From the Horse's Own Mouth



Every student has their area of interest when learning about an area in my Grade 5 class. Students can explore different aspects of the subject based on their interests. For instance, in the art unit, students explore different arts such as sculpture, ceramics, painting and

graffiti. Even though they are all writing a biography, they get to write about the person they prefer. My students are always intrinsically motivated to complete their work because of student agency, where they take ownership of their learning.

In pursuing a more practical and creative approach to learning, drama and dance have proven to be effective tools. As an educator, I facilitate a production conference with my learners to encourage ownership of their learning, in which we explore various theatre ideas. Additionally, I allow students to design their dance routines for performance.

Throughout this process, I guide students in developing creative concepts that are both visually appealing and relevant to the unit of inquiry being studied. (Mr Dennis Dzah -







Drama & Dance)





My class has been learning about machines and how much our lives have changed with their evolution. During the art lessons, we have had collaborative sessions with Grade 4 to develop models that combine concepts in energy and the use of machines. We have found great value in these sessions. The exchange of information has aided the understanding of concepts and the construction of new meanings among learners. Words like "forces" and "energy" are now used with scientific awareness. (Mr. Owusu – Grade 3)



I mostly start by asking them what they know about the unit, what they think they can learn in French or what they want to learn. I asked them about the genres they think will suit the unit like paragraph writing, poem, song, grammar and vocabulary. With vocabulary, I plan, but I also invite them to look for new words. We then look at constructing sentences. They can pick any nouns or verbs they find to form their sentences. With the poem, I guide them with an exemplar, and they also write their lines. (Ms. Ruth - French)

Our Mandarin class sometimes starts with an open-ended question, where students research, investigate, share their findings, and reflect on their learning. This activity may be based on the Mandarin characters or pinyin for new vocabulary on the unit of inquiry; learners develop their writing skills and speaking of the language as they find new information. Also, during class, learning occurs through structured and guided inquiries, where learners develop their ability to learn more about this tonal language. We play a lot of online videos on specific topics, and learners use Google Translate and Reverso to gain new information as they work on their tasks. Mandarin lessons have always opened a room for inquiring. (Mr. Merveil – Mandarin)





Learner agency means students taking an active and responsible role in their learning, making decisions and developing essential 21st-century skills. To promote learner agency, students need choices and voice, allowing them to decide what they learn, how they learn it, which resources they use and how to share their learning. Teachers can offer choices about topics, learning demonstrations, and resources, increasing student engagement and ownership. This approach leads to more meaningful learning experiences.

In preparation for a recent grade 6 unit assembly, learners were tasked with coming up with their presentations to show the different art forms. This awesome opportunity allowed students to choose their favourite art form to express their ideas. They showcased thought-provoking poetry, creative drawings, heart-stirring music performances, and even some groovy dance moves. That's only part of it - they even showed off the artistic side of sports! By allowing students to explore their creativity, they could take control of their learning and put on an unforgettable show for all to see. (Mr. Saviour - Grade 6)







Collaboration is crucial to effective communication and problem-solving, so I prioritise fostering a collaborative environment in my classroom by leading as an example. By sitting with my students and working together as a team to solve problems, I encourage them to be open-minded and strengthen their relationships with their peers. These practices have significantly improved how they work with their friends and contribute to a positive classroom dynamic. Collaborating with my young learners is always rewarding because they have fantastic ideas to share. (Ms. Comfort - K3)





"aha Moment"

Learning in my K3 class has been a joyous journey where students can make personal connections to the learning and take very authentic actions with the application of agency. Sometimes I marvel at the beauty of such authentic learning. This week, as the class delved into the theme of responsible citizenship and continued their exploration of the "How We Organize Ourselves" unit with a specific focus on cities, some students brought back interesting applications from home; this particular one caught the entire class's attention. The student here put the parents, specifically the father, on the spot when he caught him littering a water bottle. He cautioned the father to ensure such bottles were in the trash can. On second thought, he thought he could recycle the water bottle by using it to make a car toy, to be precise. One other student talked about the broken water bottle he intended to turn and use as a pen holder. Such authentic action is truly an exemplification of real learning having taken place, and listening to such feedback gives me great satisfaction as a homeroom teacher.

As a second-grade teacher, I am currently leading my students in exploring the "HOW THE WORLD WORKS" unit, focusing on understanding how people can utilise the properties of air and water more effectively. We have conducted experiments and integrated math lessons into our transdisciplinary approach. I am preparing my students for an upcoming field trip to a water treatment plant to enhance our inquiry-based learning approach and provide practical experience on water purification and production companies. I believe this will foster a deeper appreciation for the practical applications of our learning.

Engaging in various learning activities makes learning fun and authentic

As homeroom teachers, we were delighted to have a parent visit our classroom this week to discuss the significance of family celebrations and values. Before the visit, our students took the lead in creating essential agreements and a list of activities to guide the interview process. The session was informative for our students and gave us insight into the family dynamics and traditions of our student's households. We were impressed by the value the family places on their celebrations, and it was rewarding to see our students gaining a deeper appreciation for the importance of family in their lives. As a teacher, I strive to create a classroom environment where every student feels respected and valued. I encourage my students to share their ideas and opinions on issues arising from our units of inquiry and ensure that every student has an opportunity to contribute. By keeping an open mind and accepting each individual's input, my class can collaborate effectively and incorporate learners' responses into our collaborative tasks. I believe this approach fosters critical thinking skills and helps build a strong sense of community and mutual respect among my students. (Ms. Agartha - K3)







Our Grade 1 students' development in the learner agency was a sight to behold as they confidently shared their ideas and understanding of sound sources, uses, and types. After their impressive research and presentations, the students received feedback through a constructive evaluation process, including self-assessment, peer, and teacher evaluation. Witnessing such growth and progress left us amazed and proud as class teachers.

Encouraging talking is one strategy that helps bring out creativity among students. Mostly in composing songs with learners, I allow them to engage in group discussions where they put lyrics together using their thinking skills. During the group discussion, I play background music with some beats, which helps guide them on how to come up with their melodies. Another way to bring out their creativity is by playing various melodies in different time signatures or on the beat. This helps them think critically about infusing words they have gathered in time with the beat. It's wonderful to witness my students' impressive skills as they create songs across various music genres.


In Grade 4, I use various strategies to differentiate instruction for students with diverse learning needs. As a homeroom teacher, I simplified instructions for students who need extra support. I also break down complex concepts into smaller, more manageable parts and provide hands-on activities to help my students understand the material better. For students ready for a challenge, I provide extension activities that allow them to go deeper into the topic and explore it in more detail. Additionally, I offer small group instruction and one-on-one conferencing opportunities to provide targeted support for individual students. By using these strategies, I can ensure that all students in my class have access to quality instruction and can demonstrate their learning in a way that works best for them.

An "aha" moment in class

While discussing the difference between renewable and non-renewable resources, one of my grade 4 students suddenly had an "aha" moment. They realised that while non-renewable resources like coal and oil can be used up and eventually run out, renewable resources like solar and wind power can be constantly replenished. The student made a connection between their understanding of the concept of sustainability and the importance of using renewable resources for a better future. It was truly a rewarding experience to see my student gain a deeper understanding of the topic and its impact on our environment. (Ms. Priscilla - Grade 4)







However, because of the Covid-19 pandemic, they could not raise sufficient funds for Benjamin.

Benjamin has been waiting for his surgery for about 2 years, and each day that goes by, his condition becomes more regressive. He was diagnosed with Tetralogy of Fallot, a congenital heart defect that affects the structure of the heart and the flow of blood through it.

Tetralogy of Fallot can cause oxygen-poor blood to be pumped from the heart to the rest of the body, leading to many other life-threatening effects.

This project aims to raise funds for Benjamin, who desperately needs life-saving surgery. His mother, a single parent, cannot afford the surgery and has reached out to **The Children's Heart Foundation Ghana** for help. We believe that everyone deserves a chance at a healthy life, and we want to do our part to help Benjamin receive the medical care he needs. That's why we have re-launched **Healthy Heart: Healthy Live**, a fundraising campaign to help cover the cost of his surgery.

In collaboration with **The Children's Heart Foundation Ghana**, we aim to raise awareness about congenital heart disorders and encourage our school community to donate towards this cause.



SaniFlush is a CAS project initiated to aid the Ashaiman No. 2 JHS with a modernized, functioning washroom system, and the members are a group of DP1/G11 students of Tema International School: Gregory Fokou Kotang, Papa Fynn, Bradley Hoedoafia, Kow Yarney, Nadeem Yakubu, Odasey Tetteh, and Malcolm Enimil Ashun.

We are determined to solve a pressing problem in our community and found an opportunity to make a difference at Ashaiman No.2 JHS. After interviewing the headmistress, we learned that the school needed a larger student-to-washroom ratio. The deteriorating condition of the washrooms had health implications for the students and harmed their overall learning experience. The lack of clean and safe washroom facilities made it difficult for students to attend school regularly, as they were more prone to falling ill and required time off to recover. This interrupted their academic progress and could lead to poorer academic performance. Additionally, the lack of adequate washroom facilities created a sense of discomfort and unease among the students, which affected their concentration and focus during class. This could ultimately lead to a decline in their academic performance and achievement. The poor condition of the washrooms had far-reaching consequences on the health and well-being of the students, as well as their academic success, highlighting the urgent need for renovation and improvement. Also, most children lacked appropriate toilet facilities at home, causing them to defecate outside the school. Due to the poor toilet facilities, even though we wore masks during the interview, the smell from the washrooms lingered about a kilometer away, showing the severity of the situation.



After surveying the area, a professional plumber presented a budget. We needed to raise approximately GHC 28,000 to cover renovating the washrooms. So far, through Expression sales, we have managed to raise GHC 7, 600

Our project aims to address several UN SDG Goals, including Good Health and Well-Being, Clean Water and Sanitation, Industry, Innovation, Infrastructure, and Life on Land. We believe that by undertaking this project, we can make a meaningful contribution towards creating a sustainable future for the community, improving people's lives, and protecting the environment around us. 



With the high cost of living in Ghana, she can barely meet the children's needs as they come. She also mentioned that she has some brilliant children who come to her place to get support




to go to school. Some are doing so well in school despite their challenges. She also hopes they can be sponsored to go through education and maybe even go to university and have better opportunities in life.

Reflecting on the DoEIA Expedition Camp

I noticed there were numerous trees and undeveloped areas all over the camp. One of the things I took away from camping was the understanding that you can never predict what will happen next in life. You have no control over the challenges you will face. It became abundantly clear while we were helplessly wandering around in the middle of nowhere in search of shelter. Nobody could have ever imagined that the next thing that would happen



to us would be standing in the rain, but unfortunately, life isn't always straightforward and laid out on a silver platter. Because I had to finish the remaining distance by myself after my kayak capsized and my partner got saved, I concluded that kayaking was one of my strong points. I also showed perseverance throughout the process. Keeping a positive mindset would be one of my areas for personal improvement since there was a period in my life when I was on the verge of giving up, but because I persisted, I made it through. I need to improve to steer clear of negativity in general. My stamina was one of the difficulties I had to overcome. Due to a long period of inactivity and the fact that I hadn't worked out or engaged in any physical activities before attending the camp, my performance there suffered significantly. It was a factor as to why I became exhausted so quickly. Next time, I will have to participate in more frequent physical activities. When faced with challenges, always try to find a way around them. My ability to swim was one of my skills that came in handy. It was crucial because when my kayak overturned, I was fortunate to be able to swim, which made it much easier for me to move around and maintain my composure without becoming



overly anxious. Because everyone at the camp is required to interact and work effectively together during the entire camp, which makes it more engaging, and in addition to that, especially when physical fitness is a barrier for an individual, it is tougher to finish the activities, the activities were very engaging and challenging. The experience at the camp showed me that I am highly committed to achieving the goals and objectives that I set for myself and that once I set my mind to anything, nothing will stop me from achieving it. When I was standing in the rain, even though it was unpleasant at the time, I realised how breathtakingly beautiful nature was. 

The Francelia hostel party was all right. It was a good experience for me. Also, the hype impacted me positively. **-Enam Gborglah, Grade 9**



The Academic Research & Writing Principles

Turnitin has developed this checklist as a guide to support students in their academic research and writing process. Use the 12 suggested guiding principles to help you to produce high quality research and original writing, from the pre-reading stage to final submission.

1

Explore

a wide range of research. Research the topic thoroughly to develop your knowledge base, discover new ideas and strengthen your own line of argument.

2

Evaluate

the reliability of your sources. Take some time to evaluate all your sources, particularly if information has been accessed online. Consider who has created the information and why.

3

Organise

your research notes.
Note taking is a fundamental
part of the research process.
Keep notes neatly organised
and retain a copy of each
source used.

4

Write

an original paper.

The best defence against plagiarism is original writing. Unless quoting directly from someone else's work, express all ideas in your own words.

5

Paraphrase

other people's ideas.
An essential academic skill, some find it helpful to note down key words and concepts before paraphrasing other people's ideas.

6

Differentiate

other's work from your own original insights by referencing or paraphrasing. Avoid accidentally plagiarising someone else's work by using academic referencing. 7

all of your sources.
A citation in your paper shows exactly what information has come from another source. Remember to cite all borrowed words or ideas, including those which came from one of your own previous papers!

8

Reference

all of your citations correctly. Depending on the referencing system used, this may end in a list of sources as a 'bibliography'. Most students are aware of referencing requirements surrounding books and journals, but we must also reference sources like YouTube videos, images, diagrams and yourself!

9

Use

the relevant referencing system consistently throughout your assignment. Referencing can vary across module units or each course so check which system you should use and follow the relevant formatting guidelines.

1C

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your teacher or instructor for their feedback on

any drafts you have written in advance of the deadline. Writing multiple drafts and implementing the feedback you receive can help to make you a better writer.

11

Double check

your work including citations. Allow time to double check each of your citations before submission. This includes page numbers, publication dates, web links and authors' names.

12

Submit your final piece through Turnitin

Turnitin will check your work against other sources in the Turnitin database and use this information to generate an originality report.

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



- 3. TROUBLESHOOT sending large attachments and a variety of file types.
- 4. **SET** norms and expectations within any group setting.
- 5. **ARTICULATE** their ideas comfortably and show empathy for other students' perspectives and points of view.
- 6. **DETERMINE** their own signature strengths and advocate for specific roles.
- 7. **ASSESS** the effectiveness of their own (and their peers') participation and involvement within the group.
- 8. **CREATE** an agenda and maintain a project timeline.
- 9. **ORGANIZE** content so it is interesting, informative, and memorable for their peers.
- 10. Effectively **SELECT**, **LOCATE**, and **INTEGRATE** images and icons as visual cues that complement their content.
- 11. **SELECT** the best application to deliver their content.
- 12. **PUBLISH** and provide purposeful content for a variety of authentic audiences.
- 13. LOCATE and UTILIZE appropriately licensed images.
- 14. **PROTECT** their own work and images using a variety of methods and tools.
- 15. **CREATE** and **MAINTAIN** a digital portfolio and resume.
- 16. **REFLECT** on individual learning artifacts as well as their process of learning.
- 17. **PROVIDE** effective formative feedback to their peers and their work.
- 18. **BE AWARE** that social media is only one aspect of a person's life and can oftentimes be distorted.
- 19. **LEVERAGE** social media to share authentic learning artifacts.
- 20. UTILIZE curation as a way to digest and distill information.

Open Book Exam pilot

What to expect

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. The intention of these OBE formats is to relieve students of the need to recall specific details and to focus on the application of knowledge.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking the open book exam format as part of the study.

- 1. Normal exam procedures will apply. Students cannot bring in digital devices and other unpermitted materials.
- 2. Students must maintain academic integrity as normal.
- 3. Inclusive access arrangements will still apply as normal.
- 4. All students in the subject will sit the exam in the format assigned to the school.
- 5. Students will sit the same exam as all other students, the only difference to the exam is that students can bring in the permitted resource as outlined in the guidance.
- 6. The allowed resources are designed to maintain consistency of standards across participating schools.
- 7. IB will ensure that the grades for students doing open book and the standard exam are aligned, and that there is equity across groups.
- 8. Students with consent will be invited to complete surveys throughout the DP course. Completing surveys is voluntary but encouraged because it contributes greatly to the success of this study.
- 9. The outcomes of the study will contribute to IB decisions on future offerings of OBE format.


