Some parents (and students) are failing the weekly reading test - reading the weekly TIS Bulletin.


There are dates marked on the school calendar overview when there are no exeats due to an important school event. Tomorrow is an example. Yet there have been an abundance of requests this week.

### **Exeats**

Exeats for secondary school students cover passport and visa matters, family events, as well as medical, dental, optical and medical appointments.

Students are allowed a maximum of 8 days per semester. Note: A weekend exeat that commences on Friday and ends on Sunday counts as three days.

For a weekend exeat, students must return by 5.00pm on the Sunday.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approved exeat from their phone to security to enter.

(NO SHOW. NO GO.)

Families should plan their exeat requests carefully to avoid any disappointment.



### **Learning Meets the Spotlight**

At Tema International School (TIS) Primary School Campus, assemblies are an essential part of our learning culture. They provide students with opportunities to share their learning, showcase skills, and reflect on their growth in front of the school community. More than just performances, assemblies are moments of collaboration between students and teachers that highlight the values of the International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Programme (PYP). Through assemblies, students develop key Approaches to Learning (ATL) skills such as communication, social, thinking, research, and self-management skills. They learn to express ideas clearly, work with peers, explore topics in depth, take responsibility, and present confidently to an audience.

Assemblies are not only beneficial to students but also to teachers and parents. Teachers gain insights into how students are making connections across disciplines, applying concepts, and embodying the IB Learner Profile attributes. Parents are allowed to witness their children's learning in action, celebrate their growth, and connect more closely with the school community. In this way, assemblies nurture a sense of shared ownership in the learning journey.

### **Unit Assemblies**

Weekly Unit Assemblies are the heartbeat of inquiry at TIS. They give students a platform to showcase what they are learning in their Units of Inquiry across subjects such as science, mathematics, languages, and the arts. Through skits, experiments, songs, digital projects, or storytelling, students learn to communicate ideas clearly and creatively. These assemblies strengthen communication skills (presenting to audiences), thinking skills (making connections between concepts), and research skills (gathering and sharing information). For students, the benefit is building confidence and ownership of their learning. Teachers gain authentic evidence of how well concepts are being understood, while parents see firsthand the growth and achievements of their children. Unit Assemblies create a vibrant cycle of reflection, celebration, and community learning.









### **Grade 6 Unit Assembly**

The class assembly is always a highlight for students, as they eagerly anticipate the chance to share their learning with the wider community. It is a time when their voices take center stage,

and they proudly showcase the knowledge, skills, and understandings gained from their unit of inquiry. Together with their teachers, students collaborate to decide on the focus of the presentation and the most creative and meaningful ways to communicate it. This collaborative process not only builds confidence but also strengthens their sense of ownership and responsibility for their learning.

Students approach the assembly with great dedication because they see it as more than just a performance—it is an authentic action that grows out of their inquiry. By sharing their discoveries, they also invite the audience to reflect and consider changes we can make in our attitudes, habits, and daily lives. In this way, the class assembly becomes both a celebration of learning and a call to action, inspiring the entire community to think differently and act responsibly.


### Early Years Assemblies: Learning, Sharing and Growing Together

In the Early Years, assemblies are a special time where our youngest students come together to share their learning, celebrate achievements, and build confidence. Each assembly is carefully planned to reflect the different themes being explored in each class, whether it is friendships, family, water, or stories. The beauty and uniqueness of the Early Years presentations is that, though each class explores a different transdisciplinary theme and unit, careful thought goes into building authentic connections that weave all the themes into one seamless and genuine story. Anyone witnessing the performance would never guess that each class is exploring a different unit of inquiry.

Teachers (Homeroom and Additional Subjects) collaborate with students to create engaging presentations that allow every child to participate in ways that suit their age and development. Students sing songs, recite rhymes, retell stories, showcase art, or share reflections about what they are discovering.

These assemblies go beyond performance; they nurture communication skills, encourage teamwork, and give students the joy of expressing themselves in front of an audience. Teachers and peers alike take delight in seeing how much the early years learners are growing in confidence, creativity, and understanding of the world around them.

Early Years assemblies truly celebrate the journey of learning, one little step at a time.



### Language Assemblies

Language assemblies are a wonderful program that allows students to share their learning with peers. They provide opportunities for students to engage in meaningful communication and apply their knowledge in diverse ways. In collaboration with language teachers, we incorporate Sign Language, French, and Mandarin, bringing each unit of study to life. Through these assemblies, students take ownership of their learning while enhancing their communication skills. They also develop confidence as they perform before an audience, celebrating both individual and collective achievements. The assemblies foster cultural appreciation, enabling students to connect with diverse global perspectives. Most importantly, they inspire curiosity and a genuine love for languages, making learning both purposeful and enjoyable.



### **French Award**

When choosing the student to whom the award is given, I look out for the following: The student who checks tasks and completes them on time. The student who checks French resources on discussions and responds to them, if there's homework on discussions, he/ she strives to complete them. The student is attentive in class, actively participates in class engagements, is enthusiastic, strives to pronounce words clearly (perfection isn't what I look for, but the determination and willingness to learn the French language) - Miss Ruth, French Teacher

### Sign Language Award

Students in the various classes are closely monitored during the sign language lessons. They are observed on their performance in areas such as participation, hand shapes, ability to complete their tasks, and how well they remember what they have learned. They are also monitored on how well they apply their learning across the various subjects, both in and out of the classroom. Over a span of two weeks, the student whose performance stands out is selected to receive the award.

### **Mother Tongue Assemblies**

Once a semester, our mother tongue assemblies, featuring Ga, Ewe, and Twi, celebrate the rich linguistic and cultural diversity at TIS. Students perform songs, plays, recitations, or cultural displays that bring languages and traditions to life. These assemblies sharpen communication skills (expressing oneself in different languages), social skills (developing intercultural understanding), and critical thinking skills (making connections between language and identity). Students gain pride in their heritage and develop an appreciation for global cultures, teachers witness the authentic application of language learning, and parents see their children's confidence and growth as multilingual communicators. Language Assemblies remind the community that language is not just a subject but a gateway to connection and identity.

### **Thematic Assemblies**

Thematic Assemblies, often aligned with global events like Teachers' Day and International Sign Language Day, and Earth Day, connect learning to real-world contexts. Students create performances, presentations, or dialogues that encourage the community to think critically about current issues. These assemblies, though sometimes embedded within unit or achievement assemblies, promote thinking skills (analysing problems, making judgments), research skills (finding information on global topics), and communication skills (advocating for change). Students learn to see themselves as global citizens, teachers engage with broader themes that enrich inquiry, and parents witness their children's awareness of and empathy toward global challenges. 




### Class of the Day

We have a well-structured set of criteria used to assess each class's performance over a two-week period. The "Class of the Day" team carefully observes the behavior and performance of all classes, both inside and outside the classroom, based on these guidelines. After gathering their observations, the team meets to discuss and score each class out of five according to the criteria. Once the scores are tallied, the class with the highest score is declared the winner of the award.

### **Special Assemblies**


### The Importance of Assemblies in the Learning Community

Take care to weigh up how much you are relying on Al tools to generate your personal statement. Anything not in your words could get flagged as fraud by UCAS, and could in turn mean you don't receive any offers or have offers withdrawn.



#### Be honest and consider your future options

If you need to rely on Al tools to write your personal statement for you, take some time to consider if the course is right for you. You should be truthful in your personal statement answers; remember that any evidence you mention may need to be reviewed.

#### The UCAS view

The personal statement is exactly that; personal. It is a chance to showcase your passion and research, and explain why you want to study this course.

#### Is using AI to help with my personal statement 'cheating'?

- ✓ Applying for university or college about whether using tools like ChatGPT to help with your UCAS personal statement is considered 'cheating'.
- ✓ Generating (and then copying, pasting and submitting) all or a large part of your personal statement from an AI tool such as ChatGPT, and presenting it as your own words, could be considered cheating by universities and colleges and could affect your chances of an offer.
- ✓ When you complete your application, you now have to declare that your personal statement hasn't been copied or provided from another source, including artificial intelligence software.
- ✓ The UCAS Verification Team run checks to detect fraudulent applications and patterns of similarity in personal statements. Read our guide to fraud and verification and similarity.
- ✓ If UCAS software detects elements of a personal statement that are similar to others, the universities or colleges it is intended for may be notified. Be authentic!

First SAT is a standardized test widely used for college/university admissions, especially in the United States. It mainly tests Mathematics and English (Reading & Writing) skills. It helps universities assess your academic readiness, opens scholarship opportunities, and can strengthen your application. PSAT Preliminary SAT, it is basically a Practice test but most importantly in the US, high scores on the PSAT by citizens can also qualify students for scholarships.

Regardless of the fact that you are going to the UK or countries that don't really need your SAT scores to enter into the school, you are encouraged to take the test, because of how university applications keep changing and parents change their minds. It consists of Maths and English. And it is best to take it now. DP 1 first semester is best advice to take the test to focus on other things like EE, and IA as Dr. Ken stresses on it. PSAT helps you to have a feel on what SAT feels like. You are allowed to take PSAT before taking SAT, just to have a feel of how the test is.





#### The Urgency of the Cause in Ghana

Tema International School

Every year, approximately **8,000** children in Ghana are born with congenital heart conditions (Children's HeartLink, 2023). Each open-heart surgery costs about GHC 110,000, far beyond the reach of most families. As a result, many children remain untreated. Currently, over 1,200 children are on the waiting list for heart surgery at Korle Bu Teaching Hospital, Ghana's national cardiothoracic centre, where limited ICU space and resources create long delays (Mending Kids, n.d.).

This reality makes it clear: the High School Praise is not just an evening of music, but a **life-saving** initiative.





#### ASA Cooking Club - Grade 8

**Instructor:** Ms Bernice Bawah

#### **Plantain Kebab**

#### **Ingredients**

- Ripe or semi-ripe plantain (peeled, sliced into cubes or chunks)
- Sausages (sliced into pieces)
- Salt (to taste)
- Onions (cut into chunks)
- Green pepper (cut into chunks)
- Skewers (wooden)

#### **Process**

#### Prepare the plantain

- Peel and cut the plantain into medium cubes.
- Lightly sprinkle with salt.
- Fry until golden brown (not too soft). Set aside.

#### Prepare the sausage

- Slice the sausage into bite-sized pieces.
- Fry or grill lightly until golden.
- Add vegetables (onion and green pepper).

#### Assemble the kebab

Arrange pieces on the skewers alternately: plantain → sausage → onion → green pepper → repeat.

#### Serve

• Serve hot with ketchup, chili sauce, or any dip of choice.

#### **Students' Reflections from the Cooking Class**

The cooking club has been very different, as this first meeting was both informative and fun. It taught me about cooking while also making sure that people were safe (thanks to Ms Bernice). My clubmates and I learned how to make plantain and sausage skewers.

The first thing we did was wash our hands to prevent the food from being contaminated. That made me feel safe, because nobody likes to eat contaminated food. Then we learned how to cut plantain, peppers, and sausages. We also washed the utensils we had used. Each of us took turns frying and stirring the food.

In the end, we assembled the skewers with plantain, sausage, onions, and green peppers. While waiting for the last batch of plantains, we took some food to Mama Su. She was happy and grateful, and we were glad she liked it. Back in the kitchen, we tried what we had made, and it was good!

I also practised my ATL collaboration skills, working and cutting alongside different peers. This club was informative and educational, as I learned a great deal about cooking and developed my teamwork skills. **Joshua Tham, G8**


My first cooking club was delightful. Although I arrived a little late, I still learned many valuable things. We chopped vegetables, plantains, and sausages. I was quite good at it.





## Email Etiquette

It always helps to be polite.

## Checklist for DISTURBING CONTENT

Work out whether the content is right for your child.

It might be around their age or just their personality, but trust your gut and put boundaries in place.



Read up on the issues it explores. If you show that you are comfortable and knowledgeable with the issues it explores your kids are more likely to open up to you during a tough time.



Stay up to date with pop culture. You may not care about the Bieber's or Beyonce's of this world

but following sites like Pedestrian.tv and news.com.au will help you stay ahead of the game.



Make sure they know that not everything they see is how it appears. Have a frank conversation about not taking everything on the internet at face value.



Tell them that they don't have to watch something if they don't want to.

Brainstorm ways they can say no to their peers and feel confident making their own decisions.



Encourage them to practice self-care. If they are going to watch something make sure they've got an arsenal of things to pick them back up

afterwards.



Offer to watch it with


them. That way you can talk through anything tough as it comes up. This can be useful even if they've already seen the content.
