



#### Assemblies

Through performances, exhibitions, presentations, and demonstrations, students actively share their understanding with peers, parents, and the school community. Each celebration reflects the transdisciplinary nature of the IB curriculum and emphasises student agency and voice.

Throughout the event, it was clear that students had taken ownership of their learning, asking questions, making connections, and exploring concepts in ways that were appropriate for their age and developmental stage. Nursery and early years learners, for example, confidently shared their understanding of family and community through songs, simple storytelling, and visual displays. In the lower primary, students brought personal experiences into the classroom, retelling family stories or dramatising folktales, showing their ability to link classroom discussions to their own lives. Upper primary students took these ideas further by analysing the significance of traditions, presenting researched stories from different cultures, and reflecting on how the past influences the present.

#### **Exploring Beyond the Classroom: Field Trips**

This semester has been full of discovery and hands-on learning, as our learners stepped outside the classroom to connect with the real world. Carefully selected field trips helped deepen understanding across various Units of Inquiry, sparking curiosity and allowing learners to experience how knowledge is applied in everyday life. These field trips went beyond just supporting what was taught in the classroom. They sparked genuine curiosity, helped learners make real-world connections, and made learning exciting and memorable.

We truly appreciate the support of our teachers, parents, and community partners who helped make these meaningful experiences happen.







Grade 2 and Grade 5 explored Trashy Bags Africa, where they saw how waste materials are creatively transformed into useful products such as bags, pencil cases, rugs, and more. This experience helped learners appreciate the value of recycling, sustainability, and entrepreneurial thinking, inspiring them to think differently about environmental responsibility.



**Grade 4** had the opportunity to visit **Parliament House**, where they inquired into government systems. They met with some Ministers and Members of Parliament, gaining insight into how decisions are made and how leadership works at a national level.



Our Early Years learners enjoyed a cultural exploration at the Ga Mantse's (Chief's) Palace, where they learned about the Ga culture, including traditions, language, and the role of traditional leadership in the community.

## Action

At TIS Primary School Campus, student action is a vital part of learning. They are encouraged to apply their knowledge in meaningful ways and make a difference in their communities. Whether it is organizing donation drives, raising awareness, or leading initiatives, students take action that reflects their understanding and values. Through action, students embody the IB Learner Profile and that encourages them to become caring, principled, and reflective individuals who strive to make the world a better place. Their involvement encourages responsibility, strengthens their voice, and deepens their learning.

## **Student Initiatives Encouraging Action in the Learning Community.**

At the end of their unit, Grade 3 learners created their own festival to showcase their understanding. They brought food to share, celebrating togetherness and community. Alongside this, they had also explored a unit on role models, which inspired them to invite their own role models to speak. These guests shared their experiences and motivations, allowing students to extend their learning and connect meaningfully with the wider community.

Grade 4 students took meaningful action by organising a food drive featuring solely local meals, connecting directly to their unit on culture and community. As part of their fashion week, linked to their fashion unit, students also dressed up in diverse outfits throughout the week, celebrating self-expression, creativity, and cultural identity. They concluded the week with a vibrant showcase where students proudly shared the stories behind their outfits, deepening their appreciation for one another's backgrounds and traditions, and coming together as one.



#### **Students Showing Citizenship Through Giving**

As part of their unit on citizenship under the theme "*How We Organise Ourselves*", our Grade 6 students explored what it means to be responsible members of a community. Guided by the central idea, "*Citizenship requires responsible participation*," they were inspired to take meaningful action. In a touching display of empathy and civic responsibility, the students organised a donation drive in support of the Tetteh Ocloo State School for the Deaf.

In collaboration with the Grade 5 and Grade 2 students, and driven by their shared commitment to the environment based on their unit learning, they also donated dustbins to the school and to transport yards in the community. They further took the initiative to educate others on the importance of keeping the environment clean.

Several students played music for their classmates, positively impacting their mental health, while others designed handmade artworks and sold them, contributing to the donation efforts.


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#### **Book Day**

#### **THE CONNECTION: PYP6 Overnight Stay**

The overnight stay on the secondary campus is one of the initiatives designed to ensure a smooth transition for our PYP learners. It is an opportunity for our young learners from the primary campus to have a foretaste of the unique boarding school experience at the secondary campus.





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#### #MYP – Service as Action Developing Ideas from Classroom Units

#### Grade 7 students connect Science with Service



Following last week's spotlight on Carla Vodzi and Uriel Wulff-Tagoe's Mathematics project, this week we turn our attention to Grade 7 students Ayden Tinkah and Anwardeen Hussein, who are creatively connecting Science with service. As part of their unit titled "Cells -May the Force Be with You", they explored the MYP learning outcome "Perseverance in Action" by taking a principled stand to raise awareness about the human SPLEEN — a vital but often overlooked organ. Their service project involved designing an informative and visually engaging poster aimed at educating their peers about the spleen's role in maintaining health. This thoughtful initiative is an excellent example of how classroom learning can spark meaningful action and empower students to become responsible, informed contributors to their communities.

What Is the Spleen?

The **spleen** is a soft, fist-sized organ located on the upper left side of your abdomen, just under the rib cage. Even though it's not often talked about, the spleen plays several important roles in keeping your body healthy.

It helps to:

- Filter your blood by removing old or damaged red blood cells.
- Fight infections by producing white blood cells.
- Store platelets that help with blood clotting.
- Recycle iron from used red blood cells.

#### **Example:**

Imagine your bloodstream is like a busy road with lots of cars (blood cells). The spleen acts like a traffic control centre — it removes broken-down vehicles, keeps the road clear, and sends out help (immune cells) when there's an accident (infection). Without it, things could get pretty chaotic!

#### Here are Reflections from the students:

This semester, my Service as Action journey has been exciting, challenging, and full of learning. From the early days of generating ideas to the final steps of completing our project, it felt like a rollercoaster ride with lots of ups and downs, but ultimately, a great sense of accomplishment.

At first, I wasn't sure what kind of service project to do. There were numerous choices, but none of them stood out. However, after discussing the matter with my partner, Ayden, we decided to focus on something unusual yet interesting: the spleen. We discovered that many people are unaware of the spleen's function or its location in the body. That surprised us, and we wanted to make a change.




We learned that the spleen is very important; it helps clean our blood, recycles iron, and supports the immune system. Knowing this, we felt responsible to share what we had learned with our school community. We created a colourful and educational poster to raise awareness and educate students at TIS about the spleen's role in maintaining our health.

Working on the poster was fun and helped

us grow as a team. Ayden and I shared ideas, chose colours, picked out facts, and decided how to make the information easy to understand. We had to make tough decisions, such as which facts to include and how to explain medical terms in simple terms. Sometimes we disagreed, but we always listened to each other and worked things out together. After finishing our poster, we put it up around the school. The feedback was great! Many students told us they had no idea the spleen does so many important things. It felt amazing to know that our hard work made a real difference.

Looking back, I've learned not only about the spleen but also about teamwork, communication, and how to transform an idea into a project that benefits others. I'm proud of what we achieved, and I hope our poster inspires others to take better care of their health. This experience has been a significant part of my semester, and I look forward to undertaking more meaningful projects like this in the future. *Anwardeen Hussein, Grade 7* 

The first idea that came to mind was to inform people about some internal organs that are not widely known or discussed. After doing some research, we discovered an interesting and vital organ called the spleen. Many people are unaware of its function and significance in the human body, so Mandeya and I decided to create a digital poster to educate others about it.



*At the beginning of the project,* we planned to use a landscape layout for the poster. However, after experimenting with the design, we realised that a portrait layout would better suit the content, making the information more transparent and more visually appealing. The final poster includes a brief description of the spleen, its functions, and a fun fact to engage viewers. We also added some visual elements to make the poster more attractive and easier to understand. Overall, the project helped us improve our research, design, and

collaboration skills while also learning something new and exciting about the human body. Ayden Tinkah, Grade 7.






The session offered valuable insights into the programme schedule, rules and regulations on the Harvard campus, expectations for student conduct,


and collaborative projects that foster artistic expression and global understanding.


The Primary School Campus Grade 6 sleepover experience provided valuable opportunities for socialisation, teamwork, and personal growth.






