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



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LEARNING LANGUAGES

From a TIS Transdisciplinary Pespective

Language is a structured communication system governed by rules, including patterns for words, sounds, and sentences. While people learn languages in many ways, applying a transdisciplinary approach can be effective. At TIS Primary School, language learning supports students' conceptual development and critical thinking through diverse approaches catering to their needs and interests. The school follows the IB Primary Years Programme (PYP) and believes that language teaching should be responsive to students' previous experiences. Collaborative brainstorming among teachers helps plan adequate learning experiences that follow the school's language scopes and sequences.

This article explores TIS Primary School's transdisciplinary approach to language learning, covering languages such as English, Mandarin, French, Sign Language, and Mother Tongue.

Teaching Mandarin through Music

Language and music share many similarities in their acoustics, structure, and frequent use in social contexts. Learning language through music can be effective, as it simplifies grammar rules, pronunciation, and vocabulary through the excitement of singing songs. This is particularly evident in how we teach children foreign languages, where we often use songs to teach them letters, numbers, colours, and other basic concepts, which they remember even after many years.

Teaching Mandarin Chinese to children has been enjoyable due to its tonal nature. For example, learning to read Nǐ hǎo 你好 creates a singing-like atmosphere for mastering word pronunciation using pinyin. We have employed multiple approaches, including music, to support effective and efficient learning in our classrooms. At TIS Primary School, learners engage in class collaboration and inquiry-based learning experiences to create Mandarin songs. They translate English words into Mandarin using resources such as Google Translate, Reverso, and teacher support. Students learn, inquire, reflect, and develop their language knowledge through this process. Below are pictures of the Mandarin song creation process.



Learning French

Bonjour! At TIS Primary School, learning French is an enjoyable experience. Students engage in various activities, such as writing poems, paragraphs, and plays in French and learning through songs. With the guidance of their teacher, learners even strive to write their lyrics. The teaching and learning of French are approached through a transdisciplinary lens, allowing students to connect what they learn in French with other subjects. This helps them connect the units of inquiry, other subjects, and French, resulting in a more holistic understanding of the language.

Grade 3 students are exploring machines as part of their inquiry, and their French vocabulary is being expanded. By learning the names of common household appliances in French, the students can describe them accurately in the language. Not only does this exercise help them to develop their French language skills, but it also contributes to their understanding of topic. The students can




now compose paragraphs in French that demonstrate their knowledge of both the language and the subject matter. Through these connections between disciplines, they can engage with the material more deeply, gaining a greater appreciation for what they are learning.

Following their inquiry into machines, the students expanded their French language skills by learning frequently used verbs related to the topic. They worked collaboratively to compose a poem titled, "Ma machine préférée", which translates to "My favourite machine" in English. This exercise allowed the students to creatively express their knowledge of the French language and the subject matter they had been studying.



In Grade 2, students are studying the unit, "How the world works", focusing on water and air. To enhance their French language skills, they were assigned to find adjectives could be used to describe these elements. The adjectives were then used as lyrics for their unit song, which they created collaboratively. This exercise not only helped the students learn new French vocabulary but also helped them to understand the characteristics of air and



water more comprehensively.

In Grade 1, students studied the characteristics of light sound. Drawing on their knowledge of the unit, they composed a French poem. This exercise helped them learn how to structure sentences accurately and present their work effectively by creating a visually appealing poster. The use of illustrations allowed the students to express their ideas more clearly and develop language skills more engagingly and imaginatively.



Learning Sign Language

Learning sign language at TIS Primary School helps learners develop a bank of vocabulary in addition to what they have already acquired. This enables learners to apply their knowledge when learning other languages by recalling the signs and relating them to the new vocabulary learned. They can translate words and sign sentences through role-play and easily recall sentences. Learners also work with their teachers to create music using sign language, and sign poems, use gestures in drama, and apply their vocabulary when learning other languages, encouraging transdisciplinary learning across all subjects.







We are excited to introduce our CAS Project, Healthy Heart: Healthy Life. Our team, led by Nana Aba Egyei-Mensah, Seffirina Masoperh, Kwadwo Adubofour, and Mawulolo Agbeli, is passionate about making a change in our community. This initiative was started in 2021 by Tema International School (TIS) Alumni Jano Attionu, Madiba Gondoe, David Safo and Caleb Hammond (IB Class of 2022). However, due to the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic, they could not raise sufficient funds for Benjamin.

Benjamin has been waiting for his surgery for about 2 years, and each day that goes by, his condition becomes more regressive. He was diagnosed with Tetralogy of Fallot, a congenital heart defect that affects the structure of the heart and the flow of blood through it.

Tetralogy of Fallot can cause oxygen-poor blood to be pumped from the heart to the rest of the body, leading to many other life-threatening effects.

This project aims to raise funds for Benjamin, who desperately needs life-saving surgery. His mother, a single parent, cannot afford the surgery and has reached out to **The Children's Heart Foundation Ghana** for help. We believe that everyone deserves a chance at a healthy life, and we want to do our part to help Benjamin receive the medical care he needs. That's why we have re-launched **Healthy Heart: Healthy Life**, a fundraising campaign to help cover the cost of his surgery.



SaniFlush is a CAS project initiated to aid the Ashaiman No. 2 JHS with a modernised, functioning washroom system, and the members are a group of DP1/G11 students of Tema International School: Gregory Fokou Kotang, Papa Duodu Fynn, Bradley Hoedoafia, Kow Yarney, Nadeem Yakubu, Odasey Tetteh, and Malcolm Enimil Ashun.

We are determined to solve a pressing problem in our community and found an opportunity to make a difference at Ashaiman No.2 JHS. After interviewing the headmistress, we learned that the school needed a larger student-to-washroom ratio. The deteriorating condition of the washrooms had health implications for the students and hurt their overall learning experience. The lack of clean and safe washroom facilities made it difficult for students to attend school regularly, as they were more prone to falling ill and required time off to recover. This interrupted their academic progress and could lead to poorer academic performance. Additionally, the lack of adequate washroom facilities created a sense of discomfort and unease among the students, which affected their concentration and focus during class. This could ultimately lead to a decline in their academic performance and achievement. The poor condition of the washrooms had far-reaching consequences on the health and well-being of the students, as well as their academic success, highlighting the urgent need for renovation and improvement. Also, most children lacked appropriate toilet facilities at home, causing them to defecate outside the school. Due to the poor toilet facilities, even though we wore masks during the interview, the smell from the washrooms lingered about a kilometer away, showing the severity of the situation.



After surveying the area, a professional plumber presented a budget. We needed to raise approximately GHC 28,000 to cover the cost of renovating the washrooms. So far through Expression sales we manage to raise GHC 7, 600

Our project aims to address several UN SDG Goals, including Good Health and Well-Being, Clean Water and Sanitation, Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure, and Life on Land. We believe that by undertaking this project, we can make a meaningful contribution towards creating a sustainable future for the community, improving people's lives, and protecting the environment around us. By aligning with the UN SDG goals, we hope to inspire others to join us in our efforts and help create a more equitable and sustainable world for future generations.

appropriate environment. We are starting with HopeSetters as we both have a long history of collaboration with them and they are in the vicinity of our school. Gradually, as the initiative grows, we will expand our efforts to the Greater Accra region and eventually Ghana as a whole.





to school. Some are doing so well in school despite their challenges. She also hopes they can be sponsored to go through education and maybe even go to University and have better opportunities in life.



Open Book Exam pilot

DP Economics

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. In this case your school will be piloting an OBE in the DP Economics paper 1 exam.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking this exam at your school.

- 1. Students will be sitting the exact same paper but will be allowed to prepare and bring in a maximum of 2 A4 pages summarizing real-world examples that students may use in the exam.
- 2. Student summaries will be allowed to be either in the format of mind maps or short written summaries for each real-world example up to a maximum of 60 words per example and approximately 1200 words in total.
- 3. Students may use a combination of both mind-maps and written summaries.
- 4. Written or digital versions of their resources are allowed but written is recommended.
- 5. If students choose to write their resource, this must be legible.
- 6. Students must not include definitions of terminology, explanations of concepts and theories, nor any analysis or evaluation.
- 7. Students will not be allowed to include visuals including tables, figures, or diagrams.
- 8. Different colours will be allowed, as well as bullet points and acronyms.
- 9. Students will be allowed to include details of real-world examples not in their resource should they wish.
- 10. Student resources will need to be checked at least 1 month before the exam.

Open Book Exam pilot

What to expect

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. The intention of these OBE formats is to relieve students of the need to recall specific details and to focus on the application of knowledge.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking the open book exam format as part of the study.

- 1. Normal exam procedures will apply. Students cannot bring in digital devices and other unpermitted materials.
- 2. Students must maintain academic integrity as normal.
- 3. Inclusive access arrangements will still apply as normal.
- 4. All students in the subject will sit the exam in the format assigned to the school.
- 5. Students will sit the same exam as all other students, the only difference to the exam is that students can bring in the permitted resource as outlined in the guidance.
- 6. The allowed resources are designed to maintain consistency of standards across participating schools.
- 7. IB will ensure that the grades for students doing open book and the standard exam are aligned, and that there is equity across groups.
- 8. Students with consent will be invited to complete surveys throughout the DP course. Completing surveys is voluntary but encouraged because it contributes greatly to the success of this study.
- 9. The outcomes of the study will contribute to IB decisions on future offerings of OBE format.



DP2 Parents and Students - Visa Application Processes for the following Countries



With the high numbers of students applying for visas to study abroad it is important to consider these pointers and apply early to avoid dissapointments:



- ✓ You can apply for a Tier 4 (General) student visa to study in the UK if you're 16 or over & you:
- ✓ Have been offered a place on a course, can speak, read, write and understand English
- ✓ Have enough money to support yourself and pay for your course the amount will vary.
 - Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS letter)


Your chosen university will send you a reference number called a 'Confirmation of Acceptance' for Studies (CAS) once they've offered you a place on a course. You'll need to enter this on your visa application.

You must apply for your visa at most 6 months after you receive the CAS.

- >> You can apply for the visa no earlier than 3 months before start of your course
- >> You can arrive in the UK up to 1 month before your course starts if your course lasts more than 6 months:

- ✓ >> You can apply for accommodation while you wait for your IB results. Without results you cannot apply for UK visa Documents you must provide when you apply for the visa include:
- ✓ A current passport or other valid travel documentation
- ✓ Proof that you can support yourself and pay for your course (bank statements)- this will vary depending on your circumstances
- ✓ Proof of parental or other legal guardian consent if you're under 18
- ✓ Proof of your relationship with your parent or guardian
- ✓ Your tuberculosis test results if you're from a country where you have to take the test (Right after exams. There is only one centre that does the test) https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/tuberculosis-test-for-a-uk-visa-clinics-in-ghana/tuberculosis-testing-in-ghana
- ✓ You need a page in your passport that's blank on both sides for your visa.
- ✓ **You may also need to provide additional documents depending on your circumstance

CANADA Visa Application Process

- ✓ **Best time to apply is NOW!** Canadian visa application process is lengthy and cumbersome.
- ✓ The Process can take 4-5 months! You may have to take have some medical screening/tests done, check with your university!
- ✓ Make sure that if you are applying on OUAC portal submit and accept the decision from the school.
- ✓ Immediately you receive your offer or admission letter from the school use the letter to start the application process as soon as possible.
- ✓ It would be best if you had a valid passport, and other documents such as proof of sufficient funds et cetera.
- ✓ Note that Admission Offer Acceptance Deadline!

- ✓ You will need a valid I-20, an acceptance letter which says congratulations, and receipt of payment of the SEVIS Fee. Request for an I-20 from your U.S. University, and sign the student portion.
- ✓ Academic documents to show you are a bonafide student- transcript, MYP results, SAT/ACT score report

Take Smarter Notes

What's the best way to take notes? This, I'd argue, is the wrong question to ask.

A focus on note-taking assumes that the goal is creating a document. But having a nice piece of paper is useless if it doesn't contribute to the learning that goes on in your head.

Any learning strategy should aim to increase the amount of knowledge absorbed in the learning process. Here notes can help, and they can hurt.


How Notes Help

Good note-taking forces you to pay attention. It's easy to have your attention wander and not realize it. However, when you're taking physical notes, the writing activity encourages you to pay attention.

This, and not the document the notes produce, is the primary benefit. Having nicely written notes is of secondary importance in assisting you in reviewing and studying the material later. This document should only be your primary concern in classes where you expect to spend many multiples of the lecture time actively studying the material.

How Notes Hurt

Note-taking can become a distraction, however. Consider verbatim note-taking, where students seek to transcribe nearly everything a lecturer says. What's going on when you do this?




For starters, not a lot of thinking. Keeping up with the lecturer's speech while typing uses up most of your capacity. Since you're copying things mostly as they are said, you don't need to process the material for meaning, just copy it down. Handwritten note-takers performer better than those using computers partly because the former can't keep up with verbatim copying and have to process the material as they go.

How to Take Better Notes

Here are a few simple rules for taking better notes:

1. Paraphrase, Don't Transcribe




Strive to frame the lecturer's words in your own words. Avoid copying down whole sentences unless the explicit goal is to memorize them later. Paraphrasing forces you to focus on understanding the meaning of what is being said, which will be better for memory later.

2. Note Misunderstandings



In difficult classes, there will be tons that you don't grok immediately. Note these moments and questions as they arise. For videos, I tend to jot down the timestamp of my confusion to follow up on later. In live classes, make a note about questions so you can ask a peer or professor.

3. Ask Questions



Another good strategy is to reframe content presented in terms of the questions that might be asked about it. This is particularly effective for identifying the main principles being discussed rather than just the details.

For instance, a good question for this lesson would be, "Why can note-taking hurt your learning?" Asking, "What was point #2 that Scott made in this lesson?" may be easy to write now. But it is not a good question because it's tough to answer later and doesn't force you to think about the main points when framing the question.

The value of writing questions is twofold. First, it allows you to think in terms of the main message. It's easy to get stuck on details and ignore the main points in a lecture. Yet the questions you're likely to be asked will be about the main topics—not random factoids. Even when facts are important, they are easier to remember when you've mastered the central theme.

Second, questions can serve as recall practice prompts later. Some note-taking methods, such as the <u>Cornell Method</u>, make this tool explicit by keeping separate a third of the page for questions. This lets you cover the actual notes, but not the prompting questions, during retrieval practice.

Well-being Assembly: "Preparing for Exams"

The wellbeing department organised a group session facilitated by an alumnus of Tema International School (T.I.S), Dr. Brown. Dr. Brown graduated from TIS in 2016 to pursue Medicine at the University of Ghana Medical School.

He shared his experiences and insights from his time as a student of the institution. Dr. Brown touched on various learning strategies and techniques to improve efficiency in learning.

Dr. Brown provided a comprehensive overview of techniques to adopt in revisions prior to exams (group discussions, identifying varying questions in past papers) and also techniques during the exams (reading through questions carefully to identify command terms, elimination strategies in multiple-choice questions, and principles of educated guesses).

Dr. Brown finally touched on having adequate sleep and food to keep their bodies replenished before and during the course of examinations.

The students were engaged throughout the session, testing out their knowledge in tackling IB-style questions and receiving instant feedback and advice from Dr. Brown.

During the Q and A session, students asked diverse on exam preparations. These included:

1. Can we come for help to deal with stress?

Dr. Brown: Yes, the wellness department is ready to help you deal with stress.

2. How am I supposed to learn if I keep falling asleep?

Dr. Brown: If you keep falling asleep, it could suggest that you're not resting enough, in which case I suggest you rest some more.

If you are resting enough but happen to find yourself still falling asleep, you can consider some of these strategies:

- A. Drinking Coffee/Caffeinated Drinks (Long-term dependence on coffee/caffeinated drinks can have adverse effects on health, so I would encourage caution with the intake of coffee)
- B. Taking very minty/peppery snacks. This stimulates your sense of taste and can and increases your alertness. It can help increase your attentiveness when you're sleepy.
- 3. How can I handle high expectations and pressure from my parents when I feel like I can't meet them or am not good enough?

Dr. Brown: Most parents do have very high expectations of their children. Sometimes this puts undue pressure on children and adversely affects their productivity. Pointers to handling high expectations from parents:

A. Understand that expectations are coming from a place of love and goodwill. Your parents love you and want you to excel. Their expectations are not backed by malice or hatred; they are an outworking of the love and goodwill they have toward you.

B. Your best response to high expectations is to do your absolute best. Understanding parents will always give their children a pat of encouragement on their backs if they realize that their children did their absolute best yet still did not meet their expectations.

Below are the reflections of some students:

Today's assembly was very informative. I learned how to study for an exam properly and how to set my mind before an exam. -Sybil, Grade 7

This assembly was very interesting and engaging. For once, there was an assembly I could pay attention to and find useful. Before the assembly started, I wondered what one could teach me about exam preparation. However, when the presentation started, I realised that there was a lot I didn't know. I learned about the different study techniques and how to solve past questions. I didn't know how my mentality affected how well I would perform in an exam. Finally, I realised the true importance of sleep when writing exams. I plan to use all these techniques when preparing for my exams in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12. This was an amazing experience, and I would never trade it for anything. - Lois Entsua-Mensah, Grade 8

Today's assembly was very insightful. One thing Dr. Brown said that stood out to me was reading over past test questions. I will implement this in preparation for my E-Assessment, as I have much to read over by looking at and solving past summatives. - **Ebenezer Agyeman**, **Grade 9**

This assembly was very different from others because the speaker advised us on balancing our time while preparing for exams. The speaker, Dr. Nana Kwame Brown, talked to us about possible difficulties we might have encountered while preparing for exams, and I was shocked to see that I could relate to them. This was quite helpful, mainly because our end-of-MYP exams are coming up. He advised us on handling each exam, particularly if it differs from what we had anticipated during revision. One thing I took away from the presentation is that I need to interpret the command terms well, which I needed help with before. -


