



#Technology @ TIS Primary School

Our world and our schools are changing as a result of technology, and our ways of 'thinking' and 'doing' are evolving as well. Technological advancements bring with them new areas to explore, new skill sets to learn, new tools to invent and new chances to link learning communities all around the world. Technology, like language, has the ability to bring the learning community closer together and break down barriers. It is a way to research ideas, discuss discoveries, connect individuals and come up with new solutions. Incorporating and implementing technology in an inquiry-based programme can stimulate, invite, promote, and extend learning in a variety of ways.

At TIS Primary School, learners use different tools from online digital tools to gadgets such as cameras, to support the inquiry approach to learning on a daily basis. Our highlight this week is to focus on how technology serves as a tool for learners to explore the vast resources available, and how they have proved effective through the unit of inquiry.

Captured below are some benefits of using technology during the inquiry process.

1. Technology Creates A More Engaging Classroom Environment

Incorporating technology in lessons shifts learning from a traditional style to a more interactive, learner-centred approach where learners can actively participate in their learning. The loudest cheers are heard in a class when learners engage in interactive team games such as quizzes, *Kahoot*, and *Edmentum*.



Learners in Kinder 2 actively watch a video clip on the importance of animals to humans. They collaboratively made a poster based on what they had learned.





Learners in the Ruby class learn some DIY crafts by watching tutorials on Youtube to weave different useful items.



Learners in the Onyx class watched and discussed the impact of products on the environment and suggested ways to reduce such harmful practices.

2. Technology Incorporates Different Learning Styles

Each learner is different and unique and it can be challenging to differentiate instructions to meet every student's learning needs. Fortunately, the use of technology can come in handy for learners to have activities tailored to meet their specific needs and have more practice time even outside school hours.





Learners here chose to upload the poster they created so that they can display it using the projector during their presentation on goods and services.





Learners play a game to practice their multiplication using mental strategy, a far different approach used by the traditional school.

3. Technology Improves Collaboration

When learners use technology in the classroom, they are more likely to help one another, especially when they are placed into smaller groups. Online tools such as *Padlet*, *Google Docs*, *Linoit* and *StoryJumper* allows learners to find information, share their ideas, create stories that can be shared across the world, assess their peers and give feedback.



Learners work in pairs to support each other to read about different organizations and the roles they play in the community. They solved follow-up questions to assess their understanding of what they read.

The Opal class has been exploring various digital tools in their unit, "How We Organize Ourselves", and the experience has been great. Students have learnt how to use various digital tools, such as Padlet, Clipchamp, Powtoon, digital cameras, Storyjumper, Zoom and ManageBac, to communicate, collaborate and assess their works. They had the opportunity to embark on a field trip to have a real-life experience of using digital prints to make interesting designs. As inquirers, these students have identified how to take videos, edit videos, implement text and use animation for various presentations. The use of these digital tools has improved students' presentations and confidence, as well as triggered their level of curiosity. Students no more say, "I don't know". They rather say, "I want to find out". Inquiry is about learning something new and arousing curiosity is no easy task. The use of digital tools answers a lot of the questions on their curious minds making their learning experiences authentic.

Primary School Campus - Preschool and Primary Grades

Admissions for the Primary Campus open on 1 April each year.

All admissions will be online via Open Apply: https://tis.openapply.com

There will be no online testing, but a social readiness screening will be required, along with a compulsory interview with parents during a school tour. These will commence in April each year on a rolling basis when applications have been completed.

Admissions in the second semester each year are dependent on vacancies.

Main School Campus - Grades 7, 8, 9 and 11

- Prospective students are required to complete application forms online via https://tis.openapply.com
- An application fee can be paid via <u>ExpressPay</u>, at the school or into the school's account. The account details can be found on the Bank Details page. (pick from openapply and add momo number Momo reference
- All prospective students will take an aptitude test that does not require special preparation. An interview would be conducted before a final decision is made. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the selection process.
- Only candidates who have fully completed the applications will be contacted for the aptitude test and subsequent interview.
- Prospective families are encouraged to arrange a tour of the school before or during the application process.

Applications open on 1 October of the preceding year. Early applications and admissions are encouraged. Late applications will be considered, if vacancies exist.


Applicants for Grades 7, 8 and 9 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports.

Applicants for Grade 11 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports, predicted grade and a recommendation letter. When final results are released, applicants are required to attach a scanned copy on OpenApply. The release of final results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

After the completion of Middle Years Programme (Grade 10), TIS students are expected to complete the IB Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. They will make initial subject selection choices during the second semester of Grade 10. The release of examination results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

Please note that students are not normally accepted into (Grade 10 and 12).

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

Supervised by Mr. George Sandy, the group refurbished the entire library of St' Johns Academy in Lebanon, a suburb in Ashiaman. The funds repainted the hall in grey oil paint and white, provided four standing bookshelves, constructed a roofing to cover the ceilings and exposed wires, redid the electrical wiring at the hall, fixed two ceiling fans, replaced louvre blades, changed the doors and locks and provided floor carpets and curtains. In addition, the team donated story books and 4 learning stations of 24 cubicles. The remaining amount of GHC 7,600 will be paid to the school accounts for future service projects for the initiators. Last Friday, the beneficiaries of the project, St Johns Academy, honoured the team by hosting an event of spoken word, chorography, poetry recitals and speeches to extend their heartfelt appreciation to the entire TIS community, especially the initiators Klenam Torkornoo,

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


Snack Donation Drive







Cooking is the practice or skill of preparing food by combining, mixing, and heating ingredients. Cooking allows people to make healthier food choices. It is, therefore, important to teach children and teenagers how to cook and to encourage them to develop their cooking skills.

At TIS, we have established a Master Chef Class where students will learn recipes from all over the world. The idea is for students to be able to cook meals on their own and also use the skills to organize a fundraiser while learning the techniques and safety measures taken in the kitchen.

In the cooking class, each student has a task to complete to contribute to the meal preparation and cleanup. It's always important to cleanup your area after cooking, wash the dishes and mop.

Most importantly, cooking in schools can build positive memories that promote future healthy, enjoyable cooking elsewhere. It also helps them in measuring and weighing, healthy eating.

The students can also observe changes of state from solid to liquid when melting chocolate, or from liquid to gas when boiling pasta. They can explore the properties of gluten and how different proportions of ingredients can create different textures. They also build team work and a sense of satisfaction.



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Red Cross - First Aid Training



"Service! To Mankind!

This Workshop was a very informative one. contributed to the growth of my pre-existing knowledge on first Aid and how to prolong the life of casualty. I first got to understand the qualities of a first aider with being empathetic, some courageous, and proactive favourite. and my resourceful which reflects the first aider's ability to improvise and make do with

whatever materials are available and essential in saving a life. Equally important, I also learnt about the concept of the Red Cross that was brought about by a Swiss Businessman, Henry Dunant, who conceived the idea after stumbling on a battlefield filled with numerous casualties, eventually attending to them and aiding a lot of casualties with the help of mildly injured soldiers who he had helped. Additionally, I learnt about ways to approach an injured person; Looking out for Danger in the environment, Responsiveness, Deformity, Checking Their Airways, Breathing and Circulation. Importantly, I also learnt that no first aider is a hospital or works alone and that the emergency number in Ghana is 112. This helped me to understand what a lot of people who attempt to save lives get wrong, especially with the first approach which could possibly provide a safety hazard to both the first aider and the casualty. During the practical with my group members, I played a casualty who had slipped on a court and hit his head badly during a basketball game which caused severe bleeding. As much as it was fun acting unconscious and humorously being carried on stretcher by my group mates, I also observed the importance of meticulously helping a casualty while observing the approaches which are essential to saving lives. To cut a long story short, this Red Cross Workshop was an essential one which I believe everyone should take part in, bearing in mind that injuries and illnesses do not acknowledge what grade you are in, your cultural background or your age. Partaking in this workshop is necessary and teaches skills which are integral to prolonging the life of a casualty in any given situation." Andrew Opuni, G11

The first week of Red Cross training has been a very exciting and amazing experience. So far I have learnt the history of the Red Cross, The qualities of a first aider, Do's and don'ts, and the response to fainting, shock and other injuries.
