Exeats

Exeats for secondary school students cover passport and visa matters, family events, as well as medical, dental, optical and medical appointments.

Students are allowed a maximum of 8 days per semester. Note: A weekend exeat that commences on Friday and ends on Sunday counts as three days.

For a weekend exeat, students must return by 5.00pm on the Sunday.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approved exeat from their phone to security to enter.



TRACING OUR STEPS: OUR SEMESTER RETROSPECTIVE



FROM THE DESK OF THE PYPC

The first semester of the year has been marked by steady progress in student learning and strong commitment to inquiry-based teaching across all grade levels. Students have continued to deepen their understanding, make meaningful connections across subject areas, and demonstrate creativity in their learning.

School Evaluation

The school evaluation exercise was conducted successfully in September 2025. Thanks to the dedication of the entire school community, all required documentation was

completed on time and submitted. The commitment of every member of the school community played a role in this success. Generally, the Primary School stood out as an authentic station for the implementation of IB PYP.

Curriculum Review

As a school, we found it necessary to bridge the gap between the PYP and MYP, and this process began with a Continuum Workshop at the start of the semester. The workshop set the foundation for aligning practices across programs, and we further continued with a review of the Scope and Sequence and adaptation of the IB 2025 documents. Weekly teacher-led Readings and reflections on MyIB are ongoing. These collective efforts are vital to keeping our teaching practices current, consistent, and effective. To effectively monitor this, the PYP and MYP Coordinators set aside time to meet fortnightly to discuss the way forward.

Professional Development (PD)

Teachers continue to benefit from professional growth opportunities. Preparations are underway for the next PD sessions, which will run concurrently. One session, Agency, Action

EARLY YEARS CORNER



This semester, our nursery learners explored "Who We Are" and "How We Organize Ourselves." Through fun, play-based activities like colouring body parts, role-playing feelings, children learned about themselves, their friends and how people work together.

Our little learners showed kindness, sharing, and independence every day. Their curiosity and excitement made learning through play joyful and meaningful. We are proud of how much they have grown this semester. As we reach the end of the semester, we proudly celebrate the wonderful learning journey our Kinder 1 learners have experienced through our first two units of inquiry: How We Organise Ourselves and Who We Are.

We began the semester with the unit *How We Organise Ourselves*, exploring the central idea: People play different roles in the family to which they belong. Through stories, role-play, picture discussions, and sharing personal experiences, the children discovered why family members take on different responsibilities, how these roles connect to one another, and the

importance of showing respect within a family system. They demonstrated growing awareness of family structures, responsibilities, and their own place within their families.

Our second unit, *Who We Are*, focused on identity and personal growth. Learners explored how they have changed since they were babies, what they can do now, and what makes each of them

unique. Using stories, movement activities, art, math tasks, and reflection discussions, the children developed confidence in expressing themselves and making meaningful connections to their own experiences. They showed increased independence, stronger communication skills, and a deeper understanding of themselves and others.

Across both units, our Kinder 1 learners demonstrated curiosity, eagerness, and joyful participation in all classroom activities. We are grateful for your support and look forward to continued growth and discovery next semester. We wish all families a restful and joyful break.



This semester has been a rewarding and meaningful journey in Kinder 3 as we explored our units. During our unit on 'Sharing the Planet' with a focus on water, the learners explored the many ways water is used in our daily lives. They investigated sinking and floating, enjoyed

Collaborative learning was a strong part of our classroom culture. The children worked together to solve problems, share observations, and support one another during tasks. Their communication skills grew remarkably, with many learners now expressing their ideas more clearly during circle time and class reflections. This sense of community made the learning environment warm, joyful, and inclusive.



Across both units, the learners demonstrated growth in independence, collaboration, and inquiry. They engaged in meaningful learning through play, hands-on tasks, and reflection. As a teacher, it has been inspiring to watch each child grow in confidence and curiosity. I look forward to continuing this journey with them as we build on their strengths and encourage new challenges next semester.



This semester has been a wonderful learning journey for our Grade 1 class. We explored new ideas, built new skills, and grew more confident in our work. The students enjoyed hands-on activities, shared their thinking during discussions, and supported each other in class tasks. They have shown progress in reading, writing, math, and their unit of inquiry. We are proud of how much they have learned and how they continue to show curiosity, kindness, and effort every day. We look forward to more learning and growth next semester.

As the semester comes to a close, we have taken time to reflect on the exciting learning journey our Grade 2 students have experienced. This term has been filled with curiosity, hands-on exploration, and steady growth across all areas of learning. Our "Who We Are" unit was a wonderful start to the year, with students enthusiastically participating in activities such as the brushing-teeth demonstration, simple experiments, preparing healthy snacks, and our much-appreciated dental screening day. These experiences helped them build important understandings about well-being and the choices that help us stay healthy. This semester also offered rich opportunities for creative expression. Book Day was a major highlight, as learners proudly wrote and shared their own books, impressing everyone with their imaginative ideas and growing confidence as writers. Our Unit Celebration further showcased their understanding of how every person plays a role in keeping the community strong. Students presented their ideas thoughtfully and collaboratively, demonstrating teamwork and strong communication skills.

Another significant moment was our Unit Assembly, where students shared their learning through drama on caring for natural resources such as rivers and mountains. They also presented in French and Sign Language and performed a lively dance, showing how learning can be expressed in many forms. Their enthusiasm and commitment made the assembly a memorable celebration for everyone. Our trip to Shai Hills was another standout learning experience. Being outdoors and seeing landforms in real life helped students make deep connections to our unit on physical features of the Earth. Their excitement and curiosity were evident as they explored, asked questions, and built on their classroom learning.

Overall, the semester has gone very well, and we are proud of how much our Grade 2 learners have grown academically, socially, and as members of the TIS community. We look forward to a restful holiday for all and an energetic return as we begin a new semester in January.







This semester was a fast track one as we had a host of events to accompany regular academic activities. From the perspective of the grade 3 class, it was nothing short of an exciting adventure of inquiry. Our three units steered inquiry and experiences that were authentic that one of the students confessed, "This is like university work."

Among other things we visited an EV company, dramatised a Japanese folktale namely *Yoshi*, *the Stonecutter*, and studied cubism from the old art masters during our first unit alone. In that unit our focus was exploring the imagination and guide. Our second unit centred around beliefs, values and role models. Quite the cocktail of personal ideas and points of view we had, as students told personal stories of their heroes. The stories whose importance eked into the class presentation as a prominent part of the Ajenuloo Unit celebration. We capped the semester with a unit about natural resources and sustainability, which led us into the Shai Hill reserve for an adventure with nature along with the Grades 2 and 6. Students came off this unit with real insight about real world problems, and understanding of the nature of some major national issues like food shortages and illegal mining.



This semester has been a vibrant journey of inquiry, creativity, and real-world learning! We began with our first unit, *How the World Works*, where our visit to KOFA Technologies ignited students' curiosity about renewable energy and innovation. Their excitement led to meaningful action suggestions such as planting trees to support a healthier environment and even building a model car powered by a battery, just like the ones they saw at KOFA.



In our second unit, *How We Organize Ourselves*, students stepped confidently into the world of leadership and governance. They debated everyday school issues, including rules, meals, activities with passion and reason, and explored global governance systems with impressive insight. As action, they drafted sections for the school's Code of Conduct and proposed expectations for the Student Council. Once reviewed and approved, these student-written contributions could become part of our official school documents; a true example of student voice in action!

The third unit and one of the most anticipated immersed learners in first impressions, behaviour, perceptions, fashion, culture, and creative expression through the unit, 'How We Express Ourselves'. Students explored clothing styles, cultural attire, and the messages conveyed through appearance and behaviour. Their interactions with fashion designers brought their research to life, inspiring them to sketch illustrations, create handmade accessories, and eventually host their own fashion show featuring a blend of vintage and modern trends.

Mathematics came alive through real-life tasks such as taking accurate body measurements, converting units, exploring cultural geometric shapes, and designing authentic patterns. To deepen their understanding of sustainability, students would visit a fashion house committed to recycling and upcycling, seeing firsthand how creativity and environmental responsibility can work beautifully together.

We were also delighted to welcome new students from various nationalities, enriching our classroom community with fresh perspectives and diverse cultural experiences. Throughout the semester, students engaged enthusiastically in whole-school events such as TIS Founders' Day and Spirit Week, which quickly became a highlight thanks to the exciting themes and creative energy they brought to each day. During our school-wide Celebration of Learning (Ajenuloo), their debating skills and confidence shone brightly as they presented ideas with clarity and passion. The joy continued into Book Week, where the activities added a magical touch to our learning atmosphere. Across all these experiences, students consistently demonstrated the Learner Profile attributes and ATL skills: their thinking, social, self-management, research, and communication strengths were evident not only in their class jobs, which they embraced proudly, but also in their daily interactions and growing sense of responsibility as young leaders in our school community.

Across all three units, students have built strong knowledge, sharpened essential skills, and grown into confident communicators, thinkers, and creators who are ready to take on new challenges with curiosity and enthusiasm



















As the semester draws to a close, we have taken the opportunity to reflect thoughtfully on the learning and growth demonstrated by our Grade 5 students. This term has been filled with curiosity, teamwork, and steady progress in all areas of learning. We watched students explore ideas with more confidence, ask thoughtful questions, and use their understanding in meaningful ways. Their commitment to the IB Learner Profile stood out as they showed openness during discussions, care for one another, and responsible behaviour that supported a positive learning environment. Their involvement in whole-school events, especially the Unit Celebration "Ajenuloo," gave them the chance to show creativity, teamwork, and pride in their cultural knowledge.

Students also made strong progress in their personal and social development. They took part in Book Day activities with enthusiasm, engaging in character dress-up, storytelling, and shared reading. Many students managed their time better, worked well with classmates, and sought help when they needed it. They followed classroom routines and essential agreements more consistently, helping keep our space calm and supportive for learning.

These achievements also benefit the greater school community. As students become more confident, responsible, and cooperative, they help build a school culture of respect and active participation. Their contributions to major events strengthen school spirit, celebrate diversity, and encourage younger students to get involved. By showing strong IB values in their actions, Grade 5 students help make our school a caring, reflective, and engaged learning community.



During this semester, Grade 6 students explored the concept of globalisation and developed an understanding of how technology and trade connect people, cultures, and economies around the world. They learned to appreciate cultural diversity and demonstrated respect for different perspectives. The school assembly provided an authentic platform for students to share their understanding creatively.


Inquiry-based learning featured prominently across subject areas. Students engaged with real-life contexts such as time zones, population figures, and data sets, applying mathematical skills in meaningful ways. They demonstrated solid understanding of place value, number representation, rounding, and measures of central tendency. Connections across mathematics were deepened through investigations of perimeter, area, and volume, which students linked to their understanding of biomes.

In Science, students explored food chains, food webs, and weather patterns to understand how organisms survive and interact within ecosystems. These transdisciplinary connections helped students recognise how mathematical and scientific concepts support their understanding of the natural world.



A key highlight was the interaction with a resource person, a lawyer, whose experiences helped students understand the role of law and how systems function within institutions. This deepened students' understanding of societal structures and made meaningful connections to

the unit of inquiry. The field trip to the Shai Hills Reserve offered hands-on experiences that supported students in deepening their knowledge of biomes and environmental systems.




LANGUAGE TEACHERS

French

This semester in French was rich, hands-on, and deeply connected to the various units of inquiry across grade levels. Students learned a wide range of vocabulary, such as classroom objects, greetings, magic words, emotions, routines, habitats, biomes, technology, art forms, responsible citizenship and more, always in simple, age-appropriate French. They practised key grammatical structures such as *être*, *avoir*, *il y a*, adjectives, simple sentences, and using *Je suis / Je me sens* to express emotions. Many classes recited poems, performed role plays, created drawings, wrote short paragraphs, described chosen biomes or technologies, and



writing. Grade 4 students extended their learning through a mock election and a mini fashion show, demonstrating their ability to use French in meaningful and authentic ways. Other grades created posters that combined visuals with simple French vocabulary and sentences to show their understanding. Overall, the semester was filled with creativity, enthusiasm, and steady progress, and students are building a strong foundation as they continue their language-learning journey.



SIGN LANGUAGE



This semester, our Sign Language classes have been full of energy, curiosity, and meaningful learning. Students have shown enthusiasm in developing their communication skills, exploring new concepts, and applying their knowledge to real-life experiences. Learning was made fun and interactive through role-playing activities, videos, games, and music, allowing students to enjoy themselves while building their signing skills.

They began by learning about their senses and how to sign them, discovering how to express their experiences clearly and confidently. A special highlight was International Sign Language Day, where students generously donated items to the Tetteh Ocloo State School for the Deaf and invited the students to join the celebration, fostering inclusion and friendship.

Throughout the semester, learners also demonstrated their growing skills by presenting posters using clear signed sentences, practicing signs for their rights, clothing items, numbers, and colors, and recognising symbols and their meanings. They connected numbers to real-world

data, such as population figures, and improved their hand shapes, gestures, fluency, and facial expressions, making their signing more accurate and expressive.

Overall, this semester has been a journey of creativity, perseverance, and collaboration, with students using their signing skills to express themselves, learn with joy, and positively impact their community.

MANDARIN



Throughout this semester, students engaged actively in their Mandarin learning and showed steady progress in vocabulary development, sentence construction, and communication skills. Lessons were closely connected to the Units of Inquiry across grade levels, allowing students to explore Mandarin through meaningful contexts such as energy, natural resources, biodiversity, art, conflicts, and creative expression.

Students expanded their vocabulary across a wide range of themes including countries, natural resources, emotions, clothing, colours, places, prepositions, daily actions, citizenship and responsibility, and conflicts. They applied this language in simple conversations, classroom interactions, and reading activities.

They learned to express opinions, describe actions, introduce themselves, talk about resources, identify problems, and suggest solutions. Younger students especially grew in their confidence

using pronouns, basic verbs, measure words, and phonics, while older students demonstrated stronger reasoning in Mandarin when discussing sustainability, social interactions, and the role of the arts.

Students also practiced viewing, reading, and listening using a variety of fiction and non-fiction texts, lists, instructional language, and short videos. Many students demonstrated curiosity by asking questions, exploring new characters, and connecting language to real-world concepts.

Overall, students showed enthusiasm during group tasks, games, arts-integrated activities, and oral practice. Their pronunciation, tone recognition, and reading fluency improved gradually throughout the semester. As they move forward, students are encouraged to continue building sentence fluency, apply vocabulary in longer expressions, and speak more confidently in full sentences during discussions and presentations.

ARTS CORNER



This semester, the Art Department made significant contributions across the school, fully aligning with the IB PYP philosophy of creativity, collaboration, and holistic learning. We

actively supported various class assemblies by helping learners express their understanding of key concepts through visual art, music integration, and simple performance pieces. Our involvement in the Unit Celebration themed *Ajenuloo* was especially impactful, as we collaborated with teachers and students on music creation, set design, and drama direction, allowing learners to showcase their inquiries in a rich, arts-integrated context. Beyond classroom units, the department also played a key role in major whole-school events such as Book Week, Founders' Day, and the Carol Service. Through displays, artworks, themed decorations, and performance support, we helped create engaging, aesthetically meaningful environments that elevated learner agency, creativity, and cultural expression through the arts within the PYP framework.





ADMINISTRATION AND IT DEPARTMENT



The first semester of the academic year has been successful and deeply rewarding. The semester began smoothly with our traditional Meet the Teacher session, which provided parents with an opportunity to engage in one-on-one interactions with teachers. This strong start reinforced effective communication and strengthened collaboration across the school community.

Our enrichment programmes remained consistent and well received, contributing meaningfully to students' holistic development. Throughout the semester, a variety of engaging events and activities enriched learning and fostered community involvement.

The ManageBac Workshop supported parents in navigating the platform effectively, while International Sign Language Day, marked by a memorable visit to the Tetteh Ocloo School for the Deaf, was a significant success, enhanced by strong parental support. Our Sporty Family event further promoted fitness, family bonding, and healthy competition among students.

The campus was energised during Spirit Week, which elevated school spirit and encouraged creativity. The Ajenuloo Unit Celebration showcased students' learning achievements and creative expressions. Similarly, Book Week was highly successful, featuring guest readers and character-themed activities that inspired a love for reading.

Educational field trips across various grades provided students with valuable first-hand learning experiences, deepening their understanding of classroom concepts through real-world exploration.

Overall, the semester has been vibrant, productive and impactful, enhancing teaching, learning and the holistic school experience at Tema International School Primary Campus.



SECURITY

The semester went well, and the semester operations were conducted effectively and without any major incident. The presence of active Orderly patrols, trip supervision, coordinated event management, and security ensured the safety of students, staff, and visitors. For MYP2 – 4 students, the checklist below will be useful in your preparations for next semester (2026).







It is with great joy and immense pride that we share the successful commissioning of a *new toilet facility powered by a solar system* at the Mante School of Excellence, an inspiring milestone led by the IB Class of 2026 as part of their ongoing **EducAid CAS Project**.

On Tuesday, 10 December, a simple yet heartfelt commissioning ceremony was held on the grounds of the Mante School of Excellence. Our Principal, Ms Yvonne Tagoe (affectionately known as Misty), General Manager Mrs Cecilia Oppan, TIS staff, and 33 students representing both the IB Class of 2026 and 2027 were warmly received by the students, staff, and founding family of the Mante School of Excellence.

The atmosphere was filled with unity, gratitude, and celebration as both schools offered cultural and musical performances. In her remarks, Misty praised the students' vision and service spirit and reminded

everyone that the facility must be used with care and maintained for the benefit of future generations.

As part of the ceremony, a beautiful mural titled "Dreams Will Take Flight" was unveiled alongside the solar-powered toilet facility, further symbolising the spirit of hope and transformation this partnership represents.

A Legacy of Leadership and Impact

In a joint reflection, student leaders Ann Gavor and Eliana Essel shared how the IB Class of 2026 embarked on this journey nearly two years ago. What began as a search for a CAS project grew into a full-fledged initiative of collaboration and compassion. With funds raised through Dr Ken Darvall's book sales, Spirit Week TIS@21, Bistro 26, Buddies for Change, furniture-making, the Expression Arts Festival, and "A Day with Mante," the students were able to contribute meaningfully to the school's infrastructure—beginning with the IT Lab and now extending to sanitation and clean energy.

MYP – Service as Action Overview of the Semester







It has been an incredible first semester. Service as Action students have engaged in meaningful experiences, giving them the opportunity to meet the 7 learning outcomes. From creating awareness through the design of posters, writing articles for the school bulletin, and delivering Assembly presentations, students have created a positive impact around the school. Moreover, students have raised funds to support various causes, initiated campaigns, and participated in learning sessions with schools and local centres. These are some of the highlights within the MYP Service as Action classes:

MYP2: Students learned about the basic value of being responsible and caring members of their community. They engaged with the IB Learner Profile, the TIS 4 Pillars, the seven learning outcomes, and the fundamentals of writing authentic reflections. The Grade 7s are poised to take action in the coming semester, equipped with the foundational understanding that small actions can make a huge positive difference.

MYP 3: Students undertook the Community Tour to Zenu No. 1 & 2 Cluster of Schools, the Community 22 Polyclinic, and HopeSetters Autism Center. The aim was to kickstart the introductory phase of the MYP Community Project, which requires students to work in groups to address an authentic issue in their immediate community. The cohort has organised their groups with about 11 diverse projects, most of which are channelled toward improving facilities, infrastructure, and teaching and learning at Zenu School. Students are currently working on their planning and hope to take action in January and February ahead of their exhibition in March.

MYP 4: With new students joining the batch from Grade 8, students took part in a Service as Action refresher, introducing them to the core of the MYP program that encourages meaningful action inspired by classroom units.

In addition, students were introduced to a variety of service opportunities including NGOs and organisations, the UNSDGs, Assembly presentations, contributing to the bulletin, participating in the Peer Buddy/Tutoring System, student leadership, ASAs with service components, and actions inspired by the International Days.

MYP 5: Students focused on completing their pending projects from Grade 9 and finalizing their worksheets on ManageBac with their reflections and experiences. Some notable projects include *Wave of Change*, *Bundle of Joy*, *Motivation Station*, and *Project Horizon*.

Bundle of Joy Project – MYP 5



This is an initiative by Michelle Adjovu, Princess Kuivi, Karen Kasami, and Sameera Abdul-Rashid. Through research, the group found the Princess Marie Children's Hospital—the only government children's hospital in West Africa. It has a rich and moving history that inspired the group to take action. The hospital is 100 years old, and Dr. Cicely Delphine Williams, a Jamaican pediatrician, discovered kwashiorkor (a protein deficiency in children weaned onto a carbohydrate-heavy diet) in the early 1930s while working at Princess Marie Children's Hospital.

They reached out to the hospital, and the PR officer, Mr. Rockson, discussed possible service projects the team could undertake. As the project inched toward December, Mr. Rockson mentioned their annual Christmas party organised for recovering children and nearby orphanages. The team responded and decided to support the Christmas party with snacks and water for the children.

They organized a donuts and cake sale and realized a profit of GHC 2,300. This was used to purchase 15 packs of bottled water, 20 packs of biscuits, 2 packs of lollipops, 8 packs of toffees, 2 packs of Kalypo, 3 packs of Niche Coco drink and 4 packs of fruit delight juice.

Mr. Rockson came over to school to receive the items on behalf of the hospital. He appreciated the efforts of the team and commended their initiative for caring about children on admission at the hospital.


