



Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical.

All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approval exeat from their phone to enter (NO SHOW. NO GOL)

Students must return by 5.00pm on Sundays (weekend exeats).



General Exeat

A general exeat will cover passport and visa matters, as well as family events. These must not exceed more than two per mid-semester.





Transdisciplinary Learning at TIS Primary

Transdisciplinary learning is an approach to education that goes beyond individual subject areas. Instead of learning subjects in isolation, students find connections between different disciplines, applying their knowledge to real-world problems and understanding how various fields of knowledge interconnect.

At Tema International Primary School, transdisciplinary learning aims to prepare our students for the future. In the real world, problems are not divided by subject areas. To solve complex issues, we need to pull from various disciplines and work collaboratively. Transdisciplinary learning enhances critical thinking, problem-solving, and collaboration skills. By using this approach, we are not just teaching students facts but how to learn, think, and apply their knowledge.

In Kinder 1, learners are inquiring into stories' structure, significance, and the feelings and emotions that stories evoke. This unit has been interactive and fun as learners explore folktales, fairy tales, and various stories that evoke feelings while teaching valuable morals. From our class and virtual libraries, learners have enjoyed "Little Red Riding Hood," "Rapunzel," the Kente Story, "Mary Had a Little Lamb," and Anansi stories. One story that has captivated learners and lent itself to a transdisciplinary approach is the story of 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar.' Learners are familiarising themselves with the days of the week, learning to apply their number sense in counting and ordering the number of food items the caterpillar ate, and also connecting the varied food choices in the story to the Learner Profile attribute of being balanced. They have created a simple structure of stories (beginning, middle, and end) and labelled them using 1, 2, and 3. From the stories, learners discover lessons about society (Social Studies) and how to relate to people. For example, learners learned not to trust strangers from the stories Gingerbread Man and Little Red Riding Hood.' Learners have also learned the 'Bonwire Kente' song and how to sign the names of story characters in their Music and Sign Language lessons.



In Kinder 2, learners are inquiring into different materials and their properties. In this unit, students explore the various properties of materials and how they are used for other purposes. Learners use sorting activities to identify different materials suitable for packaging various products. They also participate in writing activities where they write the individual sounds that spell the names of basic materials such as metals, plastic, wood, glass, and paper. Learners actively engage through interactive activities and group discussions to encourage critical thinking and problem-solving skills.


















In Kinder 3, learners inquire into how living creatures take journeys for different reasons. We have been delving into migration's pull and push factors and the various means of migration. We are also looking at the features or characteristics of living and non-living things and the adaptive features of some living creatures. During the inquiry into the characteristics of living creatures, there was student-initiated inquiry into how plants make their food.

We have also been looking at seasons and the causes of the changes in seasons. In English, we are building our vocabulary and spelling techniques with words that are unit-related.

Learners in the nursery are inquiring into the impact of play and games on us. This unit will help improve the learners' cognitive, physical, social and well-being. This will allow them to experiment through trial and error, find solutions to problems, work out the best strategies and build their confidence and skills.



Learners build a tower with the homeroom resources in the Early Years learning space. In math, the learner counts as he builds the tower. In English, learners identify the colours they use in building the tower, which helps them create a cognitive link between visual clues and words. Learning to identify and describe colours improves their ability to communicate and express themselves in social studies.

Grade 3 learners are creating surveys to discover which of the Tema International School core values are the most favoured virtues of their school community. They are composing relevant questions in English while thinking of the quantities in the response in Math. They are using art to create pictographs and charts which are artistic components to represent their findings. They discuss the outcomes as social issues in the school community, and that is transdisciplinary learning at Tema International Primary School.



Transdisciplinary learning transcends traditional subject boundaries and fosters connections between disciplines and real-world contexts. It involves integrating various subject disciplines into a cohesive learning experience. Through collaboration among students and teachers, transdisciplinary learning encourages the exploration of complex issues from multiple perspectives, allowing for a deeper understanding of the interconnectedness of knowledge. By working together to investigate, analyse and solve problems, students develop essential skills such as critical thinking, creativity, and communication and discover meaningful connections between subjects that enhance their learning.

Throughout the unit, "Who We Are", our Grade 4 learners have been applying their knowledge in real-life contexts where they explore how beliefs shape our behaviour and how diverse cultures contribute to the uniqueness of the world. Through various planned activities, the learning and teaching process is connected through math, social studies, music, dance, art, and various languages. This connection across subjects is an ongoing adventure of learning together, where learners discover new things through engaging activities.








Transdisciplinary Connection through Language and Technology

In Grade 1, they recently delved into cooking and having fun while learning in the kitchen. They turned their cooking adventures into a learning feast, from measuring ingredients to writing down their recipes! Math tasted real-life applications as they measured ingredients for our recipes. We learned how to use measuring cups and spoons, making sure we got just the right amounts for our delicious treats. English class got hands-on as we wrote down our recipes step by step. We had to ensure our instructions were clear and easy to follow, just like in a cookbook. And when it was time to share, we stood up and proudly presented our recipes to the class. In Social Studies, we explored where our ingredients came from and how they are used worldwide. We learned about different cultures and traditions through the foods we cooked. Cooking wasn't just about making yummy treats; it was about learning, exploring, and having fun together. Our Grade 1 kitchen became a classroom full of delicious discoveries, where every stir and mix taught us something new!



In Grade 5, our unit was engaging and interactive, showcasing transdisciplinary connections. Learners explored stages of growth and puberty rites across cultures, focusing on personal well-being and fitness. In Math, they measured and converted weights, while in creative writing, they crafted stories about characters experiencing different rites of passage. Visual Arts projects depicted researched puberty rites and Sign Language lessons integrated with English learning, encompassing vocabulary, spelling, and grammar. Music was also incorporated to reinforce sign-word associations.




















In the 'Who We Are' unit, Grade 6 students explore the central idea that "citizenship requires responsible participation." Transdisciplinary learning allows them to draw skills from different subjects, emphasising the transferability of acquired knowledge. Through inquiry-based methods, they delved into fractions, explored current events through writing newspaper articles, and created art to promote responsible participation in nation-building. A highlight was their visit to the Parliament House of Ghana, where they observed live debates, simulated the process in class, and broadened their understanding of governance. Taking civic responsibility beyond the classroom, they initiated a donation drive for the Tettey-Ocloo State School for the Deaf, showcasing the essence of responsible participation in the community and utilising their sign language skills.



Transdisciplinary learning, blending various disciplines, proves crucial for holistic education. It enhances memory retention and fosters a deeper understanding of the interconnected nature of the world, promoting critical thinking and practical application of knowledge.



The Importance of Continuous Assessment in MYP4

and Examination Registration In MYP5

Behind every school assessment at TIS is continuous assessment (CA). CA can be described as a process that allows all stakeholders (teachers, parents and students) to evaluate the student's level of knowledge or understanding and to diagnose any problems the student may have with learning in specific areas. This evaluation allows decisions to be made by the stakeholders about the way forward for the student, including learning support, special examination arrangements and/or tailoring their academic courses to allow for improved success; this list is not exhaustive. CA should be monitored closely by all students, especially those currently in Grade 9 (MYP4).

At TIS, we present MYP5 examination candidates for two types of awards from the International Baccalaureate (IB). They are the IBMYP courses and the IBMYP certificate. These two awards were discussed in an earlier bulletin and at the parents' information session held in the first semester of this academic year.

TIS continues to register all MYP5 students for the final e-assessments and e-portfolios. All students qualify to be registered at IB as long as they have met TIS requirements for Service as Action (community service) and are predicted to complete their Personal Project. Then there is CA. CA in the MYP at TIS is based on units of work and their related assessments. Assessments are structured to show strengths and areas for development along the way rather than have one final assessment at the end of a semester or academic year. Throughout the two years of MYP4 till September of MYP5, CA should be used as a guide for self-assessment and planning for maintaining good grades by MYP4 and MYP5 students.

CA informs stakeholders of the most likely progression an MYP4 student will make towards their registration for MYP courses and MYP certificate in October of MYP5 and must be taken very seriously over the previous year and a half. To work towards the MYP certificate, every MYP5 student is considered capable of accessing the MYP courses. Many more will go on to show through their CA that they can achieve a minimum grade of 3 and a score point of 28 or more with no grades of 2 for which they will be registered for the MYP certificate; these are the criteria.

After the mid-semester break (in April this semester), discussions will begin with current Grade 9 students. Parents and guardians must stay abreast of results and comments on ManageBac ahead of the final decisions for MYP e-assessment entries in October 2024. All students can automatically be registered for the MYP courses; students who meet the criteria above (in bold) will have this recognised through their registration for the MYP certificate.



Leadership Training Camp Reflection

Our leadership training was on Saturday, 3 February, 2024. We were graced with the presence of a few of the school's alumni who were once in leadership positions like ourselves. Apiorkor, Gerald, and Nana Ama shared the knowledge they gained throughout their time as executives of the pioneering class of 2007, and it was incredibly insightful. The session was highly interactive, and engaging and gave us the ability to better understand what is awaiting us as council members and how we should use our power for the good of the school.

The alumni also gave us insight into the importance of building bonds with each other and knowing one another's strengths and weaknesses to work together better. They explained that we should work as one to encourage unity among ourselves and the general student body. Our favourite parts were when the alumni shared their experiences with integrity and asked us to share our own stories of integrity— these personal anecdotes helped us understand that leading is not an entirely new experience, as we are simply building on the knowledge we already have. Their stories were helpful because they had been through the system and had experienced most of the challenges associated with leadership.

Thus, getting first-hand information on our journey and the associated challenges helped us critically assess ourselves and our readiness to start taking action to benefit the school. One of our favourite parts was when we played a short game where, in teams of three, one person would be blindfolded and guided by the other two to the other side of the class. Because we were grouped randomly, this exercise helped each of us build trust in members of our council with whom we had yet to bond. After this practice, however, we all felt a lot closer to each other— a feeling we know we will continue to grow throughout our year together. Another favourite of ours was when we answered a few questions on leadership. With our pieces of paper, we wrote down what one word to describe leadership was, who the hardest person to lead is, etc. These questions, which none of us had thought of before, helped us better understand ourselves and what qualities we will prioritise with our leadership.

Moreover, sharing our various responses with the whole group expands the barriers of our minds to different things we can each add to our unique brands of leadership and how we can marry our different styles. The latter was something Nana Ama heavily recommended we do—recognising our different strengths and weaknesses to make the best of our various traits.

As a council, we immensely appreciate the wisdom and guidance that Nana Ama, Apiorkor and Gerald gave us. We're sure that we will return to the notes we diligently took during the session as we go through our time as leaders and anticipate a prosperous year.

The Office of the Special Prosecutor visits TIS

The Office of the Special Prosecutor visited TIS last week to present their Youth in Anti-Corruption Campaign to our DP1 and DP2 students. TIS is featured on their website, as found below.

Youth against Corruption at Tema International School

Tema International School (TIS) accepted our invitation to collaborate on this initiative and the Office met with TIS students on 8 February 2024. The Youth in Anti-Corruption engaged with approximately 140 students, predominantly from the 11th and 12th grades.

In discussing the OSP and its mandate, the presenters covered how the office was set up and the functions of the office, including its four-fold mandate, namely, to investigate, prosecute, and prevent corruption, as well as recover the proceeds of corruption and corruption-related activities.

The students at TIS were allowed to use their laptops during the session. Many of them visited the OSP's website and began to ask questions based on material they had read from the website. There were questions about the Office's achievements so far, collaboration with other offices, actual independence of the Office and some profound questions about our relationship with the judiciary by students who apparently follow the news. The OSP team was grateful for the opportunity to further educate them and elucidate some conundrums and misconceptions about the OSP and its work.

Reflection on visit from the Office of the Special Prosecutor (OSP)

During the assembly on Thursday, 8 February 2024, we had a visit from the office of the special prosecutor, who briefed us on corruption and integrity. It was an insightful discussion where we listened to the effects of corruption on our country. We were appalled by how normalized it is in our Ghanaian society.

From the tertiary level, SRC presidents from prominent universities have embezzled huge sums of money, setting a precedent for what many higher-up officials do. We also began to understand how sometimes the news of certain individuals being corrupt cannot be withdrawn and it still destroys the reputation of the person and their families.

At first, the topic of corruption seemed distant and almost abstract. It didn't seem like something that directly affected our day-to-day lives; instead, it was something talked about on the news and social media. However, Mr. Bright Sowu, the Principal Staff Officer and team leader, bridged that gap by showing us how corruption begins with seemingly small integrity violations like cheating on exams or disregarding school rules. He explained how those morph into larger societal issues if left unchecked. As student council members, his words ignited a sense of responsibility in us to promote transparency and integrity right here in TIS.







Moreover, we were taught the types of cases the special prosecutor deals with and discovered that not all crimes are corruption cases and some cases are fraud cases so EOCO deals with it, not the office of the special prosecutor. When Leslie, a DP2 student, asked what exactly the OSP does to ensure that government officials or businesses in the public and private sectors are not being corrupt, we were given a detailed and elaborate answer by Mr Sowu. This helped quench our suspicions that this organisation, whose aim is to prevent misconduct, is engaging in corruption themselves.

All in all, we feel much more equipped to recognize corruption and injustice and, as the student council, we are committed to ensuring that at no point in time will we ever compromise our moral principles.









Open Book Exam pilot

DP Economics

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. In this case your school will be piloting an OBE in the DP Economics paper 1 exam.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking this exam at your school.

- 1. Students will be sitting the exact same paper but will be allowed to prepare and bring in a maximum of 2 A4 pages summarizing real-world examples that students may use in the exam.
- 2. Student summaries will be allowed to be either in the format of mind maps or short written summaries for each real-world example up to a maximum of 60 words per example and approximately 1200 words in total.
- 3. Students may use a combination of both mind-maps and written summaries.
- 4. Written or digital versions of their resources are allowed but written is recommended.
- 5. If students choose to write their resource, this must be legible.
- 6. Students must not include definitions of terminology, explanations of concepts and theories, nor any analysis or evaluation.
- 7. Students will not be allowed to include visuals including tables, figures, or diagrams.
- 8. Different colours will be allowed, as well as bullet points and acronyms.
- 9. Students will be allowed to include details of real-world examples not in their resource should they wish.
- 10. Student resources will need to be checked at least 1 month before the exam.

The Academic Research & Writing Principles

Turnitin has developed this checklist as a guide to support students in their academic research and writing process. Use the 12 suggested guiding principles to help you to produce high quality research and original writing, from the pre-reading stage to final submission.

1

Explore

a wide range of research. Research the topic thoroughly to develop your knowledge base, discover new ideas and strengthen your own line of argument.

2

Evaluate

the reliability of your sources. Take some time to evaluate all your sources, particularly if information has been accessed online. Consider who has created the information and why.

3

Organise

your research notes.
Note taking is a fundamental
part of the research process.
Keep notes neatly organised
and retain a copy of each
source used.

4

Write

an original paper.

The best defence against plagiarism is original writing. Unless quoting directly from someone else's work, express all ideas in your own words.

5

Paraphrase

other people's ideas.
An essential academic skill,
some find it helpful to note
down key words and concepts
before paraphrasing other
people's ideas.

6

Differentiate

other's work from your own original insights by referencing or paraphrasing. Avoid accidentally plagiarising someone else's work by using academic referencing. 7

Cite

all of your sources.
A citation in your paper shows exactly what information has come from another source. Remember to cite all borrowed words or ideas, including those which came from one of your own previous papers!

8

Reference

all of your citations correctly. Depending on the referencing system used, this may end in a list of sources as a 'bibliography'. Most students are aware of referencing requirements surrounding books and journals, but we must also reference sources like YouTube videos, images, diagrams and yourself!

9

Use

the relevant referencing system consistently throughout your assignment. Referencing can vary across module units or each course so check which system you should use and follow the relevant formatting guidelines.

10

Δck

your teacher or instructor for their feedback on any drafts you have written in advance of the deadline. Writing multiple drafts and implementing the feedback you receive can help to make you a better writer.

11

Double check

your work including citations. Allow time to double check each of your citations before submission. This includes page numbers, publication dates, web links and authors' names.



Submit your final piece through Turnitin

Turnitin will check your work against other sources in the Turnitin database and use this information to generate an originality report.
