#### Admissions 2020/2021 Update


- The second round of admissions' testing and interviews will commence on 20 April. This whole process application, testing and interview will be conducted online, while schools remain closed.

#### WHAT IS IB PYP?

For many who are looking at TIS Primary School could probably be asking this question and more. Most are wondering why the shift from the commonly known conventional system? In this article, I will make an attempt to clarify some of these issues.

The TIS Primary School campus has simply added another of the four programmes offered by the International Baccalaureate. TIS Primary School is a candidate school for the International Baccalaureate's Primary Years Programme (PYP) for students with ages between 3 and 12 years. Our school has had a keen look at the traditional/conventional approaches to education and seen the need to take a different turn. This difference definitely brings in a fresh whiff on the educational arena. "We have always done it this way." So they say and unblushingly not understanding the dangers of doing the same thing in the same way without seeing much from the results.

From this simple context, TIS wants to see that different thing which will revitalize the education system. TIS Primary School is a unique place where everyone is happy as they rigorously work through an engaging, relevant, significant and challenging programme of learning.



At TIS Primary School, we have embraced this new approach to learning so that our learners are clearly demonstrating international-mindedness and the attributes of the IB Learner Profile. We are not just educating them to fit in with the current economic needs but to face an extremely harsh world in the future. We are preparing them to be thinkers and problem-solvers for problems which may not exist now but in the future. Thus, the shift is inevitable as we are living in an ever-changing world and we need to educate children to be fit to face the challenges of the future.

Here is a graphic to demonstrate our understanding of learning.









#### BLENDING THE LEARNING: FLIPPING THE CLASSROOM,

Blended learning is a term increasingly used to describe the way online learning is being combined with traditional classroom methods and independent study to create new ways for teaching and learning. Blended learning is usually understood to evolve around the following:

1) Lesson activities with a teacher as a facilitator. 2) The use of online learning materials and 3) Structured independent study time.

In the past, where students would have used more time researching in class under the direction of a teacher, in blended learning, they are expected to bring the findings from their research outside the classroom to their lesson for sharing with their peers. Students are also expected to apply their research in class activities and not necessarily use class time for research. This method of blended learning produced the learning offshoot known as the flipped classroom.

Our traditional classrooms see the teacher as the central focus of information with students looking to the teacher for direction and explanation of subject content. Student would work independently or in small groups on a task designed by the teacher. This traditional classroom would usually involve reading from a textbook or working on a problem set for homework directed by instructions given by a teacher. Flipped learning as its name suggests makes instruction learner-centered. Initially, students are guided to explore concepts and eventually as they master their research and self-management skills, their lessons become forums for exploring topics in greater depth through any number of ways including finding information from outside the classroom. Lessons in a flipped classroom may include more traditional homework problems, among other practices, to engage students in the content of a subject. It may use project-based learning, mathematical manipulation, laboratory experiments, document analysis, presentations, discussions and peer reviews. This type of learning allows more time to be spent in class on the application of higher-order thinking, problem solving and collaboration. Ultimately, students learn to look for other sources of information and they learn to evaluate their own research and learning which is in line with the IB MYP model. The classroom flips when independent research takes place outside class time and class time is used for some typical 'homework' tasks. This all still culminates in assessments and grading as would have occurred in a traditional classroom; yet the means to this end creates an independent learner, a creative and critical thinker who is better suited for the rigor of DP study and beyond. #### MYP TEACHING AND LEARNING

The mid-semester break is coming to an end; the new half-semester and the adjustments we must all make, are at the fore of our thoughts about school. Although the IB announced the cancellation of the May 2020 MYP on-screen examinations, all MYP5 students are still eligible for IB MYP certificates based on the results of their e-portfolios, Personal Projects and their predicted grades from their e-assessment subject teachers. In line with already planned arrangements for the IB continuum at TIS, Grade 10 will return to lessons in order to start the seamless transition to DP1.

At TIS, since the implementation of the MYP, we have been blending our learning to engage our diverse learners. From MYP2 to MYP5, we have been flipping the classroom also for several years now and we should be expecting much more of this as we begin this new half semester due to the added feature of the online interaction we started in March this year to push on our creativity. TIS subscribes to various online learning tools and we will continue with these and other teaching tools to help our teaching and learning through these unusual times. The same differentiation and student engagement in the real classroom will be expected in our virtual classrooms. It must be noted, that with the challenges we face in terms of electricity and internet fluctuations and also ensuring that we are not glued to a screen all day. We do not expect to be online for the duration of each timetabled lesson nor do we expect that all lesson tasks will be completed during the online sessions. There will be a blend of activities to ensure that effective learning does take place. Students will be expected to provide evidence of having used specific lesson times appropriately as directed by their teachers. Our ATL time management and other self-organization skills should be at their strongest this half semester.

The end of semester assessments will take place as usual with suitable arrangements to match the situation we will find ourselves in when that time comes, so it is essential that we continue the MYP programme without unnecessary breaks. The requirement to remain engaged should stay the same for our body as a school whether we are physically or virtually together. I wish you all a healthy start to this half semester.



#### FIVE WAYS TO STAY HEALTHY

Hola TIS family, I am here today to tell you that you shouldn't worry. Have in mind that everything happens for a reason and undeniably all bad things will must surely come to an end. I believe that if you follow these ways in addition to prayer, the suffering will end soon enough.

Here are the five most efficient ways to stay healthy during this difficult period in our lives, as stated by the **W.H.O.** Director General, Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, in his address to the public. He elaborates in his speech TOGETHER WE STAND the following:

#### WE STAND TOGETHER

"We know that for many people life is changing dramatically. My family is no different. My daughter is

now taking her classes online from home because her school is closed. But the experience of the cities and countries that have pushed back this virus give hope and courage to the rest of the world. During this difficult time, it's important to continue looking after your physical and mental health. This will not only help you in the long term.

#### 1. EAT HEALTHY

First, eat a healthy and nutritious diet, which helps your immune system to function properly.

#### 2. DRINK RESPONSIBLY

Second, limit your alcohol consumption and avoid sugary drinks.

#### 3. DON'T SMOKE

Third, don't smoke. Smoking can increase your risk of developing severe disease if you become infected with COVID-19.

#### 4. EXERCISE

Fourth, exercise. WHO recommends 30 minutes of physical activity a day for adults, and one hour a day for children. If you're local or national guidelines allow it, go outside for a walk, a run or a ride and keep a safe distance from others. If you can't leave the house, find an exercise video online, dance to music, do some yoga, or walk up and down the stairs.

If you're working at home, make sure you don't sit in the same position for long periods. Get up and take three minutes break every 30 minutes.

#### 5. KEEP A HEALTHY MIND

Fifth, look after your mental health. Its normal to feel stressed, confused, and scared during a crisis. Talking to people you know, and trust can help. Supporting other people in your community can help you as much as it does them. Check on neighbours, family and friends. Compassion is a medicine.

Listen to music, read a book, or play a game, and try not to read or watch too much news if it makes you anxious. Get your information from reliable sources one or twice a day."

He concludes by saying, "COVID-19 is taking so much from us, but it's also giving us something special. The opportunity to come together as one humanity to work together, to learn together, to grow together."

Hey there! Your quarantine buddy is back. It's been a while since we last spoke.




#### **BONUS TIP!!**


Let's make the most out of what we have and always stay grateful. Not everyone is as privileged.



#### What CAS has taught me

I was excited to dive in but I still worried about how I was going to balance my intimidating workload as I explored all CAS had to offer.

CAS has taught me to not let fear hinder me from achieving any goal. My journey began at the CAS Camp orientation. I took



part in an activity I never thought I'll be brave enough to face. Abseling... As I climbed down that hill whilst attached to a harness, I started to realise that I was more adventurous than I thought. I realised that my fear of heights was all in my head. I learnt endurance and patience. It was evident that the journey ahead was going to be one of a kind, and all we needed was a positive mind-set.



The creativity aspect of CAS is one that has always thrilled me. It is the aspect that I feel comes naturally to me and have put into practice long before DP. Coming to TIS in G7, I was exposed to so many opportunities, from craft, to school productions, singing for my hostel or colour group, or engaging with Expression annually. Due to this, I have always loved the idea of our annual school productions and have been taking part in them since I was in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. Playing this role taught me how to persevere and manage my time. This is because I had to juggle my assignments and classes while going for rehearsals and learning my lines. In the Weekly Assembly Organisers, I was a presenter and I planned and helped with the video room projections. This aided in improving my public speaking skills and developed my confidence. The School Choir, in which I held the position of the tenor part leader for two years is where I learnt how to lead people while also being a team player. It taught me how to teach people, relate to others and create a comfortable learning environment for different kinds of people.

Before I was introduced to CAS, I thought the activity strand was only about sporting activities. As someone who is not motivated in that area, I feared I would not be able to participate in any enjoyable activity under this strand, but I was proved wrong. I was able to accomplish many things under this section, which I thoroughly enjoyed. I took on executive role in the MUN club where I had to teach students what MUN entailed conferences and also the procedures they had to follow. Being a member of this club made me more open minded as I took part in a lot of research work to prepare for conferences. It also allowed me to develop my teaching skills

and to become more patient. Under this club I was able to travel to South Africa for the annual ALAMAU trip where I interacted with my peers from all over Africa. I socialised with people from different backgrounds and cultures, and I developed my confidence as I debated and spoke in front of many strangers who soon became friends. I combined two strands of CAS, creativity and activity during these experiences.

I took part in the 2019 CRE8TIFF Business Plan competition with a group of my classmates. This not only enabled me to explore my creativity but allowed me to work with a team and further develop my collaboration skills. It helped me apply the many theories and topics taught in my Business Management HL class to the real world which helped my academics.

One thing I did not expect myself to do was to join the Red Cross Society, which I did. I love to help people but I never thought of myself as someone who could go into the medical field and this initially discouraged me from joining the Red Cross Society. Soon, I realised that my passion for helping people was a perfect reason to join this experience. Being a part of it helped me learn a substantial amount of things that I would never have learnt in a classroom. As a physics student, there are many things that are important to know about the human body that I won't be able to learn from a lesson. Hence, I took this as an opportunity to not only care for people, but to learn more. Our semester health walks, the sport events, such as inter-hostel and intercolour competitions helped me to keep fit. I hope to grow my love for sports, and I know I could have done better, but I did my best in all the experiences within which I engaged myself.

My favourite strand under CAS is the one that moves me most, service. I believe service is using everything one has learnt under creativity, activity and beyond to help others in your community. There is nothing that can compare to the warm, content and joyful feeling one has inside after being of help to someone.







The first project I undertook to give back to my community is called Pen in the Box Ghana. The initial purpose of this initiative was to collect used and new stationery from students and donate them to schools or organisations that are in need of them. It is a project that is passed on every year. When it was finally passed on to us, I was appointed as the vice-president.

We decided to go beyond giving stationery and do something different. After deliberations, we



chose to not just give stationeries but also to pay the tuition for less fortunate students in rural areas. We were able to reach our goal and pay the tuition for over 30 students at the Graceland Academy in Akorlikope and we also supplied them with food, exercise books and toys.





The point of going to a school like TIS is to get the best education and experience that will help mould us into lifelong learners. So despite our current circumstances we are still learning and





#### 3. Update from Northeastern University, USA

I am pleased to share with you an institutional update regarding a shift in Northeastern's testing policies in light of COVID-19.

For applicants applying for the 2021-2022 academic year, Northeastern will adopt a testoptional admission policy for all students. Recognizing the challenging situation facing applicants from around the globe, our goal is to allow students the flexibility they need as they complete their junior year and begin to prepare their applications.

For full details, please see this article shared by the News@Northeastern on Tuesday, April 7.

Please note this policy applies to all applicants—whether graduating from a U.S. high school or a non-U.S. high school, meaning all students have the choice of whether or not to submit standardized testing for review as part of the admission process. All applicants will continue to be fully considered for admission, selection for the University Honors Program, and merit scholarships.

Students will still be able to self-report their standardized test scores after they have applied if they wish. In keeping with the current policy, self-reporting students will be required to submit official test scores in order to enroll. Further, applicants are welcome to submit other standardized testing scores for review (e.g., AP exam scores, IB exam scores, the GCE Advanced Levels, French Baccalauréat, or the Indian Higher Secondary School Certificate).

Finally, non-native English-speaking students will still be required to submit results from an English language proficiency exam (TOEFL, IELTS, PTE, Cambridge English or Duolingo) or request a waiver after they have applied. For additional details on our English proficiency requirements, please visit our <u>website</u>.

We hope this change in our policy will allow your students and their families to find some relief in this uncertain time. We will continue to provide further updates for you and your students in the coming weeks, as we all adapt to this changing environment. - Completion of Ghanaian applications closed in March 2020, however if still interested in applying, we encourage you to apply from home. See Ghanaian University application details further down in our write-up.
- Respond to your universities, after discussing your preferred choices with your parents. Most schools in Canada have an early reply deadline, which you need to adhere to, in order to secure your admission offer. Check and reply ahead of time or you could loose your admission offer.
- 1 May: ENROLLMENT DEPOSIT DEADLINE
  - DP2s, please ensure that you reply and accept the offers to universities you wish to enroll in, before the end of this month. 1 May tends to be the universal reply date, and is the deadline for you to also make an enrollment deposit payment at your university of choice, to secure your spot. Kindly get in touch with your university and sort this out this month to avoid losing your admission offer.
- IMPORTANT NOTE;

This is a gentle reminder for you to complete the **IBIS form** and forward it to your respective counsellors.

**Deadline - for final updates to IBIS - 28 April 2020.** Failure to submit a completed IBIS form will result in your universities not receiving your final report and your admission offer could be withdrawn if this is not completed.

So kindly update and submit your completed IBIS form early next week and email it to your counsellor NOW and update before the deadline- 28 April 2020. Please do not leave out any details. Provide information on all your university offers and decisions as well as financial aid/scholarship details before submitting it to us.

Remember that this will inform us on the school you want to submit your final results/report to directly from IB. For your top 6 schools, we need your university-specific applicant numbers too. You are allowed, 1 U.S. school, 2 Canadian Schools, 2 UK Schools – firm and insurance and UCAS, Ghanaian schools, and any other schools. Find a copy of the IBIS form on ManageBac.

Also note that as a DP2 Student, you must have fully cleared all outstanding TIS arrears/ fees, for your schools to be listed on IBIS to receive your final results. So please check with the TIS accounts department to ensure you are fully cleared, to avoid a blockage which could result in your results not getting to your universities.

#### Grade 11/ DP1s;

- Kindly work on your school selection sheet together with your parents to select the best-fit schools for you, taking into consideration affordability. However, remember that gaining admission into the university is often a holistic process. Please take your academic work seriously. As Whitney Green, Admissions Director from Columbia University, USA put it, 'OUR UNIVERSITIES ARE FIRST AND FOREMOST ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS, SO WE WANT TO BE SURE THAT YOU WILL BE A GOOD FIT ACADEMICALLY FIRST...' however, other factors that admissions officers look out for are-leadership, intiative, potential to impact meaningfully, intellectual curiousity, extracurricular contributions, strong letters of recommendations from teachers and counsellor, excellent essays that throw light on your values, character, positive attributes, initiative among others.

Check ManageBac regularly and Bridge-U for guidance assignments during guidance lessons and your assigned counsellor will be in touch with you to schedule a one-on-one follow up session to help you stay on track with your university application process. We will also email you invidually. Most of you have not yet submitted your financial aid forms, so please do that right away. Remember this is an initial draft to start familiarizing yourself with the kind of information required from you and your sponsors/parents. Use the time you have at home to complete all university searches and get ahead in the university application process. No lazying around!

The following must be completed and submitted if you have not done so already:

- Brag Sheet
- School Selection Sheet
- Financial aid ISFAA and COF forms- see ManageBac
- Review and full completion of essays and personal statements
- Study, Study, and Study! It's an accumulation of your academic performance that we send to your respective schools
- Offer help to Mummy and Daddy at home

## A guide to making your firm and insurance choices (DP2 UK University decisions).

It's always a good idea to be prepared for every stage of the university application process.

One of the toughest parts of applying to university can be choosing your top universities and confirming with UCAS. Here's everything you need to know before making your firm and insurance choices.

What are firm and insurance university choices?

- When do I have to decide? Picking firm and insurance
- Understanding your offer and what is expected of you
- What if I'm given an unconditional offer before I get my exam results?
- What happens with my offers on results day?

#### Picking your firm choice university and course

Your firm choice university **should be the one that you most want to go to**, and that's realistic given your expected grades. On results day, if you meet the grades for your firm choice then that is where you'll be going. Where you live and what you're going to study for the next three years is a hugely important decision. You'll want to make sure that you do your research and think about it carefully.

#### Some advice when it comes to settling on your firm choice university:

- If you really can't visit the university (perhaps you're an international student), then there will be videos of open days and online campus tours on university websites. Yes, these will be biased (they are trying to sell you their university), but at least you can see what the university looks like.
- Don't base your decision purely on reputation, prestige or league tables. Picking the
  right university for you is more important, and league tables change every year
  anyway. Being happy with your course and university will help you to perform well
  academically and get the most out of student life.
- Make sure you check out the student union website to find out all about the university's clubs and societies, as well as the student support offered. This will give you a really good idea of what your social life might be like at university.
- Finally, think about the cost. London and other major cities tend to be more expensive, which could affect your budget and how much you can do. It's not just the rent on first-year university accommodation: look at the cost of second and third-year rent, public transport, food, social life stuff, and the cost to travel home for the weekend, too.

#### Picking your insurance choice

Your insurance choice is your back-up university. It will probably have less demanding grade requirements than your firm choice. This means that if you miss your firm choice you still have a chance of going to university this year — and most importantly, to the one you want to go to.

- You can have an unconditional offer as your insurance even if your firm is a conditional offer. If you have an unconditional for, however, then you won't have an insurance choice because you won't need one in that case, you'd be going to your firm no matter what happens on results day. And if you apply through UCAS Extra then you won't get an insurance choice at all.
- A few things to think about when you're deciding on your insurance choice:

 Make sure it's sensible in terms of the difference in offer conditions from your firm. If the grade conditions are too close, you could potentially lose out on both your firm and insurance if you miss your grades on results day.

• Remember, your insurance only comes into play if your firm rejects you. If your firm accepts you (even with lower grades than the offer conditions), you cannot at that point decide that you'd rather go to your insurance.

Please note that as of March 2020, we have completed all Ghanaian university applications for DP2s. However for most Ghanaian schools, applications still remain open.

DP2 students who still wish to apply to Ashesi University or any other universities in Ghana, should please complete the process at home and submit their applications directly to the respective universities, following the university-specific guidelines provided below.

Remember that you will have to submit your official transcript from TIS with predicted grades, as well as your IGCSE results, as these tend to be the basic requirements of most universities, in addition to national IDs and essays among others. Please check for specific requirements of the university and be sure to complete the application process right away.



**Quick Step 3:** We send you a confirmation and ask you to submit all the supporting documents by email, drop-off or mail. Download and read the Admissions Handbook for details. Find the links below. You will also need to sit in for a 1.5-hour entrance examination.

You will receive the admissions decision within a week if all required documents are submitted. Then you can start telling your family, friends, and colleagues that you've been accepted into a top American university, the first one to have a campus and deliver fully accredited degrees right here in West Africa.

- March 14 makeup exams (scheduled March 28)
  - March school-based students are still able to test through SSD window.

We will provide refunds to all students who are registered for May, whose March test centers were closed, or who do not receive March scores due to an irregularity.

The June 6 SAT administration (Subject Tests only outside the U.S.) is still scheduled and we will continue to assess its status.

Due to the administration cancellations this spring, we expect there will be a high demand for the June 6 and August 29 test dates.
