

TIS ADMISSIONS 2022/2023

Admissions for the next academic year, 2022/2023, officially opened on 3 October, 2021, as previously communicated

For the past two years, TIS has had to put the FULL HOUSE sign up for the first time in many years. The coming year will be no different.

With the limited number of places available, TIS will be prioritising admissions for Grades 7-9 at the main campus and all classes at the Primary Campus.

Please note that admissions for the current year, 2020/2021, are being accepted for second semester at the Primary School Campus until mid-February for vacancies in the Early Years (Kinder 1-3).

The first round of admissions for the secondary school was completed in November 2021. The second and, hopefully, final round will commence shortly and conclude by late February. For this final round, applicants will be contacted in the next two weeks to arrange for the online admission test. Admission interviews will be conducted in mid-February and final round offers will be made by late February.

Applicants for Grade 11 should include their predicted grades for 2021.

It is likely that all secondary school vacancies will be filled by 1 March.

As advised previously, families with siblings at TIS received a priority for the first round which has now concluded. It is always disappointing for TIS families when they miss deadlines, especially these days when vacancies are at a premium.

Intending applicants should arrange a tour of the appropriate campus before the admission interview takes place.



Unique Assemblies @ TIS Primary School Campus

One evidence of learning is when learners can express their understanding through various modes, especially in a way they feel most confident about or consider their strengths. At TIS Primary School, we nurture 21st-century learners who are independent critical thinkers, assertive communicators and problem-solving risk-takers and caring, not just about themselves but the entire world. We have moved from traditional school assemblies characterized by teacher-centered activities with a passive audience. It is certainly not just a school event or ceremony with mundane routines. Ours' are authentic celebrations of learning, where different year groups/grades lead to showcase learning with gusto.

The purpose? Our assemblies provide:

- opportunities for children to express themselves and present their learning.
- rich learning experiences and prospects for the entire learning community.
- great occasions for teachers, parents and learners to come together as a learning and school community.

Our unique assemblies feature and seek to put learners at the forefront, where they exercise agency by owning their learning across all disciplines. They apply the Approaches to Learning Skills (Thinking skills, Communication skills, Self-Management Skills, Research Skills, and Social skills) and exemplify the attributes of the IB learner profile to share their learning with the entire learning community. In short, we celebrate and share the learning happening in the various homerooms openly.

The Opals are an enthusiastic class that get excited during unit assemblies, especially when they are presenting. They put in a great effort during the preparation stages and continue to

entertain the school community with their presentations. Every student takes part in the preparation process with an open mind. They collaborate on activities to bring transdisciplinary connections to their presentations. Learning is 'fun' (best description of learning by Opal students) and it helps develop students' skills and confidence that allow them to explore the world around them to become problem solvers and lifelong learners. The students think about what they want to do and how they want to do it. Opal students follow these steps when preparing;

- Be focused
- Research for presentations
- Do not copy information. Make it your own.
- Encourage yourself to do it
- Never say never
- Learn new things
- Practise continuously.

Learners in the Onyx class always look forward to sharing their learning with the school community. They brainstorm and suggest interesting ways to present their learning. Every student is given the opportunity to share what he or she will want to do during the presentation. Students with similar interests are put together to refine their ideas and start working on the materials and dialogues towards the presentation. Some learning activities naturally flow into the assemblies such as projects, songs learned during the music sessions, drama and dance and sign language. At the end, learners reflect on their presentations to inform and improve them in the future.







Unit assemblies provide essential opportunities for students to share their learning with the entire school community. It provides an avenue for students to explore their creativity while sharing aspects of an ongoing inquiry. Students in the Ruby class always look forward to this day and prepare accordingly. Materials shared during the presentations emanates from students' learning and transcends disciplines. Students have the agency to select what to present and the mode of their presentations to show their uniqueness. They then discuss these ideas with teachers to refine their presentations. Our focus during unit assemblies has always been 'edutainment' – to educate and entertain.

This process helps learners reflect and improve on subsequent presentations.

- Look at the audience.

- 8. **CREATE** an agenda and maintain a project timeline.
- 9. **ORGANIZE** content so it is interesting, informative, and memorable for their peers.
- 10. Effectively **SELECT**, **LOCATE**, and **INTEGRATE** images and icons as visual cues that complement their content.
- 11. **SELECT** the best application to deliver their content.
- 12. **PUBLISH** and provide purposeful content for a variety of authentic audiences.
- 13. **LOCATE** and **UTILIZE** appropriately licensed images.
- 14. **PROTECT** their own work and images using a variety of methods and tools.
- 15. **CREATE** and **MAINTAIN** a digital portfolio and resume.
- 16. **REFLECT** on individual learning artifacts as well as their process of learning.
- 17. **PROVIDE** effective formative feedback to their peers and their work.
- 18. **BE AWARE** that social media is only one aspect of a person's life and can oftentimes be distorted.
- 19. **LEVERAGE** social media to share authentic learning artifacts.
- 20. **UTILIZE** curation as a way to digest and distill information.




Community Projects

The library is currently under refurbishment: the exposed ceiling with electrical wires hanging have been covered and painted, the fans and lights bulbs have been changed and the hall has been repainted.










CAS Final Essay – IB Class of 2022 CAS's Importance on My Life by Amanda Van-Tay



One of the most enjoyable components of the Diploma Programme is "Creativity, Activity, and Service." I didn't realize the importance of CAS until I started the DP because I had transferred from a different institution. Although I researched CAS throughout my vacation before enrolling at Tema International School, I realized how rigorous it was. I decided to brace myself because this would allow me to learn outside of the four walls of my classroom, grow as a person, and develop skills and talents I never knew I possessed. Then COVID struck, and we were no longer allowed to attend school in person, and were advised to participate in online school instead. This

threw a wrench in my plans to experience CAS head-on. However, with the help of our CAS Coordinator, Mama Su, we were challenged to engage in CAS from the comfort of our own homes.

CAS is an integral part of the DP since it can change a student's life in a variety of ways. Depending on how eager the student is to understand the learning outcomes and abilities learned from CAS, the impact of this requirement can have a significant or minor effect. I knew it would be challenging to fit it into my weekly routine because it involves considerable time, energy and effort. I knew it would be challenging to combine these demands with my arduous schooling. Nonetheless, I am happy for the opportunity to participate in these activities since

they have helped me grow into a better version of myself that I did not expect to be.

I believe the CAS program instilled in me a sense of bravery. Finding new hobbies to pursue and complete aided me in pushing my boundaries and breaking out of the comfort zone I had constructed for myself. When we conducted our **The Duke of Edinburgh Expedition Camp** at the beginning of



the second semester of DP1, I first observed this. Everyone who knows me or has spent time with me knows that I am far from adventurous. On this trip, however, I hiked for several hours, camped in tents in the woods, went paintballing, climbed two mountains, kayaked despite my fear of vast bodies of water, rode bikes, and abseiled from the Adome Bridge, all of which helped me overcome my fear of heights. All of those activities would never occur to me, but I had to put my anxieties aside to enjoy the experience. It was an excellent experience for me.

I was hesitant and introverted, and while I excelled at written communication, speaking was not my strong suit. Even though several CAS initiatives required public speaking at the time, I never considered performing them because I had already realized that public speaking was not my strong suit.

Unfortunately, my hesitant temperament hampered me in more ways than one since I avoided any leadership positions. However, as a result of the cumulative skills I gained through CAS, I was able to gain confidence in my new talents and abilities, which led to a firm belief in myself. My mousiness was replaced with newfound confidence, and before I knew it, I managed leadership tasks with far less trouble than previously.

It began with being a room monitor, which I held for three semesters in a row, and then progressed to being a prep monitor; these responsibilities may appear minor, but they were a significant step forward for someone like me.

I ran for an executive position in the Interact Club and was elected Membership Director. Interact Club has aided me in being a better person and doing what I enjoy the most: volunteering. With Interact, we donate







foodstuffs and home essentials to an orphanage as one of our many projects. Through Interact, I believe I met all of the CAS learning goals. Naturally, as I led and collaborated with the Interact Club members to create events, I improved my planning, collaboration, and leadership skills.

Volunteering for the National Supplementary Immunization against Polio was the most rewarding CAS experience. This encounter took place during my online education days, and it was my first CAS experience. I joined the Rotary Club of Accra Spintex to participate in the second round of the National Supplementary Immunization against Polio program's third phase of polio immunization. The Ledzekuku Municipal Area was assigned to the Rotary Club of Accra Spintex, and I was assigned to a team to deliver the vaccine to youngsters in the Teshie neighborhood of Tsuibleoo. We began our journey at the LEKMA Hospital, where we were provided with exercise supplies.





We started by going to local churches and delivering the vaccine to children under the age of five brought to the church by their parents. Vitamin "A" pills were also offered to children aged six months to six years to help enhance their immune systems. Our next trip was to the neighborhood, where we immunize youngsters by going from house to house and door to door. This initiative aims to stop poliovirus from spreading by vaccinating every kid under the age of five with two doses of the oral polio vaccine, regardless of previous immunization status. Participating in this program has raised awareness of polio eradication, and I've realized there are much more that people can do individually to alleviate the world's problems.



Pushing my limitations is without a doubt the primary phrase to characterize my 18 months of CAS. I started doing something I never dreamed I'd do and taking part in art. My friend started a CAS project called "Uplifting with Words" during my first semester of DP2. Through pleasant and insightful words and phrases, the CAS project Uplifting with Words aimed to offer joy to children and adults in hospitals. I was requested to join the project as a researcher because my friends knew I was a great researcher.

My initial role was to find designs for the group's other designers to draw and paint, but as time passed, I became one of them as well. Mama Su, our beloved supervisor and CAS Coordinator, brought in an outside artist to train and teach us the art of sketching, designing, and painting, she also taught us some of the skills and guide our brainstorms sessions. As someone who had never learned anything like that before, I was grateful to be allowed to learn. With all of the training we've had, I can't say I'm a design pro, but I can say I can did something beautiful and I will do many others. This initiative offered a lot of delight to the institutions we donated to, making it one of the best projects. It also fits under all of the strands of CAS.



Though the above endeavors and experience had the most impact on me, I had many other experiences that helped me grow in minor ways. IB virtual choir, Quantum Physics Week Webinar, Reading Club, Transformational Leadership, and Tufts University Summer Program- Engineering Investigations are just a few examples.

To share my CAS journey in an essay is not enough. Essentially, the CAS experiences and projects I participated in over the past two years have changed my character and allowed me to grow as an individual by becoming more

caring, a risk taker, a better communicator, a more balanced and open-minded individual.

As I leave **Tema International School**, I realize that I have succeeded in becoming someone who can stare a challenge in the face and grin at it as I allowed to be transformed though the CAS (Creativity, Activity, and Service) programme. I'm pleased CAS is a required component of the DP since it has helped me push outside my comfort zone and overcome my fears. Here I go heading to the world outside the walls of my school, (TIS) ready to continue my journey of growth and positive influence.






