Secondary students must return to hostels on Monday, 9 January, by 5.00pm.





- Prospective students are required to complete application forms online via https://tis.openapply.com
- An application fee can be paid via ExpressPay, at the school or into the school's account. The account details can be found on the Bank Details page.
- All prospective students will take an aptitude test that does not require special
 preparation. An interview would be conducted before a final decision is made. Parents
 will be informed of the outcome of the selection process.
- Only candidates who have fully completed the applications will be contacted for the aptitude test and subsequent interview.
- Prospective families are encouraged to arrange a tour of the school before or during the application process.

Applications open on 3 October of the preceding year. Early applications and admissions are encouraged. Late applications will be considered, if vacancies exist.

Applicants for Grades 7, 8 and 9 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports.

Applicants for Grade 11 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports, predicted grade and a recommendation letter. When final results are released, applicants are required to attach a scanned copy on OpenApply. The release of final results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

After the completion of Middle Years Programme (Grade 10), TIS students are expected to complete the IB Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. They will make initial subject selection choices during the second semester of Grade 10. The release of examination results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

Please note that students are not normally accepted into (Grade 10 and 12).



Community Project Updates

As stated in the previous Bulletins, the Grade 8 Community Projects have taken off and each Bulletin will highlight the progress of the various projects.

Fingers and Gestures

This project is initiated by Vania Stephens and Amaris Osei-Agyemang. The goal of this community project is to raise awareness of the deaf community by creating/organising a small-scale club at TIS in collaboration with Calvary Presby students to learn sign language.

Supervised by Miss Diane Asante, the team will host about 8 students in our garden every Friday and engage them in activities geared towards sign language.



The deaf community is a group of persons that were either involved in an accident that caused them to lose their hearing or people that were born hearing-impaired. Some deaf people who were in an accident can speak and write well. Some others do not because their hearing loss prevented them from learning spoken language. Deafness usually has little effect on the vocal cords and very few deaf people are truly mute.

Sign language was adapted in communities so that it could be performed and they could communicate with hearing-impaired people. The most adapted sign language is the ASL (American sign language) But other countries have made their own sign language so that they can speak their own language.

To advocate towards Open and International Mindedness, the purpose is to create awareness about the deaf community through the Sign Language Club.







Operation Re-play Fundraiser

Christmas Service as Action Ideas





The Helix CAS Project Renovate the Anyako Health Centre

Helix is a CAS project that aimed at renovating the Health Centre in Anyako, Volta Region. In order to enhance the centre's functionality and operations in offering quality medical care to locals in the Anyako community, we started journey in April 2022 while in Grade 11/DP1. So far, a sum of GHC 38.000 has been raised

mainly from donations and fundraisers by sending out letters to the general public, going door to door in various settlements in Tema, Kaneshie, Spintex and East Legon and approaching friends and families.

Part of the donations came to use on 2 December, when the group embarked on a trip to purchase the necessary products (ACs, waiting chairs, executive table, examination bed, a fridge and window blinds) needed for the renovations, from various electronic and furniture stores. such as Hisense, Melcom, Kingdom Books and Samsung. This same trip led us to the office of the **Paramount Chief of Anyako**, **Togbi Tenge Dzokoto Gligui VII** where we engaged in a very productive meeting starting with a brief introduction into the project, a discussion on both the progress and way forward of the project and a discussion on the role teenagers like us play in building a stronger and more equal society and by the end of this meeting, Togbi agreed to donate a sum of GH¢ 5,000 along with a GH¢ 5,000 contribution by the royal family, a contribution by his company of 20+ plastic chairs, 10+ wash basins and buckets for the maternity ward. He also agreed to help build a borehole for water beside the health centre to provide a clean, safe and a reliable source of water for the health centre and community.

We left our school campus early on Thursday, 8 December, with great anticipation to the commissioning of our project. Togbi organized a ceremony at the Anyakor Health Centre where 10 divisional chiefs, the MP for Keta, the Regional Health Secretary, the MCE, and locals were present to officially present our project and launch the newly renovated health centre to the community. What a joy it was to see all that we aimed and worked for come to pass.

We are very grateful to our CAS Coordinator, Mama Su, our CAS supervisor, Mr Tay, the CASSA team, our parents, the school management and our family and friends for the immense support. The health centre is well equipped to serve the community. We left Anyakor certain that we have done our little bit to bring positive change to a community dear to us. We will share our reflections in the next Bulletin. For today, we are just so humble and grateful.



CAS Project – Ignite

Our growing concern for Public Ghanaian schools, especially local and government schools that do not promote the balance a child needs for mental growth, has led us to initiate this project. According to Terry Heick, what every student needs are, but not limited to: inspiring models, learning

strategies, play, reading, writing, and approval that is not always contingent on success, as well as creative spaces and tools.

Our learning outcomes are: "Identify own strengths and develop areas for growth, demonstrate that challenges have been undertaken, developing new skills in the process and demonstrate the skills and recognize the benefits of working collaboratively". Our SDG goals include: SDG 3: "Ensuring healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages" and SDG 11" Make cities inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable". As individuals and IB learners we believe that these learning outcomes and SD goals allow us to drive our want to provide for other schools that we believe are lacking play.

As IB learners, we are very fortunate and privileged, and we have been given the opportunity to have this balance and space to grow outside of the classroom, such as through after-school activities and an environment that makes us feel wanted and motivates us. Hence, we have come together with the initiative of building a playground for public schools around Ghana to help in our own way.

This project aims to spread awareness of the critical need for Ghanaian schools to remember that play is a key role in shaping the way children learn about the world and themselves. According to 'indirect government services,' playing is a natural and enjoyable way for children to keep active, stay well, and be happy. "Freely chosen play helps children and young people's healthy development. To have good physical and mental health and to learn life skills, they need various unstructured play opportunities from birth until they are teenagers."

On the 6 December 2022, we travelled to the Saint Nicholas Charity School in Tema Newtown to get a better look at the place. It was an amazing experience and the people with whom we interacted were so lovely and engaging. Looking at the conditions of the place, one key thing that was very noticeable was their lack of play materials. This gave us more drive in initiating our CAS project there.

At the end of our project, we hope that we will raise enough funds and work collaboratively with empowerment playgrounds to earn a specific amount of money that allow sus to provide play materials for the students of Saint Nicholas.

One thing I noticed throughout the process and on the nights of the show is that hard work pays off and that putting in the work can help achieve marvellous results. mentally be ready for the strain and amount of work we would put into the songs to overcome this challenge. And this paid off. It enhanced my ability to collaborate, which is especially useful when working with a band because, without synergy, the beauty of the songs cannot be appreciated. 
























Thank you for being an important TIS Family member.




