



ONLINE LEARNING REFLECTIONS

The times have dictated school closing and the rapid expansion of online education. We at TIS PYP have been doing our bit to ensure that learning continues and our students are well engaged through various online platforms. These platforms offer both teachers and students the ability to share material in all kinds of formats, such as videos, slideshows, word documents, and PDFs. Students and teachers are learning to work remotely and there is the need to always reflect to find better ways of learning and teaching.

Reflection is a key component of IB education. When we reflect, we learn to understand our strengths and limitations in order to support our learning and personal development. 





Parents and teachers discussed the challenges of online learning and some protocols were agreed upon in order to smoothly facilitate learning in a virtual environment.


Students and teachers also had a reflective time to maximise the time spent online. They discussed online protocols, explored resources, shared challenges, skills gained so far and how they can incorporate these skills for future learning.



Students also had their personal reflections on their online learning so far. Some students shared that they enjoy working online since they get to work at their own pace, set their own schedule and be free from "the stressful environment of school." Other students shared their reflection on ManageBac, our main online platform for monitoring learning.







The students' reflections show learning is still ongoing. Online learning has several benefits despite its challenges. For instance, students can develop a new range of skills (e.g., research skills) with online learning. Online learning can also help prepare students to be successful in the 21st century through authentic learning engagements which develop certain skills in students. Trilling and Fadel (2009) categorise these as: (a) learning and innovation skills, digital literacy skills, and career and life skills. Learning online, whether in formal or informal environments, has the ability to help children develop a number of these 21st century skills, specifically, communication and collaboration skills and media literacy skills while learning in authentic settings.

Virtual Learning in the Early Years

The impact of COVID-19 has afforded our Early Years learners the opportunity to experience virtual learning with the rest of the TIS Community.

The current state of affairs has proven that the 21c learner is not restricted within the walls of a school or class for learning to take place.

At the start of our new unit, 'Sharing the Planet', we were looking forward to a very exciting unit with many prospects for experiential learning which will provoke authentic action in our young inquirers.


Our first weeks of virtual learning and teaching have been a new, thrilling, and equally challenging experience for most of us, yet we are equipped to make learning happen.

We appreciate families' regular access to ManageBac, which is very important to stay informed about learning experiences, online resources, and assessment tasks.

Learners continue to enjoy their personal inquiries into plants, animals and water as vital resources through Language (English and Sign Language), Art, Science, PSPE, Math, and Music activities. The evidence is seen from the smiles on their faces as we receive regular feedback from families. Apart from ManageBac, Zoom, Epic! and selected YouTube videos are among the online resources teachers use to stay connected with our learners and their families. We have successfully used Zoom sessions to conduct 3WIs, composite classes and recently, a Meet-and-Greet Parent Info session.

We are proud of our parents, guardians and older siblings who are supporting at home and ensuring that our Early Years learners are not missing out on the learning experiences designed by teachers for the unit, 'Sharing the Planet'.

For the second half of this semester the Early Years will engage in project-based learning and assessments. Learners will continue to engage in experiments, observe, document, and report on their research activities.







INTERNAL ASSESSMENTS

Internal Assessment (IA) is an integral component of IB Diploma Programme assessments undertaken by students over an extended period. The IAs completed by students in any DP course are internally assessed by the teacher and externally moderated by qualified IB moderators.

Teachers first mark the IAs and submit selected samples to the IB for moderation. The process of moderation allows the IB to align marks awarded from all schools taking the assessment for that subject with the global standard. The nature of IAs differ in each of the six major subject groups, but the learning objectives remain the same.

Language Acquisition

In language B and ab initio, the internal assessment takes the form of the individual oral assessment. The internal assessment requirements at SL and at HL are different. Internal assessment is compulsory for both SL and HL students. SL students are required to make an individual presentation in response to a visual stimulus whereas, HL students respond to a literary extract. At both levels, students will then go on to engage in a one-to-one discussion with the teacher, first on the topic of the stimulus and then in general conversation across the range of themes listed in the syllabus. Internal assessment contributes 25% to the final assessment in both the SL and the HL courses.

The individual oral assesses the degree to which the student is able to:

- o communicate clearly and effectively in a range of contexts and for a variety of purposes;
- o understand and use language appropriate to a range of interpersonal and/or intercultural contexts and audiences;
- o understand and use language to express and respond to a range of ideas with fluency and accuracy;
- o identify, organize and present ideas on a range of topics; and
- o understand, analyse and reflect within the context of presentation and conversation.

Language and Literature: Individual Oral (IO)

This internal assessment is an integral part of the Language A course and it is compulsory for both standard level (SL) and higher level (HL). It enables students to demonstrate the application of their skills and knowledge in different settings and to pursue their personal interests without the constraints that are associated with written examinations (IB Language A Guide First Examination 2021). This assessment contributes a weighting of 30% and 20% to the SL and HL final assessments respectively. It is conducted in the Language A studied and must be audio recorded. It is assessed internally and externally moderated.

Aided by a prompt, students comment on how a global issue common to two 30 - 40 line extracts from two different texts studied (two literary for English A: Literature; one literary plus one non-

literary for English A: Language and Literature). The texts used for this assessment cannot be used for any other assessment component.

The IO is assessed on the following criteria:

Criterion B	Analysis and evaluation	10 marks
Criterion C	Focus and organisation	10 marks
Criterion D	Language	10 marks

Individuals and Societies

The Internal Assessment (IA) is an integral and compulsory component of all the subjects (Economics, Business Management, Psychology, History, ITGS and Geography). It is a research work with specific subject requirements and assessment criteria for each of these. This assessment enables students to demonstrate the application of knowledge and skills in these subjects in the real-world situation. It is important that students choose a topic that they find interesting and motivating to research. The Internal Assessment (Component) has between (20-25%) weighting of the overall assessment.

Business Management Internal Assessment (HL)

Duration: 30 hours spread over 12 months. Weighting: 25%

The HL internal assessment is a research project that allows students to demonstrate the application of their skills and knowledge to business issues or decision-making. Students are required to design and undertake research that either addresses an issue facing a business organisation or a range of organisations or analyses a decision to be made by a business organisation or range of organisations.

The project is assessed using the following nine assessment criteria: Criterion A: Research proposal, Criterion B: Sources and data, Criterion C: Use of tools, techniques and theories, Criterion D: Analysis and evaluation, Criterion E: Conclusions, Criterion F: Recommendations, Criterion G: Structure, Criterion H: Presentation, Criterion I: Reflective thinking.

Standard Level (SL)

Duration: 15 hours spread over 12 months. Weighting: 25%

The SL internal assessment is a written commentary that allows students to demonstrate the application of business management tools, techniques and theories to a business issue or problem. Students are required to select a real business issue or problem for their written commentary that must relate to the SL syllabus.

There are seven assessment criteria for the written commentary.

Criterion A: Supporting documents, Criterion B: Choice and application of business tools, techniques and theories, Criterion C: Choice and analysis of data and integration of ideas, Criterion D: Conclusions, Criterion E: Evaluation, Criterion F: Structure, Criterion G: Presentation.

Experimental Sciences

Each student carries out a scientific investigation through which the student demonstrates his or her application of skills and knowledge. The investigation takes about 10 hours and the write up about 6 to 12 pages. The Individual Investigation covers a topic that is commensurate with the level of the course of study. It is compulsory for both SL and HL students and is worth 20% of the final assessment. It is internally assessed by the teacher and externally moderated by the IB. The investigation addresses many of the learner profile attributes well.

Mathematics

The Internal Assessment component in DP Mathematics is an integral part of the course and is compulsory for both *Analysis & Approaches* and *Applications & Interpretation* students. It enables students to demonstrate the application of their skills and knowledge and to pursue their personal interests. It is an individual exploration, which is a piece of written work that involves investigating an area of mathematics. It contributes 20% to the final assessment score in the course. It is marked according to five assessment criteria (mathematical presentation, mathematical communication, personal engagement, reflection and use of mathematics).

The Arts

The internal assessment for the arts differs from all 3 sessions. With Visual Arts, students at SL and HL submit a selection of resolved artworks for their exhibition for assessment. The selected pieces should show evidence of their technical accomplishment during the visual arts course and an understanding of the use of materials, ideas and practices to realise their intentions. Students also evidence the decision-making process that underpins the selection of this connected and cohesive body of work for an audience in the form of a curatorial rationale.

For Theatre, students at HL and SL collaboratively create and present an original piece of theatre (lasting 13–15 minutes) to a specified target audience from a starting point selected by the ensemble. They submit a process portfolio (15 pages maximum) which documents their own individual approaches and skills, the exploration of the starting point selected by the ensemble, the nature of the collaboration and the student's individual contribution to the creation and presentation of the piece of theatre. The student submits a video recording (4 minutes maximum) in support of the process portfolio which the student selects from the unedited video recording of the created piece.

With Music, there are five options to creating available to students. They choose a combination of options to fulfill the requirements of this component. SL students are required to submit two pieces of coursework and HL students submit three.



Mathematics Across the IB Continuum


The IB mathematics continuum provides a progression of learning for students aged 3–19. In the PYP, mathematics is viewed primarily as a vehicle to support inquiry, providing a universal language through which students make sense of the world around us. Mathematics provides students with an understanding of the physical world. For example, algebra can explain how quickly water becomes contaminated and how many people in a third-world country drinking that water might become sickened on a yearly basis. A study of geometry can explain the science behind architecture throughout the world. Statistics and probability can estimate death tolls from earthquakes, conflicts and other calamities like COVID-19 around the world. It can also predict profits, how ideas spread, and how previously endangered animals might repopulate.

MYP mathematics aims to build on what students learn and do in the PYP and other student-centred programmes of primary education. In both the PYP and the MYP, it is important that learners acquire mathematical understanding by constructing their own meaning through increasing levels of abstraction and classification, starting with an exploration of their own personal experiences, understandings and knowledge. In view of this, mathematics needs to be taught in relevant context, realistic context, rather than by attempting to impact a fixed body of knowledge. Teaching and learning experiences in both the PYP and MYP challenge students to be curious, ask questions and explore and interact with the environment physically, socially and intellectually. Through engaging in this process, students are able to construct meaning about mathematics concepts, transfer this meaning to symbols and apply mathematical understanding in familiar and unfamiliar situations in variety of contexts.

MYP mathematics courses help specifically to prepare students for the study of DP mathematics courses. As students progress from the MYP to the DP, the emphasis on understanding increases as student work towards developing a strong mathematical knowledge base that will allow them to study a wide range of topics. The MYP mathematics objectives and criteria have been developed with both the internal and external assessment requirements of the DP in mind.

The use of technology, which is required in DP mathematics, is also emphasized in the MYP as a tool for learning, applying and communicating mathematics. Where students in the MYP may select either standard or extended mathematics, the DP mathematics curriculum offers two courses, each of which is available at standard level (SL) and higher level (HL)—mathematics: analysis and approaches, and mathematics: applications and interpretation. MYP students enrolled in extended mathematics generally elect to take one of the DP mathematics courses at HL.

The figure below provides a clear guide to students in grade 9 and 10 as they consider their choice of mathematics courses in DP.



Pathway to DP Mathematics Courses

Each course is designed to meet the needs of a particular group of students. Mathematics: analysis and approaches and Mathematics: applications and interpretation are both offered at SL and HL. Therefore, great care should be taken to select the course and level that is most appropriate for an individual student, bearing in mind the MYP courses (extended or standard).

Advice to Students

Students should not wait until DP before they decide on courses they wish to study, bearing in mind the pathway. It is better to decide when selecting courses at MYP, and in making this selection, the individual students should take into account the following factors:

- ✓ their abilities
- ✓ their interest
- ✓ their academic plans, bearing in mind the subjects they want to study in DP and University
- ✓ their choice of career.

To avoid the hustle and frustration in DP, students in MYP standard mathematics should seek the recommendation of their teacher when deciding which HL course to pursue in the DP.




HOW TO VOTE YOUR FAVOURITE VIDEO



As the TIS Red Cross Society, we understand that this is a concerning time for everyone. We would like to inform the TIS community and all associated with them with basic information about the Coronavirus that everyone must do to protect themselves. Standard hygiene practices not only help prevent the spread of these novel viral illnesses, but also more common viruses, such as the flu.

WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT THE VIRUS AND HOW IT SPREADS.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in the US, the virus spreads mainly from person-to-person. It can spread between people who are in close contact with each other (within 6 feet), or through respiratory droplets when an infected person coughs or sneezes. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. Studies have also suggested that COVID-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms. The symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, shortness of breath, or cough. These symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure and it is important to call your doctor for medical advice if you think you have been exposed to COVID-19 and develop symptoms.



It is possible to get COVID-19 by touching the surface or object with the virus on it, and then touching your mouth, nose, or possible eyes. That is why we recommend that you do not touch your face. The virus is also known to stay on surfaces for several hours.

There is currently no vaccine for COVID-19, therefore, the best way to prevent illness from COVID-19 is to avoid being exposed to the virus.

WAYS TO PROTECT YOURSELF.

The Red Cross Society would like to remind you of the practices and ways you can protect yourself.

- 1. Wash your hands often with soap and running water for at least 20 seconds, especially after being in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol content.
- 2. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- 3. Avoid close contact with people who are sick or showing symptoms of COVID-19.
- 4. Wear a cloth face covering (such as a mask) to cover your mouth and nose when around others as physical distancing is not always possible. And wear a facemask if you are sick. Don't place masks on young children under the age of 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.
- 5. Stay home if you are sick unless it is to get medical care or essential items such as food. You should also stay

home to prevent the risk of spreading the virus.

Sneeze or cough? Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue or use your elbow.

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.

Clean and disinfect surfaces around your home and work frequently.

Follow these three easy steps to help prevent the spread of COVID-19

- 6. Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when coughing or sneezing and throw the tissue away immediately after use. If a tissue isn't available, cough or sneeze into your flexed elbow or sleeve, and not into your hands.
- 7. Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, handles, desks, computers, phones, keyboards, sinks, toilets, faucets, and countertops.

That is the reality of many mothers here in Ghana. I hope to change that in the near future.



Also, I initiated an energy project focus on SDG 7, Clean and Affordable Energy, which was primarily meant to raise awareness of the need for sustainable and green energy. To further strengthen this project, I invited a speaker to talk to the school on this topic. To conclude this project, I made a donation of **Eco Stoves** to the village of Akorlikope which can be used in place of other local methods like fire wood, and also gas which most cannot afford. I was able to provide clean and

affordable energy for all.

To conclude, my journey through CAS has made me grow from a young, shy individual into an outspoken and confident one. I humbly draw to the last page of this once blank book with ease, knowing that I am eager to grow more and do more. Even-though my next book awaits, CAS has surely made the storyline of this one most worthwhile. To the next...





Temporary Changes to DofE programme requirements

We want every young person to have every chance to complete their #DofE – which is why we're introducing temporary programme changes to support our Leaders and participants, both during and after the lockdown.

"We're determined that young people shouldn't miss out on doing their DofE because of the coronavirus outbreak – and we want to do everything we can to support you so your participants can keep doing theirs, at what we know is a really challenging time.

To help you keep supporting participants, both now and when the lockdown ends, we're introducing these temporary changes.

1. Participants can now volunteer for family members, for example by mentoring or coaching younger siblings.

However, this should be more than a participant babysitting, or helping out with their usual chores!

As with all DofE activities, they should be structured and help the participant to meet the benefits and outcomes of the Volunteering section.

Participants can choose to volunteer to help any family member, but we would suggest coaching or mentoring a family member, particularly younger siblings, as an activity which can easily be structured and help meet the outcomes of the section. This could include:

- mentoring a younger sibling and helping them with their schoolwork or homework.
- coaching a sibling or another family member to learn an instrument or develop another skill.
- organising a sports session or arts and crafts session for someone they live with to participate in.

Participants can plan their sessions using resources online, and record what they do using a programme planner and activity log.

If a participant wants to help another family member in a different way, then their DofE Leader will just need to check it's suitable by ensuring it fulfils the aims of the section.

As with all DofE activities, to maintain the value and integrity of a young person's Award, an Assessor cannot be a family member. However, you can find some useful information on finding an Assessor here.

2. Participants can now change section activities more than once. Time spent on previous activities will still count towards completion.

Previously, participants could only change activities once per section. However, due to the pandemic, we know many participants have already changed activities to something they can do from home, and will want to resume their original activity once social distancing limitations are lifted.

Some activities participants are doing from home may also not continue when normal life returns (e.g. helping with the coronavirus efforts in their community) so they will need to find something new.

Participants can find out how to change an activity on eDofE here. If changing activities more than once, participants will need to use 'revert to draft' and resubmit their programme planner with their new activity. Participants will also need to upload an Assessor's Report for each activity they have done onto their eDofE account.



3. When expeditions are able to resume, Silver and Gold Expedition Assessors will temporarily be allowed to be known to the expedition group.

Currently, Expedition Assessors for Silver and Gold level expeditions should be independent from the group. However, on a temporary basis, Assessors will be able to be known to the group (this includes helping run the DofE group, or supporting expedition training) – although they must still be an Accredited Assessor.

We hope this will help groups more easily access the resources required to run expeditions when they are able to resume, whilst maintaining the quality assurance measure of each expedition being assessed by a trained Assessor.

4. DofE staff members may be able to act as section Assessors, if required.

If participants require an Assessor for a sectional activity, they can request for a DofE member of staff to help – more information about this can be found here.





We celebrate your achievements and are blessed to have had the chance to serve as your university guidance counsellors! **CoNgRaTuLaTiOnS** once again!!!

A few important updates and reminders...

- ✓ IBIS FORM DUE! Please be sure to email us your completed, updated IBIS FORM, which informs us about your top 6 university choices to which you want IB to send your final IB results come July when results are released. These 6 universities will receive your results for free. Failure to submit your IBIS Form to your counsellor could result in the withdrawal of your admisson offer. SO PLEASE TREAT AS URGENT and submit before close of this month, if you still have note yet submitted it. Thank you!
- ✓ **STUDENT VISA ISSUES:** With some embassies closed due to COVID-19, please continue to check for updates on the official country-specific embassy websites, for updates. This way, you can track what happens and know when they resume

services, so you can put in your student visa application right away, as soon as they open. For some countries, you may be able to even start the online student visa application process in the meantime. Also communicate directly with your preferred universities right away, if you have any challenges applying for the visa **on time.** Also check with your university to find out any updates on plans for the start of your undergraduate studies for the fall 2020 semester. We are hopeful that things will return to normal soon, so you can apply for your student visas for universities abroad hopefully in May.

✓ May 1 ENROLLMENT DEPOSIT DEADLINE

DP2s, please ensure that you reply and accept the offers to universities you wish to enroll in, before end of this month. May 1 tends to be the universal reply date, and is the deadline for you to also make an enrollment deposit payment at your university of choice to secure your spot. Kindly get in touch with your university and sort this out this month to avoid losing your admission offer.

✓ REPLYING TO YOUR OFFERS, UK AND OTHER UNIVERSITY OFFERS; Be sure to respond to your schools, and accept offers for universities you wish to attend. If you don't respond by the required deadline, you can lose your offer.

Check out this link for information on the deadlines to reply to your UK OFFERS. Your assigned counsellor will be contacting you in the coming days to confirm that you have chosen an appropriate UK FIRM - FIRST CHOICE AND INSURANCE - BACK UP CHOICE. Once you and your parents approve your final two UK choices, you have to log onto UCAS TRACK to select your two choices, after which UCAS will withdraw all other offers you have received from the system. Please make these choices carefully.

- If you received your last decision on or before 31 March 2020, your reply date is 19 May 2020.
- If you receive your last decision on or before 20 May 2020, your reply date is 4 June 2020.
- If you receive your last decision on or before 4 June 2020, your reply date is 18 June 2020 (except if you're using Extra to find a place).
- If you receive your last decision on or before 13 July 2020, your reply date is 20 July 2020 (including Extra choices)

A guide to making your firm and insurance choices (DP2 UK University decisions).

It's always a good idea to be prepared for every stage of the university application process. One of the toughest parts of applying to university can be choosing your top universities and confirming with UCAS. Here's everything you need to know before making your firm and insurance choices.

- What are firm and insurance university choices?
- When do I have to decide? Picking firm and insurance
- Understanding your offer and what is expected of you
- What if I'm given an unconditional offer before I get my exam results?
- What happens with my offers on results day?

Picking your firm choice university and course

Your firm choice university **should be the one that you most want to go to**, and that's realistic given your expected grades. On results day, if you meet the grades for your firm choice then that is where you'll be going. Where you live and what you're going to study for the next three years is a hugely important decision. You'll want to make sure that you do your research and think about it carefully.

Some advice when it comes to settling on your firm choice university:

- If you really can't visit the university (perhaps you're an international student), then there will be videos of open days and online campus tours on university websites. Yes, these will be biased (they are trying to sell you their university), but at least you can see what the university looks like.
- Don't base your decision purely on reputation, prestige or league tables. Picking the
 right university for you is more important, and league tables change every year
 anyway. Being happy with your course and university will help you to perform well
 academically and get the most out of student life.
- Make sure you check out the student union website to find out all about the university's clubs and societies, as well as the student support offered. This will give you a really good idea of what your social life might be like at university.
- Finally, think about the cost. London and other major cities tend to be more expensive, which could affect your budget and how much you can do. It's not just the rent on first-year university accommodation: look at the cost of second and third-year rent, public transport, food, social life stuff, and the cost to travel home for the weekend, too.

Picking your insurance choice

Your insurance choice is your back-up university. It will probably have less demanding grade requirements than your firm choice. This means that if you miss your firm choice you still have a chance of going to university this year — and most importantly, to the one you want to go to.

- You can have an unconditional offer as your insurance even if your firm is a conditional offer. If you have an unconditional for, however, then you won't have an insurance choice because you won't need one in that case, you'd be going to your firm no matter what happens on results day. And if you apply through UCAS Extra then you won't get an insurance choice at all.
- A few things to think about when you're deciding on your insurance choice:
- Make sure it's sensible in terms of the difference in offer conditions from your firm. If the grade conditions are too close, you could potentially lose out on both your firm and insurance if you miss your grades on results day.
- Remember, your insurance only comes into play if your firm rejects you. If your firm
 accepts you (even with lower grades than the offer conditions), you cannot at that
 point decide that you'd rather go to your insurance.

Ghana has quality universities to choose from, and we highly recommend that each DP student considers adding at least 1 or 2 suitable ones to their list.



Important Updates

May SAT and March Makeup are Canceled Due to Coronavirus

In response to the rapidly evolving situation around the coronavirus (COVID-19) and guidance from public health organizations, the College Board is canceling the:

- May 2 SAT® administration
- March 14 makeup exams (scheduled March 28)
 - March school-based students are still able to test through SSD window.

We will provide refunds to all students who are registered for May, whose March test centers were closed, or who do not receive March scores due to an irregularity.

The June 6 SAT administration (Subject Tests only outside the U.S.) is still scheduled and we will continue to assess its status.

Due to the administration cancellations this spring, we expect there will be a high demand for the June 6 and August 29 test dates.

You may change your registration to the June, July, or later ACT test date at no cost to you. You may also change your test center at no cost. To change your registration, you must go to your MyACT student account and request a test date change to either the June or July test date. Please make your selection for the new test date no later than 22 May. If this date does not work for you, contact www.actstudent.org/contactus by 22 May.
