





Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical.

All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approval exeat from their phone to enter (NO SHOW. NO GO!).

Students must return by 5.00pm on Sundays (weekend exeats).

General Exeat

A general exeat will cover passport and visa matters, as well as family events. These must not exceed more than two per mid-semester.

Medical Exeat

A medical exeat will cover medical, dental, optical, and hospital appointments. When possible, appointments should be made for Saturdays, to minimise learning loss.

A medical exeat is for the same day departure and return. Otherwise, it is a general exeat. Requesting a medical exeat with a departure on Friday and a return on Sunday is a weekend (general) exeat.

Admissions 2024/2025

Admissions for the next academic year are now open for the secondary school, Grades 7-12.

Priority for TIS family members ended on 1 December 2023.

The first round of admissions has been completed. The second round will commence in February.

Prospective students are required to complete application forms online via <u>https://tis.openapply.com</u>

An application fee can be paid via ExpressPay, at the school or into the school's account. The account details can be found on the Bank Details page.

All prospective students will take an aptitude test that does not require special preparation. An interview would be conducted before a final decision is made. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the selection process.

Only candidates who have fully completed the application form will be contacted for the aptitude test and subsequent interview.

Prospective families must *arrange a school tour before the admission test and interview*.

Early applications and admissions are encouraged. Late applications will be considered if vacancies exist.

Grades 7, 8 and 9 applicants will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports.

Applicants for Grade 11 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports, predicted grades and a recommendation letter. When final results are released, applicants must attach a scanned copy on OpenApply. The release of final results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).

After the completion of the Middle Years Programme (Grade 10), TIS students are expected to complete the IB Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. They will make initial subject selection choices during the second semester of Grade 10. The release of examination results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher). Please note that students are generally not accepted into (Grades 10 and 12,













TIS Admissions Grade Chart





"Breaking Misconceptions: Understanding OCD"

"It's easy to make jokes and even easier to self-diagnose. 'I'm depressed'. 'I can't focus, I have ADHD'. "I have to clean this Saturday, it's messy, and I'm literally OCD'. In this week's edition of Wiser Minds, we're going to talk about the misconceptions of obsessive-compulsive disorder, commonly known as OCD.

Obsessive Compulsive Disorder is a mood disorder that's characterised by having obsessions and compulsions. Obsessions are unwanted, intrusive, and persistent thoughts. Compulsions are overwhelming urges to do certain actions or rituals, usually repeated. Keyword: these obsessions and compulsions are unwanted. Ensuring your markers are arranged is a conscious decision, not a compulsion. These people find being this way uncomfortable, and it causes a lot of distress.

Take the example where someone with OCD is late for work but cannot leave until he washes his hands three times in a row because he feels like if he doesn't, something terrible will happen during the day.

Let's be more considerate and mindful of our words as individuals with OCD face invisible battles.



Checklist for DISTURBING CONTENT

Work out whether the content is right for your child. It might be around their age or just their personality, but trust your gut and put boundaries in place.



Stay up to date with pop culture. You may not care about the Bieber's or Beyonce's of this world but following sites like Pedestrian.tv and news.com.au will help you stay ahead of the game.



Tell them that they don't have to watch something if they don't want to. Brainstorm ways they can say no to their peers and feel confident making their own decisions.



Offer to watch it with them. That way you can talk through anything tough as it comes up. This can be useful even if they've already seen the content.



Read up on the issues it explores. If you show that you are comfortable and knowledgeable with the issues it explores your kids are more likely to open up to you during a tough time.

Make sure they know that not everything they see is how it appears. Have a frank conversation about not taking everything on the internet at face value.

Encourage them to practice self-care. If they are going to watch something make sure they've got an arsenal of things to pick them back up afterwards.

Let them know where to go for help. Ask them who they would feel comfortable talking to and connect them with services like ReachOut or Kids Helpline.



DP1S' WANT TO WRITE A PERSONALIZED AND OUTSTANDING COLLEGE ESSAY? TRY THESE...



He Authentic

More than any other consideration, you should choose a topic or point of view that is consistent with who you truly are.

Readers can sense when writers are inauthentic.

Use your own voice, sense of humour, and a natural way of speaking.

Honesty about traits, situations, or a childhood background that you are working to improve may resonate with the reader more strongly than a glib victory speech.

Grab the Reader From the Start

You'll compete with many other applicants for an admission officer's attention.

Here's Focus on Deeper Themes

Some essay writers think they will impress committees by loading an essay with facts, figures, and descriptions of activities, like wins in sports or descriptions of volunteer work. But that's not the point.

College admissions officers are interested in learning more about who you are and what makes you tick.



🕌 Show Don't Tell

As you expand on whatever theme you've decided to explore in your essay, remember to show, don't tell.

Reciting a list of activities is also dull. An admissions officer will want to know about the arc of your emotional journey, too.

Try Doing Something Different

If you want your essay to stand out, think about approaching your subject from an entirely new perspective. While many students might choose to write about their wins, for instance, what if you wrote an essay about what you learned from all your losses?



Writing for the reader means building a clear and logical argument in which one thought flows naturally from another.

Use transitions between paragraphs.

Write Several Drafts


Set your essay aside for a few days and come back to it after you've had some time to forget what you've written. Often, you'll discover you have a whole new perspective that enhances your ability to make revisions.

Start writing months before your essay is due.

📥 Read It Aloud Writer's tip: Reading your essay aloud can instantly uncover passages that sound clumsy, long-winded, or false.

📥 Don't Repeat

If you've mentioned an activity, story, or anecdote in some other part of your application, don't repeat it again in your essay.





Be sure the people you ask to read your essay represent different demographic groups—a teacher, a parent, even a younger sister or brother.

H Pay Attention to Form

Although there are often no strict word limits for college essays, most essays are shorter rather than longer. Common App, which students can use to submit to multiple colleges, suggests that essays stay at about 650 words.



🖊 End Your Essay with a "Kicker"

In journalism, a kicker is the last punchy line, paragraph, or section that brings everything together.

It provides a lasting impression that leaves the reader satisfied and impressed by the points you have artfully woven throughout your piece.

So, here's our kicker: Be concise and coherent, engage in honest self-reflection, and include vivid details and anecdotes that deftly illustrate your point.

Write, revise, revise again, and good luck!


