



We have chosen to use this occasion to raise funds for a cause close to our hearts, providing life-changing surgeries to babies born with Anorectal Malformation (ARM).

Anorectal malformation (ARM) is a congenital condition that affects the development of a baby's anus and rectum. This condition can vary in severity, and its effects on infants are often significant. In Ghana, where healthcare resources may be limited in certain areas, understanding the impact of ARM and the cost of surgeries is crucial for parents and healthcare providers alike. This condition can manifest in various ways, with some infants having a complete absence of an anal opening, while others may have a narrow or misplaced anus. This can make it impossible or extremely difficult for the child to pass stool normally. Depending on the specific type and severity of ARM, there can be associated problems, such as urinary incontinence, urinary tract infections, and fertility issues in the future.

Service learning is an integral part of our school community, and we eagerly embrace every opportunity to make a positive impact on the well-being of humanity. It's a core principle that shapes our educational philosophy and the way we engage with the world around us. As a school, we acknowledge the values of compassion, empathy, and social responsibility towards the general good of society.
