

Learners as Communicators

The IB Learner Profile attributes are familiar to all learners in the TIS Primary School as they strive to exemplify these attributes both in and out of school. These attributes help learners to be capable and responsible for their learning, as well as prepare them for the world around them now and in the very near future.

The PYP communicator "understands and expresses ideas and information confidently and creatively in more than one language and through different modes of communication. They work effectively and willingly in collaboration with others". Good communication is a skill we consistently encourage in all our students, starting from the Early Years.

Our students regularly deliver outstanding presentations by creating dramas and skits to raise social awareness on topical issues, making sign language videos to reach out to the deaf, creating posters about students' timelines, leading class discussions on social issues, or composing songs to inform and entertain. They demonstrate their confidence, clarity and ability to use technology and communicate.

In this article, our aim is to highlight a variety of ways in which learners demonstrate how capable they are in the area of being effective communicators during the inquiry process.

Classroom displays and posters

As communicators, our learners are not only skilled in expressing themselves verbally but also through non-verbal ways which are significantly evident through the classroom displays and posters they make collaboratively. These speak volumes about students' knowledge and understanding of their units which arise from the new understandings and connections they make to real-life situations.



Presentations

Our learners are always a pleasure to watch during our Unit Assemblies and Unit Celebrations, as they evidence impeccable communication skills that evidence their learning through skits, music and dance performances, recitals and interviews.

Through our student-led and 3-way interviews, learners are also presented with additional opportunities to share their learning journeys, challenges and goals with their Parents/ Guardians as they confidently share samples of their work from their E-portfolios on ManageBac and also from books, posters and classroom displays.



The Arts (Music, Drama, Dance and Visual Arts)

The arts are integral to the Primary Years Programme. Through the arts, learners get to express their creativity through music, dance, drama and visual arts. These four areas are powerful modes of communication through which our students explore, construct a sense of self, as well as develop an understanding of the world around them.

Through **Dance**, learners get to express themselves through movement. They inquire into how dance is used in both local and international cultures and contexts to convey ideas and communicate important messages to different audiences.

Through **Drama**, learners get to explore the use of facial expressions, gestures, movement and vocal techniques through role-plays, skits and pantomimes through which they solidify

their foundation on which to develop good public-speaking and presentation skills. The integration of IT in creating sound effects and soundtracks also exposes learners to video/ audio editing skills which are essential skills for modern-day learners.



Through **Music**, learners communicate uniquely through singing, playing instruments, reading music notations, songwriting and recording which have led to the creation of several amazing music productions from our very own Early Years and Primary students

Through **Visual Arts**, learners are exposed to a broad range of experiences that enable them to express their thoughts and communicate their ideas through painting, sculpture, basketry, textiles, picture-making and graphic designing.



Languages

As per the analysis of the language profiles of TIS Primary students, our learners get to learn and communicate in their own mother-tongue which includes, but are not limited to, Twi and Ewe. We aspire to include more dialects as our student population continues to grow.

To showcase our high level of international-mindedness, our learners are exceptionally diligent about learning to communicate in several internationally-recognised languages, such as French, Mandarin and Sign Language which are a constant feature in our Unit and Language assemblies.

TIS GOES PINK!

It's October! It's breast Cancer Awareness Month!

We'll be focusing on Breast Cancer Awareness in the Health Corner this month. Today, we'll debunk some common myths surrounding breast cancer.

Myth 1: Breast Cancer only affects women.

False.

Fact: Although breast cancer is rare in men, it affects both men and women.

Myth 2: There is no cure for Breast Cancer False.

Fact: There is a wide range of treatment options for breast cancer, including surgery, radiotherapy, chemotherapy and hormonal therapy. The key to management is early detection to ensure best outcomes. Many women worldwide have survived breast cancer and have been cancer free for many years now.

Myth 3: Breast Cancer is contagious

False

Fact: Breast cancer is caused by genetic mutations, and certain forms can be hereditary. A woman with a relative (especially a first degree relative) who has had breast cancer in the past may have a genetic predisposition (BRCA 1 & 2) should be screened regularly for breast lumps.

Myth 4: The only symptom of breast cancer is a lump. False

Fact: The earliest symptoms of breast cancer are local. They include a lump in the breast, changes in the size of the breast, nipple discharges - especially bloody discharges, dimpling of the skin or ulcers on the skin. As the disease progresses it could involve the brain, lungs, liver and spine as well.

Myth 5: Breast cancer is painful False Fact: The lumps from breast cancer are typically painless.





Self-Care with Effie

This CAS project seeks to provide

basic knowledge about skin, hair and body as a whole

Taking care of one's self is an issue I realized most teens struggle to do properly, as someone who learnt to value self-care. So, I took it upon myself with the help of other like-minded friends to help create awareness on the importance of taking the time to make our **skin**, **hair and body** the number one priority. Proper skin care is important because our skin is an easy access point for infections, which is why keeping skin healthy is so important to prevent such.

Stay tune to gain more facts and knowledge about our Body.

Let's learn about the different skin types:

Every skin is different. Therefore, it is important to know all types of skin and the conditions that may affect each one.

The type of skin is determined by genetics, although it will also be affected by other factors and can change with time.



Several criteria are used to classify the different types of skin. Thus, each type of skin will have its own characteristics and require different cares.

There are five types of healthy skin: Normal, dry, oily, combination (both oily and dry skin) and sensitive. Below we describe the main characteristics of each skin type.

NORMAL SKIN

This skin is neither too dry too oily. It has regular texture, clean, soft appearance, and does not need special care

DRY SKIN

Dry skin is caused by external factors such as weather, low air humidity and immersion in hot water, and it is usually temporary. However, for some people it may occur more often and even be a lifelong condition. Since dry skin can crack leaving it more exposed to bacteria, although in general this is not serious, it may cause other skin disorders, such as eczema, or be more prone to infections if not properly managed.

OILY SKIN

Oily skin has a porous, humid and bright appearance. It is caused by excessive fat production by sebaceous glands, and usually determined by genetic and/or hormonal causes. It is frequent in adolescents and young people under the age of 30 years old and usually related with the occurrence of acne.

COMBINATION SKIN

Based on its location, it presents characteristics of both dry and oily since the distribution of sebaceous and sweat glands is not homogeneous. The area with more oil is usually the T-zone (forehead, nose and chin) while the skin on the cheeks is normal or dry.

So, what is your skin type?

In our next article, we will talk about hair and how to identify you curl pattern. Also feel free to ask any questions with any of the Self-Care team. Make your skin a priority this week.

Brownies Ingredients

- Butter 226g
- Chocolate 226g
- Eggs 4
- Salt ¹/₄ tsp
- White sugar 1 cup
- Brown sugar 1 cup
- Vanilla 1 tsp
- All-purpose flour ³/₄ cup
- Cocoa powder ¹/₄ cup

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease and line an 8-inch square pan.
- 2. Melt the butter and chocolate together over double boiler and set aside.
- 3. Combine in another bowl the sugar and eggs. Add 1 egg at a time and mix until creamy.
- 4. Add the salt, vanilla and chocolate butter mixture. Mix gently.

5. Gently fold in the flour and cocoa powder. 6. Bake for 20 mins. Note: Bake 4 batches of brownies.



Chocolate Chip Cookies Ingredients

- All-purpose flour 3 cups
- Baking soda 1 tsp
- Salt ½ tsp
- Unsalted butter 339 g
- Brown sugar 1 cup
- White sugar 1 cup
- Eggs 2
- Vanilla 1 tablespoon
- Milk chocolate chips 10 oz
- Semi-sweet chocolate chips 10 oz

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 2. Stir together flour, baking soda and salt.
- 3. In a mixer, beat the butter, white sugar, brown sugar, and vanilla until creamy.
- 5. Add eggs and beat until incorporated.
- 6. Gradually add flour mixture. Stir in chocolate chips.

7. Drop rounded spoons unto greased cookie sheet. Bake for 8 - 10 mins or until lightly browned. Cool slightly; remove from cookie sheet to wire rack. Note: Bake 5 batches of cookies.

The Shirts for Shins CAS project was started by Sean Ellis, Charles Opoku and Kelvin Ahiakpor, three current Grade 12 students. The project combined our desire to help young people like us who are passionate about football. We noticed that many Ghanaian children love football, but most times they lack the equipment. We began brainstorming ideas in November 2020 and officially kick started in February 2021.

We aimed at purchasing shin guards for football lovers like us. To do this

we engaged in a fundraising activity of selling our branded T-Shirts. We did this with the help of extra members we recruited: **Wright Mawuli, Kevin Cudjoe, Abdul Bawumia, Bernard Obeng and Shaun Adjei-Sah.** Sean brought the idea to make a brand called **Anarchs** and this is what helped us market our shirts. A breakdown of the brand has been written by Bernard Obeng in the previous TIS Magazine section titled, "The battle of the brands".

After the money added up from the sale of these shirts, it was time to purchase shin guards.

We encountered some challenges, as there was low stock at the store we purchased from and also Covid-19 restricted our plans. Through Zoom calls and occasional meetings to discuss

progress, we strategised to get the 27 sets of shin guards and 3 footballs in time before coming back to school. We choose the **EYEH Soup Kitchen**, an organization that works with the street children, public schools and young orphans in Accra. We emailed Ms. Elizabeth Quashie-Idun and planned the handing over of the items.

She visited the TIS Main Campus



and had a very engaging interaction with us. It was a joy to present the items to Ms. Elizabeth, she mentioned that "these are destitute people" and it was with gratitude that she received our donation on their behalf. She made mention of a lack of electricity for those living on the streets, so we had the chance to donate some Luke Solar LED light and power banks. All members took part in a reflection activity to internalize the positive effect of the project on ourselves. It is our hope that we can continue to give wholeheartedly to the society in any way possible.

Types

There are three types of bipolar disorder. Throughout all three categories, mood, productivity, and energy levels fluctuate. Such emotions may range from being extremely "up," elated, agitated, or energetic (known as manic episodes) to being extremely "down," sad, apathetic, helpless (known depressive or as episodes).

Bipolar Disorder is recognized as manic depression. It is a mental condition characterized by extreme high and low mood swings, as well as changes in sleep, appetite, thinking, and personality. People with bipolar disorder may experience times of extreme happiness and euphoria, as well as bouts of extreme sadness, despair, and lethargy. They are people who need to be treated and spoken to with

Types of Bipolar Disorder Bipolar I (many subtypes) Must be a history of a manic episode There is a history of Major Depression More severe Bipolar II

- There is a history of a hypomanic episode but NOT Mania
 - There is a history of Major Depression
- Cyclothymic Disorder
 - Episodes of hypomania and numerous periods of depressed mood
 - Chronic: Never symptom free

emergency medical attention is both indicators of Bipolar I Disorder. Depressive episodes are prevalent, to last around two weeks. It is usual to experience depressive episodes with a range of symptoms (depressive and manic symptoms at the same time).

Bipolar II Disorder is characterized by a sequence of depressive and hypomanic episodes rather than the overflowing manic outbursts seen in Bipolar I Disorder.

Cyclothymic Disorder (also known as Cyclothymia) is described by hypomanic and depressive episodes lasting at least two years (1 year in children and teens). Unfortunately, these symptoms do not qualify for hypomania or depression. https://slideplayer.com/slide/5983855/



Further plans are underway to launch the **Educate Them Young CAS Project.** Stay tuned.




Community Project – 5th Cohort 2022






