

TIS ADMISSIONS 2022/2023

Admissions for the next academic year, 2022/2023, officially opened on 3 October, 2021, as previously communicated

For the past two years, TIS has had to put the FULL HOUSE sign up for the first time in many years. The coming year will be no different.

With the limited number of places available, TIS will be prioritising admissions for Grades 7-9 at the main campus and all classes at the Primary Campus.

Please note that admissions for the current year, 2020/2021, are being accepted for second semester at the Primary School Campus until mid-February for vacancies in the Early Years (Kinder 1-3).

The first round of admissions for the secondary school was completed in November 2021. The second and, hopefully, final round will commence shortly and conclude by late February. For this final round, applicants will be contacted in the next two weeks to arrange for the online admission test. Admission interviews will be conducted in mid-February and final round offers will be made by late February.

Applicants for Grade 11 should include their predicted grades for 2021.

It is likely that all secondary school vacancies will be filled by 1 March.

As advised previously, families with siblings at TIS received a priority for the first round which has now concluded. It is always disappointing for TIS families when they miss deadlines, especially these days when vacancies are at a premium.

Intending applicants should arrange a tour of the appropriate campus before the admission interview takes place.



Inquiry As A Stance at TIS Primary School

At Tema International School, the Primary Years Programme makes use of inquiry-based learning which means we encourage learners to be active participants in their learning by making them feel comfortable to ask questions and explore concepts that interest them. Teachers allow the learner's natural curiosity to direct their potential to acquire knowledge and skills. Teachers do not merely lecture, teach or deliver lessons to the class, but help learners explore the disciplines concerning the real world. Our goals are to foster inquirers who ask numerous questions, want to be hands-on, and experience things in real-time. In practical terms, the implementation of inquiry-based learning has proved effective and improved student learning outcomes by:

- Improving their critical thinking skills
- Making learners analyze and solve problems they identify around them, thus taking action
- Allowing learners to actively take ownership of their learning, making them independent learners
- Developing the ATL skills through explicit and implicit learning strategies.
- Reflecting on the learning process to self-improve
- Creating opportunities for learners to work collaboratively on learning activities, conduct research and work on projects.

Below is evidence of inquiry-based learning approaches at the different grade levels through the current units of inquiry.

Early Years

As the Topaz learners inquire about different systems, namely, *Family*, *School* and *Transportation*, they have been actively engaged in many student and teacher-initiated activities which include roleplays, interviews, data collection, poster making, drawing and painting images, brainstorming ideas, oral and written presentations, singing, dancing and drama.

Onyx class

Onyx learners are naturally curious and enthusiastic. They always want to get out of their seats and learn through exploration. They decided to go around the school environment and find as many signs and symbols displayed around.

They continued their inquiry process by presenting to the class what they saw and how important the images are. It is amazing how they actively took part in this activity.



As our current unit focuses on how people express themselves through communication, learners needed to conduct a survey to find out which communication means teachers used when they were young and now. They asked questions and recorded information from participants. They were amazed at what they found out during the whole group discussion.





Opal Class

Our learning has real-world connections where students engage in different hands-on activities with brainstorming and high-level questioning. Inquiry-based learning fosters student agency where students take ownership of their learning. In this unit 'How the World Works,' students have been collaborating to make posters, research, and have discussions as well as share new ideas.


Ruby Class

Inquiry-based learning fosters the active participation of students in the learning process. Different approaches are employed to ensure that students take charge of their learning. These approaches aim at triggering students' curiosity to acquire knowledge and develop specific skills.





EDUCATION FOR A BETTER WORLD



Interdisciplinary Grounding

The interdisciplinary learning days began at the start of this week. This is an annual set of dates on the school calendar where our students come off timetable to engage in interdisciplinary learning. As an IB World School, interdisciplinary learning is an important feature of our IB MYP curriculum and pedagogy. It is also an examinable part of the IB MYP5 examinations.

This week all MYP students and their teachers have come off timetable and regroup in two or more subject areas. At the end of the week, students are expected to demonstrate their new conceptual understanding.

They! She! He! Me! Drawn together!

Grade 7 Language Acquisition (French and Spanish) came together with Drama and Music to produce a unit of work which looks into identity through cultural, societal and personal lenses. Students have been reflecting on language, music and drama used that is used to express oneself or define others. Our PYP students and their new classmates have come to know the progression from transdisciplinary learning (PYP) to interdisciplinary learning (MYP).





Paternal Twins

Grade 8 Integrated Humanities and Visual Arts came together to produce a unit on the birth of civilization and pre-historic art and their development through the industrial revolution. Setting it in a real-life context they have considered the evolution of architecture as well as sustainable architecture. Our students enjoyed making connections between subject disciplines which they may not have thought possible before taking part in this unit.





Good Exercise, Good Life!

Grade 9. It is not often that the Language and Literature teachers take to delivering a Language and Literature lesson through PHE, but this week, Language and Literature and PHE came together to create their unit of work on good health and life. The unit was developed around turning students into eloquent ambassadors of good health through advocacy using differing text types. Not all Grade 9 students have selected PHE as a subject, but all of Grade 9 got to appreciate advocacy through one other discipline than language and this is very typical of the requirements of MYP.





Scientific Data and Decision-making

Grade 10. Mathematics and Sciences have paired up to produce the IDU. They have chosen to build the unit around a major topic in our current times. Our final year MYP students have been *evaluating data-driven decisions in the current pandemic era*. Any interdisciplinary assessment can ask for a student to make or comment on decisions around the topic in question. Grade 10 must be commended for coming up with many interesting propositions. Grade 10 will be preparing for their final interdisciplinary planning in the lead up to their final IB MYP Interdisciplinary Learning e-assessment in May. We wish them all the best!





BIG NEWS! SAT IS SWITCHING FROM PAPER-BASED TESTING TO COMPUTER-BASED TESTING IN JANUARY 2023!

Dear Students, please see the message on ManageBac, posted this week, a few days ago, to learn more and also to sign up for the pilot digital SAT exam taking place at TIS on 5 March, for free. Interested Grades 10-12 students who have prepared for this, can sign up directly using the website stated in the ManageBac message. But be sure to read the full official message (which I've also placed in the same message on ManageBac) from College Board's SAT Program to know the requirements and expectations, for students who want to be part of the pilot test.

Here is an interesting & insightful article from Applerouth about the transition to digital testing:



The Arrival of the Digital, Adaptive SAT ushers in a new era of testing By: Jed Applerouth, PhD.

This morning, the College Board <u>announced</u> that starting with the class of 2025 (current high school freshmen), test-takers will exclusively take a shorter, digital, adaptive SAT. By the spring of 2024, all SATs and PSATs administered in the US and abroad will be completely digital.

It's about time

For decades, testing agencies have been making the shift from paper to digital testing. In 1997, the GRE went digital, followed by the GMAT and TOEFL in 1998. The MCAT, LSAT, and many other standardized tests are now digital as well. The College Board is following a long-line of testing agencies ditching scantrons for more secure, reliable, and efficient computer-based testing.

Solving the test-security issue

Paper-based testing is inherently insecure. Moving around stacks of paper with highly sensitive information creates infinite security issues for testing agencies. A single bad actor who accesses and shares a fixed-form paper test can ruin a test for a whole country. We saw this again and again as test-security breaches led to national cancellations in Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Hong Kong, China, South Korea and beyond. As a result of the security breaches, the ACT shifted all of its international test-takers to digital testing in 2018. In October 2018, the US had its first domestic security breach which led to a cancellation of an ACT test date for US test-takers. The pressure has been mounting for testing agencies to move away from paper.

Computer Adaptive Testing is the Gold Standard

By shifting from a fixed-form paper test to a dynamic, digital, adaptive test, students will benefit in many ways:

- 1. A shorter test. Digital adaptive tests calibrate questions to the appropriate difficulty level for each student, based on that student's responses. This means a robust score can be obtained in less time. More time per question. Students will have more time to answer each question. This means that students' scores will be less tied to processing speed, a win for all students, especially those who need more time to process.
- Shorter passages. Shorter reading passages will put less of a burden on working memory. Hunting for relevant content through a long passage will become a thing of the past.
- 3. Eliminates the reliance upon proctors for managing timing.
- 4. **An embedded graphing calculator for every student.** Students will have the option of bringing their own calculator, and every test will now have a full-featured calculator embedded into the test, available on all math sections.
- 5. **No more issues with gridding or bubbling in items.** Students can get off track with bubbling on scantron answer sheets. The new system eliminates this issue, and students can actually flag items for review if they have time left at the end of a section.
- 6. **Superior accommodations for students with disabilities.** Shifting to a digital administration is a win for students with disabilities. Managing extended time or extra breaks becomes easier with computer-based testing.
- 7. **Faster scores.** Digital testing solves for the shipping ,unboxing and scanning of paper scantrons. Eliminating the logistical hurdles will lead to test results becoming available in days, rather than in weeks.
- 8. **Reliability.** The College Board is building in an auto-save feature to protect student work as students complete items. As student input will be continuously saved, in the event of any network or power issue, all work will be saved and ready to access once the power or network is restored.
- Familiarity with their own device. Students will have the ability to use their own laptop or tablet to take the SAT, or to use a school issued device. If students don't have access to a device, the College Board will provide one for use on test day.

The Academic Research & Writing Principles

Turnitin has developed this checklist as a guide to support students in their academic research and writing process. Use the 12 suggested guiding principles to help you to produce high quality research and original writing, from the pre-reading stage to final submission.

Explore

a wide range of research. Research the topic thoroughly to develop your knowledge base, discover new ideas and strengthen your own line of argument.

Evaluate

the reliability of your sources. Take some time to evaluate all your sources, particularly if information has been accessed online. Consider who has created the information and why.

Organise

your research notes. Note taking is a fundamental part of the research process. Keep notes neatly organised and retain a copy of each source used.

Write

an original paper.

The best defence against plagiarism is original writing. Unless quoting directly from someone else's work, express all ideas in your own words.

Paraphrase other people's ideas.

some find it helpful to note

An essential academic skill, down key words and concepts before paraphrasing other people's ideas.

Differentiate

other's work from your own original insights by referencing or paraphrasing. Avoid accidentally plagiarising someone else's work by using academic referencing.

Cite

all of your sources. A citation in your paper shows exactly what information has come from another source. Remember to cite all borrowed words or ideas, including those which came from one of your own previous papers!

Reference

all of your citations correctly. Depending on the referencing system used, this may end in a list of sources as a 'bibliography'. Most students are aware of referencing requirements surrounding books and journals, but we must also reference sources like YouTube videos, images, diagrams and yourself!

Use

the relevant referencing system consistently throughout your assignment. Referencing can vary across module units or each course so check which system you should use and follow the relevant formatting guidelines.

Ask

your teacher or instructor for their feedback on any drafts you have written in advance of the deadline. Writing multiple drafts and implementing the feedback you receive can help to make you a better writer.

Double check

your work including **citations.** Allow time to double check each of your citations before submission. This includes page numbers, publication dates, web links and authors' names.

Submit your final piece through Turnitin

Turnitin will check your work against other sources in the Turnitin database and use this information to generate an originality report.











