

Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical.

All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approval exeat from their phone to enter (NO SHOW. NO GO!).

Students must return by 5.00pm on Sundays (weekend exeats).



General Exeat

A general exeat will cover passport and visa matters, as well as family events. These must not exceed more than two per mid-semester.

Medical Exeat

A medical exeat will cover medical, dental, optical, and hospital appointments. When possible, appointments should be made for Saturdays, to minimise learning loss.



The Kitchen Staff




The IT Professional



Transforming Lives: TIS's Commitment to Making a Difference



At the beginning of this academic year, September 2023, as we began preparations for the 20th anniversary of our dear TIS, the DP1 class embarked on an ambitious journey of "Transforming Lives." Launched during the 20th anniversary Durbar, under the theme "Celebrating our Founders: The Importance of Vision and Values," this service project aimed to raise awareness and funds for Anorectal Malformation (ARM) and support the Paediatric Surgery Centre at Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital in Accra. Rooted deeply in the



school's core values of service, this initiative reflects the foundational principles envisioned by our founders, which guide all our actions at TIS.

Understanding Anorectal Malformation

Anorectal Malformation (ARM) is a congenital disorder characterised by the improper development of the rectum and anus. This serious condition can lead to significant complications if not addressed early, including infection and long-term health issues.

Despite its severity, ARM remains under-recognised and often stigmatised in Ghana. Our project aimed to raise funds and enhance awareness about this critical health issue, advocating for early diagnosis and treatment to improve the lives of affected infants (World Health Organization, n.d.).

Transforming Lives: TIS's Commitment to Making a Difference



Project Activities and Community Engagement

Throughout the academic year, a fundraising of activities engaged our entire school community. These ranged from hosting food sales on campus to leveraging the proceeds from Dr Ken Darvall's (Principal) The Teaching Guarantee: book, Dav Everv is Different, organising ticket sales for our anniversary production,

adaptation of "The Price of Egypt," at the National Theatre. The second semester featured the **Chocolate Friendship event** and **Expression Day**, raising **GHC 100,000.00**. These efforts brought us closer to our financial goal and solidified our community's dedication to the values

of service and our collective effort.



Impact and Donation to Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital

The climax of our project was a significant contribution to the Paediatric Surgery Centre at Korle Bu Teaching Hospital. Although we initially intended to donate an ultrasound machine, we adapted our support to provide five non-evasive monitors after learning the hospital had already acquired one. On Friday, 19 April, a delegation from our school, composed of students and staff, visited the hospital to donate these monitors and funds to support the corrective surgeries of babies with

ARM.

Special thanks to **Dr Yalley, our school doctor**, whose instrumental role in identifying the urgent needs at the hospital and informing us about them was crucial. His commitment and insights have been pivotal in steering our project's direction.

The Importance of Service and Ongoing Commitment

As the CAS Coordinator at TIS for nearly 14 years, I have witnessed these service visits' profound impact on our students, staff and the communities we engage with. Each visit strengthens our resolve and deepens our gratitude and awareness of our blessings. Service is a fundamental aspect of the IB Programmes. CAS (Creativity, Activity, Service) is a core component of the Diploma Programme, and service as action and community projects, a core of the Middle Years Programme, propels our students to take meaningful action. This project exemplifies our commitment to service, showing how our students can identify community issues and devise practical solutions. While our contributions might seem modest against Ghana's broader health challenges, they represent vital steps toward long-term change.




MYP 4 Girls Care for the Einstein Block Aquarium






Application Process Starts Now!

Dear Parents, please start the visa application process right away, especially for the U.S. and Canada, as it can take weeks or several months to secure appointment dates or receive decisions.

Find below some recent updates to the Canadian visa process, from an immigration expert from Wilfrid Laurier University, Canada (Mr. Tarique Plummer, Feb. 2024). Note the cap on number of international students applies mainly to UBC and Ontario provinces.





Recent Changes

- Financial Requirements: From January 1, 2024, a single new study permit applicant must show proof of funds of \$20,635 in liquid funds to study in Canada, an increase from the previous \$10,000 requirement. Additionally, the applicant is required to show sufficient liquid funds to cover the first year of tuition fees as well as travel costs.
- Working Off-Campus: Study permit holders with authorization to work off-campus issued by December 7, 2023, may work over 20 hours per week for an off-campus employer until April 30, 2024. This applies to new study permit applications or extensions submitted by December 7, 2023, and approved later.
- Distance Learning and PGWP Eligibility: For degree programs started after September 1, 2022, students are required to complete at least 50% of their program of study in Canada to be eligible for a PGWP. Online terms will count towards PGWP length until September 1, 2024.
- No Further Temporary PGWP Extension Policies: After December 31, 2023, no further extension opportunities will be
 offered for PGWP holders.
- New Study Permit Application Form: A new version of the study permit application form (IMM1294) is mandatory for all
 applications submitted on or after December 1, 2023



Heard from all your universities? Please note that the following;

- The enrollment deposit slot deadline is May 1 2024 for all U.S. universities.
- Request for an I-20 from your U.S. University and pay the Sevis fee.
- For Canadian schools, kindly check your OUAC portal to learn the specific deadline for enrollment deposit payment.
- Students applying to Canada must start the Canadian visa application process now to avoid disappointment.

**A few more pointers regarding the visa process will be shared on Managebac.

Note: Kindly contact your parents to make the deposit as soon as possible to secure your university spot.




