

Participants at Tema International School participate in extra-curricular activities (After School Activities) to fulfill the Physical Recreation and Skills requirement. Their service as action, CAS, and community projects satisfies the Service and Residential Projects requirements. The award center organizes at least three expeditions for participants to fulfill the Adventurous Journey requirement. For each award level, participants are expected to participate in two expeditions (Practice Journey and Qualifying Journey).

My Dukies' journey started as an award participant, a gold award recipient, an award leader and now the Coordinator of the Tema International School Award Centre.

I acknowledge the immense role and support given to me by Mrs King, the CASSA team, the Principal, Dr Ken Darvall, the General Manager, Mrs Cecilia Ajavon-Oppan and Dept. General Manager Mrs Frances Ajavon-Okudzeto, the management of the school. The year I joined TIS as a part time instructor was the same year the school was licensed to deliver the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award programme. Mrs King encouraged me to sign up as due to my age, I was eligible to participate in the gold award level, and in 2019, I was part of the first 21 gold award holders from TIS who received their award at the Jubilee House from the award patron, His Excellence Nana Akuffo Addo. Little did I know from that day my life would change so much for the better. Today, I am happy to be in the position of encouraging not only students, but also young staff in TIS to enrol in the Award Programme.

Well done to all TIS Dukies who participated in the 100 Challenge to raise funds to support young people in our community to enrol in the Award Programme. Thanks to you, Tema International School is able to sponsor the participation of 10 young adults from the Ashaiman Municipality. These young adults have been enrolled in all levels of the award programme and are most eager to take on the challenge of the awards programme. Ladies and gentlemen we have some of them with us


Such achievements have not been possible withouth the support of our Principal, his passion for experiential learning, excellence and endless support to his staff and students for making the journey worthwhile.

### **DoEIA Alumni CORNER**


A Gold Award holder Maame Kyei an IB class of 2020 shared with us how ready he is for change, a new normal and our new world with the help of the Duke of Edinburgh International Award scheme.

"I started the Duke of Edinburgh program in 2018, my second semester of IB 1. I had several enriching experiences: a week-long camping trip, a chance to document the skills I was acquiring, and ways to service the school community through drawing lessons. Overall, getting an education outside of the school walls it at the core of the Duke of Edinburgh philosophy. One learns how to build up character outside of academics. For example, on the camping trip, I had to learn to canoe a boat for the very first time. While inside, my canoe partner and I had to consistently push the water out in order to avoid sinking, and we also had to balance each other out to avoid capsizing. This is one of the many Duke of Edinburgh experiences that taught me to adapt to new and possibly scary situations, and also the value of looking out for others. The biggest new and scary situation in current times is definitely the novel coronavirus. We have to learn to change our habits and maneuver daily activities in ways we never have before. We also have to think about the livelihoods of those around us, including strangers, by keeping up hygiene and wearing masks. For me, this has not been an easy transition, but it was made smoother due to the values I learned during the Duke of Edinburgh program." - Maame Kyei (DoEIA Alumni - Gold Award Holder)

"All I can remember was complete darkness and silence. Honestly, at that point in time, I thought I was dead, but I imagined Heaven to be a more beautiful sight". This is an excerpt from my DoEIA reflection when I tried to get the kayak off my head during the capsize drill. Just like how I felt terrified to participate in the capsize drill, I am sure most of you were filled with a similar emotion of fear when Covid-19 disrupted our normal schedules. Suddenly, so many restrictions were placed on us ranging from wearing masks to social distancing and a ban on international travel. Many people thought we were doomed and that life would never be the same. However, as a Gold DoEIA recipient, I embraced these challenging times as an opportunity to develop myself and be part of the revolutionary campaigns that will improve our society. Partaking in the DoEIA Gold award takes you out of your comfort zone. Before DoEIA, I would have never imagined abseiling from a cliff or partaking in a four-day residential trip at Akorlikope. All the aforementioned activities improved my confidence and risk-taking abilities. These attributes were evident during my time in quarantine when I joined an NGO by the name Future Majority. As the communications lead, I helped set up a virtual town hall including city councillors, MP's and residents of the city to discuss issues ranging from Racial injustice to Mental health. Moreover, I partook in the Black Lives Matter protest on the streets of Mississauga for Justice on behalf of George Floyd and also to speak against systemic racism within Canadian institutions. I contributed to these protests and awareness campaigns against systemic racism because the DoEIA scheme teaches you to place service to your community above your comfort.

In conclusion, the Duke of Edinburgh award program may seem daunting like when I tried to get the kayak over my head during the capsize drill but I can assure you that T.I.S. will provide enough resources to help you obtain your award. If there is anything this Pandemic has taught us, it should be that life is not certain. As a Duke of Edinburgh award recipient, this does not scare you because you will overcome so many challenges and unfamiliar situations in order to obtain your award." – Alistair Kirk IB Class of 2019 (Gold Award holder)





Participating in the stimulating and exciting 18-months long program known as the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award was Gods way of preparing me for the future. In terms of involvement, I had to go on expeditions; to an island and a forest that was definitely the most difficult and amusing element. Having no communication with the outside world, sleeping outside with unstable weather, enabled me to become more open-minded. Therefore, when the pandemic occurred leading to a lockdown, adaptation was natural due to the adaptive skills I had learned from the camp. I didn't need to panic like everyone else.

Really, living in my home's comfort appeared to me to be less of a struggle than surviving in the forest. I decided to manipulate my quarantine to the max. During the program, I learnt various skills and with the knowledge of learning skills, it has made it easier to learn even more skills to keep me busy. It was certainly a breeze to arrange my life. 








The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award program is about empowering young learners to develop lifelong skills through the variety of experiential activities we offer here at Tema International School.
