The Primary School Admissions process continues for this year and will remain ongoing until the end of February.


The 2023/2024 secondary school admissions are continuing and the second round will commence soon and conclude by early March.

## **Exeat**

There are two types of exeats: general and medical. All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

## LEARNING THROUGH PLAY IN TIS EARLY YEARS

## "Whoever wants to understand much must play much." -Gottfried Benn

Play is essential to development and growth, and contributes hugely to a child's social, emotional, cognitive and physical wellbeing and development. At TIS Primary School, play-based learning is integral to the Primary Years Programme (PYP). The curriculum is centred on the idea that children are partners in their learning process. Children learn best through first-hand experiences. Play motivates, stimulates and supports children in their development of skills, concepts, language acquisition, communication skills, and concentration. During play, children use all of their senses, they convey their thoughts and emotions, explore their environment, and connect what they already know with new knowledge, skills and attitudes. As they bring their language and culture into play, they also learn about their peers in the process.

This activity helps our learners to develop motor skills, listening skills and social-emotional skills. It also promotes development and learning by encouraging our learners to express, understand and regulate their emotions by using their muscles to move and balance their own bodies.

Learners demonstrate some prepositions they have been learning about through play. Skip counting lessons was fun as learners skipped as they counted the numbers.



















## 2023/2024 SECONDARY SCHOOL ADMISSIONS ARE NOW OPEN

## Main School Campus - Grades 7, 8, 9 and 11

- Prospective students are required to complete application forms online via <a href="https://tis.openapply.com">https://tis.openapply.com</a>
- An application fee can be paid via <u>ExpressPay</u>, at the school or into the school's account. The account details can be found on the Bank Details page.
- All prospective students will take an aptitude test that does not require special preparation. An interview would be conducted before a final decision is made. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the selection process.
- Only candidates who have fully completed the applications will be contacted for the aptitude test and subsequent interview.
- Prospective families are encouraged to arrange a tour of the school before or during the application process.

Applications open on 3 October of the preceding year. Early applications and admissions are encouraged. Late applications will be considered, if vacancies exist.

Applicants for Grades 7, 8 and 9 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports.

Applicants for Grade 11 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports, predicted grade and a recommendation letter. When final results are released, applicants are required to attach a scanned copy on OpenApply. The release of final results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

After the completion of Middle Years Programme (Grade 10), TIS students are expected to complete the IB Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. They will make initial subject selection choices during the second semester of Grade 10. The release of examination results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

Please note that students are not normally accepted into (Grade 10 and 12).



## **Meet Mariam**

Mariam was born with a bilateral cleft lip. But unlike many mothers, her mom, Ramatu, knew exactly what lied ahead for her daughter.

She herself was born with a cleft condition.

When she was a baby, Ramatu received surgery from a teaching hospital to repair her cleft lip. "I'm happy that I got the surgery when I was little," Ramatu said.

Ramatu is reserved and doesn't often make eye contact with strangers. She didn't share what her life had been like growing up or what she had been through, but her strength and dignity are undeniable.

"When I saw my daughter was also born with a cleft, I said to myself, 'God gave me this child for a reason. I know how to take care of her."

Ramatu began searching for a solution a few months after Mariam was born, hoping that her daughter would receive the same surgical care that she received many years ago.

Her hopes were realized once she heard about Operation Smile Ghana.

After seeing posters around town for the organization's upcoming medical mission in Ho and contacting patient coordinators, Ramatu was relieved to learn that her daughter's cleft lip could be healed for free.

"I would not have been able to afford to pay for surgery for Mariam," Ramatu said. "When Mariam was selected for surgery, I was very happy."

But when the time came for Constance to enter the operating room, Victoria bravely handed her daughter to the volunteer surgeon and did not shed a tear.

After an hour of waiting anxiously, Victoria reunited with Constance and held her daughter lovingly in her lap.

Looking at Constance's new smile for the first time, Victoria simply said, "I'm so happy. She's very beautiful now."



I also eagerly anticipated this workshop and all the incredible things that would result from knowing that I could benefit both myself and others. I learned how to help a person who is bleeding. I learned about the various types of unconsciousness. There is drowsiness or dizziness, fainting, shock, stupor, and ultimately



coma. I got some hands-on practice with the dummy practicing CPR. I've learned that taking care of someone unconscious should come first, but you shouldn't spend too much time on them; instead, move on to the others. It's all about looking at the signs and symptoms and responding as such based on each situation. My best moment was when I got to do CPR myself on the dummy. It was a good way for me to be sure that I had learned something and practiced it before using it on a human. I realized that, with the proper information, I could save lives. My takeaway lesson is to put my newly acquired knowledge to good use. I will always keep the things I have learned in mind, as I never know when they might come in handy. I plan to renew my Red Cross certificate every two years from henceforth. Don't be shy and say what's on your mind. It's better to be wrong than unheard. ## DP Students - CAS Reflection

I thought it would be hard to go out of my comfort zone and that I had a lot to learn. I learned that body language plays a significant role in communication and can help convey things like enthusiasm or discomfort. The ability to speak more confidently and clearly can be improved by mind mapping your thoughts. It leads to better conversations and presentations. ### 13 EFFECTIVE STUDY STRATEGIES TO HELP STUDENTS LEARN

### Strategies for Avoiding Distractions

- 1. Change your space (make it distraction-free).
- 2. Don't choose distraction (don't multitask).
- 3. Ask: Do you want social media or Enjoy it? (There is a difference between wanting to go on social media and actually enjoying being online may be significant to the student.)
- 4. Plan breaks (if constantly distracted you may need a break. Planned breaks are more effective than spontaneous ones.)
- 5. It's still school. (Parents can help students structure their mindsets to tune out distractions.)

### Why We Procrastinate & How to Fight it

- 6. Start work in class (simply beginning the work makes headway against procrastination.)
- 7. Use a Planner and make it a habit. (When students don't plan or schedule, their work, they struggle. When planning, whatever time estimate you come up with, double it.)
- 8. Practise breaking down tasks. (Students need to learn how to break up large tasks into bite-size chunks.

### How to Know When to Stop Studying

- 9. Feeling that you know something is not reliable. (When students assess whether they know a topic, they should consider whether they're only familiar with it.)
- 10. Studying until you know is not enough. (To protect themselves against forgetting, students should plan their studying so that it includes time to study even after mastering a self-test.)
- 11. Creating study materials is studying. (Making their own study guides or flashcards not only allows students to review their notes but ensures the materials they use are on topic and accurate.
- 12. 'Knowing' means being able to explain. (Knowledge means being able to explain it to oneself.)
- 13. Use in-class queries. (Quick tests that require students to produce knowledge allows them to check their understanding of a concept.)


