

Exeat



How Your Teenager Can Manage Distractions

It's entirely normal for teens to get distracted from studying from time to time, especially during stressful exam periods or when they're struggling to understand the work. Plus, the transition to digital school work and having the internet right at our fingertips means that it's never been easier to be distracted.

Avoiding doing work or study is a widespread response to feeling overwhelmed and stressed, but while leaning into a bit of self-care to get through high-stress study periods is one thing, you don't want your teen perfecting the art of procrastination because it'll come back to bite them during exam time.

If your teenager is struggling to balance study with school work, social media and other daily distractions, there are ways you can help them help themselves.

Set time aside for fun

After spending hours studying and working, it's to be expected that your teen might be feeling exhausted or stressed. While they may already have a study plan, please encourage them to have a fun plan, too. If they have a specific time set aside for relaxing, social media or gaming, they'll have less desire to distract themselves while working.

Take regular minibreaks

Suggest that they work in chunks of time – say, 20 minutes – then take a few minutes to get a drink, stretch and walk around. This will keep their energy, maintain their concentration and make their study more manageable. You might watch how they're going by having a cup of tea and a quick chat with them during one of these scheduled mini-breaks.

Block screen alerts

Encourage them to block the alerts if they're working on a tablet or computer linked to their messages or social media. When they're concentrating, a message alert pinging up will distract them and break their train of thought. They can go for it in their non-study time and catch up on social media.

Agree on 'phone free' zones

Talk about areas of the house that can become temporary phone-free zones, such as where they study and where everyone eats together. Encourage the whole family to play a role in making it happen.

Create a space they can concentrate in

This is especially important if your teen has to study in a common area with plenty of distractions, like the living room or kitchen. Being around a lot of noise and activity can significantly disrupt their study routine. Creating a space primarily dedicated to their study hours will help them focus and concentrate.

If you're unable to create a dedicated space, try to create a quiet environment where they're studying. Keep the TV turned down or off and avoid having lengthy conversations around them. If you have other kids, ask them to keep the noise down, so their sibling doesn't get distracted. Some people work best with silence, others with a hum of background noise or music. See what works for them.

Minimise interruptions

While they're studying, don't let anyone disturb them; leave it until they're having a break. Did you know that it takes most people around 20 minutes to get back on track with study after an interruption?

Monitor their sleep

Lack of sleep makes you lose focus, so it's easier to procrastinate or get distracted when you're tired. Here's how you can help them get better sleep. On the flip side, if your teen is studying from home, there may be a temptation to hit snooze on the alarm and lay around all day. Explain the importance of maintaining a routine like this, including when they wake up and go to bed. They can learn more sleep routine tips here.

Eat healthy, regular meals and snacks

Being hungry causes energy levels to drop and makes it hard to concentrate, so encourage your teen to eat proper meals and healthy energy snacks such as nuts. Help them out by using these handy tips when cooking them food. Sharing a meal with your teen is a good chance to check in on how their study is going. Even a break for a quick lunch before heading back to the books gives you a chance to ask how they're feeling and support their wellbeing.

Cut the caffeine

Encourage them to drink lots of tap water; being hydrated will help them concentrate. Long days at the desk may make them keen for coffee (and lots of it!). Remind them that too much of a good thing can be bad, and suggest alternatives: Herbal teas are an excellent calming substitute.

Exams, expectations and study loads can make your teenager stressed and easily distracted. Trying even a few of these tips can help you support them to manage teenage distractions, keep calm during exam periods and <u>study more efficiently</u>, which reduces their overall stress and improves their wellbeing.

This motivated me to keep walking. One area I can improve on as a Dukie is my perseverance. We encouraged each other to keep moving forward, which was one way we collaborated as a group. I kept resting because I was tired, and my teammates were getting fed up with me. But they encouraged me to keep going, and we all moved together. My challenge was not



being able to keep going, but I tackled that by asking the team to take breaks at reasonable times. I learnt that motivation goes a long way to help me perform at my best, a skill I would like to focus on in future camps. I will suggest we do stretches and warm-up exercises before the hike. My best moment was sharing a tent with my friend. We got to know each other better and became closer friends. What is the overall impact of this camp on your personal growth? I've learnt about self-motivation and can push myself to achieve more. - Charis Kudiabor, G9. (Bronze Participant)



The lesson learnt during the camp is about leadership and the different types. I think my adaptability is my strength in this camp. An area I can improve on as a Dukie is my communication skills. Our group was Bravo 3, the last group of all the group members; when we were tired, we shared snacks, and when someone was in trouble, we helped them, which also helped our group. That was how we collaborated. I think the challenge for me was my physical strength. I just took rest time to get more energy. My major challenge was sleeping in the tent because it was too hot inside, and I still couldn't tackle it. I want to focus on communication skills and resilience in future camps. Kayaking was my best moment because it was the most challenging activity for me, but I could do it, and I'm proud of myself. I learnt that teamwork is needed to achieve a goal and to get there quickly. My strength was perseverance, I was able to push myself even when I was tired and wanted to rest. I collaborated with my Bravo group by sharing snacks to boost our energy levels, and we also collectively decided on the best times to take breaks so that we would all benefit from them. Some of my teammates were a bit slow when we were hiking, so we pushed them out of their comfort zone so that we would avoid lagging. I learnt that I can do anything as long as I put my



mind to it, and there is nothing I can't do. My best moment was kayaking with one of the rangers on the journey back home because I enjoy kayaking. The camp made me realise I can do anything and still have strength, no matter how tired. I am glad I got to experience the camp for the second time; it has helped me as an individual. - Kayla Searyoh, G11, (Silver Participant)



The most impactful lesson I learnt was "No matter how tired you are, you cannot leave yourself stranded, so you must push on and finish". This was something I had to tell myself repeatedly during the hike on the first day; it showed me I had more strength than I thought. Another important lesson I learnt was that no matter how difficult you think a change will be, you will adapt as long as you are willing. My strengths during the camp were resilience and the ability to encourage others. During the hike, despite some of my bravo members being unable to handle their exhaustion, with words of encouragement, we all pushed through and collectively decided on times to rest. While kayaking from our campsite to the hiking trail on the last day, I was exhausted and felt little to no strength to carry on. My partner, however, was not ready to let me quit. With his motivation and my

realisation that I could not leave myself stranded on the lake, I could push through and finish the task. Through this experience, I realised I am stronger than I think I am and that the mind can easily limit the extent to which your body can push itself, but it can just as easily extend that limit. So, as a Dukie, I learnt that with a positive mind and a mind that is ready and willing to endure, you can power through almost anything. My most memorable moment during this

expedition was the capsizing drill. At the beginning of the expedition, this drill was what I dreaded most, but once I drifted into the water with that kayak, I knew I was going to love it. It was just something about falling into the cool water a day after a demanding hike that relaxed me. This expedition has been one of the most impactful journeys I have been on. Before the trip, I had convinced myself it would be the hardest thing I have ever participated in. This was an idea I held onto until the last hours of the first hike after realising my mind was holding me back and a big part of my exhaustion. After this idea had departed from my mind, I was instantly energised. Throughout the 3-day expedition, using a positive and encouraging mindset carried me through and allowed me to cruise through the days with ease. Regarding my personal growth, the most significant impact of the expedition camp was showing me the importance of a positive mindset in everything you do. - Breindelle Kusi Boateng, G11. 





Open Book Exam pilot

DP Economics

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. In this case your school will be piloting an OBE in the DP Economics paper 1 exam.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking this exam at your school.

- 1. Students will be sitting the exact same paper but will be allowed to prepare and bring in a maximum of 2 A4 pages summarizing real-world examples that students may use in the exam.
- 2. Student summaries will be allowed to be either in the format of mind maps or short written summaries for each real-world example up to a maximum of 60 words per example and approximately 1200 words in total.
- 3. Students may use a combination of both mind-maps and written summaries.
- 4. Written or digital versions of their resources are allowed but written is recommended.
- 5. If students choose to write their resource, this must be legible.
- 6. Students must not include definitions of terminology, explanations of concepts and theories, nor any analysis or evaluation.
- 7. Students will not be allowed to include visuals including tables, figures, or diagrams.
- 8. Different colours will be allowed, as well as bullet points and acronyms.
- 9. Students will be allowed to include details of real-world examples not in their resource should they wish.
- 10. Student resources will need to be checked at least 1 month before the exam.

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

Study Tips!

Keep Your Notes Clean

It's hard to focus if your notes are messy and covered in scribbled out words. Rewrite your notes to keep them neat or type them out to make sure you can actually understand what you're reading.

Teach A Friend

What happens if you have difficulty finding a way to explain your answers or put your thoughts into words? This can be difficult, even if you're familiar with the material. Lecture to a friend, as this allows you to train and prepare your mind to explain complex topics. It's especially useful if your final consists of a speech or presentation.

Study Old Exams

Save your old tests if possible - they're great for studying! You can either retake old tests to review the material or just focus on the questions you previously got wrong.

Color Code Your Notes

Try taking notes and doing homework assignments with colored pens, markers, and highlighters. The colorful notes could improve your visual memory and allow you to access information from your brain during an exam more efficiently. Plus, having organized, color-coded notes makes reading through them so much easier!

Listen to Recorded Lectures

Listening to recorded lectures is helpful, especially if you're reviewing the notes you took along with it. This is a great way to refresh some topics you may have studied months ago and forgotten about.

Exam Tips!

Read the questions & instructions carefully

It seems obvious, but I've seen too many of my tutlings lose points in exams because they didn't read the exam instructions properly. Focus. Make sure you understand exactly what the exam is asking you to do. The smartest answer in the world isn't going to score you any points if it answers a question that's not being asked.

Time management - During the exam:

Have a glance at the whole exam paper before starting to viciously scribble your pen to shreds. Start with the parts you know and feel most confident about – it's an easy way to guarantee those first points. Keep an eye on the clock, and determine at what point time's up for the rough drafts and scribbles, and when to start molding your final answers

Just do your best

If you studied and prepared to the best of your capabilities, and give it your all during the actual exam, what more can you do? You can't do more than your best, can you? Whatever the outcome, what matters most is that you go out there and give those exams all the voooma you've got!

Past exam papers to better your exam writing skills

Do it. Go in there and scramble your way through past exam papers. It will give you a very good idea of the exam structure and the types of questions and instructions you may be confronted with. Take a look at our selection of past papers! Also, make sure you inform yourself about past exam papers available in your own institution's archives. Last but not least, talk to those friends of yours who have written similar exams before... and lived to tell the tale!

Re-read it all

Another avocado. It seems that people either re-read their exams ferociously or don't re-read at all, suppressing the potential consequences thereof. It's very important to re-read your exams... check your spelling, check whether that "3" won't be mistaken for an "8", and verify that you didn't forget one of the multiple choice questions. It's an important tactic for you to spot mistakes and correct them in time.
