Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical. All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted guring the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approval exeat from their phone to enter (NO SHOW. NO GO!).

Students must return by 5.00pm on Sundays (weekend exeats).

General Exeat

A general exeat will cover passport and visa matters, as well as family events. These must not exceed more than two per mid-semester.



Welcome Back To School

On 10 January 2023, learners were welcomed back to our happy school after the Christmas and New Year break. Learners came to school with so much excitement and expectations for the new semester.













The beaming smiles on the faces of learners as they arrived at the school said it all. At TIS Primary School, each day and week unfolds with excitement and the first week was no different. The week was fun as learners shared amazing vacation experiences with their friends. Learners were engaged with so many activities throughout the week.

The semester has started with so much fun in the early years























Facilitators are geared to implement all the necessary skills acquired throughout the workshop to make learning engaging, exciting, loving, and informative, while also encouraging the authenticity of learning by learners.











In the Early Years, our learners are focusing on the theme, "Where We Are in Place and Time", with an individual class focus.

In *Kinder 1*, the class is focusing on stories. The class started their inquiry by identifying what a family is and also invited a guest who share a story about their family. Looking forward, the class is also looking at inviting other members of the family such as grandparents to come and share some memorable stories.

Kinder 2 is inquiring into artefacts and how they help us gain an understanding of people's histories. The class this week has focused on what artefacts are and also identified some things we used in the past and things we use now. The class is looking at visiting some museums in Ghana to identify some artefacts discovered by archaeologists.

In *Kinder 3*, the unit for inquiry is focusing on journeys living creatures take and the reasons why they make those journeys. Kinder 3 learners began inquiring about the meaning of migration and the reasons people and animals migrate. They look forward to inquiring more about the impact of environmental changes on the migration of living creatures.

This semester, *Grade 1* class is starting with a unit that is centred on explorations of the past and how it has impacted us in modern days. Learners are looking forward to exploring new places to practice their map reading skills and using tools such as binocular walkie-talkies, and whistles to observe nature as well as communicate.

Grade 2 learners are starting the semester by delving into the physical and special features of the earth that distinguishes them from other places on earth. We will further explore and research how landforms are changing and the effects they have on the lifestyle of people.

This semester, learners in *Grade 3* are exploring the concept of role models as exemplifiers of our beliefs and values through the unit "who we are". In this unit, there are a lot of social concepts that afford diverse transdisciplinary strands to be woven together to bring out the meaning in the relationships we share and enjoy. It would be an opportunity to appraise our self-identity.



Grade 4 is inquiring into different behaviours and beliefs and how they contribute to our culture through the unit, 'Who We Are'. The learners will explore the cultural differences and similarities and understand the importance of appreciating each other's cultural backgrounds.

Grade 5 is learning about the various industries and their impact on the individual, community, and world. Learners will explore ways they can improve or keep the existing industries as well as keep our environment clean.

Learners in *Grade 6* are inquiring into the concept of governance, institutions, leadership, entrepreneurship, and productivity. Over this unit, we will explore how good governance and institutional organization lead to productivity. Learners will be exposed to leadership principles and be allowed to take up various leadership roles. They will also develop ideas for a business startup to cultivate their entrepreneurial skills.









In music, learners will explore the music industry and various careers that exist in the industry. They will further research into genres of music that exist in beat-making and select their favourite genres and produce their beat using different beat-making software. They will further compose their music to suit the beats they have created.

This semester, our art lessons are going to be fun and educational. Grade







1 will focus on the dioramas of explorers and their exploration activities. We will focus on making portraits of role models for Grade 3, Grade 2 learners will focus on dioramas of landforms and their characteristics. Grade 4 will dive into the culture and its significance while Grades 5 and 6 will focus on industrialization and entrepreneurship with much emphasis on product design. We will experiment with colour and other tools and art-making materials and processes to make our learning fun and educational.

Dance and Drama

There will be a consistent collaboration with learners to get their great and creative ideas on dance and drama. They will be allowed to engage in activities that will unearth their hidden talents. The Drama and Dance class promises to be fun!


In Mandarin, the grade 1 students are learning about explorers and their explorations; students learn how to introduce some explorers in Mandarin. The Grade 2 students are creating some posters about landforms with mandarin pinyin and characters. In Grade 4, students are learning to speak about beliefs and behaviours from around the world in mandarin.

In Sign Language Grade 1 students are learning about some famous explorers, they will sign their names and sign a little history about them. The Grade 6 students are learning about production and good management yet, their activities are woven to help them learn the basics of Sign Language and how best they can communicate with the hearing impaired. Also, Grade 4 students are exploring the deaf culture and how gestures are classified as part of the deaf culture and its essence in sign language.

Main School Campus - Grades 7, 8, 9 and 11

- Prospective students are required to complete application forms online via https://tis.openapply.com
- An application fee can be paid via <u>ExpressPay</u>, at the school or into the school's account. The account details can be found on the Bank Details page.
- All prospective students will take an aptitude test that does not require special
 preparation. An interview would be conducted before a final decision is made. Parents
 will be informed of the outcome of the selection process.
- Only candidates who have fully completed the applications will be contacted for the aptitude test and subsequent interview.
- Prospective families are encouraged to arrange a tour of the school before or during the application process.

Applications open on 3 October of the preceding year. Early applications and admissions are encouraged. Late applications will be considered, if vacancies exist.

Applicants for Grades 7, 8 and 9 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports.

Applicants for Grade 11 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports, predicted grade and a recommendation letter. When final results are released, applicants are required to attach a scanned copy on OpenApply. The release of final results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

After the completion of Middle Years Programme (Grade 10), TIS students are expected to complete the IB Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. They will make initial subject selection choices during the second semester of Grade 10. The release of examination results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

Please note that students are not normally accepted into (Grade 10 and 12).



What an experience for all of us this drive was. We walked through those improvise squatters, so concerned with the lack of infrastructure around. Most of them after receiving their bag of

goodies, asked to pray for us, others were just praising God for the gift. They advised us to continue doing our best to support those in need and to not forget how privileged we are. It was so touching and emotional, an eye opening experience that will drive us to do more, to do better. We hope one day, no one on earth will face hunger, poverty will be eradicated, and we would all live in a peaceful world.

I first met Mr. Theophilus in Grade 9 when I was offering MYP Visual Arts. I walked into the art lab with my sketchpad and saw a tall figure at a working table in the Visual Arts lab, creating a sketch with a pen of what I remember was an elephant. I realized how focused he was, with his bare feet on the ground, and that I did not want to disturb an artist at work. I got stuck between different options. So, I decided to linger around the art room for a bit and watch him work with my clueless 14-year-old self in my baggy uniform trousers, pretending to look for something. He paused, looked up, and extended his hand to introduce himself. On that day, little did I know that I would meet a mentor who would transform my artistic journey and life. At first, I used to get intimidated by his demeanor, since he was a tall man with a voice booming like thunder who could effortlessly make his presence felt anywhere. However, he was more or less a gentle giant. I admired his patience. Every time I saw him getting angry, he would internalize his anger instead of yelling and trying to work things out with other people. When he would frequently give us a chocolate bar when he observed us



working drowsily on our display pieces and his desire to learn new things, I found myself admiring his kindness. I remember very well when I was in the music room with my bandmates, playing the keyboard in preparation for a pop band performance, and he just walked in, pulled a seat, and scanned the room, bopping his head for a good 5 minutes. I did not exactly see this as a big deal because it was something a lot of people used to do during our rehearsals. However, one day in class when I was trying to

master proportion on the human figure, he took the pencil and told me we should make a deal: he draws a few figures for me in skeleton and flesh and I teach him some chords on the piano. That was a deal my heart could not refuse. As I began to teach him a few C major chords, he turned it into some praise groove, stood up, and started shaking his body, which exuded a lot of laughter from the room. I remember walking into Visual Arts class one day on Freaky Friday last year, which was an event marking the numerous events of Spirit Week.

Mr. Theophilus walked in as I was in my working space, in his Friday clothes and all, and began to help me straighten out some lines in my composition. But I realized something odd about him; I just could not pin it down. Then I noticed he had painted his long beard green. We both just burst into laughter and could not take the situation seriously. I also have a great

memory of something that shook me to my core. I was in Mr. Theophilus's office discussing some compositions I had made over the weekend when, to my surprise, he began playing Luciano Pavarotti's Nessum Dorma on his laptop. I figured it was just something to help him pass time as school was almost over. However, he began singing along, much to my surprise and was doing a great job. I was frozen, and I just felt goosebumps as I could



not believe what was before me. I applauded his performance and promised him that on the days leading up to my graduation, we would perform it with me on the keyboard, Tekpor on the drums, Akpatsa on the bass guitar, and him at the center of it all. He grinned from ear to ear and told me that would happen and that I should not forget. I learned a lot from Mr. Theophilus. Despite having only four students, our art class felt more than just a class. He was more than a teacher to us - a leader who would not only command us to embark on a journey alone but hold our hands and lead the way. He continually reminded me that I could do more to achieve greater heights, so I also learned to be critical of the work I produce across disciplines. I remember often serving as his "Okyeame" in class whenever almost everyone had a funny argument with him about a deadline extension to be the voice of reason, which thickened our bond. I do remember the delight in your eyes when I dressed up as you for Teacher's Day in an African shirt, trousers, and your signature slippers as we posed behind the cutout frame mimicking a post made on Twitter. It would never be the same passing by his office without hearing his loud, booming laugh or having the opportunity to sit down with him and have an in-depth discussion about his upcoming exhibition, which he intended to finish before his passing. It also wouldn't be the same arguing with him about not getting a 7 in class. It would never be the same not passing by his office on the way to Einstein to get chilled water from the Einstein block, which would bring a bright smile to his face. It would be painful not to be called to your office to look at some of your inspirations online until the site was blocked. It is an awfully hard pill to swallow. How you left us is not a true reflection of the patient, caring, great teacher, and older brother figure you were to us. Our last memories of you were during the recent Christmas break when we would come to campus to finish our work and you would video call us all the time to see how things were going with our work. It is painful to know that you were working on your exhibition, where you would constantly remind us that we are all in this together. I am grateful that our phone call was a happy one where you complimented my work. That has given me peace and a better reason to honor your legacy in my work across all subjects. I do, however, find comfort in believing that you are way above us, working on millions of canvases, executing all the unfinished ideas that were planned during your mortal life here with us. I am reminded of you every time we have class and it encourages me to work. I know that I was blessed to have a teacher like you. 



Below is the list of 21 Communication Skills that every high school student should have before beginning college or a career.

- 1. **COMPOSE** an email that elicits a clear response.
- 2. **UNDERSTAND** the difference between personal and professional communications and can **CRAFT** clear communications for a variety of audiences.
- 3. **TROUBLESHOOT** sending large attachments and a variety of file types.
- 4. **SET** norms and expectations within any group setting.
- 5. **ARTICULATE** their ideas comfortably and show empathy for other students' perspectives and points of view.
- 6. **DETERMINE** their own signature strengths and advocate for specific roles.
- 7. **ASSESS** the effectiveness of their own (and their peers') participation and involvement within the group.
- 8. **CREATE** an agenda and maintain a project timeline.
- 9. **ORGANIZE** content so it is interesting, informative, and memorable for their peers.
- 10. Effectively **SELECT**, **LOCATE**, and **INTEGRATE** images and icons as visual cues that complement their content.
- 11. **SELECT** the best application to deliver their content.
- 12. **PUBLISH** and provide purposeful content for a variety of authentic audiences.
- 13. LOCATE and UTILIZE appropriately licensed images.
- 14. **PROTECT** their own work and images using a variety of methods and tools.
- 15. **CREATE** and **MAINTAIN** a digital portfolio and resume.
- 16. **REFLECT** on individual learning artifacts as well as their process of learning.
- 17. **PROVIDE** effective formative feedback to their peers and their work.
- 18. **BE AWARE** that social media is only one aspect of a person's life and can oftentimes be distorted.
- 19. LEVERAGE social media to share authentic learning artifacts.
- 20. **UTILIZE** curation as a way to digest and distill information.
- 21. **SELECT** appropriate tools (both analogue and digital) and processes for curation and distillation of content.

Know how to **safely collaborate** and share work when using social media and digital collaborative platforms.

Try to overcome procrastination. Managing our time wisely will reduce stress-induced, last-minute work which increases the

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
