

As we gather for this year's Annual School Play, Secret of an Ancient Well, by Yaw Asare, we are proud to spotlight a meaningful initiative led by the IB Class of 2026: the EducAid Mante Initiative. This CAS (Creativity, Activity, Service) project aligns with our core values of service, compassion, and impact.

The Mante School of Excellence, located in Afienya East, has been a beacon of hope for underserved children for over 25 years, despite facing numerous challenges. These include inadequate learning materials, outdated IT infrastructure, poor classroom conditions, and unsanitary washroom facilities. The most urgent priority is to build safe and hygienic toilet facilities for students and staff, replacing the current unsafe and basic latrine system.

The EducAid Mante Initiative aims to raise GHC 150,000 to begin this crucial work. This first phase focuses on sanitation facilities, ensuring a healthier environment, especially for girls. Subsequent phases will address classroom renovations and additional needs, promoting sustainable, quality education. Call to Action:
