

Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical.

All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approval exeat from their phone to enter (NO SHOW. NO GO!).

Students must return by 5.00pm on Sundays (weekend exeats).



General Exeat

A general exeat will cover passport and visa matters, as well as family events. These must not exceed more than two per mid-semester.

Medical Exeat

A medical exeat will cover medical, dental, optical, and hospital appointments. When possible, appointments should be made for Saturdays, to minimise learning loss.

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

PYP: Units of Inquiry Overview



TIS Primary School encourages students to learn to appreciate knowledge, conceptual understandings, skills, and personal attributes as a connected whole. The learning community collaboratively develops a program of inquiry to reflect the unique aspects of the school's community. The program of inquiry is organised and framed according to six transdisciplinary themes:

- Who we are.
- Where we are in place and time.

- How we express ourselves.
- How the world works.
- How we organise ourselves.
- Sharing the planet.

These transdisciplinary themes together provide learners with authentic learning experiences that are not confined to the boundaries of traditional subjects. Although subjects play an important role in learning, TIS Primary School learners explore real-world problems by going beyond subject boundaries. Learners have opportunities to reflect on the significance of their learning to take meaningful action in their community and the wider world.

A Unit of Inquiry (UOI) is more than just a lesson. It is a six to eight-week immersive exploration of a powerful concept that empowers learners to delve deep into their learning. Guided by thoughtfully crafted lines of inquiry and expertly curated by teacher questions, learners embark on a captivating intellectual adventure where curiosity is the compass and critical thinking is the cornerstone.

Six transdisciplinary units (or four in the Early Years) allow students to build an understanding of themselves, their wider community, and the world. Through the units, students enhance their subject-specific knowledge and skills about the themes represented by the units. Through these units, students do not simply gather information. They develop a profound understanding of central ideas, connecting knowledge across subjects and cultivating a holistic view of the world.

Below are some descriptions of our first unit of inquiry across grade levels for the second semester.

Nursery will be inquiring into the unit, How We Express Ourselves. In this unit, our learners will look at different local and foreign games and consider the rules that govern them. Also, learners will inquire into how we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs, and values.

Kinder 1 is inquiring into the theme, How we Express Ourselves, focusing on stories. We will delve into the structure of stories, their significance, and the feelings and emotions that they evoke. Learners will deepen their communication, self-management, and social skills by engaging an audience meaningfully in storytelling sessions and possibly creating their own stories as the action component. By the end of this unit, we seek to improve on learners' communication, knowledge, risk-taker, and reflective attributes of the IB Learner Profile.

In Kinder 2, the unit focuses on the theme, How the World Works, with the central idea that materials have different properties and are used for different purposes. In this unit, learners will explore the different properties of materials and how they are used for different purposes. By understanding the properties of materials, learners can make informed decisions about which

materials to use in different situations. This knowledge can be applied in various fields, such as engineering, construction, and manufacturing. The lesson will engage learners through interactive activities and group discussions to encourage critical thinking and problem-solving skills. In art, learners will explore various materials around them and learn their characteristics. Learners will then exercise agency by converting these materials into meaningful artworks.

Kinder 3 is also looking at different reasons why living creatures migrate under the theme, Where we are in Place and Time. We will concentrate on culture, migration stories, living things, climate, weather, seasons and the positive impact of migration. Our learners will gain considerable research skills and develop their inquirer attribute. Their discoveries will make them open-minded and knowledgeable about various homes and journeys.

Our Grade 1 learners will embark on an intriguing exploration of the fascinating journey products undergo from their origin to consumption. Through engaging activities, we will unravel the origins of products, discovering how different countries and cultures contribute to their unique characteristics. Utilising simple maps, captivating stories, and introductory lessons on the basics of economics, including the concept of money, learners will gain insights into the interconnectedness of communities and the roles of consumers and producers in the product journey. This educational adventure promises to be an exciting journey into the captivating world of products, offering students valuable insights and stories awaiting discovery.

Grade 2 will take on a comprehensive understanding of the structure and function of organisations, including how various components and departments interconnect to achieve common goals. Learners will explore how we can empower ourselves to contribute meaningfully to strategic planning, whether in a managerial role or as a team member within an organisation. In Mandarin, learners will be learning to introduce themselves and talk about how they professionally participate in the operations of their communities.

Grade 3 will explore how various factors, such as our culture, family, religion, and personal experiences shape our beliefs and values. We will also learn how and why we choose certain people as our role models and how they influence our values and beliefs. We will examine examples of role models, such as historical figures, celebrities, family members, and friends, and reflect on how they inspire us to be better people. We will also discuss the importance of having positive role models who share our values and beliefs and how we can be role models for others.





In this unit, "Who We Are," the Grade 4 learners will explore the central idea, "Our behaviour and beliefs could be a result of our exposure to different cultural backgrounds". Through investigations into behaviours and beliefs around the world, analysis of how and why culture influences us and the identification of both similarities and differences across cultures, learners will develop a profound understanding of the culture and its influence on our behaviour. Assessments will include participation in discussions, research projects on specific cultural aspects, and collaboration. The key skills will be cultural awareness through social skills, critical thinking, and effective communication. Ultimately, this unit aims to cultivate a global perspective, fostering an appreciation for cultural diversity and its profound impact on shaping individual and collective behaviour.



Grades 4 and 5 engage in research to get a deeper understanding of the unit

Grade 5 learners are inquiring about the unit, Who We Are, with the central idea: Physical, social, and emotional changes impact our evolving self and interactions with others. They will explore the stages of growth and development with a particular emphasis on adolescence and puberty. The inquiry extends to the concept of well-being. The learners intend to take action by managing the challenges associated with adolescence.

Grade 6 learners will explore the central idea that citizenship requires responsible participation by examining three interconnected lines of inquiry. First, they will delve into the multifaceted concept of responsible citizenship, analysing the qualities and actions contributing to active civic engagement and ethical decision-making. Next, learners will navigate the moral landscape of both physical and virtual spheres, considering the rights and responsibilities associated with online behaviour and the ethical use of technology. Finally, the unit will trace the evolution of rights and responsibilities over time, fostering an understanding of how societal, cultural, and legal changes shape the expectations placed on citizens. Through critical thinking, ethical reasoning, and research, learners will develop a comprehensive perspective on citizenship as an evolving, ethically grounded commitment to society. Learners will take action by identifying an issue within the school or local community and taking practical steps to help resolve the issue. This will help learners develop essential skills and apply their learning in real life.

In art lessons, learners will zoom into ways of promoting responsible citizenship education in our society. Learners will create awareness posters that will educate the public on the rights and responsibilities of citizens and their importance.




Tell them that they don't have to watch something if they don't want to. Brainstorm ways they can say no to their peers and feel confident making their own decisions.



Offer to watch it with them. That way you can talk through anything tough as it comes up. This can be useful even if they've already seen the content.





Make sure they know that not everything they see is how it appears. Have a frank conversation about not taking everything on the internet at face value.

Encourage them to practice self-care. If they are going to watch something make sure they've got an arsenal of things to pick them back up afterwards.

Let them know where to go for help. Ask them who they would feel comfortable talking to and connect them with services like ReachOut or Kids Helpline.

situations, learned how to kayak, increased my communication skills with partners and people I had never spoken to before, and my senses became more acute because I was constantly aware of my surroundings during camp. At the camp, my strongest suit was my strong will. As a Dukie, I want to get better at working with others more efficiently. I made sure to first establish a base with each of my Alpha members; when they were sweaty, I'd give them a tissue, and when they were tired and helpless, I'd



make sure I was with them to move at their pace. We began speaking often, and I realised we had similar experiences at the time. Since they were seniors, I initially found it difficult to talk to them, especially when we were kayaking. I had this mindset that if I came up with an idea, they'd feel different about it, but everything changed after the experience. My allergies were a huge obstacle, but I was in the environment for a while and, by a miracle, went two days without my medication and was still completely fine. I learned that when I think more about the end goal, I achieve it wilfully, regardless of the storms. I want to improve my ability to work with others more successfully during future camp sessions. My best moment was while kayaking. It was because I had the chance to cool down and loosen my guard due to the water. In addition to that, it was amusing to see some of my teammates scared to enter the water. The overall impact of the camp on my personal growth was quite positive. I learned many new skills and built upon others as well. I even discovered things about myself I did not have a clue about. It reminds me of life's roughest roads, but they can all be endured and overcome. - Nana Adjoa Asante, Grade 9.



I learned that you can do whatever, no matter how hard it is, as long as you put your mind to it and that teamwork is essential in everything. My ability to work well in a pair was evident in how quickly my partner and I arrived at our destination during the kayaking trip. I aim to increase my stamina to avoid getting tired easily on lengthy hikes. We collaborated in finding the way to the camp when it was dark, and we all cooperated and listened to each other. Sometimes, I would want to do

something that the group would not want, such as taking a break. But I overcame it by compromising and coming to a compromise with my teammates. I had blisters during the hike, but I overcame them by stepping on specific parts of my feet and controlling my speed and balance to avoid hurting my blisters. I came to realise that I am capable of achieving goals for which I had previously had doubts. For instance, I was finishing an eight-hour hike. I want to focus on being more organised in packing and arranging my things in the tent. My best moment was kayaking because it was a fun and peaceful moment for me, and I enjoyed it a lot. This camp made me more grateful for the little things I take for granted, and it was a good bonding time for my friends and me. This camp made me realise that I can push myself to do anything as long as I believe in myself. - Kayla Searyoh, Grade 11.

I learned that, as a group, we must always stay together. My strength during this camp was my perseverance throughout the pain. I hope to improve as a Dukie by being positive. I

collaborate well with my Bravo group members through communication and teamwork. I could ride in the kayak with another who would sometimes do something contrary to what was supposed to be done. But we overcame it by correcting and listening to advice from the rangers. I had never swum before, so it was challenging for me to get back onto the kayak after falling into the water during the capsizing drill, but I followed the advice of those around me. I noticed that there are certain things that I am capable of doing, and they require me to try them out. I also like to face new challenges. Some areas I plan to work on next time are communication and taking



advice. Be more calm and less harsh towards the students, especially the first-timers. My best moment was not entirely enjoyable, but we had to kayak for about 2 hours to another island. It helped me persevere through the pain and taught me to collaborate, communicate with my group members, and listen to others. This camp helped me realise some things about myself, such as needing clarification on my capability to do difficult things and face new challenges. This camp also caused me to take instructions and advice from the elderly because they are way wiser than the younger people. It also taught me about perseverance, teamwork, and communication; this camp taught me a lot about myself and others. **Raymond Asare-Shady, Grade 9.**







Admissions 2024/2025

Admissions for the next academic year are now open for the secondary school, Grades 7-12.

Priority for TIS family members ended on 1 December 2023.

The first round of admissions has been completed. The second round will commence in February.

Prospective students are required to complete application forms online via <u>https://tis.openapply.com</u>

An application fee can be paid via ExpressPay, at the school or into the school's account. The account details can be found on the Bank Details page.

All prospective students will take an aptitude test that does not require special preparation. An interview would be conducted before a final decision is made. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the selection process.

Only candidates who have fully completed the application form will be contacted for the aptitude test and subsequent interview.

Prospective families must arrange a school tour before the admission test and interview.

Early applications and admissions are encouraged. Late applications will be considered if vacancies exist.

Grades 7, 8 and 9 applicants will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports.

Applicants for Grade 11 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports, predicted grades and a recommendation letter. When final results are released, applicants must attach a scanned copy on OpenApply. The release of final results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

After the completion of the Middle Years Programme (Grade 10), TIS students are expected to complete the IB Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. They will make initial subject selection choices during the second semester of Grade 10. The release of examination results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher). Please note that students are generally not accepted into (Grades 10 and 12,










TIS ADMISSION PROCESS



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Open Book Exam pilot

DP Economics

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. In this case your school will be piloting an OBE in the DP Economics paper 1 exam.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking this exam at your school.

- 1. Students will be sitting the exact same paper but will be allowed to prepare and bring in a maximum of 2 A4 pages summarizing real-world examples that students may use in the exam.
- 2. Student summaries will be allowed to be either in the format of mind maps or short written summaries for each real-world example up to a maximum of 60 words per example and approximately 1200 words in total.
- 3. Students may use a combination of both mind-maps and written summaries.
- 4. Written or digital versions of their resources are allowed but written is recommended.
- 5. If students choose to write their resource, this must be legible.
- 6. Students must not include definitions of terminology, explanations of concepts and theories, nor any analysis or evaluation.
- 7. Students will not be allowed to include visuals including tables, figures, or diagrams.
- 8. Different colours will be allowed, as well as bullet points and acronyms.
- 9. Students will be allowed to include details of real-world examples not in their resource should they wish.
- 10. Student resources will need to be checked at least 1 month before the exam.
