences, students are building their knowledge and understanding of the ten attributes that make up the IB Learner Profile. Our exploration of the five senses has given children ownership of who they are, and how they use their senses of sight, taste, smell, hearing and touch to demonstrate their thinking, communication, social and self-management skills. With regards to self-management, our learners are using their senses to make informed choices on how to behave in ways that meet our Homeroom Essential Agreements.

In all of these, children are engaged, learning through play, and at the same time, building these lifelong learning skills. Below is an image of our Homeroom Essential Agreements, and a visual demonstration of Early Learners' understanding of their various families.

DISPATCHES FROM THE DIPLOMA COORDINATOR

Today, in my Philosophy class, we watched an excerpt from the film 'Koyaanisqatsi' ('Life Out of Balance' in the Hopi language) directed by Godfrey Reggio in 1996. It is a beautiful, captivating audio-visual documentary exploring the relationship between human beings and the planet we inhabit. It juxtaposes images of nature with images of how human beings interact with that nature, and what they do to, and with it.

Two of the images which came back to mind this evening, whilst I was supervising Prep, were, firstly, this:



As I watched the students file down from the hostels and the MPH to begin Prep, there was a serenity, a certain naturalness, to the mass fluidity through the tranquil campus.

Shortly afterwards in the film, which is recorded mainly using time-lapse photography, the recording switches to real-time, and this image fills the screen:



The closer I got to the academic block to begin to settle in for the evening, the more individual personae and personalities became clearer, emerging from the social collectivity. Conversations were had, jokey interactions took place, and smiles, greetings as well as the occasional frown were exchanged, and then, gradually, organically, we all settled.

Walking around the passages of the school later, looking in on the students at prep, I was able to focus more clearly on individuals: so and so with her trademark headphones, such and such staring, as usual, intently at his computer screen, grappling with the intricacies of constructing a persuasive, knowledgeable essay, this person reading Anita Desai and gently swinging on the seat, those people collaborating in the preparation of some presentation or other whilst not listening to each other and then, remarkably, somehow, coming to agreement about how to proceed!

I also saw a couple of teachers in one room, teachers who were not strictly speaking 'on duty,' but who, with an exciting workshop coming up, wished to help those students involved and helping with it.

In the class we had been watching 'Koyaanisqatsi' for the purpose of studying the concept of 'nature': what IS 'natural,' what IS 'nature', and how can we – if we can – distinguish nature from 'culture' or 'civilisation,' and thus how, if we can, distinguish human beings, human actions, from other non-human species and their actions. The film juxtaposes the one and the other in order to highlight areas of compatibility as well as areas of incompatibility, areas of harmonious interaction and disharmonious disrespect. Towards the end of the film, the focus shifts from the collective to the individual. The relationship between the two, of course, is symbiotic, and it is a mark of that symbiosis that the collective allows for the individual, and the individual recognises the collective.

"The forces that unite us are intrinsic and greater than the superimposed influences that keep us apart," wrote Kwame Nkrumah and, although the context of that utterance may have been different, the force of it is quintessentially understood: it refers, also, to that symbiotic relationship between the individual – individual human beings – and the collective – the school community, and that, I think, is what was brought home to me this evening.

ARTS

Exploring the elements and principles of Visual art (Formal Qualities studies).

Visual arts studies at the DP level is practical and theoretical-based learning. It's practical in the sense that students get to explore a variety of techniques and materials by way of practising to reproduce the unique paintings made by renowned artists. Students are encouraged to identify and describe some elements and principles from the paintings made by other professional artists around the world as well as their own paintings. This has been the focus for DP 1 and DP2 students within this academic semester. DP1 and DP2 Visual arts students are currently reproducing and comparing the elements and principles of art used in the paintings made by Jonathan Kwegyir Aggrey, Lynette Yiadom-Boakye, Vincent van Gogh and Picasso. By reproducing the paintings of professional artists, they learn about the processes involved in the making of the artwork, the medium they use and how they use them, the thoughts that go into creating a masterpiece, etc. Visual arts studies are surely the right way to ensure creativity, and also the implementation of the creative process in the daily life of students.




Head/Earphones



New Additions



NAIL CARE



There is something awesome about taking time to take care of your nails! Taking care of your nail is important to the health of your hands because our hands are used every day.

Think of your fingernails and toenails as little shields protecting your fingers and toes. Not keeping your nails healthy makes the tissue beneath them vulnerable to infection via the things you touch every day.

Some tips for students on how to care for nails in order to give those nails the chance to grow healthy and always appear attractive, instead of letting them appear dull and discoloured.

- Students should trim their nails weekly, as germs can remain trapped underneath the nail and cause infection.
- Hangnails should never be ripped, but should be clipped with standard nail clippers.
- Students nails should also be moisturized often, and remember to clean underneath them in the shower.
- Students should wash their hands thoroughly, if they work with cleaning products in the hostel or other chemicals in the lab.
- Student should take care of nail tools by always disinfecting them before and after use and this goes back to prevent the bacteria.
- To clean them, use warm soapy water.
- Students should stop the bad habit of nail biting.

Another cohort (G8) is beginning the Community Project and it is evident from their enthusiasm that their classroom learning is about to come to life and their great ideas will be implemented in their own style. Their sense of independency towards the various projects is remarkable. They truly have so much potential to change the world and create an impact in the community and beyond.

To set the ball rolling, Ethan, Nana Aba and Dzidzor, who are Autism enthusiasts, embarked on a trip at the *HopeSetters Autism Centre* in Tema, to visit the children and investigate the happenings within the home. They had about 20-30 minutes interaction and question time with the director Aunty Baaba, as she is affectionately called, and then took a tour around the Centre.

According to her, the main objective of the centre is to engage in advocacy and awareness about autism while catering for autistic individuals to become as independent as possible and be accepted for whom they are. When asked how autistic people see the world, she narrated that they see it in their own world because they are routine and work with structure. While we may see them as special, they also think "we" are weird.

According to the home, they are motivated by little feats/achievements by the persons like <u>picking up</u> a spoon to eat by themselves, <u>washing their bowl</u> after lunch, <u>clapping their hands</u> and <u>asking for</u>

water. Their main medium of speech and communication is through pictures and videos. It makes us all wonder the things we take for granted.



As part of their Community Project, the team "Who we are" (Ethan, NanaAba and Dzidzor Community Project) will invest time researching how to create pictures for the home as learning materials to facilitate classroom teaching. Furthermore they will contribute funds to purchase cutlery, aprons and bowls for their lunch time. This is going to be an exciting experience and the outcome will indeed be impactful.


Lesson Plan MYP 5: What makes me unique?



Adzo Ashie - IB Development and Recognition Manager, Africa



Let's give a round of applause to the pioneering class of the Tema International School Primary School Campus. I can relate to you because, about 24 years ago, I was part of the pioneering class of the IB Diploma Program. Two decades later, I am working with the IB, and I am also a proud IB parent. I never imagined this for myself. I'm hoping about 20 years from now I will be an IB grandparent because my grandchildren will be in an IB school.



Speaking about grandparenthood, I want to recommend the late Mr. Ajavon and Mrs. Ajavon for this wonderful vision and amazing dream. Surama sent me an email a few days ago telling me that TIS is 16 years old and is about to give birth to their new baby, the PYP at the new Primary Campus. I thought, sweet 16, that is a bit like teenage pregnancy, we giving birth at 16, but considering what TIS has achieved, in school years, that should be about 30 to 40 years. You have raised students who are

changing the world one day at a time. When I think about TIS, a few things come to mind:

I get that sense of family because I see that your parents even get to take some of the exams the students sit for, the parents in the MYP E-assessments exams. I wonder how they did. You graded your parents, right? For parents to also be part of the community to this extent is fantastic. You see the family life, the family relationship at TIS, and that is extremely commendable.









Students say that TIS is a home away from home and you bring your Alumni back year after year that tells you that this is home for them, they landed here. They want to be back, and I give that a testament to the family tradition, the family community you have created at TIS. So kudos. You all give yourself a round of applause for creating a family atmosphere.

Secondly, when I think about TIS, I think forward-looking. I think progressive. To think about setting up the primary year's program so that you can create the foundation for your guardians, to adequately prepare them for the Middle Year and Diploma Program, and the life ahead. You thinking about getting them to prepare for future we do not yet know about and the world that we cannot fathom, and we are giving them those foundations that will make them successful here and beyond. Finally, one of the things I particularly admire and I am amazed at, is the fact that you created an environment for students to thrive in, for them to develop their potential, to find their

talent, their passion. I want you all to give yourself a round of applause for achieving this incredible feat. The international IB community looks for schools like yours to partner with because we believe that is what education should be about; developing the whole students.

Starting with the Primary Years Program, you are creating a happy, engaged, and active members as we saw in the pioneering class, continuing to the Middle Years Program, who are seeing the connection between learning and the real life. When you go to the Diploma Program, you are creating emotionally intelligent students, who also possess the academic capability to be successful not just at university but the life beyond.

On that note, I would like to congratulate the sweet 16 TIS, the Ajavon family for this amazing journey and for setting up a wonderful institution like Tema International School.
