#### Email Hassles


Software updates should add enhancements, but reality often reveals that issues have to be overcome before the enhancements can be enjoyed.

# How Much is Enough Sleep?

According to a study that ran over two years at the US National Sleep Foundation, the amount of hours of sleep needed can vary from between seven to 17 hours.

- Newborns (zero to three months): 14 to 17 hours
- Infants (four to 11 months): 12 to 15 hours
- Toddlers (one to two years): 11 to 14 hours
- Preschoolers (three to five years): 10 to 13 hours
- School-aged children (six to 13 years): nine to 11 hours
- Teenagers (14 to 17 years): eight to 10 hours
- Young adults (18 to 25 years): seven to nine hours
- Adults (26 to 64 years): seven to nine hours
- Older adults (65 years and up): seven to eight hours.

The study also outlined the importance of getting the right amount of sleep, which debunks theories that adults can function perfectly well on a limited amount.

It says sleep deprivation could lead to a range of serious health concerns, like heart disease.

Bad news, too, for those who love a weekend sleep-in. Oversleeping can have serious effects, including making symptoms of depression more severe.

If you are really in need of a few extra hours under the covers, or need to stay up to catch that last Netflix episode, there are sleep durations you should try to avoid. Pay careful attention to your mood, energy and health after a poor night's sleep versus a good one. Ask yourself, 'How often do I get a good night's sleep?' Like good diet and exercise, sleep is a critical component to overall health," the study states.

To start on the road to a better night's sleep, the Sleep Foundation has set out the following tips:

- Stick to a sleep schedule, even on weekends.
- Practise a relaxing bedtime ritual.
- Exercise daily.
- Evaluate your bedroom to ensure ideal temperature, sound and light.
- Sleep on a comfortable mattress and pillow.
- Beware of hidden sleep-stealers, like caffeine.
- Turn off electronics before bed.

#### EARLY YEARS

#### **Reading is Fun**

Reading builds a student's word bank, allowing them to comprehend varied written materials, read with fluency, and recall facts about books they read. These are basic elements of developing good communications skills.


To enhance their interest in reading, our Early Learners were delighted to share a story about a young boy's first day at school. Through the narrative, our learners made connections between their own daily routines and that of the characters. They were amazed to realise that morning routines, such as taking out water bottles, keeping bags in storage boxes and settling down with a favourite book or puzzle, were replicated around the world. They also observed in the story that games, such as sliding and jumping in the hopscotch hoops, were not unique to them. Connections learners made with characters in the book helped them develop a deeper understanding of how schools are organised.

Students also recognised the role of family members in getting them ready for school, packing items in their bags and transporting them to their learning centre.

Through these activities, they achieved their learning outcomes, gaining the ability to discriminate among visual representations, such as symbols, numbers, letters and words. They were also able to differentiate between pictures and written text. During whole-class reading, our learners engaged with the story by pointing to pictures when asked, and sharing ideas based on the book. They extended this reading experience by identifying and writing the titles of their favourite books. This allowed teachers to assess and observe the learners' understanding of text and illustrations.

Communication is one of the Approaches to Learning (ATL) skills that equip our students to develop an inquiring mind. We are very proud of our Early Learners' ability to express themselves in front of the school community during our Unit Assemblies. Last Friday morning for instance, all our Topaz learners confidently sang a transportation song in front of the Primary students and staff.

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#### LOWER AND UPPER PRIMARY

#### **Collaborative Learning Transforms the Classroom**

A collaborative culture which is at the core of IB and PYP, is aimed at supporting transdisciplinary learning and improving learning outcomes. It is not just about teachers meeting to plan what to teach, but also, students working together with teachers, and colleagues within and across grade levels to enrich the learning experience.

Supporting transdisciplinary learning requires time and a commitment for collaboration. This includes students, homeroom teachers, single-subject teachers, non-teaching staff, and guest specialists, among others.

Collaboration supports transdisciplinary learning and ongoing reflection within the learning community. In terms of impact, students get to appreciate their identity within the learning community, recognise how the community works and accept their unique role with respect to learning within that social unit. They gain the realisation that collaboration is the foundation of good human relationships. By this, students note that their classroom is not an island, and that learning is not confined to the walls of the school. Collaboration is also a great opportunity for them to develop some social and self-management skills. When they work in groups on projects, tasks and discussions, they learn to value others' opinions, making them more open minded.

This semester started with a collaborative learning experience with the Main Campus. Messrs. Wellington and Owusu from the Art Department deepened Onyx students' understanding of the history and elements of art. They did a great job by coming down to students' level to drive the concepts through inquiry. Learners, of course, had the opportunity to apply their knowledge by creating interesting art pieces.



During an inquiry into channels of communication, groups of Onyx students interviewed Primary staff on what their most preferred means of communication and why. Teachers, Administration, Kitchen, and other support staff collaborated eagerly with students to complete the assigned task.



Another amazing collaboration was between some G11 and Primary students. Teachers and learners alike enjoyed the support of the Secondary students, as they facilitated many activities during the three-day engagement. It was an awesome experience and we look forward to more of such.



#### **GHANAIAN SIGN LANGUAGE**

#### **Collaboration with the Hearing-impaired**

Collaboration is indeed transdisciplinary. This week, the Opals received a hearing-impaired resource person from Ghana International School (GIS), who facilitated a lesson on name signing. It was a good experience for learners, being the first time most of them had interacted with a deaf person. During the lesson, they had the opportunity to communicate with him, and also learn more about the deaf culture. Here are pictures of students signing and finger spelling their names.



The PYP Coordinator schedules weekly collaborative sessions with teachers to discuss, plan, and reflect on learning activities. Well, we don't just cooperate, we collaborate! 

TIS is an IB World School, authorised to offer MYP and DP. The Primary School campus has been approved as a Candidate PYP School.





#### THE IB CONTINUUM EXPERIENCE

The International Baccalaureate offers a globally competitive education for young people aged 3-19 years. Jean Piaget, an educational psychologist whose work in cognitive development learning theory has had enormous influence on education, categorises this age range into four cognitive levels and argues that teaching and learning at these levels must be inquiry-based, or learners discovering concepts for themselves<sup>1</sup>. It is in this regard that an IB education provides a good opportunity for students to make connections between their discrete subjects and the world around them.

The continuum comprises the Primary Years Programme (PYP), Middles Years Programme (MYP), Diploma Programme (DP) and the Career-related Programme (CP). Beginning with the MYP, each programme is a progression of the earlier years. For instance, the focus of the PYP is learners developing agency, which is further developed in the MYP by empowering students to make practical connections between their subjects and the real world. The DP enhances this by developing students who have a breadth and depth of knowledge and the CP is more specific to supporting students who want start their careers at an early stage (IBO, 2020)<sup>2</sup>.

A key thing to note with this continuum is a strong connection across all four programmes. For our MYP 5 (Grade 10) students, this opportunity will surely present itself next academic year when they transition to DP. The completion of the Personal Project is just a sign that they are ready to take on the demands of the core of the DP, Creativity-Activity-Service (CAS), Theory of Knowledge (ToK) and the Extended Essay (EE). The Personal Project is a good preparation for the core as most of the skills needed to excel in these areas have been developed. Service and Action initiatives in the MYP are stepping stones to a successful CAS program. Interestingly, all MYP units are built around research questions which are known as inquiry questions: factual, conceptual and debatable questions. These questions guide students in their own inquiry. The debatable questions are about knowledge and being openended and these are some key characteristics of "knowledge questions" in Theory of Knowledge.

For our parents, this is a good opportunity for your children to take their inquiry to the next level. After a successful experience in the MYP, the DP is surely the Golden Passport (as Dr. Ken will say) to college or university and the world at large.





- An international Travel Vaccination Card with the Yellow Fever vaccination done or updated.



#### Computer Science Lesson on Structured Query Language (SQL) with DP1 students

The beauty of computer science is how easily the concepts we learn in class can be actualised in the everyday technology that we use. A classic example of this came during the Thursday computer science lesson on Databases. Here, we learnt how to manipulate/edit databases using SQL- and because it is something that exists in the very programs that we use. It was interesting to watch the lines of code change from utter gibberish into things we could understand and use.





The lesson was a very productive one as we all improved not only our knowledge and understanding but also our critical thinking skills- we were prompted on multiple occasions to solve unfamiliar using our basic knowledge. It was a challenging and fulfilling experience that I can't wait to experience again. [Charity Apreku]



In computer science on Wednesday, we studied SQL (structured query language) commands. We learnt how to create, update, delete from, and add to database tables which will be essential knowledge for our internal assessments which may require the use of a database. When we finish this topic, I intend to apply this knowledge to improve my programming skills for my internal assessment.



Although I have studied SQL before, it was not at this level of complexity so, I struggled a bit at first, but came to understand it as the lesson went on. For me, the hardest part of the SQL commands were the inner joins which were hard to understand at first but made sense after Mr. Fudzagbo explained them. Dr. Fred Macbagonluri, the President of the university touched on what it takes to build a dynamic world-class institution. He highlighted the fact that it requires setting clear goals (benchmarking: setting appropriate goals to provide insight into the institution's position vis-à-vis its competitors), focusing on 3-4 most important business levers, implementation and control (monitor and supervise, take definite action and monitor implementation) among others.

Mr. Julian Bennett, Mechanical Engineering Lecturer, in the workshop he facilitated with a colleague Mr. Julius Amegadzie (Computer Science and Engineering lecturer), introduced a new concept known as Biomimicry. This involves observing nature, using nature as a model or "mentor" to solve problems. For instance, by observing the bird, airplanes were modeled after certain aspects of the bird, the way it flaps its wings to stay airborne, et cetera. Similarly,

a company observed how geckos manage to crawl across walls and other flat surfaces based on the nature of the bottom of their feet. This design inspired a product that sticks fast to walls for holding up bags and other items (Sciencetake - Gecko Feet). This concept was developed originally by Benjamin Linder and Jean Huang (2019).


As team, we developed our social skills in the process with this project. We



#### **Cognitive Processing as a Major Cause of Depression among High School Students**

#### Abstract:

The research aimed at exploring and describing the impact cognitive processing has on depression among high school students. The outcome of the research intends to convince the target population that depression can result from several factors such as biological, sociocultural and cognitive processing. However, cognitive processing (i.e. positive or negative) of event(s) can result in healing or depression respectively among high school students.

Primary and Secondary sources of data were collected. The participants for the study were high school students who responded to survey from the Beck Scale Inventory (BSI) uploaded on ManageBac. The questions were reviewed and sampled to suit the audience. Participants reflected on their emotions in the past two weeks and rated them according to the options provided in the survey. Data collected from participants were categorised into groupings and the highest scores were identified for detailed analysis. Results indicated that the negative cognitive processing of event(s) by high school students led to high scores characterised as depression.

The study therefore concluded that a person might be diagnosed with depression or not depending on how they process their cognition. One strength of the study is that it will help high school students to positively process their cognition to avoid depression. In addition, it will also serve as a preparation ground for high school managements in putting measures in place to help students in dealing with their cognitive processes. A limitation however, is that other research methods should have been used to triangulate the data to ensure validity and reliability of the study. Future recommendations such as exploring other causes of depression, have been made for future researchers to consider.




