

### Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical.

All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.





### **AUTHENTIC ACTION @ TIS PRIMARY SCHOOL**

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Program (PYP) values authentic action as a key component of its learning approach. Authentic action refers to behaviour that results from genuine learning and understanding.

Action, the core of student agency, is integral to the Primary Years Programme (PYP) learning process and the programme's overarching outcome of international-mindedness. Through individual and collective action, students understand the responsibilities associated with being internationally minded and appreciate the benefits of working with others for a shared purpose. When students see tangible actions that they can choose to take to make a difference, they see themselves as competent, capable and active agents of change (*Oxfam 2015 in ibo resources*)

Students taking action in response to their inquiries lays a foundation for community service in the Middle Years Programme (MYP) and creativity, activity, and service (CAS) in the Diploma Programme (DP). Action is a means for students to show that they have linked their learning to real-life issues and opportunities and are developing responsible dispositions and behaviours towards social and physical environments and the community within and beyond school. Through action, students develop a sense of belonging to local and global communities. They understand and recognise the interconnectedness and interdependence of issues and consider these from multiple perspectives (Oxfam 2015, UNESCO 2015).

Action is an integral part of the Primary Years Programme (PYP) and an opportunity for students to seek the opportunity to make a significant contribution to their local and global communities. It is a core component of agency and offers learners the ability to see that they can not only make a meaningful contribution to the world around them but also be changemakers.

As facilitators of the inquiry process, teachers incorporate some strategies for integrating authentic action into the units of inquiry. We subscribe to inquiry-based learning because it encourages students to ask questions, explore, and discover. Their actions should stem from their curiosity and interests, leading to authentic engagement.

We also believe that to make learning meaningful, learners should be able to make connections between their learning and actual life experiences. We make learning relevant by linking it to real-world scenarios. This helps students see the impact of their actions in a broader context.

Thoughtfully delivered provocations, collaboratively designed inquiries and creatively planned lessons direct learners to discover personal or group interest issues and potentially lead to student-initiated projects. These projects empower students to take charge of their learning. Therefore, we let them choose their projects and steer their inquiries.

Reflection is laced throughout all areas of planning and the inquiry process. To facilitate this valuable process, we provide time for students to reflect on their actions and their learning. This allows them to understand the value of their actions and how they contribute to their learning. The resulting conclusions can lead to decisions that birth student-initiated projects.

At TIS Primary School, we are a learning community or community of learners. Student inquiries and projects are not exempt from the learning community. We involve all members in the learning process. We do this by inviting the entire school community into learning experiences. Apart from the homeroom teachers collaborating with other teaching staff from both campuses, we work jointly with non-teaching staff, parents as resource persons, local organisations, local schools or others overseas.





















After learning about puberty,
I have decided to focus on my education because I can get pregnant if I have sex. I also learned about the signs of menstruation, how to wear a pad and how to stay clean. We consider student-initiated action as a dynamic outcome of agency, and an integral part of the learning process that can arise at any time, not necessarily at the end of a unit or school year.

For early years students, action comes from an understanding of self and a responsibility towards relationships with peers and the wider community. Learning community members support this understanding by modelling the appropriate use of language and social behaviours. At this stage of development, action may start with minor adjustments of behaviour, which may include the development of responsible dispositions towards themselves and others and in making appropriate choices. Action is responsive to personally meaningful experiences, and as with all action, it is authentic, reflective and mindful.

One such example was witnessed when one of our early years' learners applied his understanding of ear care during a unit on senses. During a student-led conference on campus, he encouraged his mother to put a stop to the dangerous habit of poking her car key into her ear.



As the Grade 4 homeroom teacher, facilitating the food drive action and fashion show initiative was an immensely rewarding experience. Witnessing the students embrace authentic action within their learning journey was truly inspiring. Their enthusiasm and dedication were palpable as they eagerly participated in designing their dresses for the fashion show. Similarly, their involvement in planning a menu for the Ghanaian food drive showcased their commitment to making a tangible impact within our school community. Watching them enthusiastically explore and taste new Ghanaian dishes highlighted their willingness to step out of their comfort zones and embrace new experiences. Throughout the process, they demonstrated the attributes of risk-takers, fearlessly embracing challenges and seizing opportunities to cultivate their skills and foster personal growth.



Action can be short or long-term, revisited or ongoing. It may be individual or collective, small or large scale and may take place at home, at school or in local or wider communities. Some actions may not always be visible or immediately impactful; they might appear in the form of impressions left on students or small things that go unnoticed because they are part of the daily life of the learning community. Action can take different forms. It could be intrinsic or extrinsic, such as:

- A change in behaviour
- consideration or plan for action in the future
- a demonstration of responsibility or respect for self, others and the environment
- a commitment to leading or participating in a youth advocacy group
- an engagement in school decision-making or an expression of support in community, local and global decision-making.

Like Ashanti, Ariella's decision to focus on her education and maintain good hygiene shows a Principled attribute.

### **Thinker**

Isaiah identified a need (goalposts) and proposed a solution, demonstrating critical thinking. Christabel's decision to design a skirt shows creativity and critical thinking.

### **Open-minded**

David shows willingness to consider and try different lifestyles, a key aspect of being Open-minded. Durowaa tried new foods, showing an open mind and willingness to try new things. Like Durowaa, Kirsten and Vicky demonstrate an Open-minded attribute by trying new foods. Michal, too, shows Open-mindedness by trying new foods.

### Inquirer


Maame Yaa's request to learn sewing shows curiosity and initiative.

Over the coming weeks, our students will be channelling their creativity and entrepreneurial spirit by crafting various products they will sell later.


The proceeds from these sales will be dedicated to supporting a local orphanage, providing essential resources and care to those in need.







- 3. **Empower Others:** We want to share information and resources that can make a real difference in the lives of people with dyslexia.


