

Main Campus Information



Exeats for secondary school students cover passport and visa matters, family events, as well as medical, dental, optical and medical appointments.

Students are allowed a maximum of 8 days per semester. Note: A weekend exeat that commences on Friday and ends on Sunday counts as three days.

For a weekend exeat, students must return by 5.00pm on the Sunday.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approved exeat from their phone to security to enter. (NO SHOW. NO GO.)





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THE WORLD OF ARTS AT TIS PRIMARY SCHOOL CAMPUS



At Tema International School Primary School Campus, the Arts comprising both Visual Arts and Performing Arts are not seen as stand-alone disciplines but as powerful lenses through which learners make meaning of the world around them. Within the PYP framework, the Arts are deeply embedded into the learning process, supporting learners in exploring central ideas, constructing personal understanding, and taking action.

Visual and Performing Arts provide authentic opportunities for learners to express themselves, engage in critical thinking, and demonstrate conceptual understanding in diverse and creative ways. Regular engagement with the arts helps students become more reflective, open-minded, and confident communicators, aligning closely with the IB Learner Profile attributes. They learn to collaborate, take creative risks, and develop empathy as they explore global themes and personal experiences through artistic expression. The integration of the Arts fosters transdisciplinary connections, allowing students to draw links between subjects and the world beyond the classroom. In this way, the Arts enrich learning and nurture a sense of identity, agency, and belonging.

Visual Arts



Developing Thinking and Communication Through Imagery

In our classrooms at TIS Primary School Campus, Visual Arts allows students to express ideas that can be hard to put into words. They explore significant concepts and make connections across different subjects using materials like paint, clay, paper, and collage. Whether drawing the water cycle, designing cultural symbols, or creating artwork about their communities, students learn to see and think in new ways. They often share their art during unit celebrations, proudly explaining their work to the school community. This helps them take ownership of their learning, feel more confident, and appreciate the beauty and meaning behind what they create.

Art lessons become exciting spaces where students can take risks, try new things, and share their unique perspectives. They learn that art is not just about making something pretty. It's about thinking deeply, exploring ideas, and telling stories. Sometimes, they use recycled materials to discuss the environment or work together on big murals that reflect what matters to them. These experiences spark meaningful conversations and help students understand themselves and others better. The classroom becomes a creative studio where every piece of art tells a story. As they plan, create, and reflect, students also build essential life skills like empathy, confidence, and critical thinking.



Performing Arts

Students investigate perspectives, develop empathy, and build confidence as they collaboratively devise scenes that reflect their inquiries.

Dance allows students to explore patterns, cultural practices, and emotional responses through physical expression. It nurtures balance, coordination, and creativity, offering a kinesthetic entry point into transdisciplinary learning. Music supports learners in making connections between rhythm, pattern, culture, and communication. Whether composing, performing, or responding to music, students engage with diverse forms of expression that reinforce their understanding of other disciplines, such as mathematics, languages, and social studies.

Unit celebrations at TIS Primary School Campus are vibrant showcases where the Performing Arts come alive. Students often create performances synthesising their inquiries, presenting them through original skits, dance choreographies, or musical interpretations.



At TIS Primary School Campus, the Arts are not taught in isolation but are thoughtfully integrated into the transdisciplinary learning experience. Through Visual and Performing Arts, learners inquire, reflect, and express their understanding in meaningful, personal, and globally connected ways. The Arts foster voice, choice, and ownership, key elements of learner agency and help nurture compassionate, creative, and internationally minded individuals. Artistic experiences support students in exploring identity, celebrating diversity, and communicating ideas across cultures. Performances and exhibitions reflect the depth of classroom inquiry, while collaboration in the Arts builds empathy, confidence, and critical thinking. Learners develop lifelong skills that inspire curiosity, creativity, and joy by using the Arts as a tool for exploration and expression.





13 EFFECTIVE STUDY STRATEGIES TO HELP STUDENTS LEARN

Strategies for Avoiding Distractions

- 1. Change your space (make it distraction-free).
- 2. Don't choose distraction (don't multitask).
- 3. Ask: Do you want social media or Enjoy it? (There is a difference between wanting to go on social media and actually enjoying being online may be significant to the student.)
- 4. Plan breaks (if constantly distracted you may need a break. Planned breaks are more effective than spontaneous ones.)
- 5. It's still school. (Parents can help students structure their mindsets to tune out distractions.)

Why We Procrastinate & How to Fight it

- 6. Start work in class (simply beginning the work makes headway against procrastination.)
- Use a Planner and make it a habit. (When students don't plan or schedule, their work, they struggle. When planning, whatever time estimate you come up with, double it.)
- 8. Practise breaking down tasks. (Students need to learn how to break up large tasks into bite-size chunks.


How to Know When to Stop Studying

- 9. Feeling that you know something is not reliable. (When students assess whether they know a topic, they should consider whether they're only familiar with it.)
- 10. Studying until you know is not enough. (To protect themselves against forgetting, students should plan their studying so that it includes time to study even after mastering a self-test.)
- 11. Creating study materials is studying. (Making their own study guides or flashcards not only allows students to review their notes but ensures the materials they use are on topic and accurate.
- 12. 'Knowing' means being able to explain. (Knowledge means being able to explain it to oneself.)
- 13. Use in-class queries. (Quick tests that require students to produce knowledge allows them to check their understanding of a concept.)







#MYP - Service as Action - *Mildred's Corner*



This column is dedicated to an initiative by Mildred Okyere-Darkwa, Grade 9, who reviews the books she reads in an effort to encourage or foster the culture of reading among peers. In this edition, she reviews a book titled *The Body Keeps the Score* by **Bessel Van Der Kolk**

Trauma Today

Throughout human society, people have been both the recipients and givers of traumatic events. These traumas have shaped the way society has evolved and the very values we live by. This review highlights trauma and what happens in the brain during a traumatic event.

What is Trauma?

In the book, The Body Keeps the Score, the author describes trauma as " not the story of something that happened back then, but the current imprint of that pain, horror, and fear living inside [the individual]." What is meant by this is that trauma is the effect of an adverse event on the way you organise your life. When you go through a traumatic event, you cease to move forward; you are still stuck

in that distressing moment, ever frozen in the emotions you experienced, never moving on from that situation, even if others move on without you.

The Science of Trauma

When people think of trauma, they think of damaged/broken people, inability to function well in society and other external views of trauma, but how about what happens on the inside? When someone experiences a traumatic experience, the amygdala becomes overactive and over-sensitive, which leads to heightened fear and stringer memory imprinting. The prefrontal cortex, which is responsible for rational thinking, is deactivated, which makes it hard for the person to think logically. Then the hippocampus (the memory centre) is disrupted, leading to fragmented and broken memories. Finally, you have an influx of stress hormones to the brain, such as cortisol and adrenaline, which increase heart rate and, in extreme cases, damage the hippocampus, leading to PTSD. These are the physical components that produce that fractured and frozen effect of trauma.

Dealing with Trauma

Previously, trauma was thought to be only experienced by war veterans or people who lived in extremely unique situations, but it has become obvious that trauma is something that can be experienced by everyone everywhere. The absolute truth of the issue is that trauma is more common than people believe. In actuality, one out of five women in America has a history of sexual molestation. Even a lot of men have histories of sexual molestation. One out of four kids get beaten very hard by their parents. One out of eight kids see physical fights between their parents. Trauma is prevalent, and so we should learn to deal with it because it's a part of life. According to the book, there are four common steps to deal with trauma.

First, acknowledge the experience; allow

yourself to know that whatever happened, happened, then seek support.

- Speak to trusted people to help you navigate through that tough time.
- Practise self-care, leisure, hobbies, exercises and personal grooming.
- Seek professional attention, such as talk therapy.

Putting it into practice

Let's realise that life is a series of ups and downs. Sometimes, these downs may hit us so hard that we feel stuck and frozen, but these hits are not the end, and one can heal from the scars and bruises. Let's keep this in mind as we go through school and when we speak to people. Whatever we do, we may not be givers or receivers of traumatic experiences.


The project is structured in phases to address key needs:

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



On Monday, 15 April, 18 students from the IB Class of 2026 officially launched the EducAid Mante Initiative with a powerful Community Engagement Visit to Mante School of Excellence in Afienya. And what an experience it was!

Divided into focused working groups, the students engaged with the Mante school community through classroom teaching, student discussions, canteen support, and an IT lab needs assessment. Each group had the opportunity to interact meaningfully with students, teachers, and staff, gaining deep insights into the school's challenges and hopes.

Open Book Exam pilot

DP Economics

Your school has been chosen to participate in a study looking into the impact of offering different types of open book exams on the whole school community. In this case your school will be piloting an OBE in the DP Economics paper 1 exam.

We would like to inform you on what this will mean for the students taking this exam at your school.

- 1. Students will be sitting the exact same paper but will be allowed to prepare and bring in a maximum of 2 A4 pages summarizing real-world examples that students may use in the exam.
- 2. Student summaries will be allowed to be either in the format of mind maps or short written summaries for each real-world example up to a maximum of 60 words per example and approximately 1200 words in total.
- 3. Students may use a combination of both mind-maps and written summaries.
- 4. Written or digital versions of their resources are allowed but written is recommended.
- 5. If students choose to write their resource, this must be legible.
- 6. Students must not include definitions of terminology, explanations of concepts and theories, nor any analysis or evaluation.
- Students will not be allowed to include visuals including tables, figures, or diagrams.
- 8. Different colours will be allowed, as well as bullet points and acronyms.
- 9. Students will be allowed to include details of real-world examples not in their resource should they wish.
- 10. Student resources will need to be checked at least 1 month before the exam.

REFLECTIONS ON THE RECENT MYP DESIGN COMPETITION

Joel Ahiakpor: The Design the Experience AIS competition was an excellent experience for me. Honestly, I wasn't that interested initially, but I enjoyed it once we started. We reviewed the guidelines AIS sent and planned what we wanted to create. As a team, we decided to design a model of an inclusive learning hub for students in rural areas. My role was to make the 3D model, which wasn't too challenging because of my experience using Blender for my Personal Project.

After finishing the 3D model, we created the physical model. This part of the process opened my eyes and helped me better understand the process of creating physical architectural designs. There were some ups and downs, especially since we were short on time, but we pushed through and gave it our all. Ultimately, we were proud of what we created and achieved second place.

Overall, this competition helped me improve my 3D modelling skills and gave me a deeper understanding of design and architecture.

Throughout this, we challenged ourselves and set foundations to reach new heights.

Bruhan-Deen Hussein: Attending the Association International School's Design the Experience conference was a very enlightening experience. I was first apprehensive about enrolling since I was unsure of my preparedness, and the competition's size seemed intimidating. But with my facilitator's support, I decided to take a chance and dedicate myself to the task. Preparing for the competition over the Easter break was challenging because my team and I were dispersed across several sites with competing schedules and little funding. We adjusted, worked together online, and gave the job our best effort despite these challenges.

Our efforts were rewarded when we took second place, which felt satisfying considering the situation. The things I learned—the worth of moving outside of my comfort zone, the strength of resilience, and the significance of teamwork—stuck with me the most, even after the accolades. This event served as a reminder that uncertainty is frequently the starting point for progress and that, with enough willpower, even the most difficult obstacles may turn into turning points in life.
