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

At this time of year our G12 students complete their exit from TIS. This requires them to return all school items, be removed from the network, among other requirements.


It is always disappointing when students do not know where their textbooks are and are then liable for the replacement costs.

Some even return other students' text books, believing that it belongs to them.


Unfortunately, some/many G12 parents will receive an account after 25 May for the replacement costs for these lost items. Responsibility certainly saves money.

Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical. All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted guring the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approval exeat from their phone to enter (NO SHOW. NO GO!).

Students must return by 5.00pm on Sundays (weekend exeats).

General Exeat

A general exeat will cover passport and visa matters, as well as family events. These must not exceed more than two per mid-semester.

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

CONSTRUCTIVISM

A TIS Primary School Perspective

Learning is fun when it is based on what you are interested in. Boring is a word that is not seen in a child who is well-engaged and poised to learn more. Learning then becomes a lifestyle. With an open mindset, one can take the risk of exploring and gaining in-depth knowledge on a topic of interest. At TIS Primary School, having students at the centre of our learning is an integral part of the learning process. In an environment where constructivism is enabled, learners get to.....



Explore

Exploration is an important part of research since it involves the active search for knowledge, as well as the study of multiple sources. Students at TIS Primary School get to explore through field trips, which are a primary source of information. They fun while have experiencing new things and gathering information based on their learning. One benefit TIS Primary students gain from



exploration is the confidence to explain what they have learned in detail and state clear cut

examples. Through this, our students have improved their research skills, such as observational skills, asking good and relevant questions, keeping information records, and analysing information. The student also gets information from secondary sources like articles and books. They learn to identify the right source of information. This enhances their ability to decide what to add to their learning. Through exploration, TIS Primary School students become creative thinkers.





Collaborate

Collaboration is a strong strategy for improving social skills. When students work together to achieve a similar objective, they must communicate, listen to, and respect each other's perspectives and ideas. This promotes the development of critical social skills, including active listening, effective communication, empathy, and teamwork. Collaboration also enables students to express their ideas, learn from one another, and compromise when necessary. Individuals may practise negotiating, conflict resolution, and problem-solving skills via collaborative efforts, which is essential for managing social circumstances in the learning community. Overall, cooperation can help to improve social skills, establish pleasant connections, and promote a cooperative and inclusive approach to attaining common goals.



At TIS Primary School, small or large group discussions, which include circle time and think pair share, are used to brainstorm and share ideas. Role-play, music and dancing are evidence of collaboration. Kindly plan to attend our next unit celebration and upcoming PYP Exhibition. You will have a chance to view some of our final products of student collaboration.



Analyse

When analysing information, one must examine and assess various points of view, facts, and arguments to gain better knowledge and reach more educated judgments. Second, analysis fosters problem-solving by breaking complicated situations into smaller, more manageable portions. It lets students uncover the core reasons for an issue, experiment with different remedies, and evaluate their success. Finally, analysis fosters creativity by boosting creative thought. Individuals may find gaps, create connections, and produce new ideas by studying existing material from various perspectives. Students at TIS Primary School use different analytical tools to analyse their acquired information. They use pictographs, bar graphs, and experiments to analyse the acquired information. From these analyses, they draw conclusions from their research, increasing their curiosity to learn.

Presentations

At TIS Primary School, students use visual aids, such as slides, charts, and graphics, in presentations to reinforce the information and improve understanding. They use strong verbal communication skills, such as tone, tempo, and speech clarity, which are essential in giving an engaging presentation. During presentations, students develop their communication skills. Communication skills are a dynamic and interactive process that requires active participation with others to gain information and comprehension. Communication skills, such as listening, speaking, reading, and writing, are important tools for effective learning in various ways. Communication skills allow students to express ideas, ask questions, and seek clarification, resulting in a better comprehension of the subject matter. Second, communication skills encourage active

participation in the learning process. Speaking and writing about thoughts and ideas helps people organise their thoughts, reflect on their learning, and convey their understanding comprehensibly. Furthermore, excellent communication skills promote teamwork. These are all evident in the learning and teaching process at TIS Primary School.



The learning environment at TIS Primary Campus encourages students to develop basic skills that promote constructive and engaging learning experiences, which empowers them to become lifelong learners.




CAS Project – SaniFlush

SANIFLUSH CAS PROJECT – WE NEED YOUR HELP.



SaniFlush is a CAS project initiated to aid the Ashaiman No. 2 JHS with a modernized, functioning washroom system, and the members are a group of DP1/G11 students of Tema International School: Gregory Fokou Kotang, Papa Duodu Fynn, Bradley Hoedoafia, Kow Yarney, Nadeem Yakubu, Odassey Tetteh, and Malcolm Enimil Ashun.

We are determined to solve a pressing problem in our community and found an opportunity to make a difference at Ashaiman No.2 JHS. After interviewing the headmistress, we learned that the school needed a larger student-to-washroom ratio. The deteriorating condition of the washrooms had health implications for the students and hurt their overall learning experience. The lack of clean and safe washroom facilities made it difficult for students to attend school regularly, as they were more prone to falling ill and required time off to recover. This interrupted their academic progress and could lead to poorer academic performance. Additionally, the lack of adequate washroom facilities created a sense of discomfort and unease among the students, which affected their concentration and focus during class. This could ultimately lead to a decline in their academic performance and achievement. The poor condition of the washrooms had far-reaching consequences on the health and well-being of the students, as well as their academic success, highlighting the urgent need for renovation and improvement. Also, most children lacked appropriate toilet facilities at home, causing them to defecate outside the school. Due to the poor toilet facilities, even though we wore masks during the interview, the smell from the washrooms lingered about a kilometre away, showing the severity of the situation.



After surveying the area, a professional plumber presented a budget. We needed to raise approximately GHC 28,000 to cover renovating the washrooms. So far, through Expression sales, we have managed to raise GHC 7, 600

Our project aims to address several UN SDG Goals, including **Good Health and Well-Being**, **Clean Water and Sanitation, Industry, Innovation, Infrastructure, and Life on Land**. We believe that by undertaking this project, we can make a meaningful contribution towards creating a sustainable future for the community, improving people's lives, and protecting the environment around us. By aligning with the UN SDG goals, we hope to inspire others to join us in our efforts and help create a more equitable and sustainable world for future generations.



to school. Some are doing so well in school despite their challenges. She also hopes they can be sponsored to go through education and maybe even go to university and have better opportunities in life.



When I first visited, I was scared because I thought they would be aggressive and throw me off them, but this experience has proved me wrong. Adjusting to situations was a skill that came in handy. My takeaway from this experience is that you should try new things. Controlling the horse for the first time was my unforgettable moment. - Samantha Arthur (Grade 9)

I experienced a sense of "freedom" while sitting atop a horse's back. I noticed that horses are calm, but they tend to get angry when they are around chickens. I learnt more about riding and controlling horses. I'll try to be more comfortable with the horse next time. The skill of self-balancing came in handy. Since it had been ten years since I last rode a horse, this was a first for me. I was afraid then, but I've since overcome my fear. With my horse, I had a very laid-back attitude. After I touched and rode a horse, it became my memorable experience. I will join the Equestrian Sports as part of my ASA (after-school activities) from September to December. - Edwin Jonah (Grade 9)

Before horseback riding, I believed that horses were always comfortable with everything. It appeared that it was an uncomfortable situation for the younger horses. I learnt the fundamental way to control a horse's movements. It is about the pressure applied to the head and underbelly of the horse. Once a person understands this system, they can control a horse at a steady pace. I was nervous about the horse's height compared to mine. I'd apply more force to my kicks to make the horse move in that direction next time. I realised that everything requires care and patience after I realised that my patience with the horse seemed unfocused. One of the other participants jumped onto a horse and began screaming out of fear. At the time, it wasn't amusing, but once it was all over, we all laughed about it, and this was a priceless experience. Felix Osei–Amoako (Grade 11)

I learnt how to control a horse. I acquired the fundamental skills to stop and turn a horse left or right. Getting onto the horse was challenging because the saddle was not well positioned, but I was successful with my willpower. I was required to pay close attention to the instructor, so my listening abilities came in handy. An unforgettable moment was when the instructor commended me for effectively executing a left turn. Open Book Exam pilot What to expect

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. The intention of these OBE formats is to relieve students of the need to recall specific details and to focus on the application of knowledge.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking the open book exam format as part of the study.

- 1. Normal exam procedures will apply. Students cannot bring in digital devices and other unpermitted materials.
- 2. Students must maintain academic integrity as normal.
- 3. Inclusive access arrangements will still apply as normal.
- 4. All students in the subject will sit the exam in the format assigned to the school.
- 5. Students will sit the same exam as all other students, the only difference to the exam is that students can bring in the permitted resource as outlined in the guidance.
- 6. The allowed resources are designed to maintain consistency of standards across participating schools.
- 7. IB will ensure that the grades for students doing open book and the standard exam are aligned, and that there is equity across groups.
- 8. Students with consent will be invited to complete surveys throughout the DP course. Completing surveys is voluntary but encouraged because it contributes greatly to the success of this study.
- 9. The outcomes of the study will contribute to IB decisions on future offerings of OBE format.

Work out whether the content is right for your child. It might be around their age or just their personality, but trust your gut and put boundaries in place.



Stay up to date with pop culture. You may not

care about the Bieber's or Beyonce's of this world but following sites like *Pedestrian.tv* and *news.com.au* will help you stay ahead of the game.



Tell them that they don't have to watch something if they don't want to. Brainstorm ways they can say no to their peers and feel confident making their own decisions.



Offer to watch it with them. That way you can talk through anything tough as it comes up. This can be useful even if they've already seen the content.



- Financial Aid Forms specifically needed in the US should be filled early. By November, applications should be submitted for early consideration because of the voluminous applications that universities receive.
- ✓ By applying early in the cycle, students get the benefit of "fresh" admission committees whose uninspired essays and lacklustre presentations have not yet burned out. These applicants leave the impression that they are ready, willing, able to submit their applications, and eager for a response.
- By all standards, students can apply through Early Decision or Early Action, I strongly recommend it. *Early Decision, because it's binding, is only for students who know beyond any doubt that a specific school is for them* – *or Early Action.* ~Mark Gathercole, University Advisor~

VISAS & MORE:

All DP2 students planning to study abroad and require a visa must do the following;

- Early Bird. Be proactive. Plan and book for your visas early with all requisite documents ready to be uploaded to avoid any disappointment. Visit the Embassy of the country of your university's destination or check the requirements online, gather the required documents, check if you are required to take any vaccinations and **APPLY FOR YOUR STUDY PERMIT AND (OR) STUDENT VISA RIGHT AWAY!**
- Ensure that in addition to the total amount of school fees required per year, a substantial amount of money is also reflecting in your parents' bank account. E.g.: For Canada approximately CAD 10,000- CAD 12,000 in addition to school fees per year
- Book a Mock visa interview session with the TIS University Guides, to help you prepare for the interview. Some documents you may need are a copy of your transcript, copy of your SAT/ACT Score report, parents/sponsors bank statement, acceptance letter (congratulations you've been accepted letter), be able to demonstrate ties to your home country.

Country-Specific Requirements:

UK;

- Heard from all your five UK schools on UCAS? Students should log into their UCAS Track and please select your Firm (your first choice school) Insurance (your second choice or safety school), all other offers will be declined.
- You can contact your university to start working on accommodation reservations. Once final IB DP results are out in July, and you meet the conditions for your firm choice, you're in! If not, you get to be considered for your insurance choice as a backup. You have to request for your CAS Letter, the Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies, from your number one university where you intend to enroll and apply for your UK Visa as soon as results are released.
- We can put you in touch with an agent affiliated with the British Council for free credible UK visa application support- reach out to the TIS University Guides.

US;

- Pay your enrollment deposit to your respective university as a commitment to secure your university admission. **Deadline for most enrolment deposits- before** May 1, 2022.
- Request for your I-20 document to be mailed to you as soon as possible, from your number university where you plan to enroll. You cannot apply for the F-1 Student visa without the I-20. This is a document from your U.S. university which confirms that you have been accepted into the school and provides your financial aid offer

information, cost of attendance and other details to help inform the Consular Officer during the visa interview that you are truly intending to study

• Your I-20 includes a SEVIS Number, which you will need, in order to complete the Sevis fee payment (I-901 fee). **Pay for your SEVIS-fee**, once you receive your I-20 from your respective university, complete the U.S. F-1 Student Visa application and book for your visa appointment online. **Sevis fee cost: USD\$350** Sevis fee payment account can be created here: https://www.fmjfee.com/i901fee/index.html

**Sometimes online payment by credit/debit Mastercard or visa card may not work for internationals so you can pay with a U.S. check mailed to the Sevis Fee Courier address in the U.S.:

- NOTE: There tends to be longer queues that build up in June and July. So try and secure a visa appointment date in May.

CANADA;

• Be sure to accept your offer on OUAC or on the university's portal directly to confirm you would be coming.

- Pay the enrolment deposit by May 1st or the specified deadline
- Your school has to send you an admission offer letter with all the details you need to apply for a study permit and student visa, this includes when you intend to commence studies and when you are likely to complete your studies among others. Request for this. Once you have this letter, don't wait, apply for the Study Permit and student visa now!
- Try and book a slot right away by end of April if you can, as the Canadian visa application process can take more than 3-4 months to process sometimes. The earlier the better.

How can students prepare to summarize?

Strong summaries grow from careful reading. Your students can follow this close reading process to help them uncover the main points of written texts:

- 1. **Skim the reading.** Review the title, headings, pictures, graphics, and topic sentences.
- 2. Read the full selection. Don't rush!
- 3. **Take notes and annotate.** To *annotate* means to mark up a text while reading-highlighting, underlining, and writing notes in the margins.
 - Note headings and topic sentences, which often contain main points.
 - Note repeated words or ideas. Authors often say important things several times.
 - Ignore trivial details. Don't write down details that are of little importance. If they are not key to the meaning of the text, do not include them in your notes. Instead, focus on the "big ideas."
- 4. Answer the 5 W's and H questions to make sure you understand the essential information. (Complete this minilesson.)
- 5. Review your notes and answers.
- 6. Reread parts you still don't understand.


